One Big Union is Scathingly Denounced at Trades Congress Sitting at Hamilton, Ontario

New body said to be opposed to organized labor; Armstrong advocates soviet government and complete withdrawal from Russia; Joint candidates with farmers; Other questions discussed

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Hamilton, Sept. 24.—Scathing denunciation of the O. B. U. principles and of the methods used by those who try to foster the movement and of everything connected with it were made by delegates C. W. Hayes and Matthews Wall, members of the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor in speeches before the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress. It was alleged that the O. B. U. was strongly opposed to organized labor and was attempted thirty years ago in the States.

A resolution handed in by George Armstrong of Winnipeg advocated the soviet form of government and demanded the immediate withdrawal of troops from Russia and the Government to refuse aid financially or otherwise to "bourgeois" governments. Armstrong was one of those arrested by the Government on a charge of seditious conspiracy at the time of the Winnipeg strike. The motion was sent to the committee on resolutions for consideration.

Other matters which came before the congress were a proposal in regard to shorter working days, the federal housing scheme and the organization of policemen's unions with the right to affiliate with the trades union movement.

Hamilton, Sept. 24.—(noon). Joe Marks, secretary of the Independent Labor party, told the Trades and Labor Congress today that Labor in Ontario was a political union and that they intended to run joint candidates with the United Farmers.

LABOR GAINS SOME GROUND IN BIG STRIKE

Conflicting Reports From Different Parts of the Country in Regard to Operations.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Sept. 24.—Organized labor gained ground in Chicago, Youngstown, and other western centres on the second day of the great steel strike, which was marked by increased violence. According to officials of the United States Steel Corporation and various independent companies, little headway was made in Pittsburgh and other eastern towns.

From the south were read conflicting reports such as from Birmingham where Union leaders claimed there were 1,000 men out and the plant officials asserted there was a surplus of labor.

PREPARATIONS FOR LAUNCHING

Merchants Asked to Close Places of Business for Short Time in Order that All May Attend.

Preparations are well under way for the laying of the keel for the first of the big ships at the local shipyards on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Manager Schellenberg is making the preparations at the yards and it is expected that everything will be ready when the Duke of Devonshire arrives.

In order that all may have an opportunity to attend, the local stores are being asked to close for a short time. It is pointed out that as everyone will be at the ceremony there will be no business for merchants to do even if they keep open.

This is the great event of the year in connection with Prince Rupert, it being even more important than the launching of a ship.

ARMY AND NAVY VETERANS MEET

Would Scotch Profiteering Wherever and Whenever Found and Pass Resolution to That Effect.

The regular monthly meeting of the Army and Navy Veterans was held last evening in the rooms on Second Avenue. Major McMullin, the president, in the chair. The usual routine business was disposed of and the following resolution endorsed, sent by the Vancouver unit of the association.

"Whereas investigations of a committee of the House of Commons have adequately proved the popular allegations that profiteering existed in the handling of necessities of life. Be it resolved that the Army and Navy Veterans Association in Canada urge that the greatest efforts be made by all parties to solve this question without delay, in view of the hardships resulting to the people and the bitter and dangerous feeling towards classes and individuals known to be responsible for the same.

"That wherever profiteering is found, adequate means be immediately found by the enactment of legislation for prompt and fitting punishment of those responsible by the amendment of the Criminal Code and

"That all persons allowing food to waste in order to enhance values be punished likewise."

The Army and Navy Veterans will co-operate with the Great War Veterans in forming a guard of honor for the Duke of Devonshire on his visit here at the week end, and all veterans of former wars have been requested to wear their medals.

Several applications for membership from veterans at Prince George and Vanderhoof were disposed of.

GIVE IRON WORKERS SHARE IN PROFITS

New York, Sept. 23.—At a luncheon here Viscount Findlay said that employers should give the iron workers a paid up interest in the business, a share in the profits, and require them to shoulder farther losses.

VON BERCHTOLD BROUGHT ON WAR

Urged Austrian Cabinet to Act at Once Because Germany Was Ready to Assist.

