Bonus For Pensioners

VICTORIA — Premier Byron Johnson told the House that the government will recommend to the Legislature that a graduated cost of living bonus with \$10 monthly maximum be made available to pensioners receiving \$40 monthly on an eligibility test basis. This will apply to the over-seventies, the 65 to 69-year group and those qualifying for pensions to the blind. Hospital, medical care and drugs will also be provided for.

LONDON (CP)—Former Prime Minister Winston Churchill was summoned tonight to Buckingham Palace to receive the command of the King to form a new government following yesterday's general election in which the Conservatives clinched the victory by electing the largest group by a narrow margin of seats. He then took over as Prime Minister of Great Britain.

Egypt Still Stands Firm

CAIRO (CP)—The Egyptian foreign ministry said today that there can be no question of mediation in the Anglo-Egyptian dispute before British troops were evacuated from Egypt and Sudan.



INTERNATIONAL WATERWAY—While Britain, France and the United States plan a Middle East defence system, based on co-operation between the Western Powers and Near East States, Egypt has voted to abrogate the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian Treaty, which provides for British military and air bases in the Canal Zone (see inset), and for the defence of Egypt by British forces until such time as Egypt is militarily strong

enough to defend her territory effectively by her own power. Shaggy Materials London Favorites For Winter Coats

LONDON (CP)—With early fogs reminding them of last year's long, wet winter, British women are making a beeline for the coat racks and "the shaggy look."

Popular demand thus supports the designer's choice of long-haired wools, fur fabrics and caracul weaves for this season's chilly days. British stores find the new deep-ple, shaggy-surfaced styles sell as fast as they appear on the racks. Thick velours, with their closely-knit surfaces, come close behind.

Both London and Paris show a wide range of shaggy materials fashioned for the most part in wind, swing tent styles with big sleeves and collars. The cosy look to these garments is their own sales promotion.

This is the first time since the war that so much preference has been shown for fur fabric materials—or what is known as "the poor man's fur."

Popular during the war, this fabric is coming back into town after a post-war lapse. Present materials, however, give a slinky glamor that has little in common with the old.

Charles A. Comiskey, 73-year-old owner of Chicago White Sox, American League baseball team, died early today at his camp at Eagle River, Wisconsin. From a plumber's apprentice, the "Old Roman," as Comiskey was known universally, rose to be one of the richest and best known men in the baseball world. In 1881, Comiskey joined the St. Louis Browns after giving up his career as plumber, playing first base for a salary of \$125 a month. Twenty years later, he introduced a new team, the Chicago White Sox into National League territory in Chicago, and captured the American League pennant.

CHURCHILL TAKES OVER

(Continued from Page 1)

By late afternoon today, the count of votes had given the Conservatives 318 seats, assuring them of an over-all majority in the 625-seat House of Commons.

With the Tory margin a slender one, possibly leaving 300 seats to Labor, Churchill's followers will not be much better off than their Labor predecessors.

The result brings to a climax six years of grim, unrelenting struggle by the old wartime Prime Minister against the Labor party which imposed government control over much of Britain's industry and private enterprise.

However, the Tories are not expected to change things much except to turn back the iron and steel industry to private ownership.

EARLY TRENDS

As early as last night the Conservatives were within reach of victory although metropolitan areas, earliest with their returns, gave a majority to Labor. Even there, however, the Labor party was losing close seats to Conservatives. The results from country seats, reporting today, wrapped up the majority for the Conservatives.

By the time half the seats had been counted, results pointed to a political and personal triumph, limited as it might be, for Mr. Churchill. The Conservatives had gained seats from Prime Minister Attlee's Labor forces and Labor had failed to gain seats from the Conservatives although capturing a couple from Liberals.

Privately, Labor party leaders, at the half way mark in counting last night, conceded that the early trend, by all normal standards, meant the end of Britain's Socialist rule although the full Conservative strength at that time was still to appear.

(The popular vote with percentages in the 313 districts counted to midnight last night was: Conservatives, 7,120,708—48 per cent; Labor, 6,451,428—60.3 per cent; Liberal, 232,227—1.6 per cent. In 1950 the percentage at a corresponding stage was: Conservatives, 6,450,832—43.7 per cent; Labor, 7,110,291—48.1 per cent; Liberal, 1,208,309—8.2 per cent.)

