Both Sides Claim Advantage In Big Steel Strike which Started in U.S. Yesterday

Union leaders say that 284,000 out of half million are out, and 71,000 in Pittsburg district alone; Corporation officials claim only 15,000 in same district.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Pittsburg, Sept. 23.—The opening day of the strike in the iron and steel industry of the United States found both sides in the bitter struggle claiming the advantage. After the first day's skirmish, the U. S. Steel Corporation, against whom the brunt of the attack was made, was able to operate most of its plants in Pittsburg district, according to officials of that concern.

What tomorrow will bring they could not say, but they expressed confidence that in view of the fact that the steel workers did not cause a general tieup they would have more men at work on the second day than on the first.

Union Statement.

Union leaders at headquarters of the National Committee of Steel Workers declare that they were highly pleased with the answer made by the thousands of organized and unorganized men engaged in the industry.

William Foster, secretary of the National Committee, predicted that an intensive campaign to unionize the plants, not only of the Steel Corporation, but of the independents as well, would result in bringing many more thousands out on strike.

Secretary Foster gave out figures, based, he said, on reports received from union leaders in all steel districts of the country, indicating that approximately 284,000 men out of the half million engaged in the industry, has answered the strike call. In the Pittsburg district alone, he said, 71,000 men were out.

While the corporation officials refrained from going into figures, the estimates did not agree in any particular with the figures issued by Secretary Foster. It was claimed that not more than 15,000 workers in this district had answered the call.

Related Industries.

St. Paul, Sept. 23.—The steel strike, if maintained, may tie up the structural steel and building trades, according to union leaders here. "I understand that if the steel companies send out scab material we won't handle it, and if they scab on us we will be asked to quit," said David McKee, business agent for the structural and ornamental ironworkers, reinforced steel workers, movers and riggers.

Many Insurance Policies.

New York, Sept. 23.—Riot and civil commotion insurance policies aggregating more than \$100,000,000 have been taken out by business men in Pittsburg and other cities where plants of the United States Steel Corporation are located, it was estimated by insurance men today. They added that this amount probably would be doubled within a week. The amount called for by the largest policy is \$6,000,000, while that of the smallest is \$2,500.

ITALIANS ASK HELP TO TAKE FIUME AGAIN

Would Send Allied Force Against Gabriel D'Annunzio—U. S. no Report Regarding Landing of Marines.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) London, Sept. 23.—The Italian Government has appealed to the Allied powers to send an Allied force, exclusive of Italians, to drive Gabriel D'Annunzio out of Fiume, according to a report received here.

The United States navy headquarters here, which is in direct communication with the Adriatic ports, has no confirmation of the report from Rome last night that United States marines have been landed at Buccari, near Fiume. Naval authorities are not inclined to credit the report.

SERIOUS DAMAGE TO GRAIN CROPS

Reports Indicate That it Was Injured When in Stook in Northern Saskatchewan.

Regina, Sask., Sept. 23.—Reports received from points in the northeast of the province would indicate that damage from rain to grain in the stook is extensive and serious. Practically all the territory in that part of the province north of Melville has been adversely affected by the weather and reports of damage as far west as Rosthern are forthcoming.

WILL ASK FOR EXTRADITION OF WILHELM

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Paris, Sept. 22.—The Dutch foreign minister in Paris, according to Le Libre Belgique of Brussels, says that Holland within two weeks will receive a demand for the extradition of Emperor William on behalf of the Allies.

SAYS PRESIDENT GOT VALUABLE PRESENTS

Gifts From "Crowned Heads" to Wilson Alleged to be Worth More Than Million.

KOLCHAK NO LONGER LEADS ALL-RUSSIANS

Resigns in Favor of General Denikine, According to a Soviet Despatch.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) London, Sept. 22.—Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian Government at Omsk, has informed the Allies that he resigns the title of chief ruler to General Denikine, leader of the anti-Bolshevik forces in southern Russia, according to a wireless despatch sent out by the Soviet government of Moscow. The message admits that the Bolsheviks have abandoned Kursk after fighting against Denikine's troops.

