## Flames Rage Through Forest; Logger Dead

Vancouver Island Camps Wiped Out  
VANCOUVER (CP)—Forest flames, swept by mile-an-hour wind, cut a path six to seven miles across Cracroft Island, Monday. A logger is dead, logging operations are wiped out and 70 women children had to be evacuated from camp.

Cracroft Island is at the northeast corner of Vancouver Island, where forest fires have taken heavy toll in last three weeks.  
The logger was killed when struck by snag as he and other workers were trying to save valuable machinery. His name is being withheld pending notification of next-of-kin.  
The blaze was brought under control and then it ran wild as 50-mile-an-hour gale swept the island. Property damage will amount to thousands of dollars.

By the glass, beer is jumping from ten to fifteen cents. But it is fully expected—and it's here the soothing touch comes in—there will be an extra half-ounce in the glass. The size of the glass, in 1939 was reduced to 7½-ounces. It may now return to the eight-ounce. Brewery workers and beverage room dispensers have made application to take a strike vote, said one official.

None are very large, however, and all remain under control.

## Quonset Huts Blossom At Alcan Site

Accommodation for Alcan workers and their families is being pushed ahead fast, in connection with the concern's development in north-central British Columbia. More than \$800,000 worth of quonset construction is already under way.

A contract to provide 140 quonset buildings has been awarded to a Vancouver firm, Keystone Industries Ltd., by Morrison-Knudsen Company of Canada, major contractors on Alcan work. The huts are to be used for camp accommodation for approximately 1500 men for offices, warehouses, workshops, staff dwellings, recreation buildings, as well as a church, theatre, a hospital and aircraft hangars.

Nehru Hasn't Quit

NOBODY can accuse the British Colonial Office of doing things in too much of a hurry.

A solemn announcement says that on 22 September, 1951 the town of Singapore will officially become a "city"...

WHEN I was over on the prairies many people asked me had I heard the news over the radio about Nehru quitting his job.

That is just another proof of how deceptive radio news can be, unless given out with clarity and explanation.

Nehru resigned from the executive committee of the Congress party. But he has not resigned as Prime Minister...

We would have a similar situation in Canada if Mr. St. Laurent were to say that he was resigning from the executive of the national Liberal party...

NEHRU LOOMS far above most of the members of the Congress party in his prestige with the people. But between Nehru and the people stands the Congress party machine...

The people will not vote for Nehru unless all signs fall. But the candidates who will be elected will be hand-picked, not by Nehru but by the hard-bolled plum-picking Congress party.

That is what the turmoil is all about in India. Nehru is an advanced thinker, a progressive, who is the leader of an "a my" or political party in which most of the other generals and colonels are hard-boiled reactionaries.

Thus in a sense, Nehru has been a prisoner of the army he is supposed to lead. That is what is really behind all this fuss and furore—but how will come out is just a guess.

DOES BRITAIN'S health scheme pay? Would the Tories abolish it if they came to power in the forthcoming election?

Here is one figure which explains why. The death rate in England and Wales fell no less than 20% in 1950 as compared with 1949—the greatest drop in any year since 1929.

BRITAIN IS soon due to start repayments of the huge post-war loan from the USA. Unless all signs fall, she will be unable to pay more than a small fraction of what she contracted.

When that happens, the skies of Washington will be shattered by outraged roars.

I figure the worst mistake the British ever made was to ask for, and take that loan from Uncle Sam. The whole British Commonwealth should have had the guts to get together and stand on its own feet—without accepting handouts from anybody.

VICTORIA REPORT

VICTORIA.—The people who call themselves conservationists showed, this reviewer thought, some hysteria during the recent hearings into the controversial Buttle Lake situation.

The conservationists, much to my surprise, I found staging a real high-powered, high-pressure campaign, complete with costly public relations experts, expensive lawyers, even hotel suites filled with good Scotch...

One conservationist, in a moment approaching hysteria, got up and cried aloud and in some forced agony that the government had hidden an order-in-council authorizing the B. C. Power Commission to dam Buttle Lake.

