# ASSAULT BY THUGS, GANGSTERS HIRED DETECTIVE

Third Day of Big Steel Strike Shows Little Change in Relative Position of Either Side; Fight Being Transferred to Senate of United States, says Fitzpatrick

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Sept. 25.—The third day of the great steel strike HOUSING BAD passed without either capital or labor having made any apparent material gains. Attention is focussed on Washington where the inquiry into the industrial struggle by the Senate Labor Committee opens today.

From their respective headquarters the industrial leaders and directors of the strike issued the usual conflicting statements, which left still in doubt the exact number of workers who have Particularly in Mining Districts walked out.
