The world-wide cold war Korea is the only area of open conflict between Communist forces and those of the free world. The fighting front is connected to China by land communications, and there the Fourth Army with North Korean forces, perhaps some 400,000 men, are retreating before 275,000 United Nations troops. Supply lines in North Korea are under constant air and bombardment.

Korea is dangerously near the province of Manchuria, whose industrial wealth the economic future of China. Manchuria has easier access to the Soviet Far East than China proper, and already at Changchun there is a Soviet staff headquarters where 1,500,000 Chinese troops, including the Third Field Army are receiving training and training from Russian instructors before they enter Korea.

According to recent reports, China's regular army will be increased from 2,000,000 to 4,500,000 men and her territorial militia, now 4,000,000 strong, is to receive university recruits for training in naval and air services.

But all these forces require equipment, and this, with technical instruction, is obtainable only from Russia and Russian-controlled Manchuria. Besides her commitments in the north-east, China requires to reserve forces for such possible issues as a counter-revolution in South China, a conflict with Nationalist forces in Formosa, and the Tibetan campaign.

In the area mapped above, China possesses superiority in manpower; Russia controls the arsenals, land communications in the north, and is developing a submarine fleet (for which she desires the use of the Korea Strait between the Amur River shipyards and the warm-water naval base at Port Arthur); while the United Nations control the sea and air from bases in Japan, the Ryukyu Islands, Hong Kong and the Philippines.

MacArthur is Going Home

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP) — House Republican Leader Joe Martin said today "there is a possibility" General MacArthur may fly back to the United States next week to address Congress.

Martin made the announcement following an early morning session of the House Republican policy committee. "There is a possibility," he said, "that General MacArthur will fly back next week and will be available to address Congress sooner than the three weeks mentioned earlier."

Republicans, furiously angry at President Truman for firing the general, are sponsoring a resolution inviting MacArthur to address a joint meeting of Senate and House.

Jet Fight Is Biggest

Baffling Withdrawal of Koreans in North Korea

TOKYO (CP) — American warplanes shot down five enemy jets and probably destroyed two more, damaging 15, today in two roaring air fights over north-west Korea.

All American planes came safely out of the battles. One of the thunderous clashes was the biggest jet fight in history. It involved 152 jet planes — 83 Russian-made MIG-15's and 72 American F-86's and F-84's — and about 40 B-29 medium bombers.

On the ground two Chinese divisions pulled back suddenly and mysteriously on the central front.

American troops pushed cautiously ahead in their wake against no opposition.

Staff officers said they were puzzled by the enemy withdrawal.

Two Red divisions Wednesday bitterly opposed Allied crossings of Hantan River south of Chonwon, but they broke contact Wednesday night.

South Korean troops on the east coast stabbed 26 miles into North Korea in the deepest Red land penetration of the current United Nations drive.

Canadiens Lose in Overtime

TORONTO (CP) — Swift Syd Smith, an old hand at scoring hockey playoff goals in bunches, got the Toronto Maple Leafs off to a winning start with a two-goal outburst last night in the first of best-of-seven games in the Stanley Cup finals with Montreal Canadiens.

Only Toronto native on the Leaf line-up, the leftwinger slapped home a pass from linemate Tod Sloan after five minutes and 51 seconds of sudden-death overtime play to give the Leafs a 3-2 victory in the series, which opened before 13,939 fans.

Smith also tallied the game's first goal after 15 seconds of play, also on a pass from Sloan. Maurice Richard matched Smith's opening goal. Sloan put Toronto ahead again 15 seconds after Richard scored but Canadiens rubbed that out in the second period on a shot by rookie forward Paul Masnick.

"It was 2 o'clock yesterday morning when we struck the reef—thank the Lord no men were lost," said Capt. Murray who explained that they had miscalculated the tides.

The 60-foot tender, owned by the Klawock Ocean Side Packing Company, was carrying supplies from Seattle to Klawock when she struck the reef. The skipper said that there was some confusion over lights seen in that area.

Wismer Promises Tenants Protection

VICTORIA (CP) — Attorney-General Gordon Sloan said yesterday tenants will not get kicked around when the British Columbia government takes over rent controls from the federal government.

Speaking during the second reading of the government's rent control bill, he said tenants now living under federal regulations will not be forced to vacate or pay doubled rents.

Provincial controls would come into effect immediately federal controls are relinquished. April 30 is the date.

Wismer said the government is hoping it would be possible to institute a "reasonable and proper" system of orderly decontrol.

Legislation aimed at sharply reducing the land tax on privately-owned tracts developed as tree farms was introduced by Finance Minister Anscomb.