COUNT STEPHEN TISZA URGED DIPLOMACY FIRST

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vienna, Sept. 24.—The War Office made public today from the archives of the former Austro-Hungarian government the minutes of the meeting of the Privy Council on July 7, 1914, at which it was virtually decided to begin war on Serbia.

According to this publication, the ministry of Austria-Hungary, especially Count Leopold von Berchtold, Foreign Minister, was solely responsible for the outbreak of hostilities.

The minutes show the meeting to have been opened by Count von Berchtold, who pleaded for an immediate resort to arms against Serbia, stating that Italy and Roumania "could be compensated afterwards for not having been consulted beforehand."

Count Stephen Tisza, then Hungarian Premier, opposed the war, demanding that diplomatic action be taken first and then that an ultimatum of an acceptable nature be sent. Only in case both failed would he have resorted to arms.

Count von Berchtold thereon said: "Now is the right moment because Germany is ready to assist."

NINE MONTHS AT OKALLA

J. Warren of Smithers Goes to Prison Farm for Shooting Horses.

J. Warren of Smithers was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment in Okalla Prison Farm by Judge Young in the Smithers County Court on Monday. The accused was charged with the wilful wounding of horses. He had used a bird gun and had caused injury to several animals, one of which subsequently died.

Bottle Found in Room Smelt Like Alcohol, Says Dr. Cade.

VICTIM LOST HIS WATCH AND RINGS

The hearing of the charge against M. J. Noone of administering a drug with the intention of committing an indictable offence, was resumed in the police court this morning before Magistrate McMullin.

W. Pagnotti was the first witness called. He said that he was engaged at the Travellers Club and his duties took him out all night. He had gone home on Saturday morning to the Windsor Hotel to sleep and went to bed about noon. At quarter to five in the afternoon he was awakened by someone tapping at his door, and the accused entered holding a bottle of whiskey in his hand. He offered witness a drink, which was accepted and within ten minutes he was asleep again. He awakened around nine o'clock in the evening, and then found that his gold watch and chain, his rings, and his money were gone. He immediately blamed accused of robbing him, and went to the police office, where he got Constable McGlinchy to search the accused's room, but the stolen property was not found. On entering the room the accused dropped something which proved to be a small phial.

Probably Chloral.

Dr. Cade, in the witness stand, said that he had examined the crushed glass bottle, in which no trace of any drug could be seen. The cork, however, and the crushed glass bore a smell very similar to chloral hydrate, and on comparing the scent of the exhibit with the drug he was of opinion that the contents of the phial had been chloral. This is a very powerful drug, with a hypnotic effect.

Constable McGlinchy was also examined and told of having searched the witness's room without finding any of the property in question, and of the accused dropping the little bottle and treading upon it. He asked accused what it was. "That's for you to find out," was the reply he got.

The further hearing of the charge was adjourned until Saturday.

SALMON REACH THE SPAWNING GROUNDS

Stewart Norrie, of the Dominion Fisheries Department, returned to town last evening after a trip to the salmon spawning grounds. He was as far east as the Babine country, and says that this year has been a good one for salmon spawning. Big Dawson Mining Deal is Settled

Many Prominent Men Affected, Including Food Controller Hoover and Colonel Boyle, now Duke of Jassy and Food Controller of Roumania

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Dawson, Sept. 24.—A settlement has been effected of a several million dollar lawsuit involving the Granville Mining Company, the Canadian Klondike Power Co., the Canadian Klondike Mining Co., the Marion Steam Shovel Co., and several others.

Included among the big shareholders of the several companies is Herbert Hoover, American Food Controller; Lord Raeburn of London; Lieut.-Col. Joseph W. Boyle, of the Klondike, who was created Duke of Jassy by the King of Roumania, and who is now Allied Food Controller for Roumania.

It is understood that Boyle retires from the Canadian Klondike Company under the settlement. He originally secured the Boyle concessions twenty years ago, covering many miles of rich dredging grounds in the Klondike.

