Warmly Welcomed

QUEBEC (CP)—The royal tour began officially today beneath the high cliffs of this historic capital of French Canada. Down beside the St. Lawrence River, under bleak, grey skies, Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh formally began the month-long tour that will take them from coast to

For the start of the tour there was military pomp and splendor as the Princess came down the platform of the royal train which brought her and her consort from Montreal.

The Princess and Prince Philip on Monday stepped off the plane from Britain and into a royal Canadian welcome from massed thousands.

Flying out of a clouded, blustery sky, the royal couple came down for the start of their Canadian tour at Montreal's huge Dorval airport, jammed by about 25,000 onlookers.

WEATHER



With indications now that the local house is to be pressed into use, it may not be appropriate to harp back again on the many years it has not only been unused but practically forgotten—a situation which was emphasized by a recent amazing communication from the Prince Albert Board of Trade which said it did not know it existed until reading about it in the Saturday Evening Port.

With all parts of the world calling for wheat of which it seems Canada is almost developing a surfeit—and even the minister of trade and commerce, Mr. Howe, talking of the storage and shipping emergency, there should be little further delay in getting the house into use.

The railway company, we have been informed, has received instruction to get the track into shape and there are signs of life around the elevator itself. Rumors are heard of impending shipments to the hungry countries of the Orient. Cargoes are already going forward from Vancouver to India and other parts of the world.

Surely the powers that be would be hard put to find further excuse for not using this house-not only in the immediate present but for an indefinite period.

Proper Toast To King

A CCORDING to the Imperial Order Daughters / I of the Empire there is a recognized procedure for proposing a toast to the King.

A definite formality should be observed by civilians on occasions where a toast to the King is proposed.

The chairman rises, brings the audience to attention and asks them to rise and drink a toast to His Majesty. At this, the audience rises and the chairman says: "Ladies and gentlemen, the King." Then, and only then, is the glass lifted from the table, held at eye level for a moment, then one sip of liquid is taken and the two words, "The King," repeated before the glass is replaced on the table. No other procedure is correct for a civilian pledging the health of His Majesty. Glasses are never clinked. Guests must not smoke before the toast has been proposed. It is not correct to play or sing the National Anthem.
