## To Lay First Keel Next Week

### Governor General to Perform Ceremony During His Visit To City on Saturday Next

Three o'clock is time set for important event; Second keel should be laid down about a month later than the first if everything goes well; Long looked for time now in sight.

On Saturday next the Governor General, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, will lay the keel of the first of the 8,100-ton steamships to be built at the shipyards in this port. That was the decision arrived at yesterday. The first of the slips is nearly ready and the work of preparing the keel is going forward and it is expected that everything will be in readiness for the big event.

Seen this morning in regard to the preparations, Superintendent F. F. Schellenberg said that the first of the slips was pretty nearly ready and the steel was now being prepared for the keel, he thought that by Saturday it would be in such shape that it could be well and truly laid by His Excellency. Preparations were made to accommodate the public as it is expected that if the weather is propitious a large crowd will be present, as everyone in Prince Rupert is interested in the shipbuilding.

The second keel should be laid about a month later if everything goes well. There is already 95 per cent of the steel for the ships on the ground and the rest of it is expected soon.

The event is set for 3 p. m. directly after the Canadian Club luncheon.

The laying of this keel is the great event that has been looked forward to during the last few months. Many vexatious delays have occurred to put off the time, but it is now hoped and expected that the keel will be laid and that work will proceed steadily thereafter.

### ALICE ARM IS VERY ACTIVE

Shipped From Dolly Varden  
Amounting to 1,000 tons  
Making Good Assays.

### BEST GOVERNMENT TAKE OVER THE WHARF

Alice Arm, Sept. 20.—Approximately 1,000 tons of ore has already been shipped from the Dolly Varden mine and it is going well at fifty dollars a ton on the shipments.

The suggestion is being made, it is understood it meets with the entire approval of the mining engineer, that the Government should do something to increase the facilities at Alice Arm. One suggestion is that they should lease the Dolly Varden Railway wharf and increase its capacity. The purchase money would give the company some funds with which to increase its equipment and provision could be made for bunkers, both for the use of the Dolly Varden for the other mines up the coast which will be making shipments almost immediately.

Work is proceeding on the development of a good many of the properties up the valley and by doing there should be a number of shipping mines in the district.

### ROYAL BANK OFFICIALS ARE IN THE CITY

President of the Canadian Bankers Association and Other Directors in Party.

E. L. Pease, president of the Bankers Association and a number of directors of the Royal Bank of Canada about a dozen prominent men in all, arrived in the city this morning and were met by A. W. Cameron, manager of the local branch, and a number of members of the local Board of Trade.

The distinguished party was taken to see the industries of the city including the shipbuilding plant and drydock, the cold storage plant and the big mill, and later they lunched on board the steamer.

Besides Mr. Pease there were in the party such distinguished men as Sir Mortimer Davis, president of the Imperial Tobacco Co., and G. H. Duggah, president of the Dominion Bridge Co., C. S. Wilcox, president of the Canada Steel Co. All were much interested in what they saw and showed some surprise at the fine up-to-date plants they found here and were struck with the possibilities of the place.

### PROMISE OF LIVELY MEETING TONIGHT OF FAIR ASSOCIATION

There is to be a meeting of the Agricultural Association tonight in the city hall at which the fair will be discussed as well as plans for next year.

It is understood that a number of proposals will be made in connection with the next event. ### Duke of Devonshire Will Be the Guest Of Canadian Club

Complete arrangements made to entertain distinguished visitor who should arrive here on Friday evening and leave Sunday night

At a meeting of representative citizens held in the Council Chamber yesterday a program was drawn up for the entertainment of His Excellency. The train is expected to arrive at 8 p. m. on Friday and a committee will meet the special train and escort the Governor in automobiles to the Exhibition Building which will be specially decorated for the occasion. A guard of honor composed of war veterans and mounted police will also accompany the party.

At the hall an address will be presented by the mayor and the Governor will reply, after which a reception will be held when those wishing to meet His Excellency personally will have an opportunity of doing so.

On Saturday visits will be paid to the mill and cold storage plant and also to the Tucks Inlet cannery.

At one o'clock the Duke will be the guest of honor of the Prince Rupert Canadian Club in the Prince Rupert Hotel at which His Excellency will address the members. Tickets for this event will be limited and members are advised to purchase them at once. President Judge Young will preside.

In the afternoon the keel laying ceremony will take place and at 5 it is proposed to have the Governor address the school children in front of the Government offices on Second Ave., but this has not yet been definitely arranged.

The party will leave for Anyox at midnight and will inspect the smelter and mine and on Sunday night will proceed south to Vancouver and Victoria.

All the visitors to Stewart district return with wonderful tales of the richness of the mines, of the promising future of the district and of the big city they are going to have soon at the head of Portland Canal. They believe in it and they enthuse us all with their exuberance. We in Prince Rupert share very largely in the optimism of the people of the Portland Canal capital. We are glad to see them prosper. Perhaps we are a little selfish all the same, but we have a great bond of sympathy with a new town and especially with a neighboring town. It is an advantage for Prince Rupert if Stewart grows, and it should be an advantage to Stewart if this becomes a big industrial and distributing point.

