SEATTLE LABOR MEN OPPOSE SENDING ARMS TO SIBERIA

Longshoremen's Union refuses to allow longshoremen to load munitions for shipment to anti-Bolsheviks of Siberia

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Seattle, Sept. 19.—Business agents of the local longshoremen's union backed by the approval of the Central Labor Council refuse to allow the longshoremen to load a shipment of arms and munitions to Siberia.
Labor agents held that the handling of such material was in violation of labor's pact embraced in the Peace Treaty.
The general view of labor in the west has been against the sending of troops or munitions to Siberia.

BORNITE KING RICH STRIKE

Valuable Lead Discovered Last Week at Usk and Ore Exhibited Here.

One of the most interesting samples of ore shown at the Exhibition is from a new strike made only last week. This is in the Usk section and is from the "Bornite King" property owned by Baxendale and Peters. They have been working on their property developing for the last two months and only a few days ago struck a six-foot lead of solid metal which carries 60 per cent copper. This property lies five hundred feet high on the Bornite mountain just above the "Old Quarry" group.
Another rich sample of gray copper also from the Usk district was shown a few days ago from the "Peerless" group which lies eighteen miles up Gold Creek. This showing consists of 100 per cent copper with traces of silver to the ton.
Usk is becoming a very busy place these days between mining, lumbering and eighteen cars a week are being shipped out. The Kitselas Mountain Copper have their concentrator on the ground now and most of the machinery is installed on the "Peerless" property. Every day points to Usk taking an important place among the mining centres of the province.

MASKED MEN ROB A TRAIN

Gagged Mail Clerk and Carried off Large Sum of Money.

Quebec, Sept. 18.—Five masked men bound and gagged the mail clerks on the Ocean Limited train on the Canadian National Railway near Harlaka early this morning. They robbed the mail car of \$75,000 in paper and silver which was being shipped from Montreal to Halifax for the soldiers' pay.

ATTENDANCE AT FAIR WAS GOOD

In Spite of Inclement Weather People Turned Out in Large Numbers.

Yesterday there were 700 paid admissions to the sports and 9 to the exhibition building. This is nothing like as many as there would have been if the weather had been good, but it is a wonderfully good record considering the condition. In addition to the above there are the ticket holders, a record of which does not appear.

Taken on the whole people have patronized the fair well. The takings have been nearly as good as last year, and this under the extremely unfavorable conditions. Possibly the one outstanding feature that has been of more interest to the fair than anything else has been the mining exhibit. It is a splendid showing and will not only advertise the district well when it is sent on to New Westminster, but will also be a good permanent exhibit when it is returned to this city.

AIYANSH BAND WINS THE PRIZE

In Competition Yesterday is Adjudged Better of Two Entering.

Yesterday afternoon the band competition took place in the Exhibition Hall with the two bands, Aiyansh and Greenville as contestants. Great interest was taken in the event and many gathered to hear the strains. The Greenville band was the first to take the stand and rendered the selection "Souvenir de Beethoven." The Aiyansh group offered a rather simpler production in the overture "Stradella" and received great applause for its efforts. The judges decided that the honors should be carried off by the Aiyansh.

The musicians who had the winning of the matter were J. S. Gray, of Smithers and formerly of this city, Dr. A. H. Bayne and Jim Peyton. The latter two men are both very well known here in musical circles.

JAP FISHERMAN PROBABLY LOST

Went Out in Cold Storage Boat Which was Upset in the Storm.

CRAFT PICKED UP BY "THE BROTHERS"

A fishing boat belonging to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. was picked up yesterday upside down with the sail set near Melville Island, close to South Dundas by the halibut boat Brothers. It was brought in yesterday and turned over to the owners. There was nothing in the boat except a few plates and small pieces of net and a coal oil can. Word has been received by the cold storage company that a Japanese boat pulled left Haysport on Tuesday to fish outside, probably in the neighborhood of Porcher Island. That was the last heard of him. He had been boat pulling for a returned soldier who gave up the game two weeks ago and since that time the man had been fishing alone.

FISHING BOATS BRING CATCHES

Good Prices Paid for Halibut; Salmon in From North Island.

