Library Had Active Year

Increased Circulation and Membership Reported

Despite illness of the librarian and changes during the past year, the circulation did not suffer but in fact showed a substantial increase, according to the librarian's report at the annual meeting of Prince Rupert Library Board. Total circulation in 1949 was 17,892 while in 1950 it rose to 19,303—an increase of 1,501.

Registration figures showed a decrease for the year, 321 in 1951 against 336 in 1949 but, as the cancellations in 1949 were much higher, at the end of 1950 there was a net gain in borrowers of 144—there being 1,568 in 1949 and 1,712 in 1950.

The young people's section, started in 1948, is proving very popular and had a most successful year, circulation jumping from 1,100 in 1949 to 1,616 in 1950, an increase of about 50 percent. With the young people showing such a gratifying interest in the books at their disposal, the librarian brought to the Board's attention the need for funds to build up this section.

Adventure On Alaska Road

The Alaska Highway is the most adventuresome motor trip on the continent, says Ronald Schiller in the February Reader's Digest. Even on flat land the road twists into hairpin curves. In rough terrain it goes up and down like a roller coaster. Sometimes clinging to the sides of cliffs 400 feet high, it turns sharply without warning, giving rear-seat passengers the stomach-gripping sensation of taking off into space. There is not a guard rail in its entire length. The 1523 miles of the Highway between Dawson Creek, B.C. and Fairbanks, Alaska, are not, however, quite as rugged as they were a few years ago. It is no longer necessary to take along food, camping equipment and extra gas. Lodges, garages and stores have opened up at intervals of 50 to 100 miles along the route. You'd better have at least six good tires, however. You should observe, too, the ancient law of the Yukon that no one may withhold help from anyone who needs it. If you drive by a car in a ditch without offering assistance you may find that no lodging is available to you anywhere along the Highway. Though many more tourists flock the Highway in summer, the road in winter is in better condition. Buried under soft-packed snow and kept clear by plows, it provides a smooth surface. Weatherproof, 35-passenger buses maintain their usual three-times-a-week schedules. Drivers fear not the intense cold but the warm Chinook wind from the Pacific that melts the snow and makes the Highway a ribbon of ice. The scenery is on an epic scale, the article says, and the whole country is a "gigantic menagerie." Big game, including caribou, moose, bears and wolves, is frequently seen.