Now that the fair is over it is time to prepare for the next. President Perry and his board of directors have done splendid work this year and secured excellent results. Mr. Perry is full of energy and optimism and enthuses those who work with him. He and the members of the board deserve the thanks of the community and especially of the business men who stood to benefit financially by the fair.

The complaint has been made that those who benefit most from the fair do least to help make it a success. We do not know how true this may be, but in any undertaking of this kind there should be co-operation. The work cannot all be left to one or two people, and especially to a few who from a business point of view are disinterested.

There is no fair so good that it cannot be improved. Now is the time to take stock and find out where improvements may be made. While the thing is fresh in mind is the time to consider next year.

One great improvement this year over last has been the provision of accommodation for the visiting Indians. The next thing will be to improve that accommodation and also to provide for others who come at that time. The hotel and rooming house keepers did their level best this week, but even that fell short and some found it very difficult to get a place to sleep.

Considering the weather the city must certainly congratulate itself on the excellent results obtained. The elements were against us, but a good deal of wholesome fun was enjoyed and the city as a whole benefitted.

The city owes a good deal to Superintendent Campbell of Anyox and the bunch of good sports from that place that helped the Prince Rupert people to celebrate. It also owes a good deal to the Terrace people and to all those who took a real interest in the annual exhibition. Without the co-operation of the people from the outside districts it would be impossible to carry on. On the other hand they receive that measure of publicity which is essential to their welfare.

Unfortunately on this occasion there were many entries to the fair which did not arrive. The gale kept many launches from bringing in stuff from various points and that made gaps on the tables. These are the sort of things that cannot be obviated.

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## WAYWARD GIRL TAKES SILVER BACK TO ANYOX

Florence Won in Cruiser Class in Close Race on Waterfront Last Evening.

With a noise like an aeroplane, with the spray flying on either side, with one third of her length sticking in the air, the Anyox special "Wayward Girl" made the local boats look like coal barges so far as speed was concerned, during the speed boat races yesterday evening. It was the spectacular feature of the boat races.

Shortly after five o'clock yesterday evening the judges of the boat races, Ben Self, Harry Lipsett and Dave Thomson, went out in the Dinty Moore and set the course moorings. The cruisers got away on a good start with their engines running and the clutch thrown out. At the first dory they were all well together and the judges' boat went round the course to see that there was no cutting of corners. She then dropped out and started the speed boats.

### Cruisers.

On the first lap the cruisers rapidly strung out with the Florence of Inverness cannery in the lead, the Seal Cove of the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills next and the Northern Cross entered by Rev. Rushbrook, third, and they finished in this order. On rounding the first buoy the Narbethong was thrown away off her course on account of trouble with her steering gear.

### Speed Boats.

At the shot the two Rupert speed boats got off in good time while the Anyox boat seemed to stall for a minute. However it soon got under way and in one round caught up to George Frizell who was travelling along at a fair clip. Myhill-Jones lost ground in the early part of the event. The Anyox scooter was now going at real high speed and after passing the Violet F. seemed to walk right away from her rival whose engine was now smoking very badly. Lusty cheers from the smelter supporters who lined the wharves greeted the speeding craft on every turn. The two mechanics will take the cup back to Anyox with them, as once more the Wayward Girl has proved her superior powers.

## RUPERT TOOK BASKETBALL

Won From Anyox by Score of 57 to 12—Weight and Skill.

Last evening's basketball game ended in favor of Rupert by the decisive score of 57 to 12. Throughout the game the home boys played an excellent game and had the advantage of heavier players. 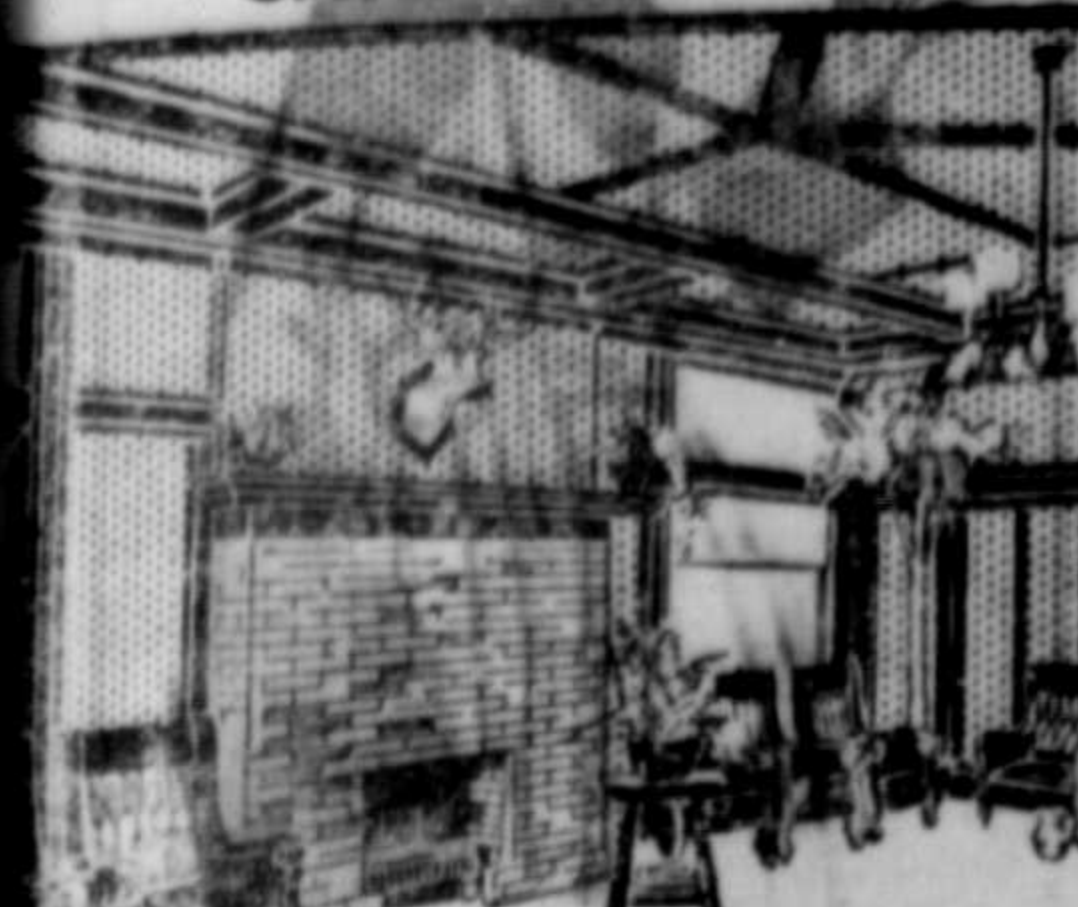

