## Tropical Hurricane Sweeps Coast of Texas and Death Claims Hundreds of Victims

Corpus Christi leads with 130 and Property Damage in that City is set at Four Million Dollars; Other places are Said to have been Completely Destroyed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, Sept. 16.—Corpus Christi leads the mounting list and enormous property damage reported from the coast region which was swept by a tropical hurricane from the Gulf of Mexico on Sunday. The death list at Corpus Christi has risen from 25, as at first reported, until it now reaches 130. Property damage in that town is estimated at \$4,000,000 and many other cities along the coast also suffered heavily.

San Antonio, Sept. 16.—From fifteen to twenty-five people dead and no less than 4,000 are homeless here as a result of the terrific hurricane of Sunday last.

Houston, Texas, Sept. 16.—Port Aransas was completely destroyed by the tropical storm of Sunday which swept the whole line of the Gulf of Mexico.

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 16.—Seventy bodies of flood victims have been taken from the Gulf shore here. They are mutilated beyond recognition.

### REPORTED TO REPORT AN AUTO ACCIDENT

The police court this morning sentenced Joseph A. Heyden to a fine of \$20 for failing to report an auto accident which occurred on Eleventh Ave. two evenings ago. The case was adjourned from Saturday morning when the accused was to appear. The magistrate gave him a warning about his conduct and remarked that he was glad that he wasn't hurt with a more serious offense.

Chou, a Chinaman, appeared charged with a breach of the prohibition Act. He is accused of having liquor in his possession. The case has been adjourned until tomorrow.

Bracken for allowing a dog to run at large was fined \$5 and costs of funds amounting to \$10.

### WISE MAN CHANGES HIS MIND SOMETIMES BUT A FOOL NEVER

Sage Remark Evoked by Discussion Over Purchase of Ford Truck for City.

At the meeting of the City Council last night it was decided to purchase a Ford truck for \$843 f.o.b. Prince Rupert.

This being the first thing Alderman Casey had heard of the proposal, he having been away from the previous meeting, he protested against aldermen changing their minds so easily and so often. Only a short time before they had opposed the purchase on the grounds that it would mean the hiring of a driver.

### GRATUITIES QUESTION IS POSTPONED IN THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Ottawa, Sept. 16.—Parliament returned yesterday to the debate on the address. Col. John A. Currie proceeded to move the adjournment of the debate in order to discuss the question of gratuities, but desisted when it was explained that Major General Mewburn was unavoidably absent. Discussion of this matter will be held up today.

### EIGHT THOUSAND SHIPYARD MEN ARE OUT OF THEIR JOBS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) New York, Sept. 15.—Eight thousand shipyard workers who established a 44-hour week by declaring a strike for every Saturday afternoon and quitting at noon on Saturday last, found themselves out of jobs when they returned to work Monday morning.

### TYPHOONS DO MUCH DAMAGE TO PROPERTY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Houston, Texas, Sept. 15.—Property damage running into hundreds of thousands of dollars has been done along the coast of the Gulf of Mexico by the recurring typhoons. All shipping is held up in the ports.

## Great Industrial Conference Opens

Premier sent Message although too ill to Attend; Mrs. Ralph Smith advises Women to Organize for Equal pay with Men.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Sept. 16.—The first day's proceedings of the National Industrial Conference came to a close an hour ahead of scheduled time. It was found that employees had not their names ready to submit for nomination on the special committees on various subjects when the formation of the committee came before the conference for discussion.

The Labor group was ready and Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, spoke of the need of a real social union. They had buried the spark of trouble which required very little to fan it into flame. The trouble was the high cost of living.

Mrs. Ralph Smith of Vancouver expressed the opinion that women should organize with the purpose of securing equal pay with men.

Premier Borden who was absent owing to illness sent a message which was read by Senator Robertson, Minister of Labor. The message referred to the need of unity among all classes in striving to better labor conditions in Canada.

### LUMBER CARGO BEING SHIPPED FROM ISLANDS

Four Masted Schooner Carrier Dove Loading at Sewell Mills, Masset Inlet.