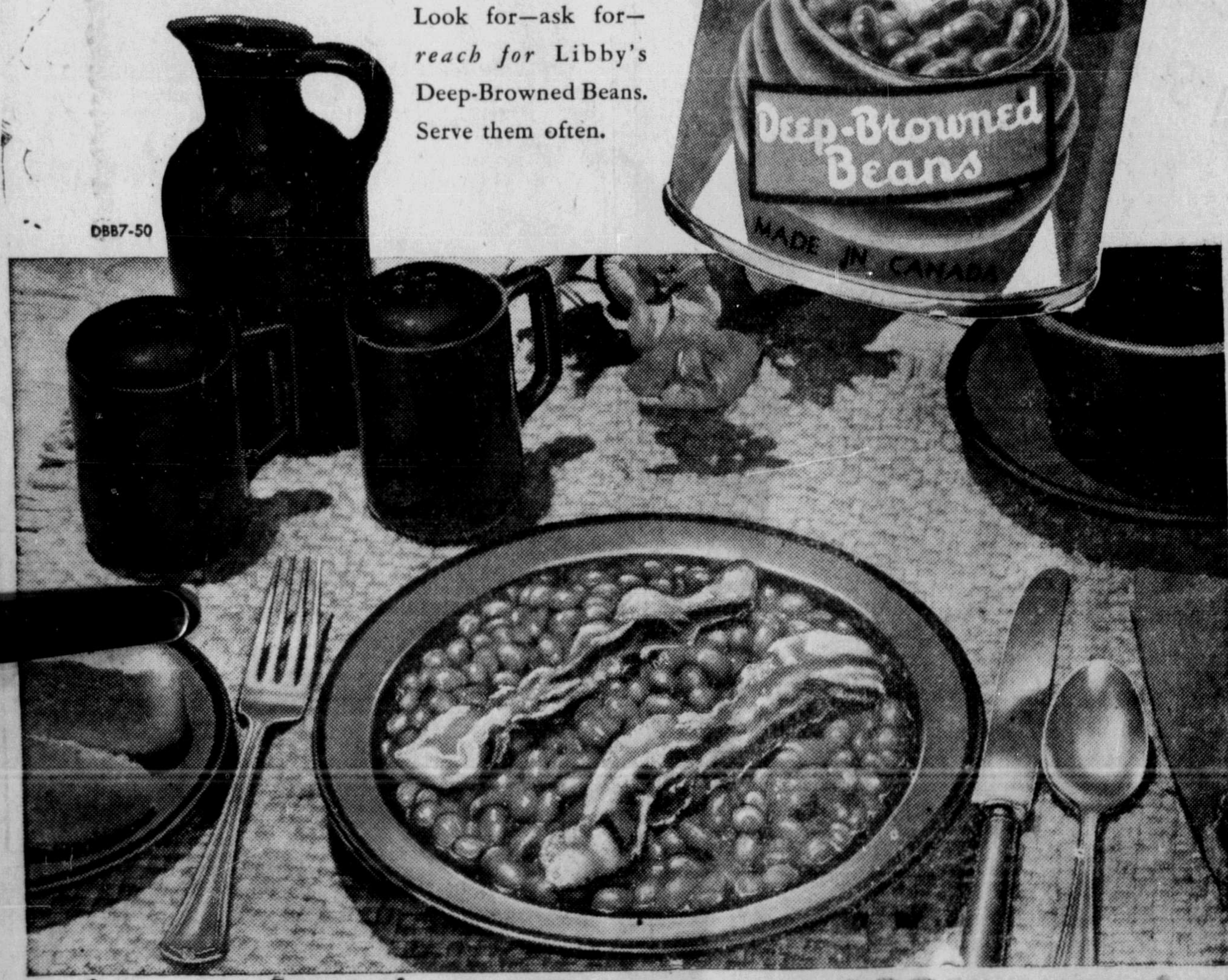

able" tourists and boomerang against the lush summer trade, especially from United States. The move for incorporation followed and last November residents petitioned to be taken into Lambton county.

Lambton county residents — under the Liquor Control Act of Ontario — can buy liquor, wine or beer at government stores, but they are liable to prosecution if they consume these drinks outside their own homes.

A few feet away, in Huron county, the situation is almost reversed. The CTA does not ban liquor consumption so residents can imbibe in public, but they cannot legally buy liquor in person in Huron. Instead, to be within the law, they must order from a vendor outside Huron County and have the beverage shipped to their home by a duly licensed delivery service.
Law enforcement officers have been thwarted frequently by these conflicting liquor regulations, and scores of Stephen township residents, on the north side of the line, complain that too much public drinking is permitted by the antiquated Canada Temperance Act.
Residents of the village — which has a permanent population of 750 and a transient population of 15,000 at the height of the tourist season — feared that a continuance of present liquor laws in Stephen township would discourage "desir-

