## LLOYD GEORGE WILL MAKE AN EFFORT TO CONCILIATE IRELAND

Suggestions of co-operation with labor are refused by leaders; Several Cabinet changes are foreshadowed by British press; Churchill going to Colonial Office

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 22.—In its forecast of the coming reconstruction of the British ministry the Sunday Times says that Premier Lloyd George has decided to offer another olive branch to Ireland, "recognizing as does Bonar Law, that resolute government has been carried to the farthest extent possible and that Ireland cannot indefinitely be kept under military occupation."

The Times says that the Premier has sounded certain labor leaders on the subject of co-operation, but they have definitely declined, "hence," it adds, "the ministerial congresses probably will be few."

Viscount Rothermere, who is a zealous economist, according to the Times, will probably be appointed secretary of war while Colonel Winston Spencer Churchill, the present war secretary, will go to the colonial office as Viscount Milner, who holds the office, is anxious to retire.

## U. S. SQUADRON AT VANCOUVER

Plans Changed at Last Minute Owing to Death of Seaman.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 22.—The United States dreadnaught New Mexico, accompanied by the destroyers Anthony and Ludlow, and under command of Admiral Hugh Rodman, who commanded the Sixth Battle Squadron of the American navy with the Grand Fleet during the war, anchored in Vancouver waters on Sunday afternoon. The death at noon of a seaman on the New Mexico, the Admiral's flagship, from spinal meningitis, caused last minute change of plans for the formal reception of the Admiral and his arrangements in connection with the visit of the Prince of Wales.

Captain and Mrs. Beavis of 5th Avenue West, accompanied by Miss Beavis, left last evening for Vancouver on their way to England, where they will visit for the next year or so. It is their intention to return here afterwards to resume ranching on Stephens Island.

## SEVERAL CASES IN THE POLICE COURT

Michael J. Noone Charged With Administering a Drug for Unlawful Purposes.

In the police court this morning, Harry Lathrop and P. Droppity were each fined \$10 for fighting on the streets. A satisfactory explanation was given to the court in connection with the stabbing of Matsu Yama, the Japanese who was admitted to the general hospital a few days ago. The affair was accidental.

Mrs. Gertrude Brown was charged with theft and Michael J. Noone with administering a drug for the purpose of committing an indictable offense. No evidence was given in either of these two cases, both being adjourned for eight days. So far as can be learned, however, it appears that a man had been relieved of a considerable sum of money in connection with which the above charges were laid.

## STEEL WORKERS IN STATES NEARLY ALL ARE OUT ON STRIKE

Secretary of the Steel Workers National Committee claims ninety per cent. effective; Many Cities in the East affected by move

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 22.—Wm. Z. Foster, secretary of the steel workers national committee, today claimed that the strike of the men in the steel plants of the country was ninety per cent effective. The supreme test of organized labor under the United States Steel Corporation is taking place today. Up to eight o'clock this morning no disorders had occurred in McKeesport, Clairton, Homestead, Braddock, Duquesne, and other nearby points.

State police were stationed at Mill Gates and McKeesport, the number striking at these places is placed at 500.

At Clairton, where the state constabulary broke up the strikers' meeting yesterday and where shots were fired during the clash, all was reported quiet this morning.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 22.—"Nineteen thousand men are out and before night we shall have 25,000 to 28,000 men striking here," said H. W. Raissie, union organizer in charge of the steel strike in Cleveland district, early today.

Wheeling, Va., Sept. 22.—At least 15,000 men in Wheeling and vicinity are idle today, it was estimated.

Pueblo, Colo., Sept. 22.—The Colorado Fuel and Iron Co. announced that its steel plant here employing over 6,000 men was forced by the strike to shut down today.

Garry, Ind., Sept. 22.—The industrial heart of the Magic City is practically at a standstill today. Activity in the great Garry works was checked at 6 o'clock this morning when thousands of workers failed to report.

Johnstown, Pa., Sept. 22.—It is estimated that the strikers number in excess of 80 per cent of the Cambria steel workers.