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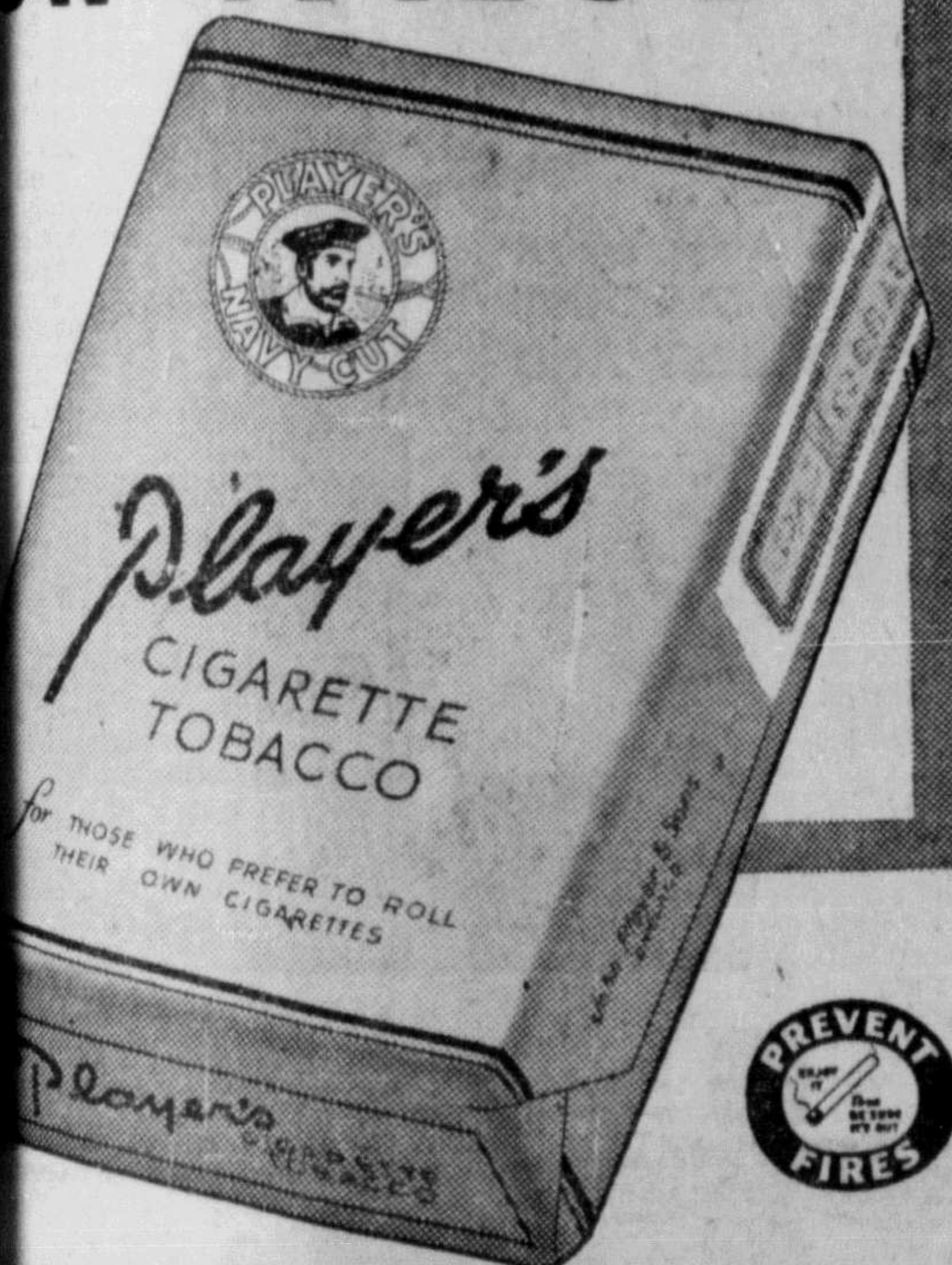