Conservationists in the past have been wrong. It's only 10 years ago that they were in misery because the government was building a streamlined Island Highway...

Yes, some timber was ruined and the old Island Highway has been more or less abandoned. But would we have progress stemmed? People today want streamlined highways...

In 10 years this island could well have a population of 500,000 people. They will need industry; the Power Commission must supply energy for such industry.

But, when all is said and done—it should be up to the Legislature to settle this question. It was the Legislature which originally set Buttle Lake and Strathcona Park aside for the recreation and enjoyment of the public.

The Legislature should now make the decision, remembering that in this day and age there's no reason for hysteria; that there can be a combination of both natural beauty and industrial progress.

### Cafe Garbage Collections

And extra cans are to be provided by restaurants to carry overflow during the two-day non-collection period. Cans that don't meet requirements of the garbage by-law will be tagged.

Board of works chairman Ald. Don Fitch also proposed that all cardboard boxes should be broken down and tied in bundles and garbage cans provided to take care of refuse now being put in boxes.

Meanwhile, at the garbage dump, a runway will be built for private dumping and rat poison will be purchased and applied under supervision of Sanitary Inspector Edward Bradley.

### Giants 'Hot' On Heels of Brooklyn



Audrey, who lives in suburban Willowdale, has a pet fox called Freddy and she is getting a little weary of people telling her Freddy would make a better pet than a dog.

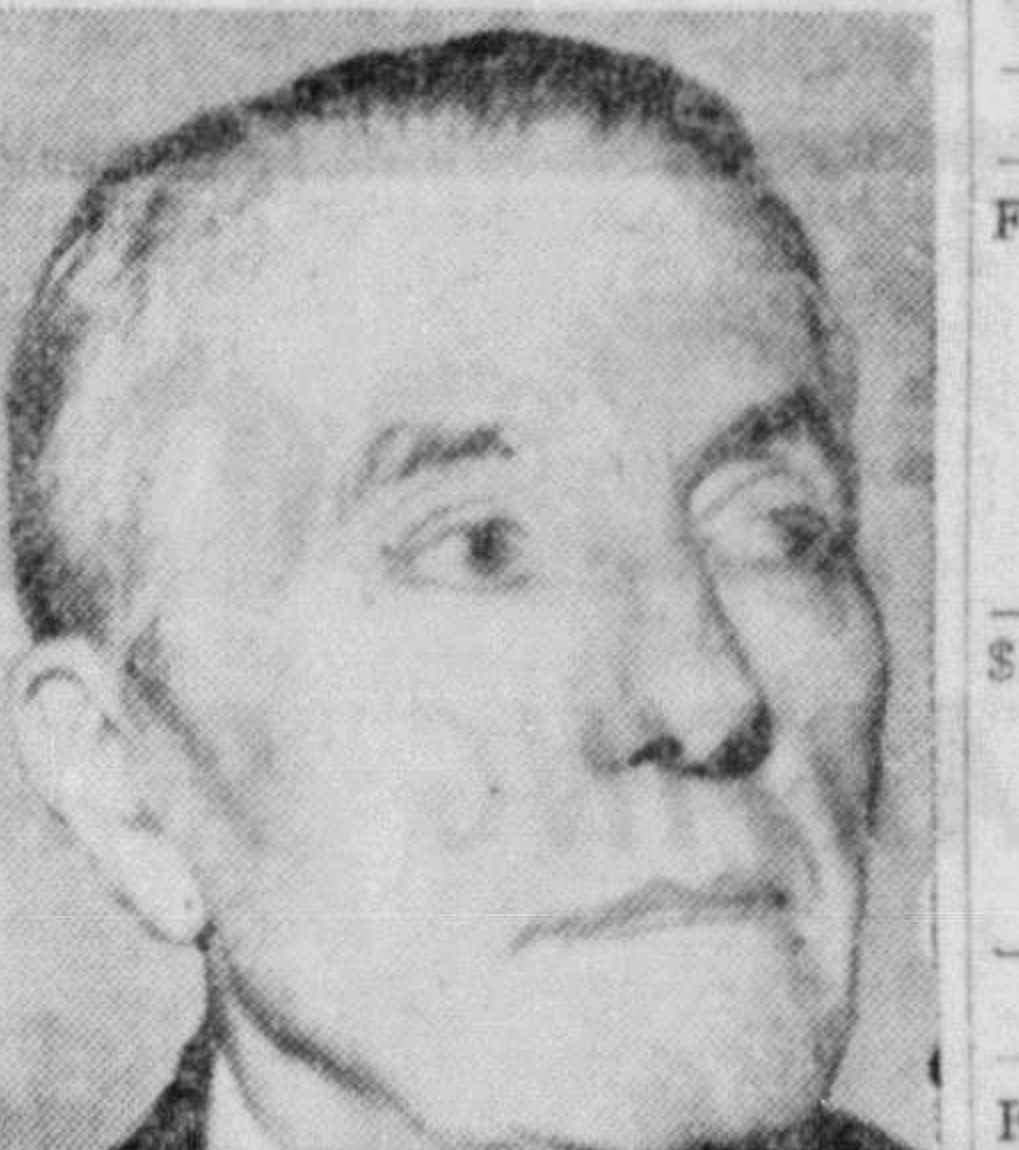
Freddy was found playing with the Hind's two dogs on their lawn four months ago. Audrey's sister Pat captured the fox and gave it to Audrey.