Buffalo, Sept. 22.—Less than 200 workers reported at the Lakawana Steel Company this morning. The principal mills on strike are Lakawana, Rogers Brown, Buffalo Slag Co. and the Donners Steel Co. The union heads place the number on strike at 20,000, while the company officials place the number at not more than 12,000.

## TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS OPENED AT HAMILTON, ONT., TODAY

Many important questions to be discussed, including the status of the One Big Union; Ben Tillet is attending

Hamilton, Sept. 22.—Welcomed by Sir William Hearst, premier of Ontario, Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor, and Mayor C. G. Booker of Hamilton, nearly 800 delegates representing practically every organized craft in the Dominion, commenced the inaugural session of the 35th annual Trades and Labor Congress of Canada this morning.

All the delegates agree that the congress just started will be the most important in the history of organized labor. Probably the most important matters on the order paper are resolutions with the eight-hour day, minimum wages, collective bargaining, and the policy of the congress regarding the One Big Union question.

Ben Tillet, M. P., the prominent British Labor leader, is attending on behalf of the British Trades and Labor Congress.

There are no less than 800 delegates present representing all the organized crafts.

## FAIR MEETING WAS A FIZZLE

Very Slim Attendance, so Adjournment Was Taken Until September 30.

COMPLAIN MERCHANTS TAKE NO INTEREST

The annual meeting of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association which was called for Saturday night was adjourned as the attendance was not very large and it was thought Saturday evening was not a suitable time to get the merchants and others together.

Vice-President D. McD. Hunter was in the chair. He explained that there seemed to be a lack of interest in the fair among the merchants. The directors felt that they were carrying the whole load of the work while the merchants were reaping the benefit. It took a good deal of time and energy to put on and feature a fair. Had it not been for the weather they would have had good results.

Send Out Circular.

D. Thomson said they could do for themselves the lack of interest. There was nothing to do but adjourn the meeting. He suggested sending out a circular to the merchants pointing out that if there was not more interest taken in it than in the past they would drop it altogether. They had been working in order that half a dozen others might make money. The directors had been in their employ, pushing their business for them and giving their time for nothing. It was up to the merchants to come forward and say what was going to be done.

A. Brooksbank agreed with the remarks made by the others. The interest taken in the fair did not warrant their going on and electing directors. They should give the merchants another opportunity to attend. The directors had practically decided to retire unless the merchants came forward and gave the fair their support.

Out of Pocket.

Ben Self said that expressed his views absolutely. He had made up his mind not to take part in the fair again. He had been out of pocket every time and had made special trips. The men who took no part in the work only criticised and abused. He thought they should let someone else have a chance.

**Need for Quick Action  
 On the New School.**

There is great need of haste in connection with the new public school. There is a class of about forty pupils crowded into the basement of the Methodist Church where the light is very poor and the room is in other ways ill suited for the purpose of a class room. This is not good for the youngsters and steps should be taken to get something better as soon as possible.

There are other rooms crowded to the doors as well as an inconvenient room in use on Second Avenue in the Hays Block. The people of Prince Rupert have decided that they want a new school. A majority of the people realize the serious condition of affairs. There are some people, however, in every community that begrudge every cent that is spent on the children. This has no particular reference to those who voted against the school bylaw for many of them did it because they thought better arrangements might be made.

To the average normal parent the most precious thing in the world is the child, and nothing is too good for it. Many of the Prince Rupert people are perfectly normal and they want the best there is for the boys and girls. What is needed now is quick action so that they may have it before the health of the children has been irreparably injured.

**Registering for  
 Voters' Lists.**

In Victoria the voters' lists were all cancelled and a new list has been made for the election which is taking place there, caused by the elevation of Dr. Toimie to a cabinet position. Whether the same will be done in every constituency is not at all clear. To make sure it might be wise for those not registered to get on the list at once in order that there may be no chance of their being disfranchised. Because this action is taken for a Dominion election does not follow that the same will be done before a provincial election. There are a good many newcomers to Prince Rupert and they should all see that they are registered before the list closes.