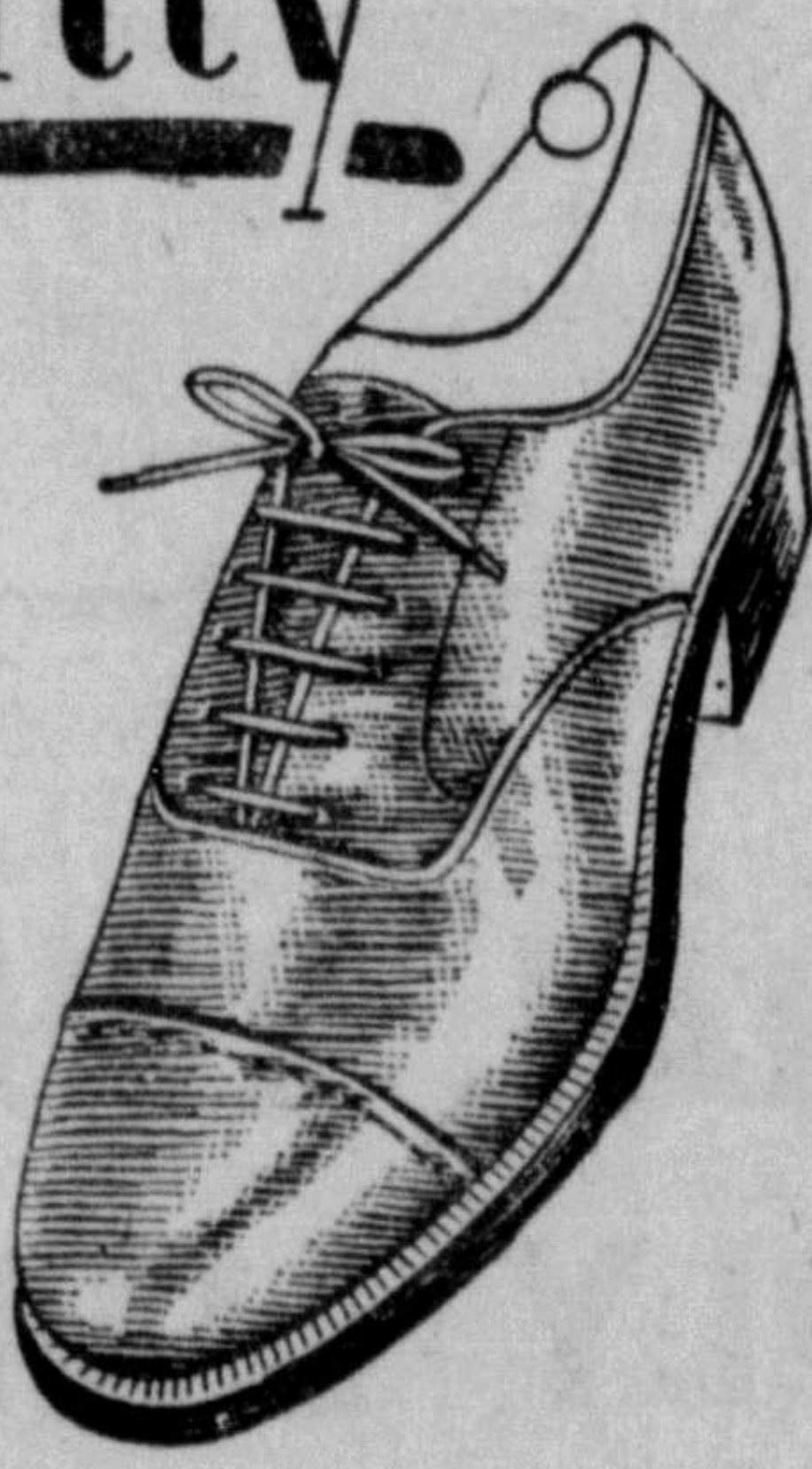

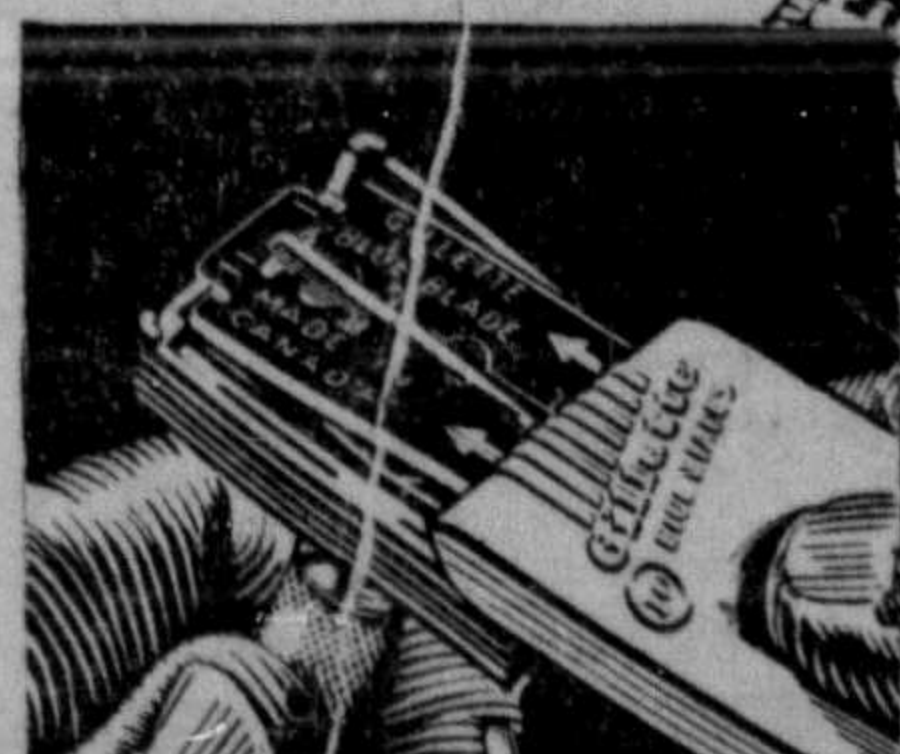

Distinctive Movie House Added to City Amenities

"TOTEM" INAUGURAL

Tonight at 6:15, Mayor G. W. Rudderham will cut a ribbon and open the doors of one of the most modern entertainment houses in the province—the \$150,000 Totem Theatre at the corner of First Street and Third Avenue.

Right from the first glimpses of the large neon sign outside—the city's largest—to the inside auditorium, patrons will recognize the theme of original Indian totems, carved and painted by Charles Dudoward, well-known Indian of Port Simpson.

At the box office will be smiling Mrs. Helen Gray, cashier, and William Reid is the door-man.