The following boats sold their catches at the Fish Exchange this morning: Atli, 7,000; Wanderer, 9,000, and Nuba, 8,000, to the Royal Fish Company at 15 and 6 cents. Brothers, 13,000; Hilda, 7,000, and Bringold, 7,000, to the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., at 14.50 and 6 cents. Star, 13,000; Lenor, 7,000, and Bartalome, 7,000, to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., at 14.60 and 6 cents. The Vienna, 8,000, to the Cold Storage at 14 and 6 cents.
The Carruthers arrived with 30,000, the Kelly with 30,000 and the Foster with 10,000 flat fish.
The Zorra owned and operated by the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., returned to port last evening after a long absence to North Island. She brought in about 6,000 lbs. of salmon which were discharged at the local plant this morning.

FOOTBALL GAMES ARE SET FOR NEXT WEEK

Owing to the rain the football tournament has been postponed until next week. A match was to have been played last evening between the Sons of England and Trail Club. It was postponed, so it has been decided to set over the whole series of three games until the weather becomes settled again. It will still be held under the Exhibition Association.

For babies under two years the second for the prettiest goes to Herbert Chandler. The heaviest first prize was Billie Dunn and second Sidney Roberts.

BOLSHEVIKI FORCES' GAINS AND LOSSES

Driven to North Bank of Dvina by Poles, but force Petlura out of Radomysl; German Spartacans clash with Government Troops

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Sept. 19.—Polish forces in Russia have driven the Bolsheviki to the northern bank of the Dvina River as far as Disna and have occupied the Korohtenshtop front. The Bolsheviki have forced General Petlura out of Radomysl, but apparently are not attempting to recapture Kiev itself.
Brunswick, Germany, Sept. 19.—Clashes occurred here on Wednesday between Spartacans and Government troops, during which there was sporadic shooting in the streets.

SAILORS STARVING ON SCHOONER WHEN SHE REACHED PORT

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—With topmast carried away and the crew weakened from lack of food, the four-masted schooner W. F. Jewell arrived 164 days out from Sidney. Half a sea biscuit and a cup of water each day had been the ration for the last few weeks of the voyage of the stricken vessel.

When two weeks out from Australia a terrific storm struck her and this was followed by calms. She put into the Marshall Islands for food but the people there were starving.
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LITTLE DANGER OF LABOR TROUBLES

Toronto, Sept. 18.—There is little danger of labor troubles among the railroad shopmen on Canadian railways, according to J. Clarke, schedule representative of the Canadian railroads for the union of boilermakers, the headquarters of which are in Kansas City. Clarke is in Toronto to allay unrest among railroad shopmen.

ONLY HOPE LIES IN STRIKE SAY WORKERS

Pittsburg, Sept. 18.—The national committee for organizing the steel and iron workers declared that having failed to secure a conference with the United States Steel Corporation their only hope lay in a strike.

CORDON IS THROWN AROUND FIUME CITY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, Sept. 19.—There is now a military and naval cordon around Fiume and it is expected that the D'Annunzio forces will surrender to the Italian Government before long.

ATLAS BRINGS CARGO DISTILLATE AND GAS

The fuel oil situation here has been relieved. The tanker Atlas has arrived with a full cargo of distillate and gasoline from Ioco and fishermen and others will now be able to supply all their needs. She brought the cargo from Ioco near Vancouver, where the Imperial Oil refinery is located.

At the Grand Trunk wharf today there is tied up a scow on which there is a big gasoline-driven concrete mixer. The scow is for the work on the lighthouse at Triple Island which is being built by J. H. Hilditch. The boat is ready to tow the load out as soon as fine weather outside permits. A lot of reinforcing iron is included in the load.

RUPERT WINS BALL GAME

Beats Anyox to Tune of 6 to 2 in Game Yesterday Afternoon.

In the baseball game yesterday afternoon between the Anyox team and the local nine, the home boys were victorious to the tune of 6 to 2. Rupert got well away in the first innings and at the beginning of the fifth stood 5 to 1. A terrible state of affairs was saved here as there were three men on bases and Tinetti to bat. Frank knocked a nice little fly which was gobbled right up by the man tending the third sack and the whole side passed out. In the fifth, pitcher Daly for the smelter men knocked a clean home run over the rock pile which brought them up another point. However the Rupert boys were not to be kept back and they added another run before the finish.

Weather Man Goes Slightly Awry.

The weather man seems to have made a mistake or else he is punishing the fair directors for their sins. At any rate the fair this year has been to a large extent spoiled by the blustering weather, when up to the eve of the great event there had been nothing but ideal days following each other with almost unceasing regularity.

