New Tariffs

WITH big industry becoming a factor of preponderant importance in the economy of Prince Rupert and Central British Columbia, we become more tariff-conscious. Tariff is of a good deal more direct importance than a merely theoretical matter.

Heretofore, tariff on fish was the thing that we were most directly concerned about although lumber tariffs interested us to some extent. Now any announcement concerning such commodities as pulp and aluminum are of great interest.

Therefore the Torquay agreements, some particulars of which we announced yesterday, are headline events for Prince Rupert.

For instance, we note that the tariff on aluminum from Canada to the United States is to be reduced by twenty-five percent. Such a concession, if finally consummated, would have a great bearing on the new aluminum industry in this area.

Canadian canned salmon in the United States also gets a cut in tariff from 25 to 15 percent. This should work to the benefit of this industry which has long been of so direct concern to Prince Rupert.

British Columbia businessmen are receiving the news of the Torquay agreement with gratification. They should be of considerable satisfaction, also, to this industrially expanding area.

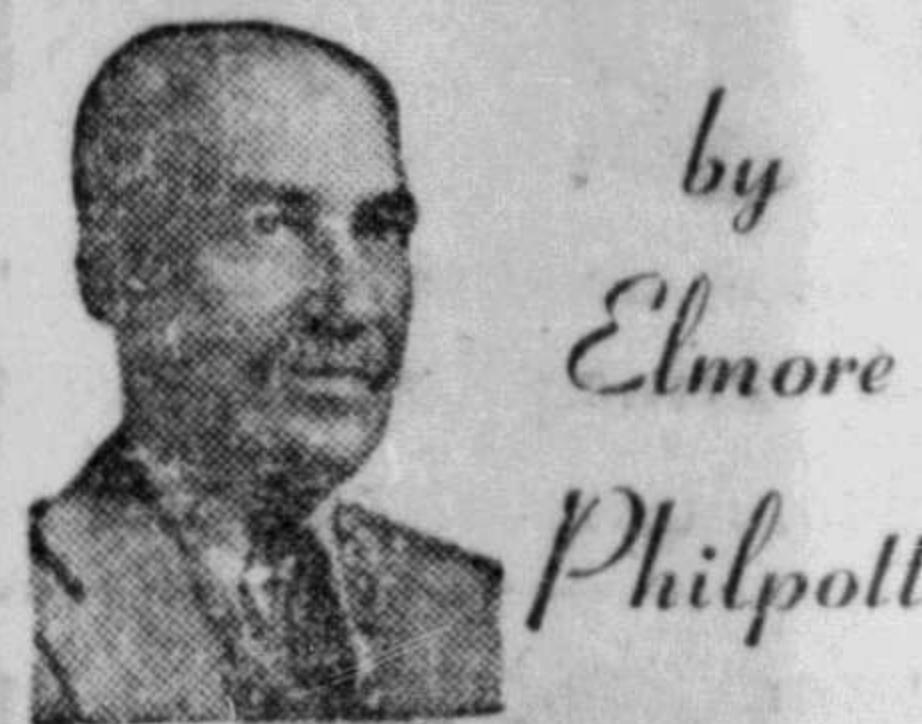

SCHOOL IN BELGRADE

BELGRADE, YUGOSLAVIA.—This morning I went back to school—this time far from home. I wanted to see what they did in their schools here, so picked the one nearest our hotel.

It was the second boys' high school. As we entered I noticed the huge bomb-gap, left vacant since the Germans bombed this place in 1941.

We entered the principal's office much like its Canadian counterpart. But I noticed the significant two photographs on the wall—Tito's and Lenin's. Three years ago, Stalin's would have been there But not now!

I soon chuckled to think how similar people are despite differences of race and tongue and politics. The principal, or director, Patrassin Nikitovic, neat, raven-haired, hawk-nosed man of 30-plus, was talking to some windpup on the phone. But meantime, a handsome woman with a fine figure was trying to complete some business involving papers on the desk. The principal, without interrupting his phone talk, carried on the complicated extra transaction, which involved sign language, signature and even tearing some coupons and letter in half.

WHAT DID I WANT TO OBSERVE—an English class, geography or physics? I chose English first and geography second. It turned out that we were just too late for the English class—so we concentrated on geography. I think the principal was a bit disappointed when I resolutely vetoed physics. Once I unwilling-

ly learned enough of it to pass my matric, I swore "never again" and I'm too old to change now, even for the sake of Yugoslav-Canadian relations.