In the lobby a contrast of color is displayed in bright yellows, cerinthian red and turquoise blue, which are the fundamental colors originally used by Indians in their totem-pole painting.

Candy bar, operated by Mrs. Pat Deveau, is finished in imported black walnut on which is mounted a three-foot model of a Haida war-canoe. The bar will handle favorite confections such as popcorn and all types of candy; two dispensers of favorite soft-drinks.

A check-room and ladies' powder-room lead off from the west end; while a carpeted stairway leads to upstairs offices, men's washroom and projection rooms. On the wall near the foot of the stairs hangs a large Thunderbird mural. Floors are heavily carpeted with rugs in floral design.

In the auditorium with its 649 seats, an indirect lighting effect in colors brings out the decor with a singular effect—rich and soft.

MAIN FEATURE
Main feature of the house—first such installation in Canada—is the floating screen which is framed in neon lighting. This is a departure from the norm in that the picture fades out slowly toward the edges of the screen, instead of the commonly-used black masking where the picture is cut off. Behind the screen, a convex, fluted-plaster drop is so designed that the back lighting is converged directly behind the

screen, softly disintegrating toward the edges. Scientists maintain this system of projection is easier on the eyes.

The curtain is of spun glass fibre, gold in color.

Back from the stage skirts, the splade walls in sea-foam green fall away toward a recess which, with the cove ceiling, is lighted indirectly by neon white and canary yellow. Ceiling fixtures are flush mounted, which is considered the most scientific approach to theatre lighting as no direct beam ever falls on the screen. Running lights, mounted within the ceiling fixtures, spread a soft glow over the house while projection is in progress.

An auxiliary power unit has been installed which cuts in immediately in case of power failure.

It is on the slade walls that are hung four symbolic totems, each representing the original crests of coastal Indian tribes: Grizzly, Eagle, Raven and Wolf.

In the main auditorium, two large acoustic panels stand off from each wall, these in corinthian red. At the rear, a perforated, saw-toothed acoustic board covers a two-inch wall of fibre glass of special design.

Chairs are placed with a 32-inch clearance, and are an all-welded steel assembly, mohair upholstered back with a 22-spring plastic-covered seat. The theatre floor is saucer-like, with an upward slope in the extreme front to give unobstructed vision throughout the seating capacity. Heavy carpets line the aisles.

The building is 60 by 100 feet, space of which has been devoted to compactness and comfort. Heating is thermostatically controlled hot water and filtered air through a system of ducts, fans and outside air ventilators which provide 36 cubic feet of air per person a minute.

GRANDMA WAS RIGHT

Perhaps Grandma wasn't so far wrong with those little household hints she used to keep cached away in the drawer of the kitchen table. They covered all manner of subjects—everything from how to take milk stains from the tablecloth to a sure-fire method of separating the yolk from the white of an egg.

Remember some of these? Hot vinegar will remove paint from glass.

Rub hands with a slice of raw potato to cleanse them of vegetable stains.

A soft ball of tissue paper is used to remove rain spots from satin, felt and other such materials. Rub the affected parts with a circular movement.

Faded woollen rugs may be brightened by rubbing with a flannel dipped in warm water to which a little vinegar and common salt have been added. Dry in the open air.

A varnished floor should never be washed with hot water. A cloth wrung in lukewarm water

Remove milk stains by washing them in cold water, followed by soap and water. Rinse in clear water. These hints may not come complete with scientific explanation for their working ability, but grandmother found them useful.

NOT ALL WHEAT—If it's whole wheat bread you want, then ask for "whole wheat" on the next visit to the bakery. Avoid using the word "brown." That's just a tip to help you get what you're after.

Believe it or not—all brown bread isn't whole wheat. In fact it may not contain more than 40 per cent whole wheat flour with burned sugar or molasses added to give it coloring.

While it's quite within the law for bakers to add this kind of "coloring," at the same time it can be confusing to buyers.

Health experts suggest that when housewives want "whole wheat" bread they should ask for it when they give their order.

GENTLE REMINDER—Health experts remind that a daily diet should include at least one pint of milk, one egg, a portion of meat or fish plus whole wheat cereal and bread. And don't forget two vegetables as well as potatoes, plus at least two kinds of fruit.