As no one here seems to have sufficient pull at Ottawa or Victoria to prevent calamities of this kind we must just make the best of it and smile again. Perhaps it might be wise to try to arrange a week earlier another season, but then the fishing might be late and it would never do to take the people away from the canneries until the season has closed. Prince Rupert is simply undergoing a similar experience to that which other cities have often been through.

Famous Novelist Writes About Men.

Mary Roberts Rhinehart, the famous novelist, in an article in the American Magazine has some very interesting things to say about men. She says that they are all just grown up boys and even when old are simply old boys.

In another place she likens men to cats. She says: "Just run over the cat's predominant characteristics and check them off: The cat is a night wanderer. The cat loves familiar places and the hearth side. (And oddly enough the cat's love of the hearthside doesn't interfere with his night wanderings). The cat can hide under the suavest exterior in the world principles that would make a kitten blush, if it had any place for a blush. The cat is greedy to helpless things. And heavens, how the cat likes to be petted and generally approved. It likes love, but not all the time. And it likes to choose the people it consorts with. It is a predatory creature and likes to be neat and tidy."

Mrs. Rhinehart says that men are always loyal to each other. To quote again: "This I maintain is the sole reason for alluding to them as the stronger and superior sex. They are stronger. They are superior. They are as strong as a trades union only more so. They stand together against the rest of the world. Women do not. They have no impulse toward solidarity. They fight a sort of guerilla warfare, each sniping from behind her own tree. They are the greatest example of the weakness of unorganized force in the world."

Mrs. Rhinehart is on the whole appreciative of men although she points out many of their foibles. She says: "A house without a man in it is as nice and tidy and peaceful and attractive and cheerful as a grave in a cemetery. It is as pleasant as Mark Twain's celebrated combination of rheumatism and St. Vitus's dance and as empty as a penny-in-the-slot chocolate machine in a railway station."

Difficult Work Stopping the War.

Stopping the war seems about as difficult as stopping a comet, once you get it nicely going through space. It has to wear itself out before it stops its mad career. Fighting still goes on in Russia, in Poland, in Fiume and in other parts of Europe. The war is not yet at an end even though the peace has been signed by a good many of the nations concerned in the big fight. The great thing will be to prevent it starting again.

BANKERS' ASSOCIATION
PRESIDENT'S OPINION

E. L. Pease Who is Expected Here
Tomorrow is Optimistic Re-
garding Next Loan.

E. L. Pease, president of the
Canadian Bankers' Association,
who is expected to arrive here
tomorrow, said in an interview in
Vancouver that the east was in a
very prosperous condition with
greater demand for labor than
the market can supply at the
present time.

This impetus to some extent is
ascribed to the working to capac-
ity of the manufacturing plants
so that they may take advan-
tage of the exchange between
Canada and the United States and
already this activity is affecting
the premium wall.

New Loan Will be Success.

That the new Canadian loan
will be a complete success is the
opinion of the visiting banker and
his directors. "The people have
learned that Canadian bonds are
good security and it is my opin-
ion that the small investor will be a
large factor in the marketing of
this new issue," said Mr. Pease.
"Canada's paper currency has a
greater gold covering, per capita,
than that of the United States,
but it is not policy for a country
like Canada to extend long term
credits to foreign countries,
which have small probability of
paying within the next 100 years.
Canada needs that money to de-
velop her own resources. She
must produce and ship abroad
more, that her own debt may be
liquidated."

"I can hardly think," continued
Mr. Pease, "that the Canadian
government has discontinued her
shipbuilding policy, as it is con-
sidered in financial circles as the
salvation of the country, for Can-
ada to own her own merchant ma-
rine."

Mr. Pease failed to agree with
the opinions of some of the United
States financiers that the clearing
house of the commerce of the
world will move from London to
New York, and he pointed out that
all the British colonies would
continue to draw on London and
despite the fact that Great Britain
had sustained a severe blow in the
war she was still considered a
sound financial institution.

baseball leader on the Pacific
coast, is favorably mentioned as
possible manager.

SETTLEMENT BOARDS

Editor News.—It is questionable whether the government considered the question of settling returned soldiers on land in close proximity to the fishing grounds of the north. There are many spots of ten or twenty acres adjacent to Prince Rupert on which families might live the year round, while the men could engage in trolling during the summer and preparing gardens during the fall and winter. The raising of strawberries, poultry, vegetables and fruit would give employment and a lucrative means of living could be found.