THE GEOGRAPHY CLASS WAS a treat, even if I had to get whipsawed interpretation at times. The room was full of boys of about 12 or 13 years of age. (Girls and boys have separate schools here.)

The teacher, Mrs. Radmilo Ristic, is a powerful woman in every sense. She appears to be in her thirties, is fairish, broad and businesslike. Energy vibrates from her in waves.

They were studying the North American continent—with a good map, showing the physical features. No political boundaries of any kind were shown.

The teaching technique, in that class, is by the question and answer method. The first boy up to the board to answer seems to me to be the "brain" of the class—probably picked to impress visitors. But there was nothing stage-managed about the rest of the period. As each question was asked, eager hands went up, not by ones or twos, but in large numbers. The whole class seemed to have a really sound grounding in the kind of resources which North America possesses.

I asked myself whether a class of 13-year-old Canadian boys would be as well able to answer, readily, questions about the Balkan peninsula.

I AM NO EXPERT ON TEACHING methods. It seemed to me that the Belgrade lady teacher intervened to correct the boys' answers more than would have been the case with us—but I'm

not sure. Anyway, whatever the theory may have been, the results were obviously good. For this teacher was obviously getting results that any teacher would be happy and, indeed, proud to get in any land.

AFTER CLEARING UP SOME points with my interpreter, I asked myself why they had made no distinction between Canada, U.S.A., Mexico and so on, in their teaching. But then I recalled that the teacher had been most explicit in correcting the boys, to the effect that they were studying a continent, not countries. Also, it was most clear that they were interested in physical facts—not political dividing lines.

MY WIFE IS VERY PLEASED with herself, because of what she thinks was a smart comeback to a comment made by an elevator man. He said to her, "You American?" "No," she answered, "Canadian." He shrugged. "All same—all same." "O, so you are all same as Italian, eh?"

He burst out laughing at that, for, of course, the Italians and Yugoslavs, though also next-door neighbors, are very far from being bosom pals. Of course, her comparison was away out of line, for whether we admit it or not, the difference between Canadians and Americans are virtually imperceptible to others. However, the farther from home we are, the more Canadian we

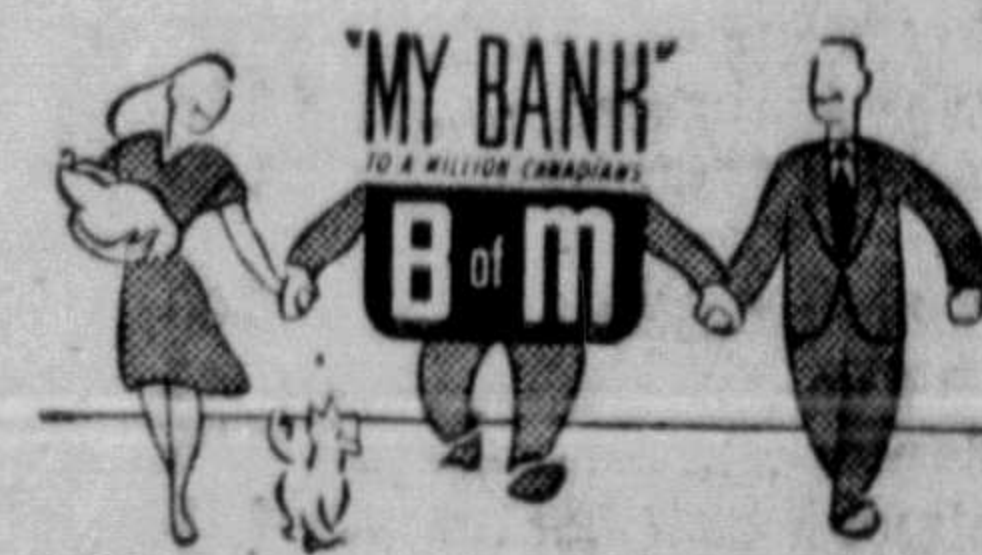

### Rupert Milk Best in B.C.

Bulkley Valley farmers, who supply Prince Rupert's fresh milk market, are producing the best quality milk in the province.

Such is the statement of Dr. Duncan McC. Black, director of the Prince Rupert and District Union Board of Health in his report for the month of April. Routine sampling of milk was carried out and bacteriological data obtained during a period of six months.