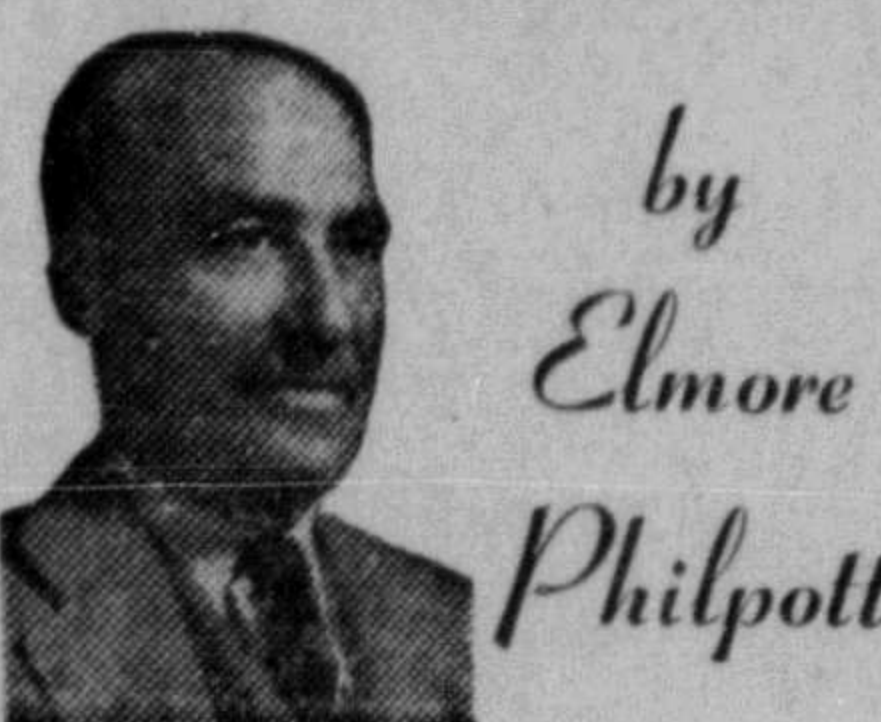

SIKH HOLY CITY

AMRITSAR, India.—It is some job to get a taxi where there is no telephone in the only hotel and taxis are scarce as hens' teeth.

But my hotel room bearer went about for one. The driver looked absolutely blank when I woke him up to show me the city square where a British general turned the machine guns on a mob, right after World War One—and poisoned relations between India and Britain for many a year.

Time is surely a great healer. For the taxi driver had never even heard of the so-called "Amritsar massacre."

I DROVE OUT to the famous Sikh Golden Temple—through back streets barely wide enough for the car to pass, when not blocked by wandering cows, very scrawny in these poor parts.

But the temple itself well repaid the trip.

A grave-faced, jet black bearded, blue-turbaned Sikh guide, named Ram Singh, took me around. He showed me the free hostel where they have 150 free rooms, in which each visitor may stay four days—absolutely without charge. He showed me the free kitchen, where they serve free meals each noon. He gave me a brand new pair of cotton socks—for it is forbidden to enter the temple shod, or bareheaded. As we walked around the marble-paved court that surrounds the huge "pool of immortality" he told me many things about the fine Sikh religion. Some of them I knew already—many were completely new.

The Golden Temple opens on all four sides, as a symbol that it is open to all classes, creeds, races. Inside, from two o'clock in the morning on till night, there is continuous reading of the Holy Sikh Scripture. Relays of singers carry on the holy chants. The people throng in and out by thousands. Most say a prayer, pass on. In the pool itself many are bathing, for many remarkable healings are on record.

THE SIKHS, of course, believe in one God of all creation, and that all men are brothers. The best of them really practise this creed, too.

Ram, my guide, told me with touching simple faith stories of miracles, such as when some great Sikh fighter, coming to liberate the temple which had

been overrun by the Mongols, had his head cut clean off by a fierce sword sweep of the enemy. But the doughty warrior carried on, with his decapitated head in his left hand, till the job of liberation was done.

Smile, cynic, but you will not smile quite so bitterly if you see the really beautiful faces of the old white-bearded men—one I remember yet dangling his grandchild or great-grandchild on his knee.

Nor shall I forget another old fellow, chanting aloud some prayer to God and utterly unconscious of the world around.

MY GUIDE REFUSED any tip or gratuity—certainly something refreshing in India or any other country.

We drove to Khalsa College, where Sikhs from all the world come to be educated. Then, after a nice chat with the president, I drove along to see the Anglican Bishop (Wilkinson). I knew he was a Canadian. In fact, this is the centre of the Canadian Church of England work in India.

The Bishop was in Delhi, and the Bishop's lady was washing her hair. But she sent me down a cordial invitation to come to tea. Unfortunately, I had to turn this down, as I am flying back to Delhi this afternoon in order to see the Taj Mahal tomorrow at Agra.

I met one of the Anglican missionaries—a nice young lady from Medicine Hat, Ruth Ingram. She told me of their many-sided work in the Kangra Valley—hospitals, schools, as well as the religious enterprise.

It turned out she had been a good friend of my nephew, Bill Nimmo, who lost his life in the recent war.

Miss Ingram talked, too, of India's progress in a balanced way that was refreshing. For most of the foreigners that one meets in India are as pessimistic and cynical as are most Indian intellectuals—which is saying a lot.

She thinks this country is coming through all right—and I feel sure she is doing her bit to help bring it through.

School Band Enthusiastic

TWENTY-FIVE STUDENTS ENROLLED

Booth Memorial High School Band Tuesday night turned out for its first rehearsal, complete with band-instruments and 25 players. And Fred Huber, music teacher and conductor of that band, is quite enthusiastic about getting started.

"So are the band members," he said. Most of them had been given instruments a month ago so they could learn something about them. Mr. Huber gave them lessons after school hours. Last night they played together for the first time.


Their conductor hopes to have band work put on the school curriculum next year, he has told them. This will get credits for their work in future.

