GOMPERS CHARGES MURDER AND ASSAULT BY THUGS, GANGSTERS AND HIRED DETECTIVE CROOKS

Third Day of Big Steel Strike Shows Little Change in Relative Position of Either Side; Fight Being Transferred to Senate of United States, says Fitzpatrick

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
New York, Sept. 25.—The third day of the great steel strike passed without either capital or labor having made any apparent material gains. Attention is focussed on Washington where the inquiry into the industrial struggle by the Senate Labor Committee opens today.
From their respective headquarters the industrial leaders and directors of the strike issued the usual conflicting statements, which left still in doubt the exact number of workers who have walked out.
Wm. H. Foster, secretary of the strikers' national committee, claims 15,000 more men have abandoned their posts, bringing the total to 342,000, but in the crucial Pittsburg district, the officials of the United States Steel Corporation and several "independents" asserted that the stream of labor had turned and was flowing into the mills.
An attack on the methods which he said had been employed in the past by the steel companies was made yesterday by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who, addressing the Senate Interstate Commerce Commission, charged that there had been "murder, assault, arrest of men, prohibition of meetings on rented grounds, and workers dispersed by thugs and gangsters and detective crooks employed by the companies."
To the Senate will be carried the fight of the strikers of the Pittsburg district for the right of free speech and assemblage, John Fitzpatrick, chairman of the national committee for organizing the iron and steel workers, announced.

HOUSING BAD SAYS MOORE AT CONGRESS

Particularly in Mining Districts Is Condition of Living Poor.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Hamilton, Sept. 25.—At the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, P. M. Draper submitted a report as secretary-treasurer of the congress which showed that there are now 248,000 organized trades unionists in Canada, 160,000 being affiliated with the Trades and Labor Congress.
President Moore deplored the housing conditions in Canada. Particularly in the mining districts was accommodation bad. He instanced a case of fifteen Chinamen living in one small attic room in Vancouver. Too many people were being warehoused instead of housed, he said.
Congress endorsed the action of the United States steel workers. At their sessions yesterday the delegates commenced action in arranging for an interview with the government to protest against prohibition.

SALMON FISHING SEASON CLOSED LAST NIGHT WITH GOOD RECORD FOR SKEENA

About three weeks more allowed for taking of salmon on Queen Charlottes; Most of canneries of district closed; Sockeye pack was very large

At midnight last night the salmon fishing closed throughout District No. 2, except in the Queen Charlotte Islands area. Taken all round it has been a very profitable season for the cannery firms in this district. The run of sockeye salmon, which always fetches the highest price on the markets of the world, has been something out of the ordinary on the Skeena. Last year's pack of sockeye totalled 113,000 cases, while this year it has reached about 177,000 cases. The larger pack of the higher priced fish means a lot of money for canneries and fishermen.
Most of the canneries on the Skeena have ceased operations for the season, although at least one cannery is obtaining supplies still from the Islands. Fishing is still good there and will last until the 15th of October. The run of all other varieties is over except dog salmon. The catch of cohoes has been light on the Islands, as this is the off year.
The Puget Sound canneries have many boats running from the Queen Charlotte Islands this season, as the run on the Fraser has been so poor. In order to get anything like a pack they have to draw supplies from the Islands of this less valuable variety.
By the time the seining operations draw to a close this year, the figures for District No. 2 should be away ahead of most other districts on the Pacific coast.

SOLDIER VOTE AGAIN BEFORE PARLIAMENT

Leader of Opposition Asks for a Special Committee to Investigate, But Meighen Says Telegram Was Proper.

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—There was an old time debate in the House of Commons yesterday with party feeling running high over a code telegram which the Liberals allege Hon. Arthur Meighen sent to Sir Robert Borden during the last general election dealing with the distribution of the votes of soldiers who voted "at large" among the various Manitoba constituencies.
D. D. McKenzie, leader pro tem of the opposition, moved for a special committee to inquire into the matter.
Hon. Arthur Meighen denied any recollection of the telegram but said if it was sent it was quite proper.

PRINCE RUPERT FLOWERS FOR THE VISITORS

Members of Governor's Party Will be Recipients of Present From Local Ladies.