YARROW OFFERS PRIZE FOR FIRST PACIFIC FLIGHT

Victoria, Sept. 24.—Norman Yarrow, head of Yarrow Ltd. at Esquimalt, has offered a prize of \$50,000 for the first non-stop airship flight across the Pacific Ocean from Vancouver Island to Japan.

MINERS DEMAND SIXTY PER CENT HIGHER WAGES

Shorter Hours and Five-Day Week Also Among Proposals Made at Cleveland.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Cleveland, Sept. 24.—Demands for a 60 per cent increase in wages, a limit of six hours a day, and a five-day week, with time and a half for overtime and double time on Sundays and holidays as well as important improvements in the conditions of labor, were adopted by the convention of Mine Workers of America.

The convention adjourned to await the result of the joint wage conference with the operators of the central district which opens on Thursday.

EVIDENCE ON RACING AND TRACK BETTING

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Commissioner J. G. Rutherford opened an investigation yesterday into race-track betting.

Senator N. A. Belcourt, president of the Connaught Park Jockey Club, said his organization had given \$233,000 in purses in five years. In that time the shareholders, 193 in number, had received \$24,648 in dividends. The income from the pari-mutuel machines was a source of revenue.

Soldiers' Housing is Good for the City.

Just what the city would have done without the money under the housing scheme does not appear. Already there are something like a dozen residences going up under the plan and within a few weeks there will be thirty. These houses will help a good deal in providing for those who cannot get a place to live.

Both the Dominion and Provincial Governments deserve some credit for having provided the money. The Dominion raised the loan and handed it over to the Province to expend under an outlined plan. The Provincial Government decided that the returned men should have the first opportunity at British Columbia's share and finding that the need in Prince Rupert was greater than at some places, allocated a large share here. According to population we should have received about \$18,000, but so far we have been granted \$75,000 and may get another \$25,000. Possibly having the local member in the cabinet has helped somewhat in having our claims laid forcibly and effectively before the Government.

Proposal to Lay Macadam on Streets.

There is some doubt whether tar macadam is the best paving for the local streets. It answers very well where the traffic is light but where rain and frost alternate it is almost impossible to keep it solid in the winter. A good deal of repair work is necessary.

In Victoria it has been used with good results on some streets and on others it has been a complete failure. What they have found most economical has been a good grade of asphalt or mineral rubber. Yates Street, in that city, has been laid about ten years and is still good although it is beginning to show a slight tendency to get "dippy" and a few holes have broken through. It looks good for another five years, however, and the traffic is very heavy on that street. Creosoted wood blocks do not last more than about seven years under similar conditions.

In Oak Bay municipality tar macadam was used almost exclusively, and on the ordinary side street has stood the wear well. On streets where there is heavy traffic, however, it has given way and has had to be repaired often.

In Esquimalt the main thoroughfare seems like an ordinary old gravel road, oiled, and it is usually in good condition, often just as good as the tar macadam streets.

In Prince Rupert the number of automobiles and delivery wagons is increasing steadily as well as trucks. These are hard on a road and when the nights are frosty and the days warm the tendency of the surface of the road is to loosen up and break. Whether the tar macadam would stand the strain long is very uncertain. It is probable that it would need repair about the third or fourth year, whereas asphalt should last for from fifteen to twenty years. Before either is laid, however, it should be seen that all water laterals, sewers and other pipes or drains, if there are any, are put in. It is impossible to dig up a hard road without spoiling it.

PUBLICITY MEN TELL OF VISIT

R. C. W. Lett and W. C. Riddell
Give Out Statement in Win-
nipeg Regarding Trip.

FINDS RUPERT PEOPLE ARE OPTIMISTIC

R. C. W. Lett, industrial and colonization agent, and W. C. Riddell, advertising agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, on their return to Winnipeg after a two weeks' trip through central British Columbia gave out the following statement relative to their observations concerning business conditions in that section of the province:

"Business conditions throughout Central British Columbia are better today than ever before and 1919 has been the banner year for this portion of the province."