BOLSHEVIKI DEFEATED BY POLISH FORCE

Ten Days Battle on the Dvina River Results in Complete Victory for Poles.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Berne, Sept. 22.—The Polish bureau here announces that the Polish army has achieved a complete victory over the Bolsheviks after a ten days battle on the Dvina River. It is asserted that the Bolsheviks, who previously had crossed the Dvina, were surrounded and killed or taken prisoners. The bureau adds that the Poles have gone up the Dvina and occupied the town of Duisno.

RETAIL PRICE OF MEAT DROPS

Five Cents a Pound off all Varieties Went into Effect Here Yesterday.

The retail price of beef, mutton and pork dropped five cents per pound yesterday. Amid the firmness and stiffening in prices of all other foodstuffs, this information will be the more welcome these days of high prices. And so far, it seems that the butchers are the only ones who have been enabled to make a reduction in price to the consumers.

High cost of living experts have made enquiries previously into business conditions without making any appreciable difference to the housewife's bills and in this instance the credit for the drop must not be placed with any of the spellbinders in high places who declaim with much vehemence that the "prices must drop" when they are powerless to alter market conditions.

The fact is that this is the time of year when meats become cheaper. Every year it is the same. Prices drop in the fall and go up in the spring. Only it seems that the drop in the fall never seems to be so great as the rise in the spring.

THIRTY HOUSES ARRANGED FOR

Possibility of Getting Enough Money to Build ten More.

The whole of the \$75,000 allotted to this city for building houses for soldiers has been appropriated and as a result no less than thirty new houses will be erected. There is a possibility that another \$25,000 may be secured and that amount would provide for the building of ten more houses. The matter is being taken up by the committee on soldiers' housing.

Allotments were made last night by the City Council to R. W. Cameron, H. O. Crewe, F. Hardy, J. J. Little and J. Clapperon. This is the final allocation from the money now in hand.

At the meeting of the city Council last night the proposal was made that the city engineer should attend the meeting of the B. C. Municipalities' Union at North Vancouver along with the mayor, and one reason given for advocating sending him was that he might investigate the building of roads in the southern city's.

The mayor explained, in answer to a query, that Third Ave. was being surveyed with a view to having a permanent road laid and they were endeavoring to get some hard rock on the island. When they were ready to do the work they would probably get an experienced foreman from Vancouver or Victoria who would have charge of the operations. The proposal was to lay macadam twenty feet wide.

Can Prince Rupert Beat Anyox in Speed?

A good many people are discussing the possibility of Prince Rupert beating Anyox at speed boat racing. For several years the Anyox boat has come here and carried off the honors. This year a better effort than usual was made to hold the trophy here but everything was left to the last minute with the result that the visitors walked away with the coveted silver just as usual.

Two of the local contestants, George Frizzell and J. Myhill-Jones, declare that they are going to build something that will beat the Wayward Girl. As that boat made over 28 miles an hour over part of the course it will be necessary to make a speed of at least thirty miles to beat her. There is also the possibility, and a quite likely one, that the Anyox people will have something better next year.

Both Mr. Frizzell and Mr. Myhill-Jones are men who, when they say they will do anything, are likely to do it. They say they are going after that trophy and nothing would please us so much as to see it come here. Anyox people have been good sports in sending a boat here year after year and it is not exactly to our credit that we have let them get away with the honors each season. Possibly the real race next year will be between two local boats and that the Wayward Girl will be the slow one of the trio.

New Fish Firm Gets Ready for Business.

The Pacific Sea Products has taken a lease on some waterfront property with an option to purchase. They have recognized the strategic position of Prince Rupert as a buying centre and are spending some money here and getting ready to compete with the other firms.

The more buyers we have here, the better it is for the port. Fishermen like to go where there is plenty of competition and that is what they will get at Prince Rupert. It is to be hoped that they will prove a real factor in the business life of this community.

