### The Elevator Situation

THE inexplicable and recently ridiculous situation whereby Prince Rupert's big grain elevator has been standing idle while the most serious crisis in regard to storage and movement has been developing during a bumper crop on the prairies should soon be rectified.

With indications now that the local house is to be pressed into use, it may not be appropriate to harp back again on the many years it has not only been unused but practically forgotten—a situation which was emphasized by a recent amazing communication from the Prince Albert Board of Trade which said it did not know it existed until reading about it in the Saturday Evening Post.

With all parts of the world calling for wheat—of which it seems Canada is almost developing a surfeit—and even the minister of trade and commerce, Mr. Howe, talking of the storage and shipping emergency, there should be little further delay in getting the house into use.

The railway company, we have been informed, has received instruction to get the track into shape and there are signs of life around the elevator itself. Rumors are heard of impending shipments to the hungry countries of the Orient. Cargoes are already going forward from Vancouver to India and other parts of the world.

Surely the powers that be would be hard put to find further excuse for not using this house—not only in the immediate present but for an indefinite period.

### Proper Toast To King

ACCORDING to the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire there is a recognized procedure for proposing a toast to the King.

A definite formality should be observed by civilians on occasions where a toast to the King is proposed.

The chairman rises, brings the audience to attention and asks them to rise and drink a toast to His Majesty. At this, the audience rises and the chairman says: "Ladies and gentlemen, the King." Then, and only then, is the glass lifted from the table, held at eye level for a moment, then one sip of liquid is taken and the two words, "The King," repeated before the glass is replaced on the table. No other procedure is correct for a civilian pledging the health of His Majesty. Glasses are never clinked. Guests must not smoke before the toast has been proposed. It is not correct to play or sing the National Anthem.

## VICTORIA REPORT

### What Next After Esquimalt?—Should Be Election Soon

VICTORIA.—What to do now? That's the question puzzling the government in the wake of the Esquimalt by-election. Result of the voting in Esquimalt was a terrific shock to the government and a surprise to everyone—even the victorious CCF. Everyone thought that, if the government lost, Independent A. C. Wurtele, backed by rebels W. A. C. Bennett and Mrs. Tilly Rolston, would win.

It was a bad licking for the government. There's no other way of looking at it.

In this reviewer's opinion it was not disapproval of government policies the electorate was expressing but disapproval of the bickering and fighting that's going on among Liberals and Conservatives in Coalition.

The wings of Coalition are sparring for political position. They're calling each other names, casting aspersions, one on the other. The public is fed up with this sort of hanky-panky—and the people of Esquimalt said so in no uncertain terms.

By and large, government policies are good. Hospital insurance, despite all the criticism that has been levelled at it, a lot of it unfair, is a splendid thing. No one wants to throw it out. Anyone who has been in hospital is all in favor of it.

There can be no argument about the government's road policy. It's a good policy. No one is against extension of the PGE. There are complaints, of course, about our ridiculous liquor situation and about margarine and daylight saving—but it wasn't those matters that defeated the government in Esquimalt. It was just that—to repeat—the people are sick and tired of the snipings that go on within Coalition.

A coalition is always an arrangement of political expediency, not matter what pious utterances there are to the contrary. Ten years ago, when Liberals and Conservatives were forced together, it was because the CCF had grown so strong, not to further Canada's war effort as was said at the time. It was expediency again in 1945 and 1949. There was no war in those years, yet Liberals and Conservatives didn't dare break, because they knew that if they did the CCF would win.

The CCF might win next time, too, but that's a chance that has to be taken.

The people have said they no longer want a coalition, as long as the wings of that coalition are fighting.



Several years ago, an eastern

American publisher's attention was drawn to a rather outstanding accomplishment of a newspaper carrier. He began an investigation on his own newspaper into the affairs of the little guy who brings the paper to your door every day, rain or shine. The reporter whose assignment it was to do this job ran into some of the most human interest-packed stories of his career.

Some of the stories may have run something like the following:

DAVID MARDIN was 13, lusty, energetic and carefree. His home was a modest cottage on a suburban street of one of the bigger Canadian cities where he lived with his mother, his carpenter-aunt, and his 10-year-old sister.