### VARIOUS ACTIVITIES AT THE QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Masset, Sept. 15.—The four-masted schooner Carrier Dove is loading lumber at the Sewell Mills, Masset Inlet. This is the first vessel to load here since the mills started up on their own account following the shut down. She sailed into Hecate Straits and was taken in tow by the launch Quinetza and safely moored off Ship Island. It is expected that the other ships will follow this one to the mills on Masset Inlet.

Wharf and road building is in progress at many points on Graham Island. Wallace Fisheries Company erected a new wharf, and is completing the construction of numerous cannery buildings at the mouth of Woden river. A new wharf is under construction at New Masset.

Miss Weatherhead has assumed the duties of teacher of Masset school. The school building is undergoing a complete renovation under the direction of Trustees C. Spence, J. Briden and N. Sherwood.

### Labor Day.

Labor Day was celebrated at Masset by all manner of sports. Ex-pupils of Coqualeetza Industrial Institute carried off the honors in footracing, jumping and football. A committee consisting of Messrs. Adams, Hill and Colleson was in charge of the celebration, which was continued all day in a manner that shows the islands capable of producing a number of athletes competent to meet the Prince Rupert athletes at the next field day in the terminal city.

### Many Plants.

Several fishing plants, with headquarters at Prince Rupert, are engaged in the production of canned salmon, crabs, clams and cod fish on the Queen Charlotte Islands. On Langara island two plants are in operation. A new cannery plant is being installed at Naden Harbor. At Aliford Bay a large salmon cannery plant is in operation. Wallace Fisheries will reopen the plant at Woden River on Graham Island.

### AUSTRIAN GOVERNMENT ARE EXPELLING JEWS

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Stockholm, Sept. 15.—The Austrian Government has issued an order expelling 130,000 war refugees, mostly Galician Jews, from the country.

## FRED. DAWSON RETURNS HOME FULL OF PEP

Gives His Impressions Gained From Visiting Many Cities and Applies Them to Prince Rupert.

### WOULD LIKE TO SEE HYDRO-ELECTRIC HERE

"We spent a month at Echo Lake, in the Qu'Appelle valley, fishing, swimming, golfing, and motoring," said F. G. Dawson yesterday to a Daily News representative on his arrival home after a two months' holiday. "We motored approximately a thousand miles through the grain belt in Saskatchewan.

"Harvesting is completed and threshing is eighty per cent finished. The wheat crops generally speaking are good and with the high prices prevailing for wheat the farmers will have plenty of money. Southeastern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta are hard hit from want of rain, but the rest of the prairies have no reason to complain.

### Look to Central B. C.

"During my trips I met many farmers who were eager to hear about the farm lands in Central B. C. along the line of the G. T. P. and a great many of them expressed their intention of looking over the country with a view to settling there, stating that they were tired of the cold winters and would like to take up land in a more moderate climate, and as I know that both the land and the climate will appeal to them, I look forward to a great influx of prairie farmers to the Bulkley and Nechako valleys in the near future. These farmers will make admirable settlers, as they know how to farm and they have ample capital with which to establish themselves comfortably and permanently.

### Outside Capital.

"Twenty years ago when I was a commercial traveller in the prairie provinces there was not a town, except Winnipeg, that was half as large or prosperous as Prince Rupert is today. And when I go back there now and see the numerous thriving and hustling cities with nothing but farming to support them, I am more convinced than ever (if that is possible) that Prince Rupert, with its varied resources and limitless territory must become a great city, and furthermore when I see what outside capital and influence has done in developing industries for these prairie cities it again confirms my opinion that the rate-ayers of Prince Rupert did themselves a great injustice when they refused to negotiate with the Hydro-Electric Company that wanted to develop a huge water-power and deliver to us at city limits unlimited electric power, with which to build up an industrial city. I understand that this company is about to submit another offer to the city for consideration. If it does, and it is 'nearly' reasonable, let us forget our petty differences and get something started that will be an industrial asset to our city.

### Plenty of Resources.

"We have plenty of resources, but they are all in an undeveloped state, and without outside assistance in the way of capital they will never be developed and consequently be of no assistance in the building of the city.

"What Prince Rupert needs is more pep and less pip," concluded Mr. Dawson. "These are my impressions as the result of seeing what is being done elsewhere."