Labor Prepares for Political Action.

In Great Britain it looks as if the Labor men were preparing for a big political struggle. They are lining up their forces and refusing to compromise with the present government. It will be an interesting fight. Lloyd George has not often been beaten, but if he stays in long enough he is bound to meet his Waterloo. Tom Smilie is already spoken of as the next premier of Great Britain. The situation is not only interesting but critical. It will be watched from this side of the Atlantic, as Canada often takes her cue from the Old Country.

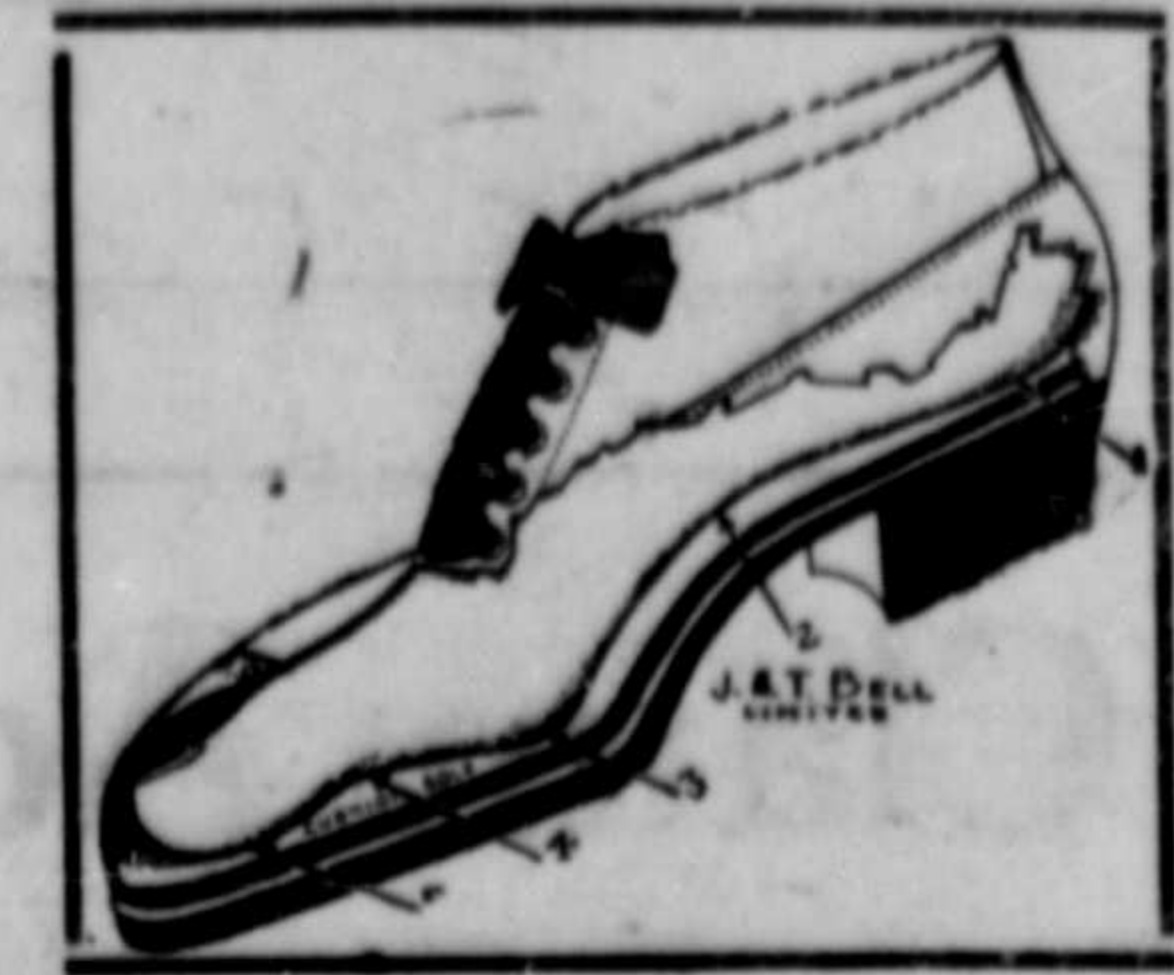

SEA PRODUCTS SECURE A SITE FOR BUSINESS

Lease the Lowrie Property Near Seal Cove With Option to Purchase.