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World Trade League Fades

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's great hope of the world creating a flourishing International Trade organization is dwindling.

Officials say they now see little chance of the Havana Charter—the instrument by which the hope might have been realized—being ratified by world trading nations.

Discouraged by the twist in international events, they are placing more and more importance on the smaller victory, the Geneva Tariff Agreement as the next-best thing to the hoped-for ITO.

Now, in Torquay, England, that Geneva agreement, formally known as the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, has run into a raft of trouble.

Britain and the United States have failed to reach agreement on a new round of tariff negotiations. This disagreement involving British tariff preference is expected to fan out to encompass some of the U.S. negotiations with Canada.

The Havana Charter, if ratified, would have committed some 54 signatory nations to a policy of non-discrimination in their customs charges and their general internal trade taxation and regulation policy.

HAVANA MEETING

Preliminary agreement was reached three years ago at a Havana conference of the members of the Geneva agreement, signed the previous year in Switzerland.

Since then Canada has been waiting for nations to make final ratification. Particularly, Canada was watching the United States to take the lead. So were other nations.

Congress still has not given full consideration to the matter and both the trade and external affairs departments see no sign that it intends to do so in the near future.

There is "increasing possibility," says the external affairs department in its annual report, "that ITO will not be established." The General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade assumes "a new importance."

Trade officials pointed out that though the Geneva agreement does not go as far as the Havana Charter, it provides a strong emphasis on multilateral trade which is Canada's basic trade policy.

It provides for a general policy of non-discrimination in world trade, but it does not emphasize the need for full employment and economic activity, two strong points of the Havana Charter.

A few months ago, some of the nations belonging to the Geneva agreement attempted to write into the pact the two articles of the Havana Charter dealing with employment and economic activity. A vote was taken. The move was rejected.

SINGLE MARKET ECONOMY

The main aim of the Havana Charter was to restore a non-discriminatory single market economy to the world, including a general levelling off of high tariffs.

The Geneva agreement tries to do this, too. It has made advances on three paths: by tariff negotiation, gradual reduction of import controls and by the periodic international meetings to air out undesirable trade practices.

For the last six months, members of the Geneva agreement, including Canada, have been negotiating their third post-war round of tariff bargaining.

The United States has called in Britain and other Commonwealth countries to reduce the British preferential tariff which grants special tariff concessions to countries within the Commonwealth and excludes those outside the Commonwealth.

Some reductions actually have been negotiated in the past. But Britain decided against going any further. And it is learned here that some other nations, such as Australia and New Zealand, are at Britain's side.

Canada had high hopes of cutting down U.S. tariff preference still further by granting her the same tariff preference as that granted to other Commonwealth traders on certain commodities.

Now, say officials, it was a question of whether it would be "politically wise" for Canada to follow such a policy, "in view of the positions taken by other Commonwealth countries."