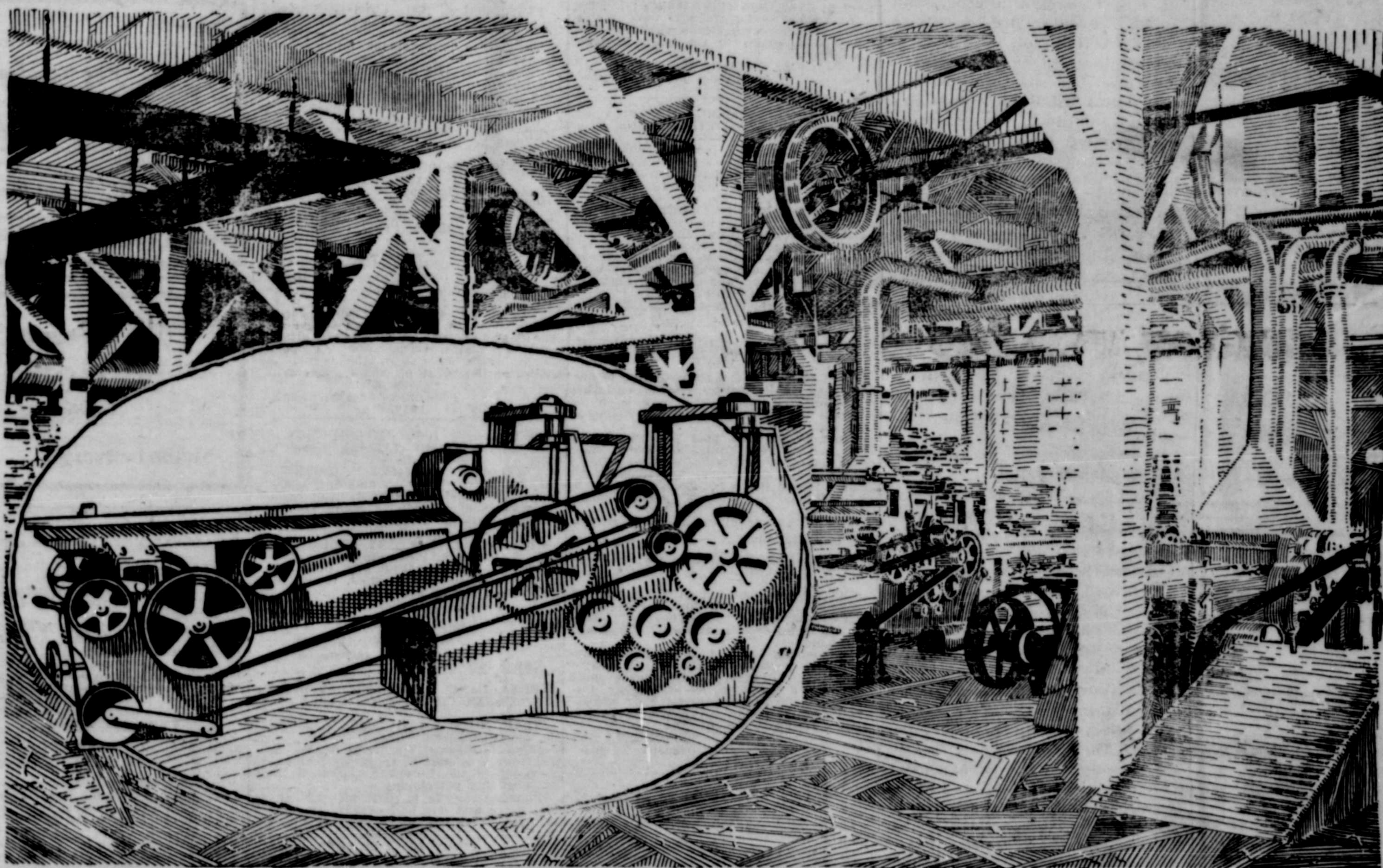

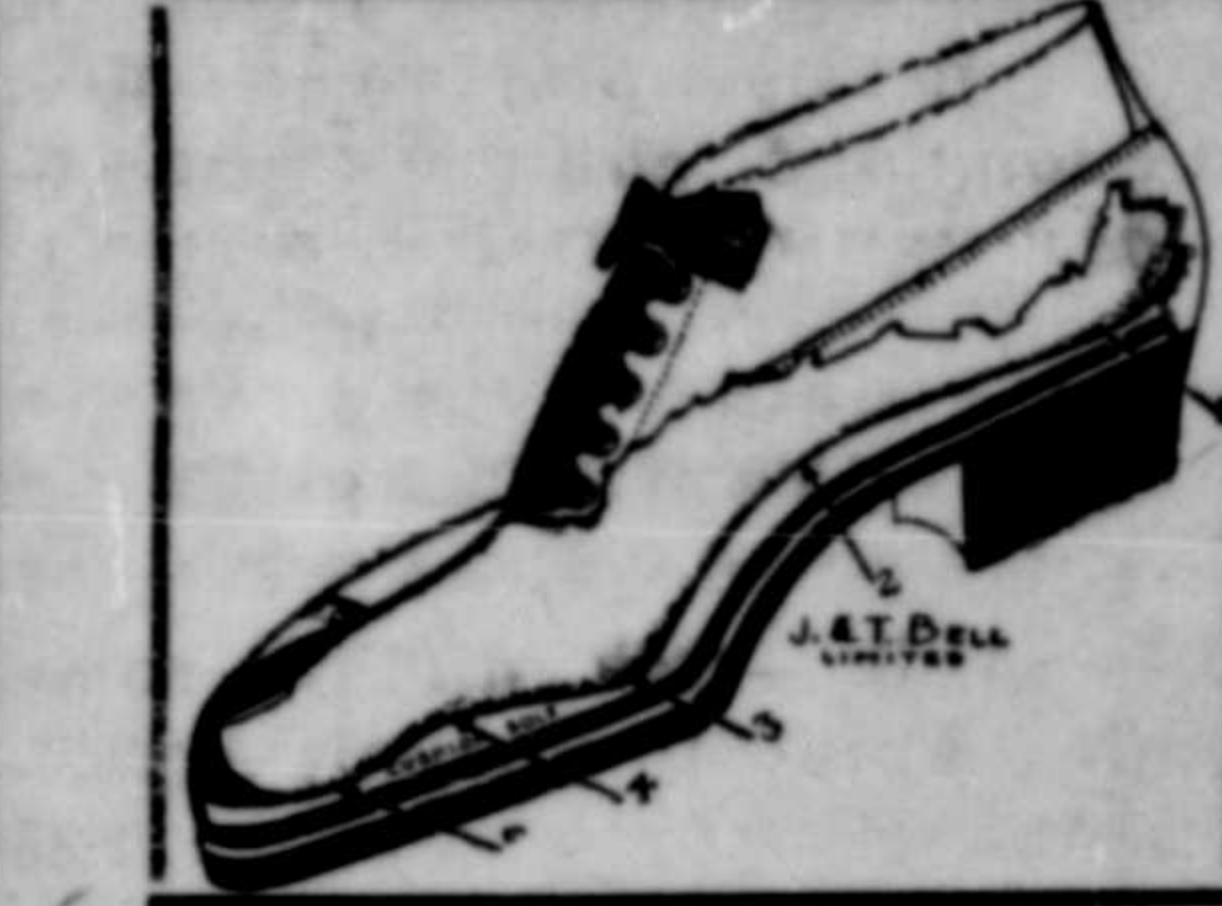

**BRING GRATUITIES BEFORE CITY COUNCIL**

Alderman Casey has posted the following notice of motion to come up at the meeting of the City Council tonight:

"Whereas the matter of extending payment of gratuity money to returned veterans has become an issue between the G. W. V. A. and the Dominion Government, and whereas the outcome of the controversy will have a far-reaching effect on the social condition of the country during the coming winter, therefore be it resolved by the Prince Rupert City Council that we endorse the six months' extension of payments of gratuity and an allowance to widows and dependents of soldiers comparable with the present cost of living, and be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Dominion Government and the Dominion executive of the G. W. V. A. and that all other municipalities in British Columbia be requested to take similar action.