For more than a year, David had been waiting for the day to take over a paper route. Long before that day he used to frequent the "paper shacks" where the carriers got their papers delivered by trucks loading from the big presses of the downtown office.

The would-be carrier loved the smell of fresh newsprint and printer's ink which filled the shack as the boys opened their bundles. He loved the wild excitement of the carriers as they so ambled for their bundles, jostling each other good-naturedly. But he had another reason for wanting the job.

And so it was a great day when David got his first paper route. He had a bike and it was no time at all before he was "one of the boys."

SIX MONTHS PASSED before David knew it. He was by now well established, and he had been making pretty good money too, what with the extra customers he had picked up on his route. A most \$100 he had saved, spending hardly a cent of his income.

For the anniversary time, David pulled a well-worn wallet from his pocket. He grinned to himself a little as he studied the bills. Then he jammed it back hurriedly as Sister Joan came into her hands and knees,

the only way she could move around.

Surprising how fast she could move that way, the brother thought with a pang. It had been several years now that she'd been that way. He knelt down beside her for a few minutes to talk and see her face light up with a smile.

WET SNOW CAME down in shovelfuls from the heavy grey skies. It was hard to wheel his bike on the slippery streets and the heavy load of Christmas papers didn't make it any easier. Fog was blowing up pretty fast from the waterfront, David noticed, and put on an extra burst of speed to finish his route before the pea-soup fog made it any more dangerous to criss-

cross the traffic-laden thoroughfare, on either side of which lived his customers.

His customers were good people, he thought. Several of them already had asked him inside for a cup of hot chocolate, but he'd answered:

"No, Mrs. Smith, I can't stay, but thanks anyway." Most of them said "Merry Christmas," and had left a coin in his hand, which swelled his "fund" as he fondly called the savings box in his room.

SUDDEN SCREECH of brakes, a thud and a cry—that's how witnesses described it afterwards. The twisted wreckage of a bike lay 50 feet beyond the new model car which slid across the slushy

pavement. Sudden newspapers lay everywhere. A figure rushing from the car stooped to pick up a small bundle from the roadside, returning in the same hurry.

THE WHITE-CAPPED nurse ushered the reporter into the ward. He saw the little figure and saw the tight fist clutching a piece of paper.

"He hasn't regained consciousness yet," said the nurse. "His parents have been here but none of us could take the paper away from him."

The reporter leaned over the boy to see if he could read what was on the paper. He saw it was an advertising folder of some sort. Then the eyes of David

flickered and he looked up at the stranger.

He gave the reporter the paper. Then whispered to him.

Sister Joan got her wheelchair alright, and for Christmas, too. The publisher saw to that. But

the little "fund," of course, was not touched.

And the reporter got his story.

## ...HOUSEKEEPING...

THRIFT SUGGESTED AS THANKS GIVEN FOR BOUNTIFUL HARVEST

Once again Thanksgiving Day has come and homemakers are preparing to use the fruits of our bountiful harvest. Primed with information from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics that grain foods are to be plentiful this year, home economists suggest that people will eat more grain products.

The story of flour is an old one, one that begins in the wheat field and ends in the kitchen. In between, are the careful selection of wheat varieties and the meticulous control of milling processes used to produce the fine, modern flours which are available for home baking today. Many flours besides white flour are used to make bread and each requires understanding to ensure best results. For example, whole wheat flour when used alone, makes a dough that is too sticky to knead. For this reason, this flour is usually combined with at least an equal amount of white flour. Bread, made entirely of rye flour is dark and heavy because this flour fails to hold the leavening agent and of course this affects the shape of the loaf. To overcome this difficulty, a sponge is made from white flour, allowed to rise and then rye flour is added in sufficient quantities to make a dough. From our bountiful harvest Canadians have a variety of flours to choose from for baking in the home.

All Canadian women have heard and will be hearing, more and more, about the thrift campaigns. Each homemaker will be working out what economies she can practice in her home. Some feel that they want to start by making their own bread and rolls.

There is nothing that smells so good and looks so attractive as a pan of crusty-brown, freshly baked rolls. No doubt they make one hungry just to think of them. Plain rolls either white or brown may be varied in many ways to produce a number of special ones. For instance, buttermilk rolls may be made by brushing the dough with melted fat and sprinkling it with a mixture of sugar and butter. The dough is then rolled up like a jelly roll and cut into one-inch slices. Some of the butter-sugar mixture is sprinkled on the bottom of the pan and the rolls are baked in this and baked.