**B.C. HISTORY**—An attractive nursery, furnished with blond-wood pieces, has a color scheme that combines turquoise with pale yellow and coral. The dado and woodwork are enameled in turquoise, while the upper walls and ceiling are coated a delicate tint of cream-yellow. Draperies and bedspread match the turquoise of the dado and are edged with yellow and coral.

**Adds Newness**—Window shades, which are still in good condition, may be refinished in colors to harmonize with the room in which they are to be used. Unroll the shades and lay them flat on the floor, after it has been covered with clean papers. Dust the shades, then apply interior flat paint with a wide soft brush, flowing the paint on generously. When thoroughly dry, turn the shade over and refinish the other side.

Mr. Champion opened the queen of hearts and Miss Brash won with the ace and counted up her winners. Apparently she could take five spades, two hearts, the two minor suit aces and a heart ruff—10 tricks in all. Of course, this count was based on the opposing spades being divided 3-2.

What if one opponent had four spades? In that case it appeared impossible to avoid the loss of one spade trick, one diamond and two clubs. But what's a little thing like "the impossible" to Miss Brash? Nothing at all. She decided to play the hand so that she would have a good chance for success even if the spades were divided 4-1.

A premature leading of trumps would ruin this plan so at the second trick Miss Brash played a small diamond and won it with dummy's ace. She returned a small diamond and Mr. Abel was in with the jack. He led back a trump and Mr. Champion's 10 went to dummy's king.

Now Miss Brash led another diamond from the board and ruffed it with the seven of spades. Then she cashed the king of hearts and ruffed her last heart in dummy. The last diamond was led from the board and ruffed with the nine of spades.

# Salmon Dishes

Prepare a white sauce and when quite hot add the salmon and liquor; sprinkle with grated cheese. Butter the inside of the rolls, fill with the mixture, close the ends with crumb, or the ends which were removed, and place in the oven. Serve when well browned, and very hot. Serves four.

**SALMONBURGERS**  
1 lb. can salmon, flaked  
3/4 cup coarse cracker crumbs  
1 egg  
1 small onion, sliced  
1 tsp. butter  
Seasoning  
Dill pickles

Mix flaked salmon with cracker crumbs, egg slightly beaten. Saute slice onion in butter, add to salmon mixture, season. Shape 6 thin salmon cakes and brown quickly in butter. Warm six large buns, split and place with salmon cakes between. Serve with dill pickles. Serves 6 generously.