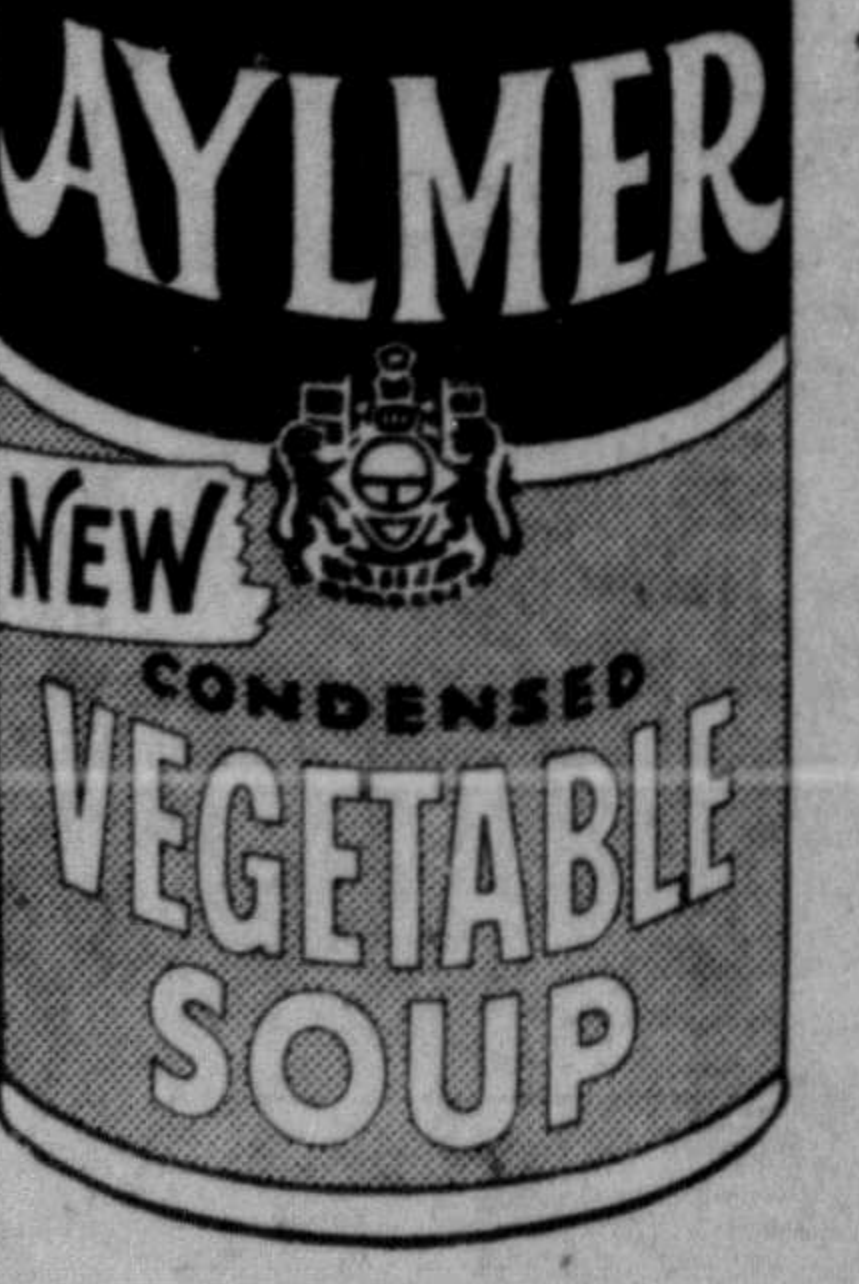
LAMPS HELP WINTER SUN TO GROW GARDEN PLANTS

Light is a limiting factor affecting the growth of plants indoors; but recent experiments have shown how artificial light can be used alone or to supplement whatever sunlight may be available.
Tulips were flowered in dark rooms, lighted solely by incandescent lamps giving 50 foot-candles of light for 12 hours each day. Experiments conducted in Canada and Holland gave approximately similar results. The foliage of the tulips was a healthy green and the flowers of normal color.
For the amateur who has a photographic light meter, it will be easy to test the light from his best window and to determine the supplementary light which he should supply artificially to insure vigorous growth.

To measure the light that falls on the spot where you plant to set a seed-box or plant, lay down two sheets of white paper, one on top of the other. Hold a Weston Master light metre six inches above the paper, being careful not to cast a shadow. Multiply the meter reading by four and you will have approximately the foot-candles of light available to your plants.
If daylight provides less than 50 foot-candles for 12 hours a day, then arrange an ordinary electric light to make up the deficit. Remember not to place the lamp so near the box or plant as to raise the temperature unduly. Fluorescent light of equivalent brightness may be used. To produce vigorous plants the light must reach an intensity of 50 foot-candles, and lower intensity even applied for longer intervals will probably weaken the growth.

