Driven to North Bank of Dvina by Poles, but force Petlura out of Radomysl; German Spartacans clash with Government Troops

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 19 .- Polish forces in Russia have driven the Bolsheviki to the northern bank of the Dvina River as far as Disna and have occupied the Korohtenshtop front. The Bolsheviki have forced General Petlura out of Radomsyl, but apparently are not attempting to recapture Kiev itself.

TEACHER CAME FROM VICTORIA IN BOAT

Delayed by Running on Rock Near Prince Rupert Harbor After Long Trip.

On Tuesday there arrived in the city C. W. A. Drader who is on his way to the Queen Charlotte Islands to take charge of the public school at Port Clements. le made the trip here in a 22-ft. launch with a cabin top. The launch travels at a rate of eig miles an hour with a Pierce twocycle motor.

Mr. Drader left Oak Bay, Victoria, in his small but staunch eraft on the 3rd of this month and intended to reach Prince Rupert on Monday the 15th, as the Victoria offices had told him that there was a boat for the Islands yesterday. Everything was going along fine until he struck a rock just outside of the harbor here and was held up for some time. This delayed his arrival.

No difficulty was experienced in getting over the sounds, but when crossing Queen unarlotte it was hrough a dense fog and a compass course had to be taken. There was the customary heaving vell but no chop. The roughest part of the trip was experienced coming to Wright's Sound where quite a squall blew up owto conflicting mountain preezes.

Mr. Drader who is a British Columbia man joined up with the Canadian forces at Edmonton in the 49th infantry and he had two brothers with this unit. They all ent overseas together but were very soon separated at the front. 'n his return to Canada after several months' convalescence he ame to British Columbia and has accepted this position as teacher at Port Clements. Mr. Drader will remain in town until next week awaiting boat connections.