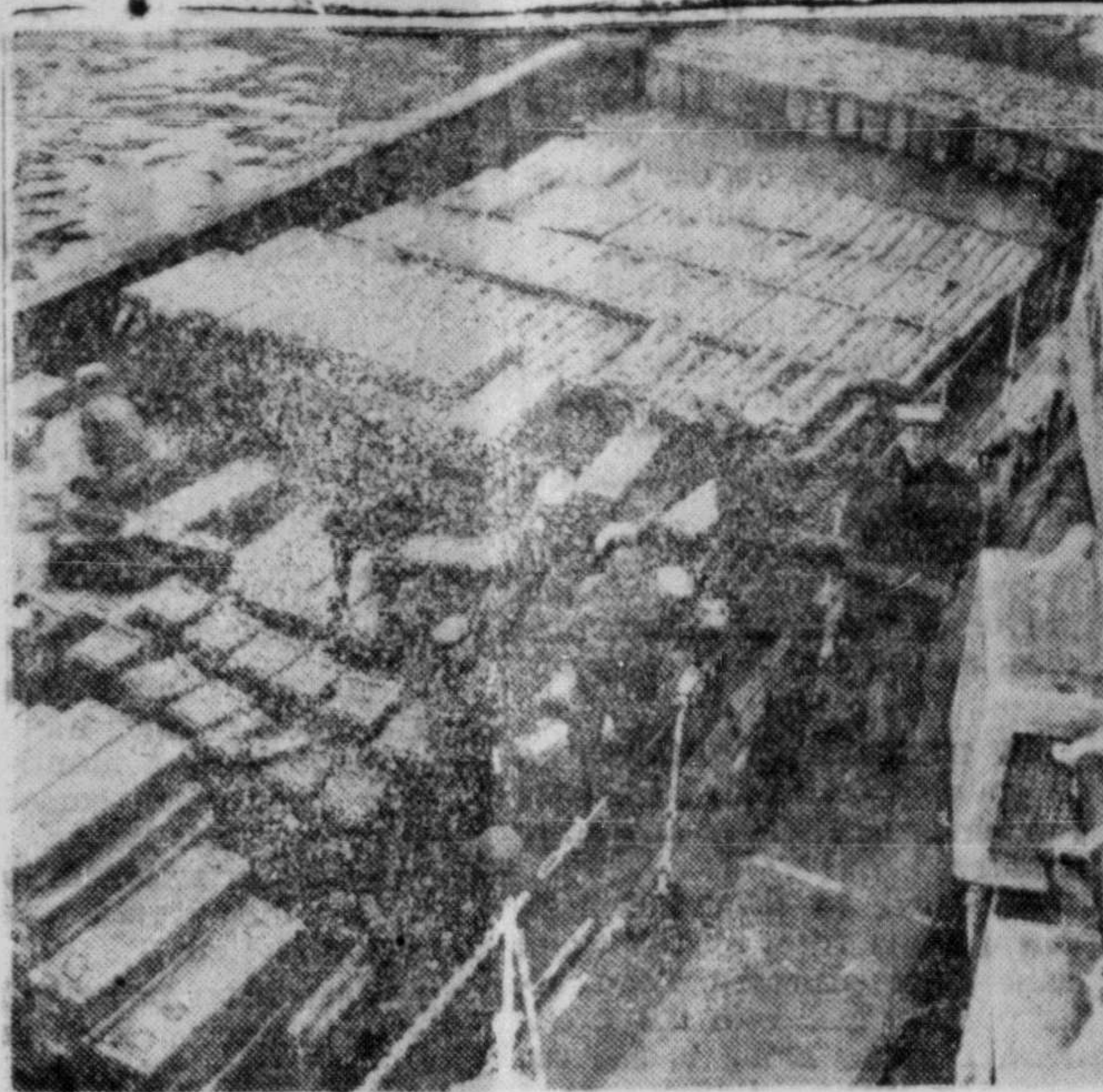

TIME TO CLEAN UP

The news that President Truman has dismissed General MacArthur, together with the news of the British budget, might well qualify today for the title: "Black Tuesday." The only ray of light in the darkness is that our own budget is not worse than it is.

I would like to recommend to the world at large that Truman be sacked, Eisenhower be installed, MacArthur be reinstated, the present milk and water British government be told to get out and let Churchill take over, another 20 per cent be added to our income taxes, or more if necessary, and that we finally get down to the job of ensuring that our children will not have to live in a slave state.

Time has nearly run out for the free world. It is agonizing to watch what little we have left being wasted away in international bickering and appeasement of pressure groups. 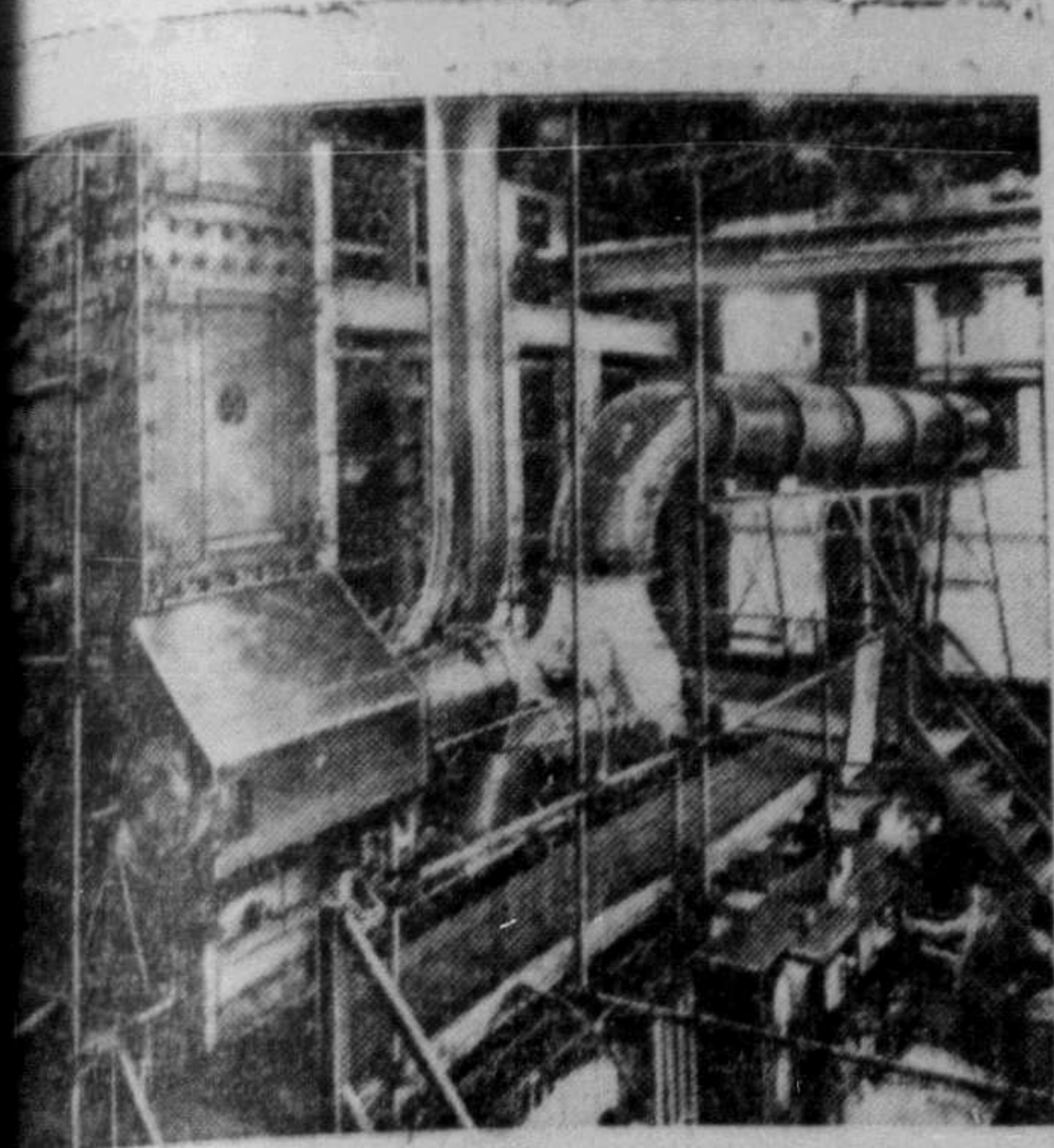