Sunny south windows will usually provide adequate light for indoor seed boxes, but since it comes from one direction it usually causes the seedling plants to incline toward the light. A large white cardboard placed behind the seed-box to reflect the sunlight will prevent this bending and make it unnecessary to turn the box around every day in order to make the plants grow straight.
When seeds are started in the home, as soon as sprouts emerge from the soil the seed-box should be placed where they will get adequate light.
Even a day's delay may result in the plants growing tall and "spindly," bending toward whatever light may reach them, seeking for more.

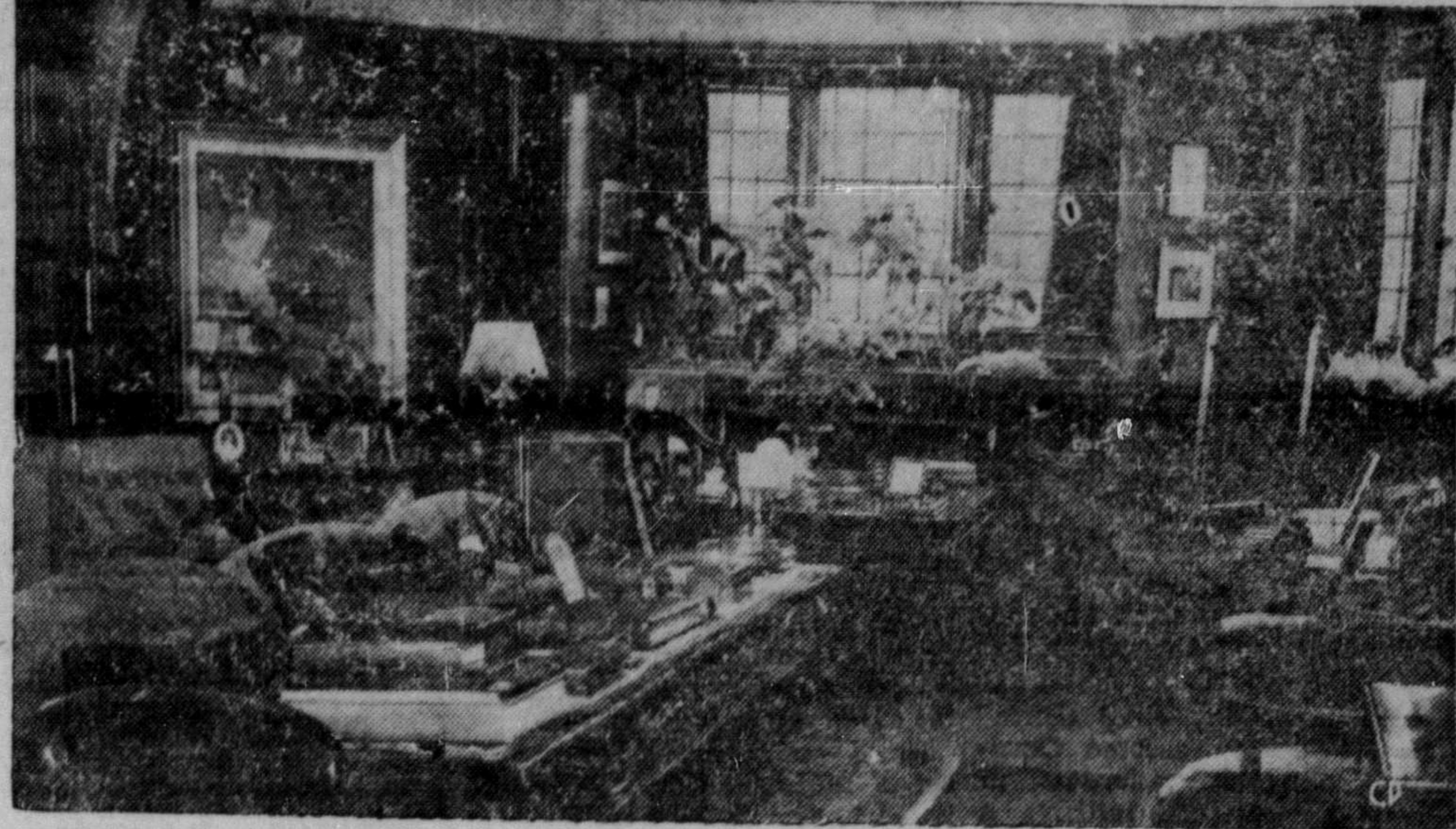

Remember this important point: After your partner has responded to your four no-trump bid telling how many aces he has, do not bid five no-trump to ask him for kings unless you and he hold all of the aces. The reason is obvious. When you bid five no-trump you are automatically forcing the bidding into the six range.