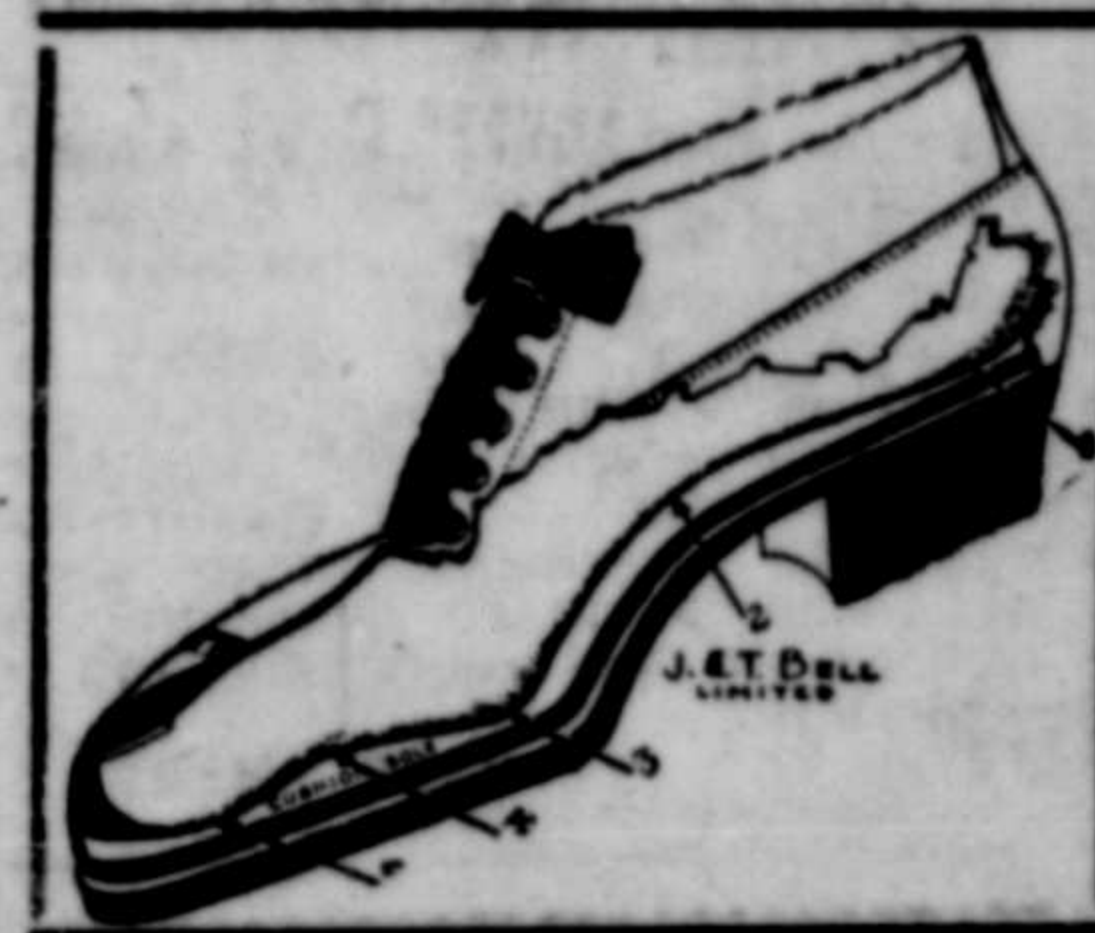