### Joining up To Sewers

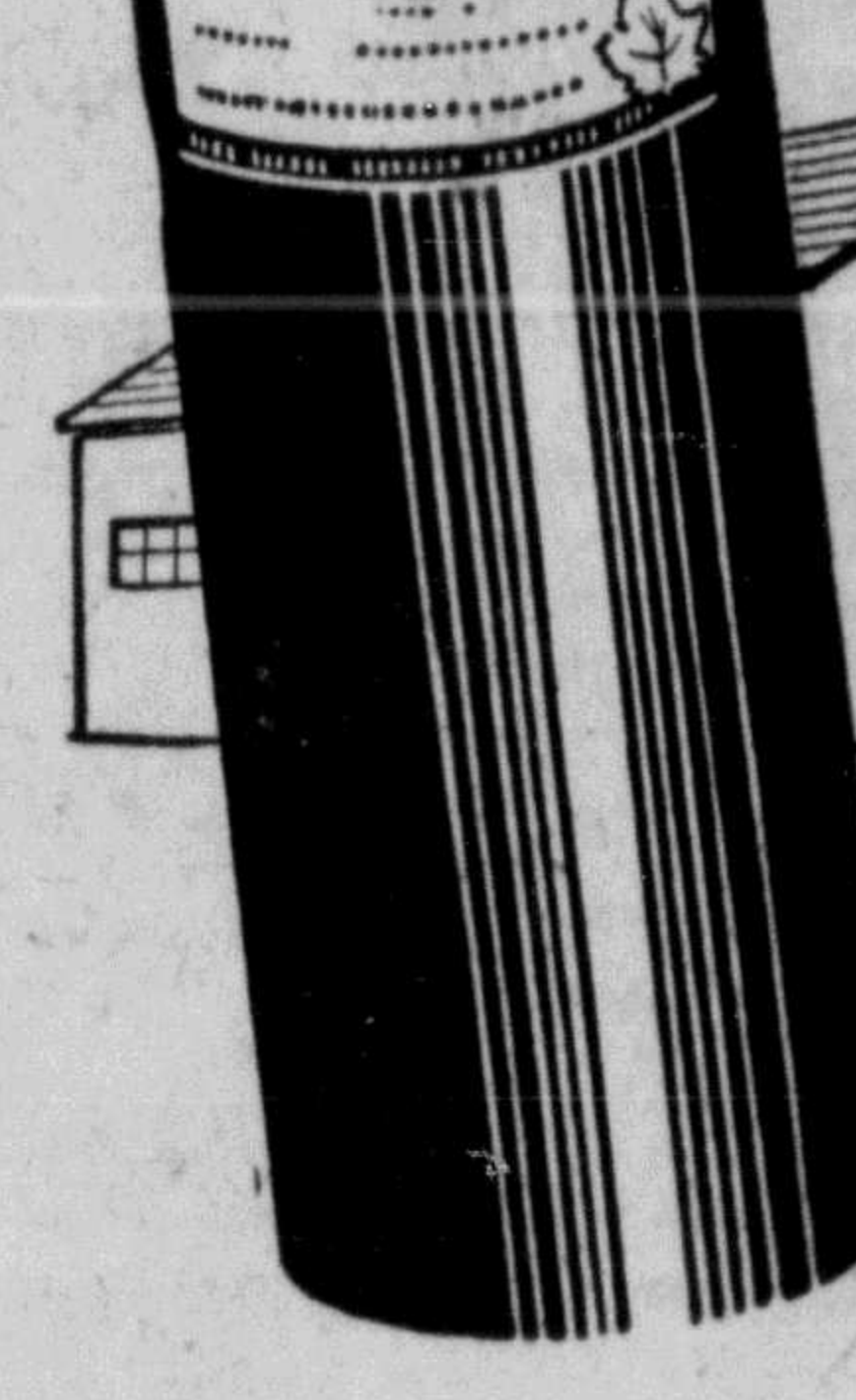

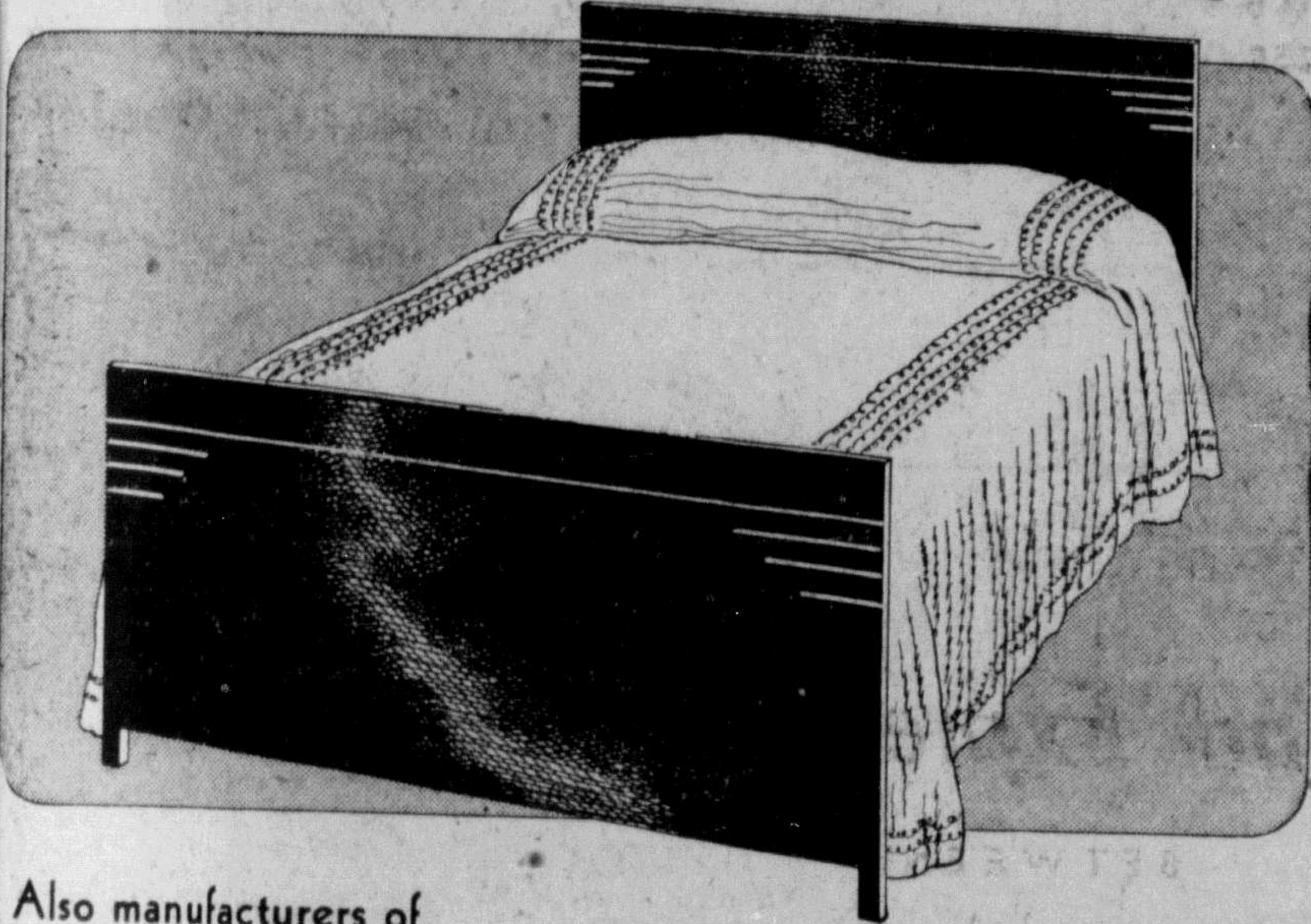

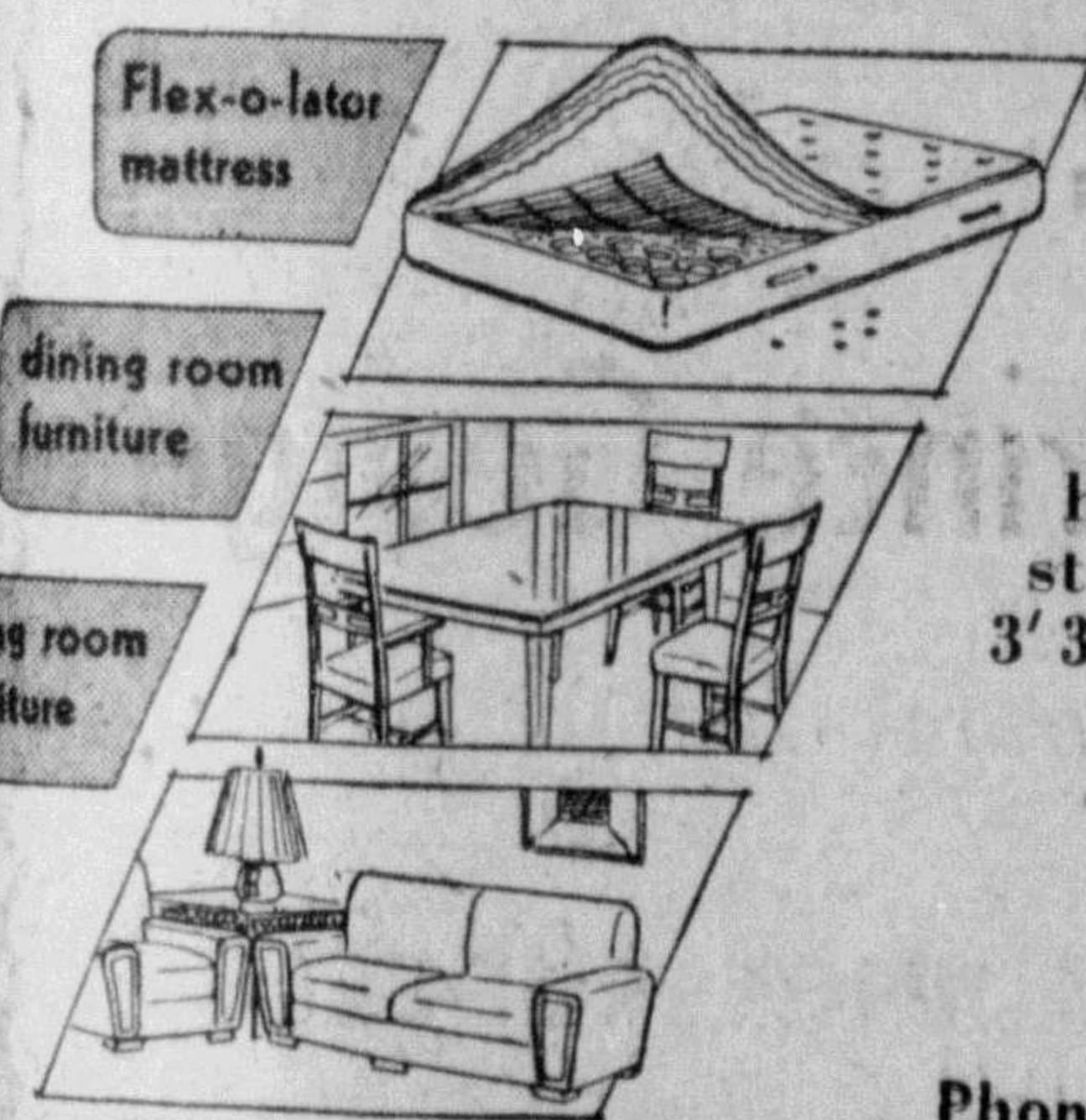

**Baggage Cars Are Ordered**

MONTREAL—An order for 59 baggage cars valued at \$4,360,000 has been placed by the Canadian National Railways, E. A. Bromley, vice-president, purchases and stores, announced here today. It raises to \$90,000,000 the value of rolling stock now to be delivered to the company.

The new baggage cars, to be built at the National Steel Car Corporation, will be 73 feet, six inches long, 10 feet wide, and 13 feet, six inches high from the rail. Of all steel construction, the car bodies will be made of welded steel with steel underframes and riveted roofs.

Both sides of each car will be equipped with two doors having eight foot and six foot clear openings respectively. Interiors will contain water coolers, stoves, equipment lockers, desks and baggage skid racks.