APPLICATION FOR WATER TO COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

The Pacific Sea Products have leased the Lowrie property near Seal Cove to be used for fish buying purposes, and possibly later for the erection of a cold storage plant. They also have an option made by them to the City Council to purchase the property.

Last night an application was made for a four-inch water main to supply the necessary water for the fish packing business. It was explained that it would take approximately 1,000 feet of four-inch pipe but that the ditch for it was already dug.

Mayor McClymont explained that it was customary to lay on water when it was found that the income from the sale would be sufficient to pay for the extension. In this case he thought it would be sufficient.

The proposal seemed to meet with the favor of the aldermen but it was decided to refer it to the Board of Works for report.

There is already a good wharf and shed on the property and business can be commenced immediately a siding has been constructed.

PEOPLE MAY STILL BUY A LITTLE FRUIT

New Classification Bylaw Will Allow the Selling of 10-lb. Lots During Evening.

LONG DISCUSSION BEFORE SETTLEMENT

The classification bylaw drawn for the purpose of regulating the sale of fruits and other articles of merchandise after 6:30 p. m. received its third reading last night after over two hours of debate, much of which was of a very humorous nature and some of which was extremely personal. Alderman McRae, who fathered the bill was the subject of attack by Alderman Casey and Alderman McKeekin charged Alderman Casey with inconsistency.

Instead of discussing the bylaw clause by clause as usual the council discussed the general principle and its application and especially that clause which had to do with the fruit stores. After a lengthy discussion Alderman McKeekin said that grocers would be satisfied if the bylaw prevented the selling of crates of fruit after 6:30 so it was finally arranged that the classification should read in such a way that those selling in less than ten-pound lots were not considered fruit stores, and would not be forced to close. That would allow the people an opportunity to purchase small quantities of fruit during the evening. This came in the way of a compromise as for a long time those favoring the bylaw insisted that fruit should be consumed on the premises after hours.

Alderman Casey claimed that the city solicitor had misled him as to the aim of the bylaw.

Inconsistent. Alderman McRae charged that Alderman Casey first wanted to send greetings to the enemy and then to cater to the returned soldier. He wanted shorter hours for the painters, but did not care how long the fruit sellers worked. Alderman Casey: "I'm a proletarian and he's a Bourgeois. That's the difference between Alderman McRae and me. It's a difference in psychology."

Mayor McClymont said he was opposed to the closing of fruit stores after 6:30. It was the business of the unions to see that the employees did not work too long. He was in favor of short hours as a rule but that did not prevent working a double shift.

Alderman McRae said that Chinaman worked sixteen hours a day and he showed it. The self-respecting businessman wanted to get away from that. China-

men and Greeks were the ones that worked that long. They were driving others out of business. If the country went on that way the others might as well get out of business. They had passed a bylaw to prevent people making Chinamen of themselves. If certain merchants kept open until 12 others might as well get out of business.

Manipulate Trade. Alderman Casey charged that Alderman McRae wanted to manipulate trade and put the money into his own pocket. Everything he did was for the benefit of McRae.

Alderman Rochester said that his guests went for fruit in the evening and took it to their rooms. He opposed passing the bylaw.

Alderman Perry favored passing the bylaw and giving the dealers an opportunity to repeal it if they wished.

The compromise was then arranged and the committee rose and reported and the bylaw was read a third time.

The City Council last night received an offer from Litchfield's Book Store at Victoria to sell for \$250 an interesting letter of

Prince Rupert and the Duke of Albermarle to the Commissioners of the Navy written four years before the granting of the prince of the famous charter on this continent which led up to the naming of this city. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee for report.