An interesting flavor may be obtained by inserting a small amount of pimento process cheese or chive cream cheese in the top of each roll before it is baked. Cinnamon rolls may be made by brushing dough with melted fat and sprinkling them with sugar, cinnamon and raisins. The dough is rolled as for jelly roll and cut into one-inch slices. A good trick is to use a thread for cutting instead of a knife. This will make a clean

cut without denting the roll. Fruit rolls may be made by adding any variety of fruits, such as raisins or currants, to the dough. While Good Friday seems a long way off, there is no need to save delicious hot cross buns till then. They may be served at any time during the year.

For the ambitious homemaker who wants to vary the meals from day to day, there are dozens of ways to change the shape of the homemade roll. If the family prefers a crusty finish to the rolls, they should be placed one-inch apart on a greased cookie sheet to bake. For clover leaf rolls, the dough may be shaped into small balls, each one brushed with melted fat and then placed together in each muffin tin. They will bake together to give a clover leaf effect. Finger rolls are another common type. To make these, the dough is cut into small uniform pieces, shaped into balls and rolled to the desired length and thickness with the palm of the hand. Other shapes of rolls are those which are made by twisting or braiding the dough before baking.

## Building Low In September

Building in September struck an all-time low for this year, with only \$4600 worth of permits taken out. Previous month \$6077 worth of building was done.

Total amount spent on building here in the last nine months is \$294,923, as compared to

\$308,957 for the same period last year. However, the June 1951 amount of \$145,875 total still stands as a record for any single month. Total amount spent on building last year was \$349,-832.

## SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

### Kathleen-Rupert Inquiry Soon—Week-End Activity

Inquiry into the collision between the steamers Prince Rupert and the Princess Kathleen will take place in Vancouver soon but, so far as known, the date has not yet been set. It will be a formal investigation. The preliminary inquiry has already been held. The coming investigation is to be presided over by Mr. Justice Sidney A. Smith. Counsel for the department will be L. St. M. Dumoulin.

Stormy weather on the Queen Charlotte Islands and in Hecate Straits delayed Union steamer Chilcotin. Capt. James Hunter, in returning here Sunday evening from her regular fortnightly voyage to Skidegate and Cumshewa inlet points and it was not until 11 p.m. that the vessel arrived, sailing a couple of hours later for Vancouver.

Union steamer Coquitlam, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 4:30 p.m. Sunday from Vancouver and sailed at 11 p.m. for Alice Arm and Stewart. The vessel returned here this morning and sailed south on schedule at noon today.

CPR steamer Princess Norah arrived in port at 10 o'clock yesterday morning from Vancouver via Ocean Falls, Kemano Bay and Kitimat and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return south. Not only was the passenger accommodation of the vessel taxed to overflowing with personnel for Alcan construction operations at Kemano and Kitimat but the vessel's freight space was also taxed with cargo. Twenty-six overflow passengers from Kemano were landed here to be flown south by Canadian Pa-

Capt. J. T. Hamilton, marine superintendent for British Columbia Coast Steamship Service of the Canadian Pacific Railway, will be coming north next week aboard the steamer Princess Norah for an inspection trip on the new service to Kemano Bay and Kitimat between Vancouver and Prince Rupert.

CPR steamer Princess Louise, southbound from Skagway, was in Prince Rupert Saturday afternoon and took aboard the following passengers for Vancouver: Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Rodman, R. H. Hoban, F. What is reckoned the oldest hull in British Columbia waters was given the customary overhaul and inspection this summer and is considered in good shape for a 69-year-old craft. This is the Joan G, owned as a coastal craft by the Tahsis Company. In early life the Joan G was used in the Arctic and to stave the ice floes it had need of a thick hull. Some parts are three feet thick. The vessel was built in 1882 in San Francisco.

On her lonely voyage to the far north, the commercial steamer Square Knot is now on her way from Seattle to Alaska. This will be her final voyage before winter. She will call at Nome, Teller, Unalakleet, St. Michael, Naknek and Unalakleet. Not until next May or June will other other ships visit these ports.