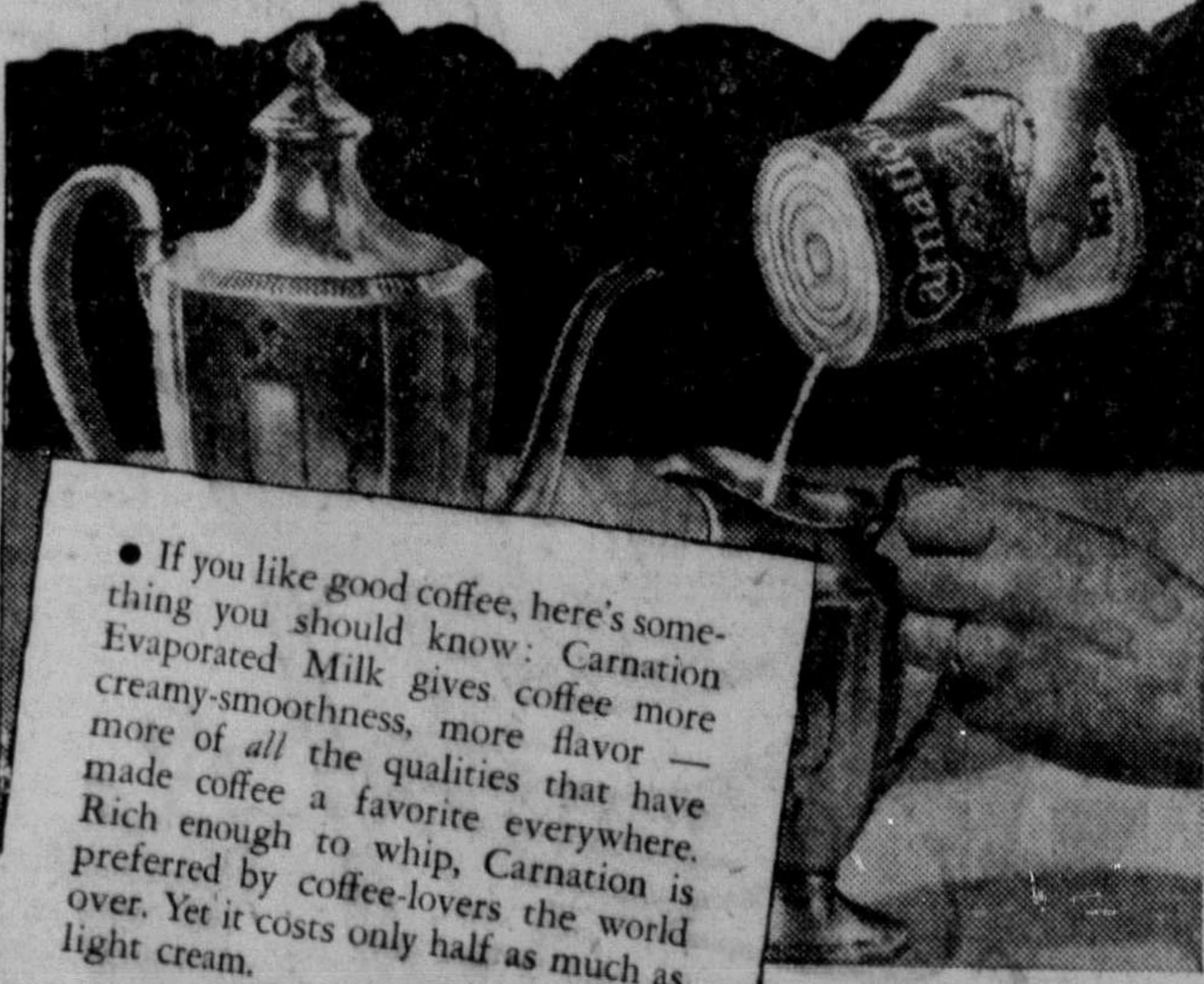

## Clever African Artist Found

PORT ELIZABETH, South Africa — The story of an African who changed the whole course of an industry in which he was once a laborer was told at the Port Elizabeth agricultural show by an official of the company.

Two years ago 30-year-old Freddie Mputing, an African from the eastern Transvaal, was instrumental in bringing about a radical change in the company's output.

Workers at the receiving end of a long kiln in which clay insulators were baked from time to time found clay animals hidden under the insulators. Unaware of their real artistic worth they often destroyed them.

One day a Johannesburg artist, Mrs. Marjorie Sangster, saw one of the figures and immediately recognized its value. The unknown artist had hitherto only been sought for the purpose of a reprimand for using company materials and time.

### NARROWING THE SEARCH

The search was then instigated for another purpose, and was narrowed down to 20 Africans who were placed in a row and given clay to model.

The natural artist, Freddie, although unwilling to disclose his name because he thought he would be punished was unable to

hide his talent and modeled a perfect figure.

Freddie's talents were given free rein, and he was set to the work he loved. His models of animals, detailed with acute ob-

servation, were marketed and instantly created a demand.