"To give full expression to the extent of the development that is taking place would necessitate an intimate knowledge of all and sundry branches of industry that the limitless resources of this section of the Pacific coast province are yielding as the country is opening up."

"In a brief two weeks' trip through that section reached by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, evidence is bountiful that 1919 has seen greater activity in all branches of industry in Central B. C. than in any previous two years since the construction of the railway."

Settlement.

"Of first interest to the province is without doubt the settlement of the agricultural districts, and during the past summer many settlers have come in from eastern provinces and the middle and western states with the object of making permanent homes. It may here be said by way of explanation of this statement that the average settler coming in is taking up comparatively small holdings ranging from one hundred and sixty acres in the grain-growing district to ten, twenty or thirty acres in the fruit belt—just such areas as can be readily worked without depending upon outside labor to any great extent. It is estimated that one thousand families have taken up land in this territory this year, possibly 500 of whom are returned soldiers."

Central B. C.

What is known as the plateau and valley lands of Central British Columbia embraces that section of country north and south of the railway line from the vicinity of Tete Jaune to Terrace a distance of approximately five hundred and seventy-five miles. This area in its full expanse of six million available acres offers homes for at least a million people. Climate conditions are excellent and damaging hail and thunder storms are unknown. This territory is also very easily cleared as is indicated in the case of a farmer named John Henderson, who located two years ago twelve miles south of Prince George and in that short space of time has under cultivation sixty-five acres of land including forty acres of oats, fifteen acres of wheat and ten acres of rice—as fine crops as one would wish to see. In addition to clearing the land and planting crops, Mr.

Henderson has constructed a real home with modern conveniences such as hot air heating, hot and cold water system, artificial lighting, etc. This is but one of the many examples of what can be accomplished in this country under ordinary conditions. The Prince George district is also developing as a fruit growing area. Even as late as the last week in August, small fruits such as black, white and red currants, raspberries and gooseberries were abundantly in evidence. Apples, cherries and other fruits are grown here.

Terrace.

At Terrace, ninety miles from the Pacific Coast, fruit grows to perfection. The quality and flavor of Terrace fruit is unexcelled and the slogan "Grade your berries and put Terrace on the map" is being generally adopted by the growers. Central British Columbia strawberries coming as they do in August, a month later than the berries from other districts, have a special value and their growth need only be limited by the markets that can be created for them.

"This whole country is also eminently suited to the raising of live stock owing to the natural vegetation which consists largely of pea vine, vetch, red-top and brome-grass. Large herds of cattle and horses have been brought in this summer."

Mines.

"As to mining development, on every hand throughout the mountains may be found prospectors ceaselessly searching for valuable minerals in rocky caverns or high up on the mountain side. Stewart district at the head of Portland Canal, the dividing line between Canada and Alaska, is the newest "Eldorado" and it is generally believed on the coast that next season will see one of the greatest rushes into this field that Canada has ever experienced. Native silver has been found in large quantities in this field and is thought by many to have all the ear marks of a second Cobalt."

"Lumbering industries are unusually active all along the line and new lumber mills, numbering thirty or forty, have been put into operation during the present season in the territory traversed by the Grand Trunk Pacific."

Fishing.

"The fishing industry at Prince Rupert was never better. Immense catches of halibut are being brought into port daily. On one day last week over a hundred thousand pounds were brought in, representing a value of upwards of fifteen thousand dollars to the fishermen. Salmon fishing on the Skeena River has also made a new record this year."

"Altogether the business men of Prince Rupert as well as of the inland towns, are optimistic and have enjoyed this season the largest trade in their experience, all of which is reflected in the immense traffic the railway and steamships are enjoying."

Choice of Convention Owing
to Lack of Anyone Else.

MAJOR DICK BURDE AMONG POSSIBLES

Victoria, Sept. 24.—Preparations are being made by local Conservatives to take part in the Conservative convention next week at Vancouver, the one outstanding object of which will be the choosing of a leader.

"Will W. J. Bowser be the choice?" That is what people are asking. He is without doubt the only really brainy man in the party, but he has not a very good record and he does not hold the party together. His influence is just the opposite. He is a disintegrator. He has more brains than Sir Richard McBride ever had, but he lacks personality and that is the one thing needful in politics.

