City's Worst Need

OUD screams for help in the housing problem are being raised in Prince Rupert. Joining in the forus are the city council, Chamber of Commerce, redical health officer, the press and numerous organizations and companies.

It looks now as if definite progress were being made. The need was pointed out strikingly to the housing commissioner when he visited here last fall. Although he could not promise anything, he said while here that he was convinced of Prince Rupert's immediate need for housing and asked the city council to gather pertinent factual information for submission to government departments concerned. That information has been gathered and placed before the proper authorities.

The next move is up to the provincial and Dominion governments. Will Prince Rupert receive governmental assistance with its housing problem, or will it not? That is the burning question facing the city today.

Unfortunately, costs of small scale building operations in Prince Rupert appear to make it unprofitable for people to build a few rental houses. The mass building of houses, such as is suggested under the Dominion-provincial scheme now under consideration, would make it feasible to bring in heavy, high-priced equipment to help lower building costs. That is why it is so important that the scheme go through.

Continued representations from companies interested in finding proper accommodation for their employees and from organizations anxious to see the townspeople living in decent surroundings cannot but keep the problem before the administrators. To allow interest to cool down now would be fatal.

Now is the time for action as much as it was when the scheme was first attempted. Continued loud screams must be heard by those in power.

And any practical move that can be made locally to meet the situation is much to be commended.

Conscription Still Hot

THCSE who have been pondering on what means are best and most effective for the raising of the armed forces that all agree are necessary for the security of Canada will note with interest what Major General G. R. Pearkes, V.C., M.P., has to say on the subject.

Recognized as a sound and realistic military man who knows what he is talking about, Gen. Pearkes, according to dispatches yesterday, says that, while the volunteer system is unfair and outdated, it would not be opportune to introduce conscription at this time.

Gen. Pearkes must have good reason for making such a statement when so many other members of his Progressive Conservative party and some of other parties too, are strenuously advocating compulsory military service without delay.

Still remains the problem of how Canada's armed forces are to be quickly brought up to the desired and necessary strength.





The CTA does not ban liquor consumption so residents can inbibe in public, but they cannot legally buy liquor in person in Huron, Instead, to be within the law, they must order from a vendor outside Huron County and have the beverage shipped to their home by a duly licensed delivery service.