Expansion in the ceramic field was started. Five potters were brought from Italy, Holland and England, and the output of glaz-

Freddie, who uses no tools but his hands and has had neither lessons nor guidance, continues to model his individualistic figures and critics predict a great future for him.

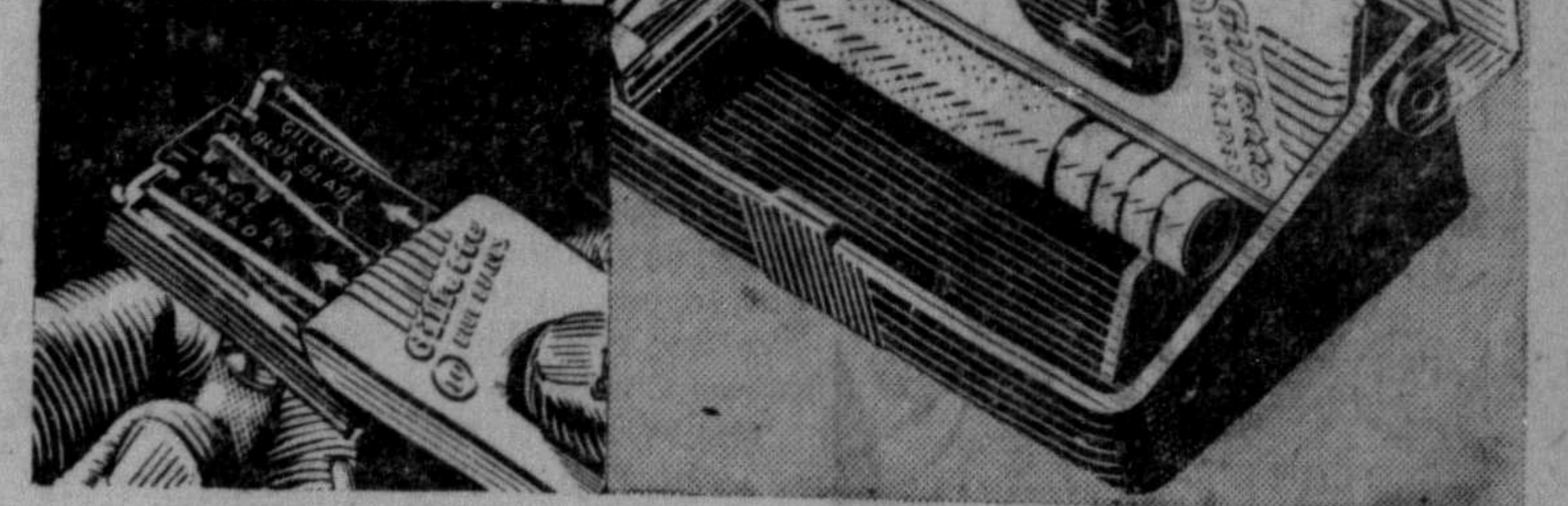

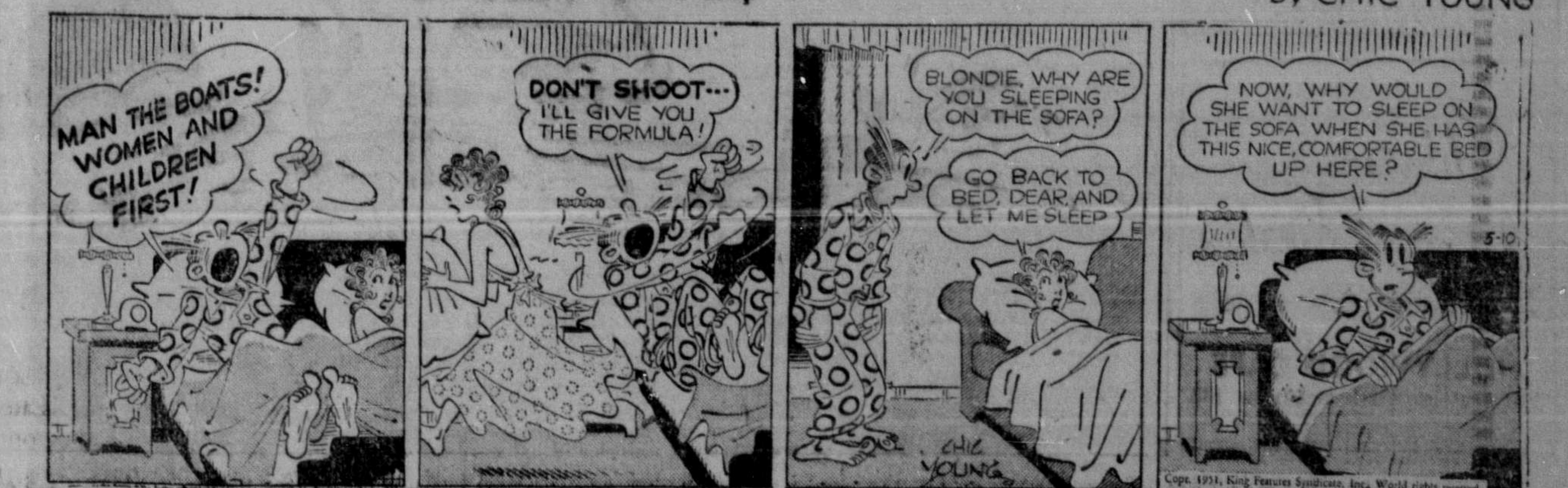

## Victoria Papers Make History

VICTORIA (CP)—An event unique in Canadian newspaper history took place here when the Victoria Daily Times, the afternoon paper, and the Daily Colonist, the city's morning paper, moved into a new, single \$1,000,000 plant, known as Victoria Press Ltd.

The big push started when tons of machinery was moved from the two downtown plants to the new building at the north end of the city. Workmen had already erected scaffolding and knocked holes in the upper-storey walls of the old buildings to facilitate removal of Linotypes and other printing machinery.

The move was completed without a break in publication. Clarence Wallace, Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, pressed a button to start the new press rolling. The press can produce 40,000 newspapers an hour.

The papers have separate editorial offices in each wing of the building but will use the same press, composing room, stereotype, wirephoto machine and library. Each paper will also have its own Canadian Press teletype service.

## Use of This Port Sought

Suggestion of the Prince George Board of Trade is that if wheat shipping could be developed through the Prince Rupert elevator, loaded railway box-cars would come to this railway line and then be available for use in shipping lumber thus obviating periodical shortage of rail cars which has been working hardship on interior mills. The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday night turned over the matter to the grain and Peace River committees. The Prince George Board of Trade requested that the local chamber give it a true picture of the present elevator situation here.

Prince George has been interesting itself considerably of late in the possibility of better utilization of the port of Prince Rupert as being essential to the economic welfare of the whole interior country. George Murray, MP for Skeena has also been advocating considerably along the same line.