The Indian fishermen raise potatoes, turnips and other vegetables by planting in the spring before the salmon season begins. They then engage in trolling and gather their vegetables in the fall. These people own their houses; almost all of them have gasoline launches, and they are becoming fairly well off. With fishing settlements on the adjacent islands where each resident would cultivate a few acres of land, there are better prospects than in clearing farms out of the wilderness of trees and stumps.

Some fishermen made five hundred dollars in a few weeks fishing on the rivers and along the coast. The climate is not against clearing and gardening all the year round. To prevent isolation families could form settlements of fishermen and make a good comfortable living away from the turmoil of the city. They would also garner food from a more prolific source than from the land with no trouble in planting. The price of fish this year shows that that industry is profitable for those engaged in the neighborhood of Prince Rupert.

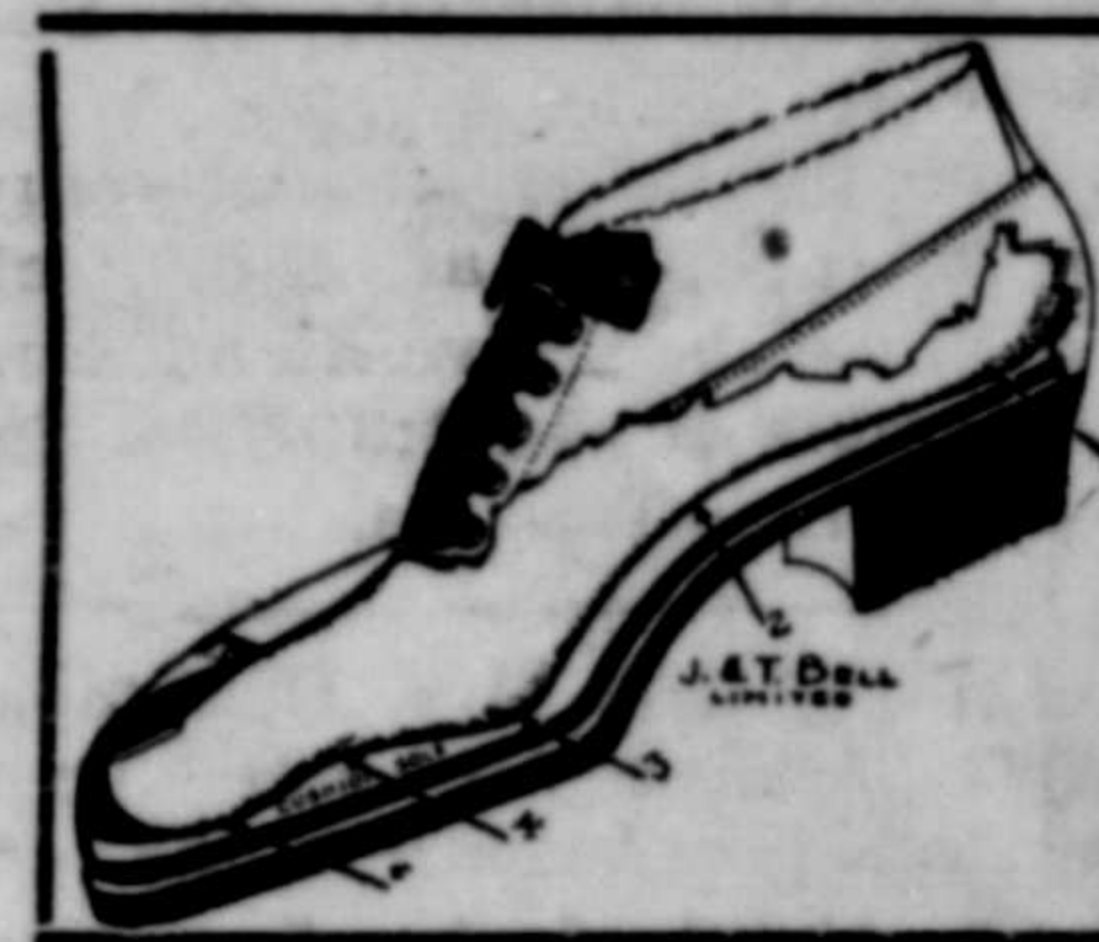