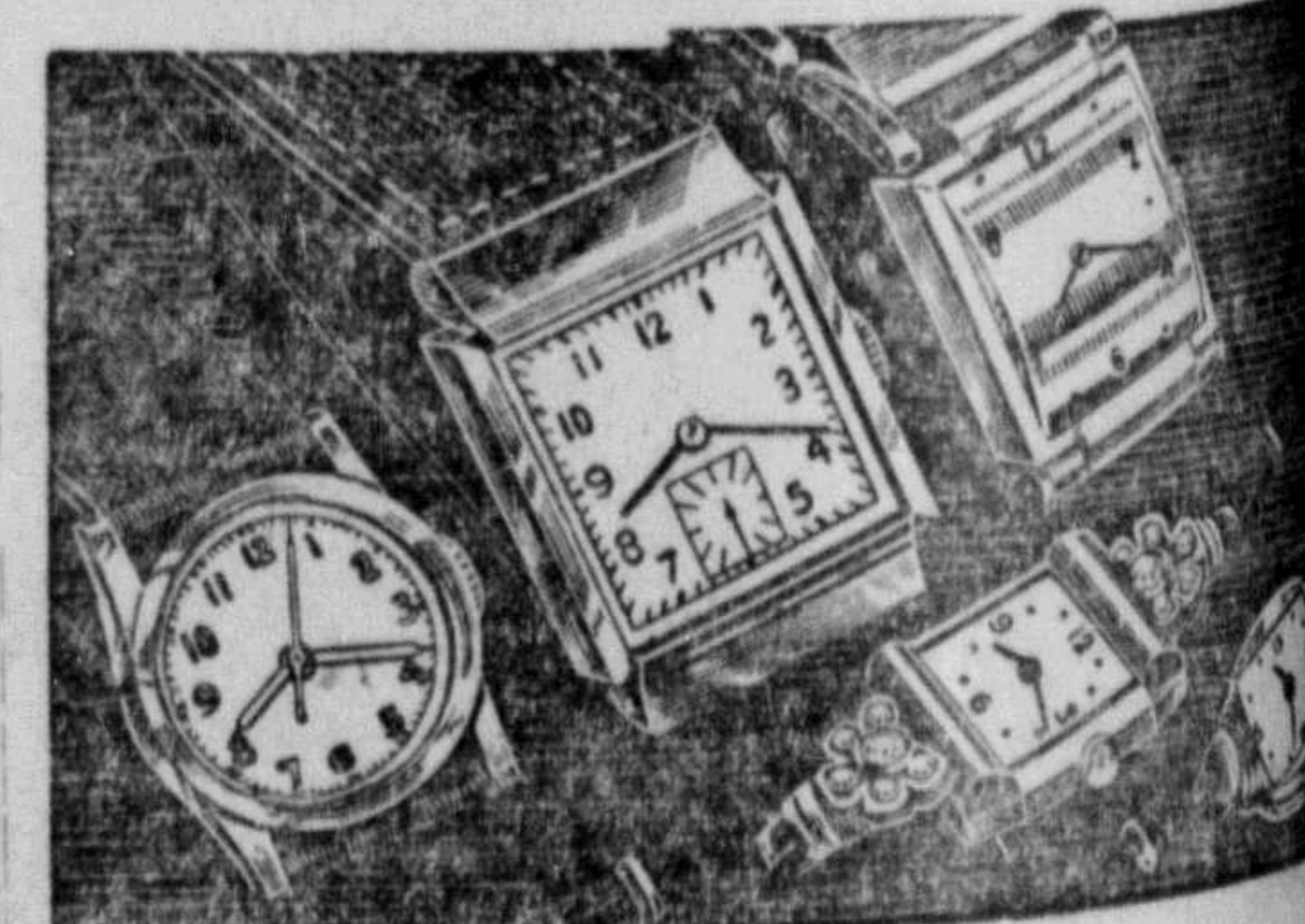