## Cancer Clinic Doing Well

REGINA (CP)—A small auburn-haired widow with sympathetic grey-green eyes is looked upon as a combination fairy godmother and helpful friend by thousands of cancer patients in Regina.

She is Anne J. Ellis, welfare worker employed by the Saskatchewan division of the Canadian Cancer Society.

At her desk in the Allan Blair Memorial Cancer Clinic, Mrs. Ellis says she is mostly concerned with "review" patients. These she visits twice weekly.

During a five-month period this had added up to 6,200 patients visited, including general hospital, nursing home and out-patients.

Her job is manifold. She writes letters for patients, attends to their personal shopping and brings them magazines. Occasionally she takes patients to meet trains.

### HELPS NEWCOMERS

Often people of foreign extraction unable to speak or write English to any extent must stay over in Regina for treatment. The difficulty of getting word to their families, often the cause of much anxiety, is solved by Mrs. Ellis who writes or telephones for them.

In addition, Mrs. Ellis supplies small comforts for patients who have very little means. Money for this purpose is supplied by the Yorkton, Swift Current, Moose Jaw and Regina units of the society.

Christmas is an exceptionally busy time for this busy little woman who sees to it that none of her patients is forgotten.

An important service Mrs. Ellis performs is to find suitable accommodation near the clinic. She endeavors to find a sympathetic environment for each patient seeking a temporary residence. She keeps a file of these accommodations and says:

"I've had to knock at doors but I usually find what I'm looking for"

Cancer patients are remarkably cheerful and most appreciative, Mrs. Ellis says, adding of her own role: "The work grows on you"

Three others are still missing. Original report indicated that a sixth man may have been in the boat but this could not be confirmed.

The tragedy was discovered Sunday when an aircraft sighted an overturned boat floating in the canal.