The five no-trump bid is used only for deciding whether or not to bid a grand slam. And nobody wants to bid a grand slam if the opponents hold an ace.

The player who bids four no-trump is captain of the hand. He hears his partner's response showing aces and then it is up to him alone to decide whether to bid a small slam. However, when the same player follows up with a bid of five no-trump, there is no captain of the hand. Now, both players know the side has all the aces and either player may decide to play for a grand slam if his holding warrants it.

Profits would yield the 5% or 6% on a \$45-million plant capital outlay and also amortize the \$5 millions required for an eight-inch pipeline from the Athabasca oil sands to Edmonton.

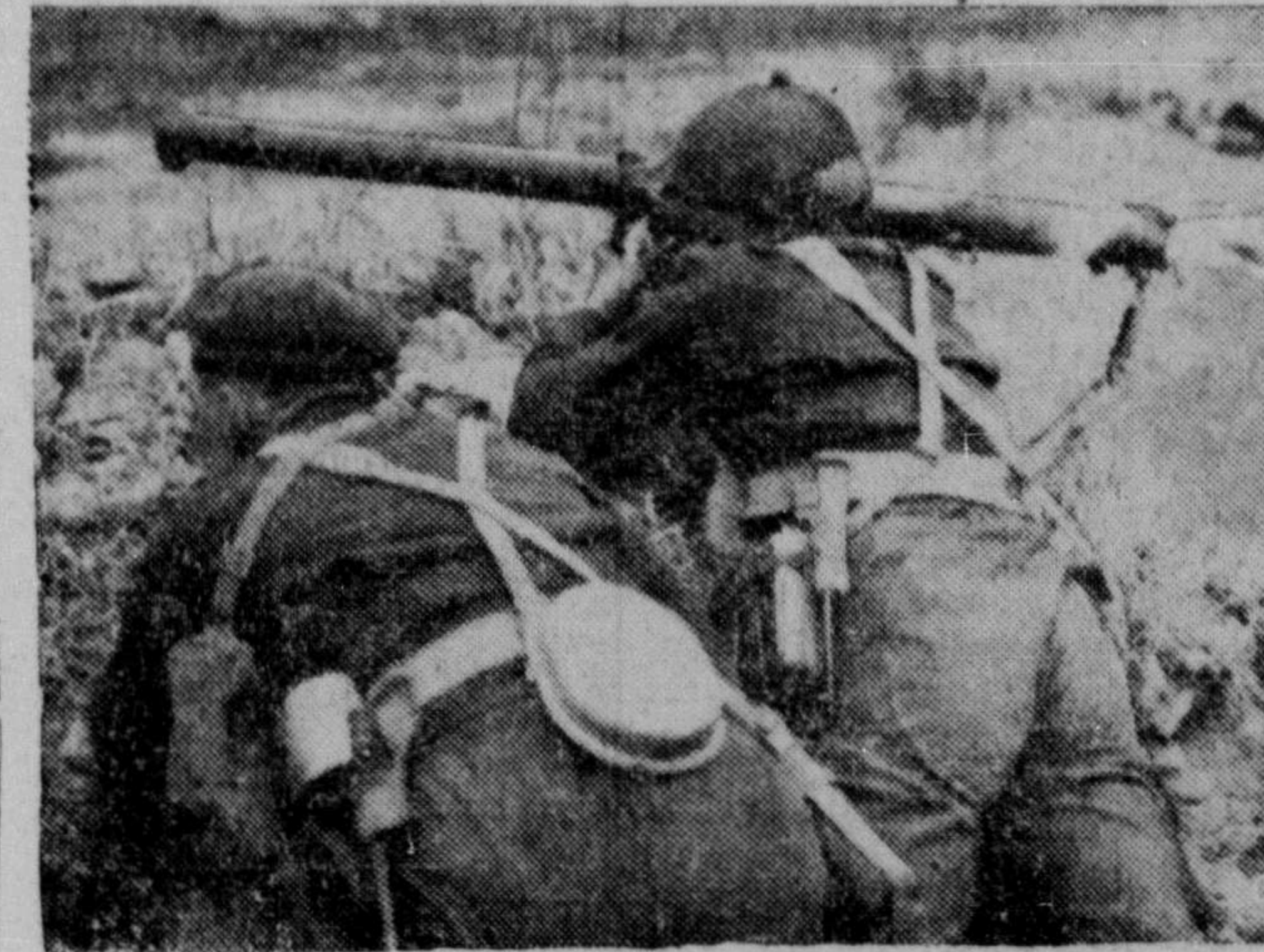

Canada's non-pensionable blind are not eligible because they are under 21 years of age; because they have incomes sufficiently high to exclude them; or because they have not lived in Canada for the 20 years necessary.

The maximum basic pension for a blind person is \$40 a month. A single blind pensioner is permitted a maximum of \$720 annually in pension and other income. If a man is blind but has a sighted wife the two are permitted \$1,200 between them. Two blind persons who qualify under the pension are permitted \$1,320 pension and income.

In British Columbia and Alberta the blind pensioner, under certain conditions, is paid an additional bonus of \$10 a month. In Saskatchewan, the only other province, to pay a bonus, the pensioner receives an additional \$2.50.

**United Nations
Vote Deferred**

LAKE SUCCESS.—The political committee of the United Nations adjourned again yesterday without a vote being recorded on the United States resolution which would declare Communist China an aggressor in the war in Korea. The United States has the support of France, Australia and New Zealand.

Great Britain has adopted a wait-and-see attitude.

Twelve nations want another conference on the whole Far Eastern situation.