Compared with earlier years, Prince Rupert calls from the American Campbell Church yachts, making their annual cruises north, appear to be fewer. Nevertheless, they come and one, just a few days back, might have stayed permanently. This was the Acania, which scraped a reef in southeastern Alaska. Twenty-two were aboard. At first, more water was being taken in than could be pumped out, but it was not long before this was reversed. The Acania was floated and is understood to be in Juneau. She has a leak propeller and shaft and a leakage around the stern bearing.

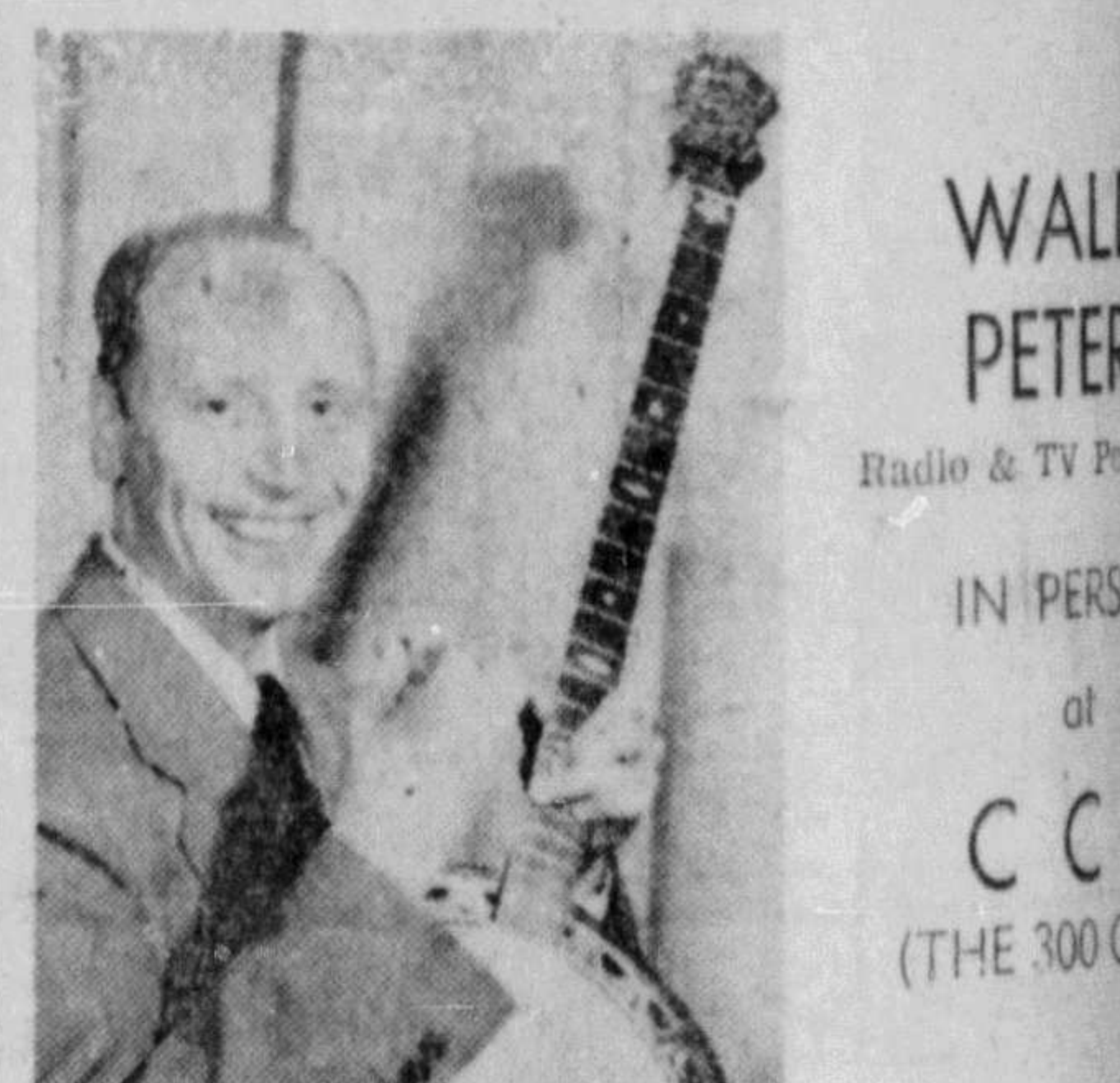

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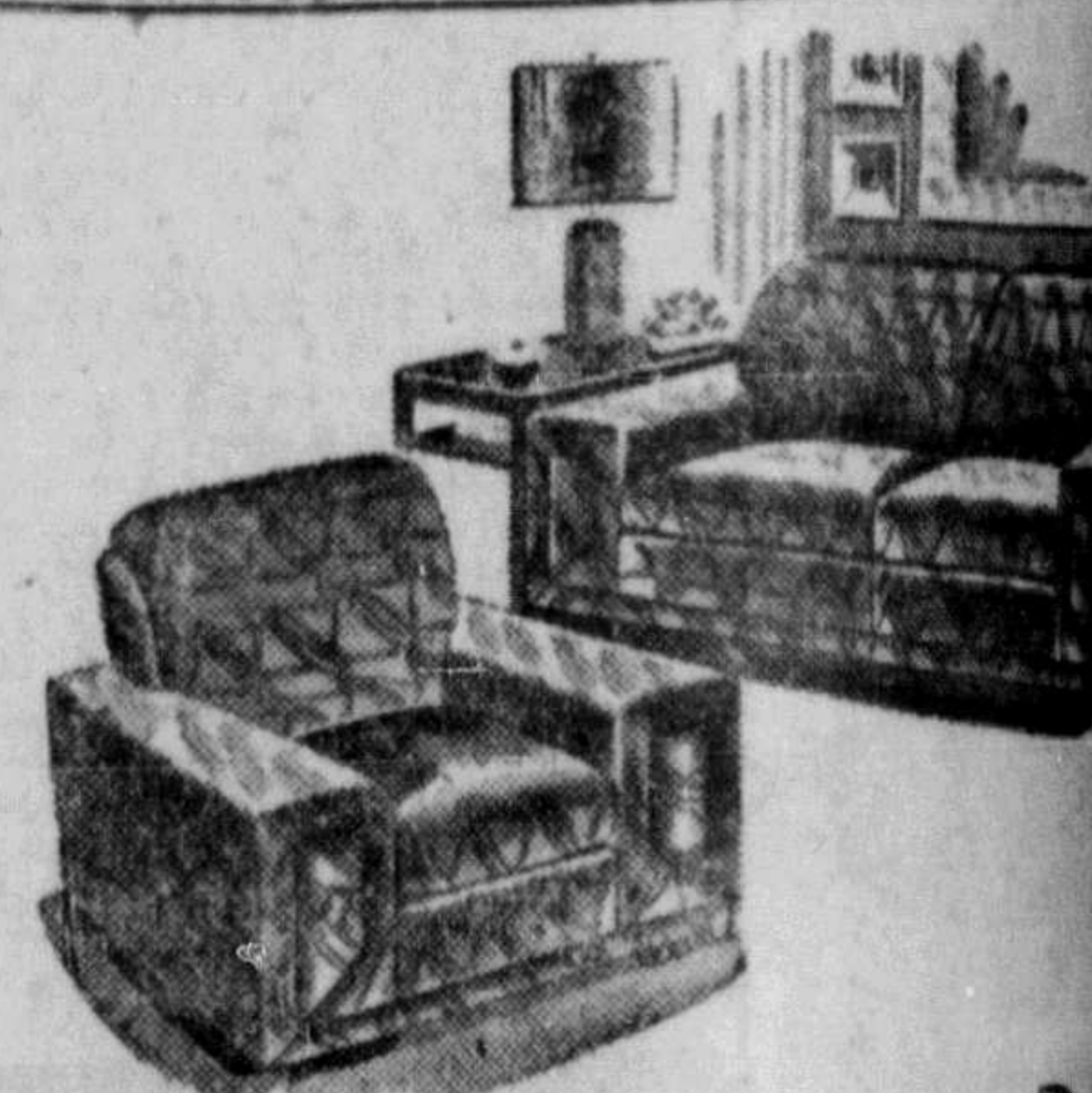
