It was a neck and neck race right down to the wire. Slightly more than half of the ridings had counted their votes and announced their returns on the night of poll closing. When those results were totalled at 4 a.m. today, Labor held a 30seat lead over the Conservatives. Later this morning returns from other ridings began to roll. in. They came from predominantly agricultural districts. The majority of them were won by

Conservatives in the 1950 election and were considered secure for the Tories in this election. Within a few hours returns from those districts erased the Labor lead and then put the Tories in front. At one time the Conservatives were nearly 50



enough to defend her territory effectively by her own power.

the United States plan a Middle East defence system, based on co-operation between the Western Powers and Near East States, Egypt has voted to abrogate the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian Treaty, which provides for British military and air bases in the Canal Zone (see inset), and for the defence of Egypt by British forces until such time as Egypt is militarily strong

Because the Suez Canal has become an international waterway-the bottleneck of the free world's supply routes-it calls for international defence. Under the new plan Egypt is invited to participate with Britain, France, the United States and Turkey in a Five-Power defence pact which would supersede the 1936 Treaty.

THE Conservatives have won the British election and Winston Churchill will be Prime Minister again if only for a short time since it has been generally assumed that it was his ambition, now achieved, to lead his party to an election victory, something he had never done before, and then retire in view of the fulness of years and the infirmities which must perforce come therewith.

It would have been better had the result been more decisive instead of what it has turned out to be so ambarrassingly close. It had been generally expected that the Conservatives would have been given a clearer mandate although, towards the end of the campaign, it was generally agreed that there would be no landslide in spite of the early Tory enthusiasm. Britons, however, are not given to sudden change or quick revulsion. In spite of the general campaign cry of time for a change, the cost of living, the continued austerity and the poor state of foreign relations, they all but returned to power again the Labor party which already had held the reins of office for six-and-a-half years. Especially in view of the narrowness of the margin by which they will hold office, it is not to be anticipated that there will be any drastic change under the Conservatives in either domestic or foreign policies. Indeed, the Conservatives had never suggested that there would be any move to return to private ownership the major industries which have been nationalized. Foreign policy may not be changed but may be somewhat more firmly applied.

spring, and if only one turning is to be given them, it is better to wait until spring.

The importance of contour plowing on sloping gardens is much stressed by farm advisors. This means running furrows at right angles to the slope, rather than up and down it. The effect is to check washing, and hold water in depressions between furrows. The same effect can be produced in spading a garden which is on sloping ground and which must be spaded this fall. Run the trenches which you open with the spade, at right angles to the slope, and leave tidges and hollows which will check the flow of water.

The practice of sowing rye on gardens to be turned under in the spring is good, but the benefit to be derived from the crop depends upon the length of time it has to grow. For best results it must be sown in the early fall, and fertilized with at least two pounds of plant food for 100 square feet. The amount of organic matter added to the soil is relatively small, so that it is seldom worthwhile to disturb