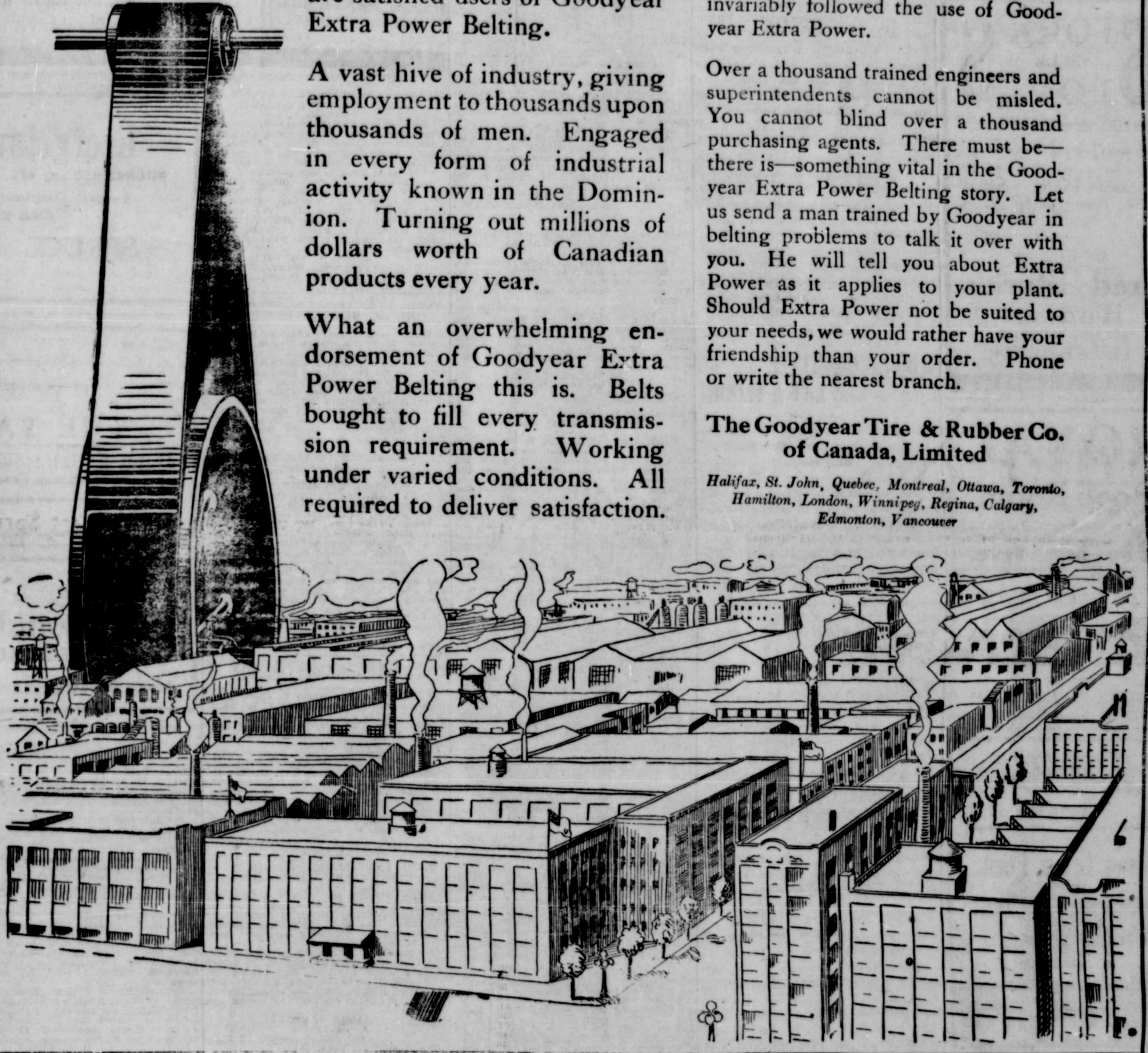

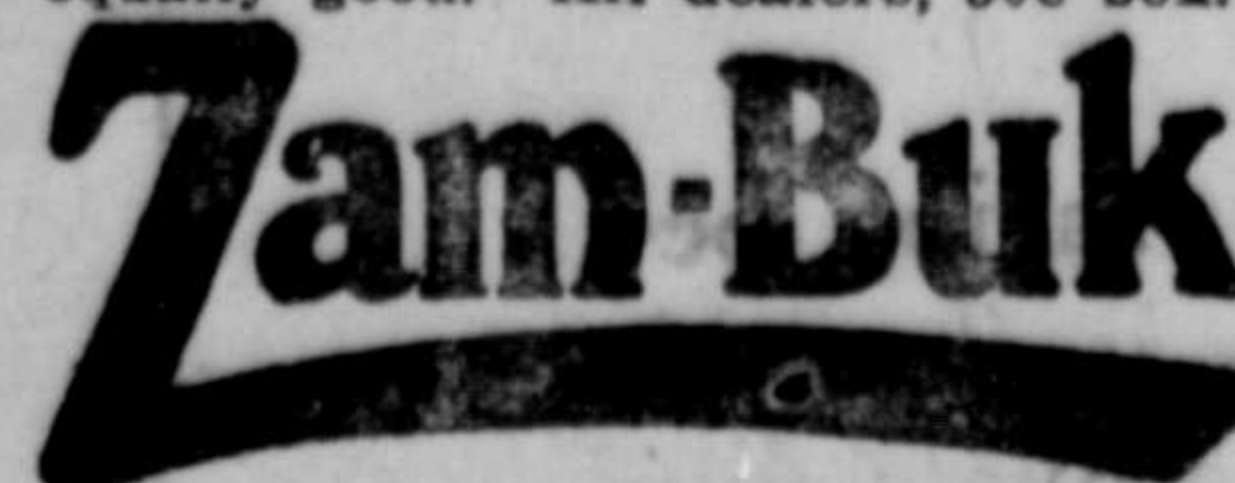

TWO TRAINS OF ORE DAILY ON DOLLY VARDEN

Mine at Alice Arm Develops in Richness Beyond All Former Expectations.

NUMBER OF PROPERTIES GETTING OUT GOOD ORE

200 oz. of Silver, \$13 Gold and 45 Per Cent Lead in Quartz From United Metals.

Alice Arm, Sept. 22.—The Dolly Varden mine under the management of Major Davis is now shipping two trains of ore daily to tide water. The mine has developed in richness far beyond what the estimates, based on diamond drilling some years ago intimated, when the property was under the management of R. B. McGinnis.

The manager of the railroad and shipping facilities, Ted Taylor, states that the equipment of the road will be immediately increased to handle the tonnage of other properties. The present equipment is handling 100 tons per eight hour shift.

Ship in Sacks.

The North Star has got in horses and will start packing high grade silver ore to the Dolly Varden train in sacks. They expect to realize \$30,000 from their shipments if they can get transportation. The property is looking very good as the tunnel is all in ore, showing great quantities of native and ruby silver.

A very rich strike was made on the Muskateer property recently bonded to Mr. Meenach of Seattle. The open cut gave assay values of \$200 gold, 135 ozs. silver. The vein is one of the largest in the district.

The Tiger property has been sold to Messrs. Price and Crawford of New York for \$125,000.

A large force of men have started operations on the Last Chance group recently bonded to New York people.

Free Gold Seen.

The homestead property bonded by Mr. Somerville of Seattle looks very good. Several thousand dollars will be expended on it next month. The largest gold strike in the camp was made last week on the adjoining property. Free Gold can be seen in all the ledge matter when shots are fired in the face. Assays of the ore have not been received.

Mr. Hancock of the United Metals has two pack trains of twelve horses each packing out ore that will average 200 ozs. of silver, \$13 gold and 45 per cent lead. A shipment to the smelter will be made about the end of the month.

In general the camp looks very promising and it is expected it will make the largest silver producing camp in B. C.