Warren Austin, chief United States delegate, accused Communist China yesterday of "blackmail and bad faith." A nation could not be allowed to shoot its way into membership, Austin asserted in referring to the Communist demand for a seat in the United Nations. He charged that China was endeavouring to beloud the issues and divide the United Nations. It was necessary, Austin said, that each member nation be faithfully protected against aggression.

Earlier reports yesterday of a new Chinese offer brought the information last night that Communist China's attitude is little, if any, changed. China has indicated that she would favor a seven-hour conference, not necessarily to be held in China but "certainly not in the United States."

The debate was resumed today.

VICTORIA—Officials of the motor vehicle branch report that 36,389 more cars and trucks were licensed in British Columbia at the end of November than at the same time the previous year.

The total at November 30 last was 255,189 and the comparative figure for the previous year was 218,791.

Of this total, 190,117 were passenger cars in 1950 and 159,944 were passenger cars in 1949; 85,653 commercial vehicles in 1950 and 58,847 commercial in 1949.

There was a drop in the number of motorcycle license plates issued in the period—4,547 up to the end of November last year and 4,618 in 1949.

There were more trailers licensed in 1950—10,893 against 10,610, and more drivers' licenses—320,165 against 295,473.

ETON, ENGLAND.—Eton College, one of Britain's oldest and most exclusive institutions of learning, is to undergo a costly face-lifting under a £1,000,000 (\$3,000,000) re-building and modernization scheme.

To help defray the bill more than 12,000 letters are being addressed to graduates all over the world, appealing for contributions to the fund. Among the graduates are men of great wealth, including sons of royal families and aristocracy of many countries.

One building alone, to accommodate 5 pupils, will cost approximately £100,000 but the program provides for reconstruction of nearly all the boys' houses associated with the 500-year-old college.

The plans also call for modernization of the science school as well as restoration of the 15th century chapel and other ancient buildings.

For centuries the boys of Eton have done their bathing in the Thames. Because of river pollution, however, the authorities are considering installation of a large college swimming-pool.