## F. L. CARTER-COTTON IN LOW CONDITION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, Sept. 15.—F. L. Carter-Cotton, former finance minister in the McBride cabinet, is in a very precarious condition as a result of an accident on Friday. He was walking along the beach at English Bay when he was overcome with dizziness. Falling with his face in one foot of water he narrowly escaped drowning. He is 72 years of age.

## CITY COUNCIL DEMURS AT PAYING BILL FOR WHICH NOT LIABLE

A letter was read from J. H. Oliver at the meeting of the City Council last night, asking that the city pay the doctor's bill of \$35 in connection with injuries received by his small son from a scavenger wagon.

It seems that the boy had climbed on to the wagon and got tangled up in the wheel and badly injured. No blame apparently attached to the driver and the aldermen thought it would be a bad precedent to commence paying bills for which they were not legally liable. The matter was held over to the next meeting for further information.

An interesting sidelight on the case was an explanation by one of the aldermen that he had advised Mr. Oliver to say nothing about the city paying the bill until the same had been received from the doctor, the inference being that it would have been higher had it been known who was expected to pay it.

### NEW FLYING RECORD

Mineola, Sept. 15.—Roland Rohlfe, the Curtis testing pilot, claims a new altitude record of 34,000 feet, or over six miles.

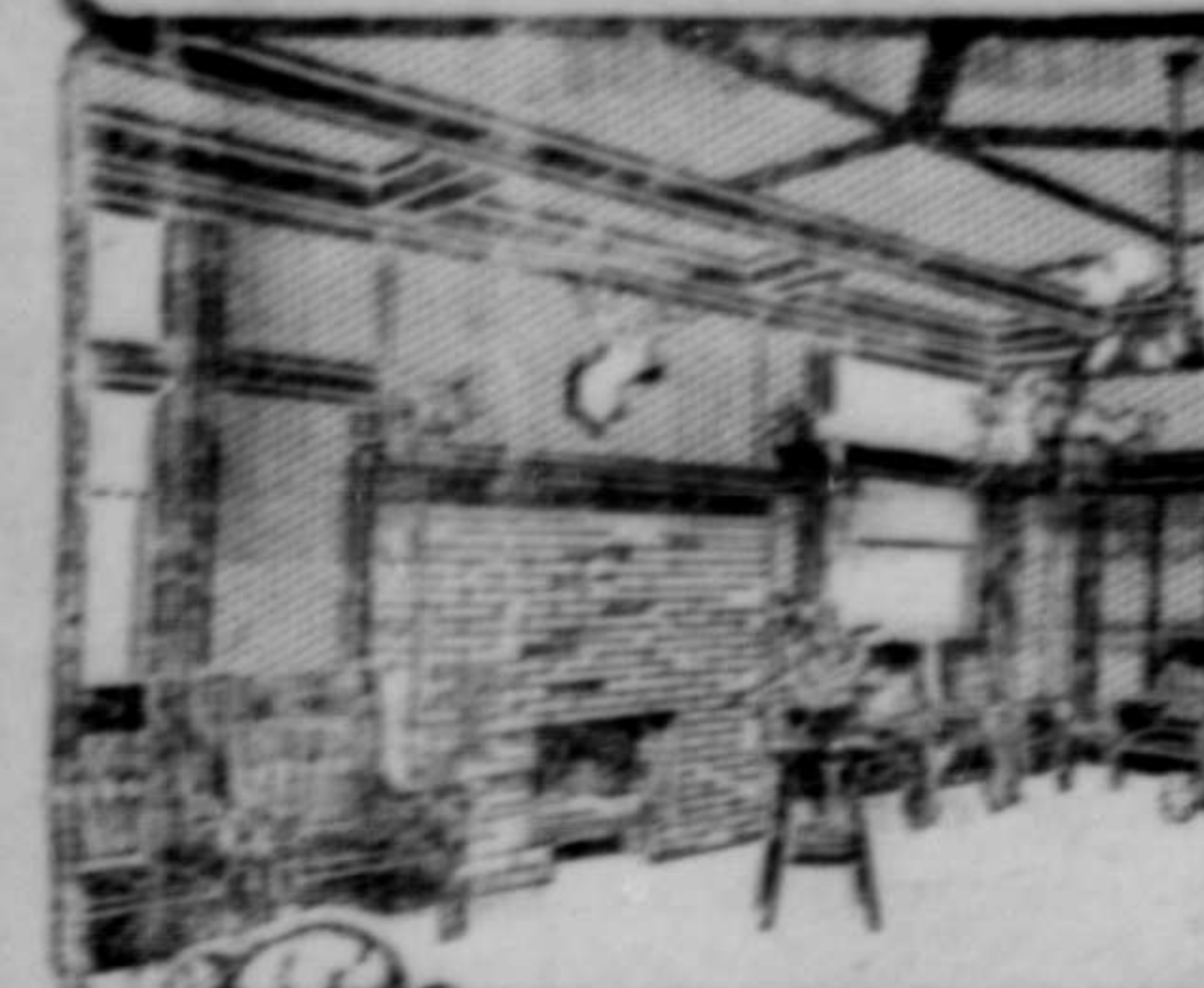

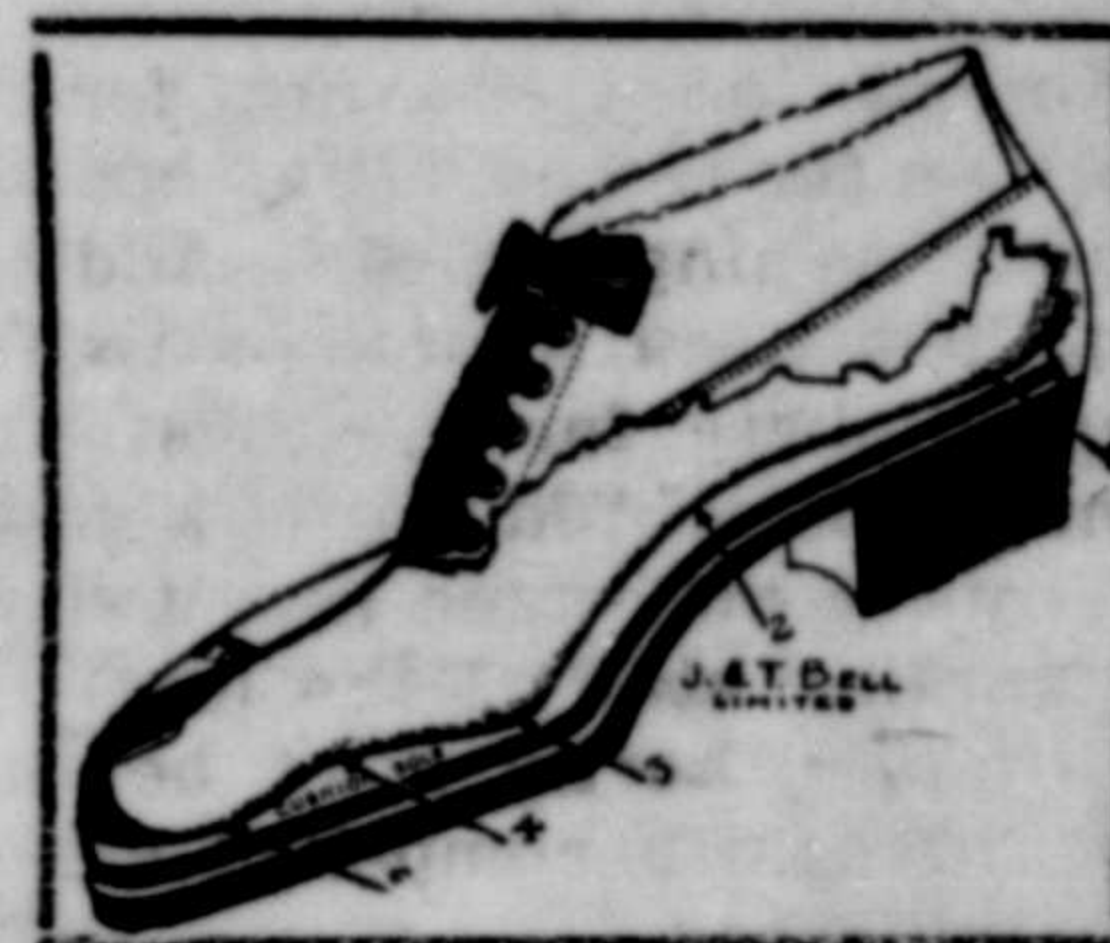