The special train carrying the Governor General, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, is due to arrive in Prince Rupert tomorrow night at 8:30. It is officially announced. A civic committee will meet the train and will accompany the distinguished visitors to the Exhibition Hall. A band of honor will also be at the depot and will be composed of returned soldiers and the Army and Navy Veterans.
On arriving at the Acropolis Hotel, His Excellency will be presented with a civic address and the ladies of the party will be the recipients of bouquets and flowers from the ladies of Prince Rupert. After these formal ceremonies, a public reception will be held when the citizens will have an opportunity of meeting the Governor General. Those citizens who intend to be at the reception should go there direct, the party of visitors will proceed from the depot by auto.
On Saturday the guests will visit the sawmill at Seal Cove and will be conducted through the Cold Storage Company's plant hereafter they will take sail across the Inlet to the Prince Rupert Cannery. On their arrival in town the Canadian Club will entertain at a luncheon in the Hotel Prince Rupert. On his way to the laying of the keel of Prince Rupert's first steel ship at the drydock plant, His Excellency will meet the school children in front of the Government Office on Second Avenue. The ceremony of the laying of the keel will take place at 3:30.
At midnight, the visitors will leave on the Prince Rupert for Nanaimo, where they will inspect the smelter town.

CAUGHT IN ICE IN FAR NORTH

Three Vessels at Entrance to Kolyuchian Bay May Spend Winter There.

Nome, Sept. 25.—Three steamers, the Russian steamer Stavanpol, and another American steamer are caught in the ice at the entrance of Kolyuchian Bay on the coast of Siberia, according to a wireless message. If not pulled out soon they will have to spend the winter on the ice.

STANDARD OIL SHIPS GIVEN TO THE ALLIES

Twelve Vessels Belonging to that Concern Sent to Firth of Forth.

New York, Sept. 25.—Twelve American owned steamships aggregating 70,000 deadweight tons and valued at more than \$10,000,000, property of a German subsidiary concern of the Standard Oil Co. of New York, have been ordered from German ports to the Firth of Forth for allocation among the allied and associated nations.

RAILWAYMEN OF BRITAIN MAY STRIKE

Ultimatum Sent to Government On Day Sir Eric Geddes Becomes Minister of Transportation.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Sept. 25.—By a curious coincidence on the day Sir Eric Geddes formally took up his new duties as Minister of Transportation, the Government was confronted with an ultimatum threatening the stoppage of the whole railroad system unless a basis for the standardization of wages, which has been in dispute since March, is settled upon to the men's satisfaction.

When it is remembered how fierce was the opposition to the Transport Bill, which created the new ministry, in its passage through Parliament the coincidence is perhaps not insignificant. The question is being asked by the public whether there is some political motive behind the railwaymen's ultimatum.
Sir Eric Geddes consented to meet the men's leaders and the possibility of avoiding a strike looks more hopeful.

FEWER BOATS WITH CATCHES

Several Have Gone South Until Next Season and Others to Northern Alaska.

The small number of fishing boats arriving with catches these days is one of the signs of the fast coming winter season. The arrivals this week have been very light, and one by one many of the fishing boats are laying up for the winter, when the stormy weather increases so much the hazards of a calling already hazardous enough. The Kitgora belonging to the New England Co. arrived yesterday with 10,000 lbs. of salmon which she had collected from the trollers. After taking on supplies the Kitgora sailed again for Vancouver, out of which port she will operate during the coming months. There were no other arrivals yesterday.

ENDORSE REVOKING VANCOUVER CHARTER

SEVERAL NATIONS RATIFYING TREATY

Canada Gives Final Sanction to Bill Carrying into Effect Provisions.

Paris, Sept. 24.—Premier Clemenceau expects to go before the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon and call for a vote ratifying the Peace with Germany.
Ottawa, Sept. 24.—The House gave final consideration to the bill to carry into effect the provisions of the Peace Treaty. The measure deals among other things with the liquidation of the property of Germans in Canada.
Hon. C. J. Doherty informed the House that since the Austrian Parliament has given its approval of the Peace Treaty, the British ratification would be deposited in Paris.

**Cost of High Living
 In Prince Rupert.**

The high cost of living is not troubling most people in Prince Rupert so much as the cost of high living. People here live well. They usually buy the best there is and get as much as they want. Step into a restaurant and you find there is no stint on the part of the large bulk of the patrons and this has been true even during war times. The people here, speaking in a general way, have the best of everything. It costs a good deal, just as it costs a lot everywhere, but they certainly spend their money.

Spending makes for good business. If everyone in this city hoarded, the restaurants, the poolrooms, the cigar stores, the theatres and other places of business would have to curtail a good deal. They would not make money as they seem to do now.

As a rule people spend all they make. A few people save, but the majority spend. They never feel that they are getting enough income because as their income increases so do their inclinations to spend increase. There is little provision for the future. That is why in some countries they have inaugurated a policy of old age, sickness and unemployment insurance. It does away with the fear of unemployment or sickness, and relieves the merchants of the necessity of extending credits.

**Is There Virtue
 In Being Small?**

There was an article written in one of the American weeklies recently on the virtues of littleness. It pointed out that people looked with a certain amount of respect on the small and struggling merchant, but when the business grew and the merchant became a merchant prince and the business was looked on as a corporation or trust, then it became the butt of every man who was poor.