There is some talk of choosing Major Dick Burde, the member for Alberni, the inveterate enemy of Mr. Bowser, but Dick is no longer a party man. He has been to the front and he returns anything but a hide-bound Conservative. Another thing is that Mr. Burde has hardly the standing of a leader of a great political party. He is the owner and editor of the Port Alberni weekly paper which struggles for existence in a town that is not growing very fast. Before going overseas he was strongly anti-prohibition and there is a large section of the Conservative party that declare they will not stand for any but a temperance man.

Dr. McIntosh, leader of the soldier party in the House and who was elected as a Liberal to represent Vancouver, is looked upon as a possibility but he will not attend the meeting and it would scarcely be dignified for the Conservatives to choose him.

Those who profess to be in the know, and their name is legion, declared that Mr. Bowser must be retained because there is no other man. Mr. Flumerfelt, the capitalist, who was for a few short weeks minister of finance but whom the electors of Victoria rejected, is sometimes mentioned, but not seriously. There seems to be but one man and his name is Bowser.

TWO KILLED, TWO WOUNDED

Shots Exchanged Yesterday at
Farrell, Pa., Between Police
and Strikers.

Pittsburg, Sept. 23.—(4 p.m.) The forces of organized labor and the United States Steel Corporation are still struggling for control of America's great "Iron Valley" as the nation-wide strike of steel workers enters its second day. At Farrell, Pa., two men were killed and two wounded when shots were exchanged between the company police and the strikers, during a riot near the plant of the American Steel and Wire Company.

Geneva, Sept. 23.—Capt Bradley, a British aviator, landed at Lucerne after flying over the Alps and losing his way in the clouds above Mount Blanc, at an altitude of 15,000 feet.

LABOR DECIDES ON OPPOSITION TO DR. TOLMIE

President of New Westminster Branch G. W. V. A. Chosen to Contest Victoria.

Thomas A. Barnard, president of the New Westminster branch of the Great War Veterans' association, and for the past twenty-five years a member of organized labor unions, was the selection of the members of the Federated Labor Party at the nominating convention held by that organization last week at Victoria. There were but two candidates in the field, Mr. Barnard and W. E. Peirce, the latter a resident of the city and erstwhile editor of the now defunct publication The Week, in the conduct of which he fell foul of the censor during the war and was convicted and served a short period in jail. The vote stood forty-three for Mr. Barnard and 10 for Mr. Peirce.

By the selection of Mr. Barnard opposition at the forthcoming Federal by-election is assured against Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture.

The meeting waxed enthusiastic over the selection of Mr. Barnard, speakers pointing to the fact that his being a returned man would gain him much support in addition to that of labor, which, they professed to believe, would be found solidly behind him.

Candidates Speak.

Prior to the ballot being taken the candidates were given fifteen minutes in which to address the meeting, after which they were asked to withdraw and the meeting discussed their respective merits and demerits. The press representatives were not, as at the previous meeting of the party, asked to withdraw, but while confidence was expressed in the reporters, some members of the audience professed to fear the "capitalistic editors," who, they suggested, might garble the reports of the proceedings. In addition to the fifty odd members of the Federated Labor Party present, there were twenty or more representatives of labor organizations, who were permitted to take part in the discussion. A number of ladies were also in attendance.

Before addressing the meeting each candidate was asked to state whether he would give whole-hearted support to the platform of the Federated Labor Party, a brief document, as follows: "The Federated Labor Party is organized for the purpose of securing industrial legislation and the collective ownership and democratic operation of the means of wealth production." Both candidates expressed their full accord with such a platform.

IN POSSESSION AND FINED FIFTY FIFTY

Inland Revenue and Liquor Cases in Police Court This Morning.

This morning in the police court before Magistrate McMordie Mrs. Gertrude Brown, who was charged yesterday with being in possession of intoxicating liquor while a guest at the Windsor Hotel was found guilty and fined \$50.
