Ottawa, Sept. 17.--The proposal of the returned soldiers that a gratuity of \$2,000 be paid every man who served at the front, and \$1,500 and \$1,000 be given those who served in England and Canada respectively, will not be considered by the Government, Hon. C. J. Doherty stated in the House of Commons yesterday. The parliamentary committee, which will be appointed to deal with the new Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Bill, will not take up this matter.

In an article on the recent Liberal Convention at Ottawa J. Munro in McLean's Magazine mentions the Premier of British Columbia, Honest John Oliver. He says:-