Is there virtue in being small? People with small ideas fear, distrust or are jealous of those with big ideas. And yet it is the man with imagination, with brain power and with executive ability that will eventually bring about a better social condition. The small man will always be a cog. The big man is bound to predominate.

**No Success Without
 Plenty of Advertising.**

There can be no success without advertising. That hardly needs proof. There was a United States senator who was always in the public eye but who was opposed to the war. The newspapers of the United States agreed together not to mention his name. As a result his name is being forgotten today and he will find it very difficult if not impossible to secure re-election. He can secure no advertising so he no longer exists insofar as the American public is concerned.

Some merchants rely on their window advertising, or on their customers telling each other about the virtues of the goods they sell. A few depend on circulars that are mostly thrown in the waste basket without being read. Everyone reads the newspapers and ninety-nine per cent of the people read newspaper advertising, sometimes at any rate. They do it either consciously or unconsciously.

There are a few unusually wise people who profess to disbelieve in newspaper advertising. If they were in a newspaper office for a few days they would soon know its value. The tales that come in of quick returns, of smart sales, of wonderful results would convert the most hardened sceptic.

STEWART IS DEVELOPING

Thirty Million Dollars in Gold and Silver Blocked Out at Premier Mine.

SHIPPING COMMENCES SOON AS SNOW FLIES

Bear River Country Beginning to Receive Attention Once More From Prospectors and Miners.

"We have every reason to be satisfied with the advancement of the Portland Canal district during the past summer, and with the assurance of development work being continued on many mining properties during the winter, the outlook for the camp is brighter than it has been for some years," said J. W. Stewart who is here for a few days. "The phenomenal ore bodies developed on the Premier mine has been the main factor in re-creating renewed interest in the district, and capital has already been forthcoming for the bonding of a large number of properties. "The Premier mine has now an available ore tonnage practically blocked out estimated to contain something like \$10,000,000 in gold and silver. The construction of a concentrator is under way and the wagon road to tide water has been completed and shipments of ore will go forward as soon as the winter has set in and the sleigh road is available. This road, which now serves a large portion of the Salmon river valley will be continued next summer to the Big Missouri and other properties on the upper valley.

"Development work has continued throughout the summer on a number of properties, notably on the Big Missouri. The '49, Mineral Hill, Yellowstone, Bush Mines, Ltd., Diamond drills are at work on the Big Missouri and '49' and so far as known the results are satisfactory. Wagon Road.
"The new wagon road between Stewart and Hyder will be completed shortly. This road, costing in the neighborhood of \$30,000 and built entirely by returned men, is a first class piece of work, the road is about a mile and a half long and is practically one solid rock cut for its entire length along the shore line. The construction of the new Dominion wharf is expected to be commenced shortly, the contract having been let some time ago. The approach to the old wharf is in bad repair but it is understood that temporary repairs will be made immediately.

Bear River.
"In the Bear River side of the district mining development has proceeded more slowly, the Salmon river section having naturally attracted the most attention from mining men, but lately the Bear river seems to be coming into its own again, a number of properties having changed hands within the past few weeks. The Lakeview on Glacier creek has been bonded to Welch & Fetter who are interested in the Mineral Hill claims on the Salmon, and the property of the McNeil brothers on Bear river has been acquired by Alaskan people. Options have been taken on several other properties.

"Many new mineral locations have been made during the past summer, nearly four hundred having been recorded, mainly on the Salmon river, but a large area of territory still remains to be systematically explored, for instance, beyond the Maybee claim five miles north of Red Cliff on American creek lies fifteen miles of good prospecting ground on which, as yet, not one location has been made. CAPTAIN MORKILL DECORATED BY PRINCE

Brother of Well Known Stewart Resident Gets Military Cross With Bar.

Among those receiving decorations in Vancouver at the hands of the Prince of Wales was Capt. Alan B. Morkill, a brother of D. B. Morkill of Stewart. His photograph is published in the Vancouver Province which says of him:

"Capt. Alan B. Morkill, 7th Battalion, who receives the Military cross and bar, left Victoria with the 88th Battalion, being transferred to the 7th Battalion in France. With that unit he served through the battle of the Somme, Vimy and the later battles of the war. He was wounded at Passchendaele and rejoined in 1918. He was awarded the M.C. for his work in the battle of Amiens in August, 1918. The official notification of the award was as follows: 'This officer got his company to his assembly position without casualties, despite heavy shell and machine gun fire. Next morning he led his company in the attack, and as soon as he attained his objectives set about organizing a defensive line under intense fire. The following evening he again did good work in taking up a position along a canal. His energy and coolness set an excellent example.' Capt. Morkill was awarded the bar to his M.C. for gallantry in later battles."