Life Amazes Mme. Gouzenko

TORONTO (CP)—Picnic tables along Canadian highways without a placard demanding gratitude to the government that provided them astounded Mme. Svetlana Gouzenko when she first saw them.

The wife of Igor Gouzenko, former Russian embassy employee, whose disclosures precipitated the 1946 Canadian espionage trials tells in Saturday Night recently of her life since coming to Canada.

Since fleeing the Soviet embassy in Ottawa, the Gouzenkos have lived under a new name in a new community. Most of Mrs. Gouzenko's time has been devoted to bringing up their children. To them she feels that the happy spontaneity of Canadian holidays and festivals brings a great deal of joy. They help to develop "children into kind and loving people with a heart and soul, and not as empty automatons who repeat slogans of the party from their childhood."

The instance of the picnic tables was to her a striking illustration that in Canada the needs of ordinary people are supplied in a business-like way. "In Russia," writes Mme. Gouzenko, "even for the right to breathe free air, a man must thank Stalin from morning till night."

Canadian hobbies came as a great surprise to the Gouzenkos. The idea of employing spare time in ways both pleasant and profitable emphasized in their eyes the "unlimited productivity and intense briskness of a free people."

Her tastes in house furnishings changed during her years in Canada. They bought a second and plainer rug for their hallway largely as a result of magazine reading. The extraordinarily large number of magazines has provided her with not a few ideas.

Mme. Gouzenko comments on the high level of material well-being of the population in Canada and considers their cultural level very high.

Gardening....

TAKE A CHANCE—For the main plantings it is inadvisable to plant or set out too soon. With moderately tender things little is to be gained by planting until both the soil and air have started to turn warm and spring has really arrived. But this advice, of course, does not apply to very hardy flowers and vegetables nor to most nursery stock, grass seed, etc. And it does not apply rigidly to a few extra early rows of almost anything in the vegetable line.

If these come along and escape the frost one gets a good deal of satisfaction in boasting to the neighbors. If they don't come—well, one is out only a few cents' worth of seed and an hour's healthy exercise. Just as soon as the ground is fit to work, one can take a chance on a few feet of lettuce, some radish, carrots, onions, spinach and such things. Even a few hills of potatoes may be planted. Main plantings, however, of vegetables and flowers should wait until practically all danger of frost has passed.

WHEN SOIL IS FIT—Above, and in many garden articles and bulletins, will appear the caution "when the soil is fit to work." What does that mean? If one can walk through the garden without getting one's shoes really muddy or if when one squeezes a handful of soil it crumbles rather than packs into a hard ball, then the ground is fit to cultivate and plant. If it is wetter than this it is too soon, and with heavy soil it will do harm to work it. It is very liable to bake hard later on into lumps that will take half the summer to break up.

SMALL COST BUT VITAL—Too much emphasis cannot be laid on suitable seed. Suitable seed is more than just pure, high quality, graded seed. It is seed of varieties especially selected and for Canadian conditions. In vegetables it also means that the variety has been approved and tested officially for Canada.

As seed is the only factor in gardening over which man has absolute control, and as it costs a few cents a packet for all that will be needed in a normal garden for a whole year, nothing but the best should be considered.

TWO COMMONEST MISTAKES—Probably the two com-

monest mistakes are too thick and too deep in sowing flower and vegetable seed. One should remember that all these things require room, even tiny things like alyssum or radish or onions.

With big things like peas, beans, etc., it is not hard to space as one plants; with tiny seeds it is more difficult, and after the plants come up they should be thinned. To spread very small seed more evenly some experts mix with a little sand or fine soil and sow the mixture. The general rule for depth is three times the diameter. Now that does not mean getting out a ruler or calipers. It simply suggests that fine seeds such as that of onion, poppy, portulaca and carrots should be merely pressed into the soil; larger seed like beans and peas covered about an inch, and still larger, such as potatoes and gladioli, three to six inches. If planted too deep, the tiny seed especially may not germinate at all.

Wolves Prey on Moose and Deer

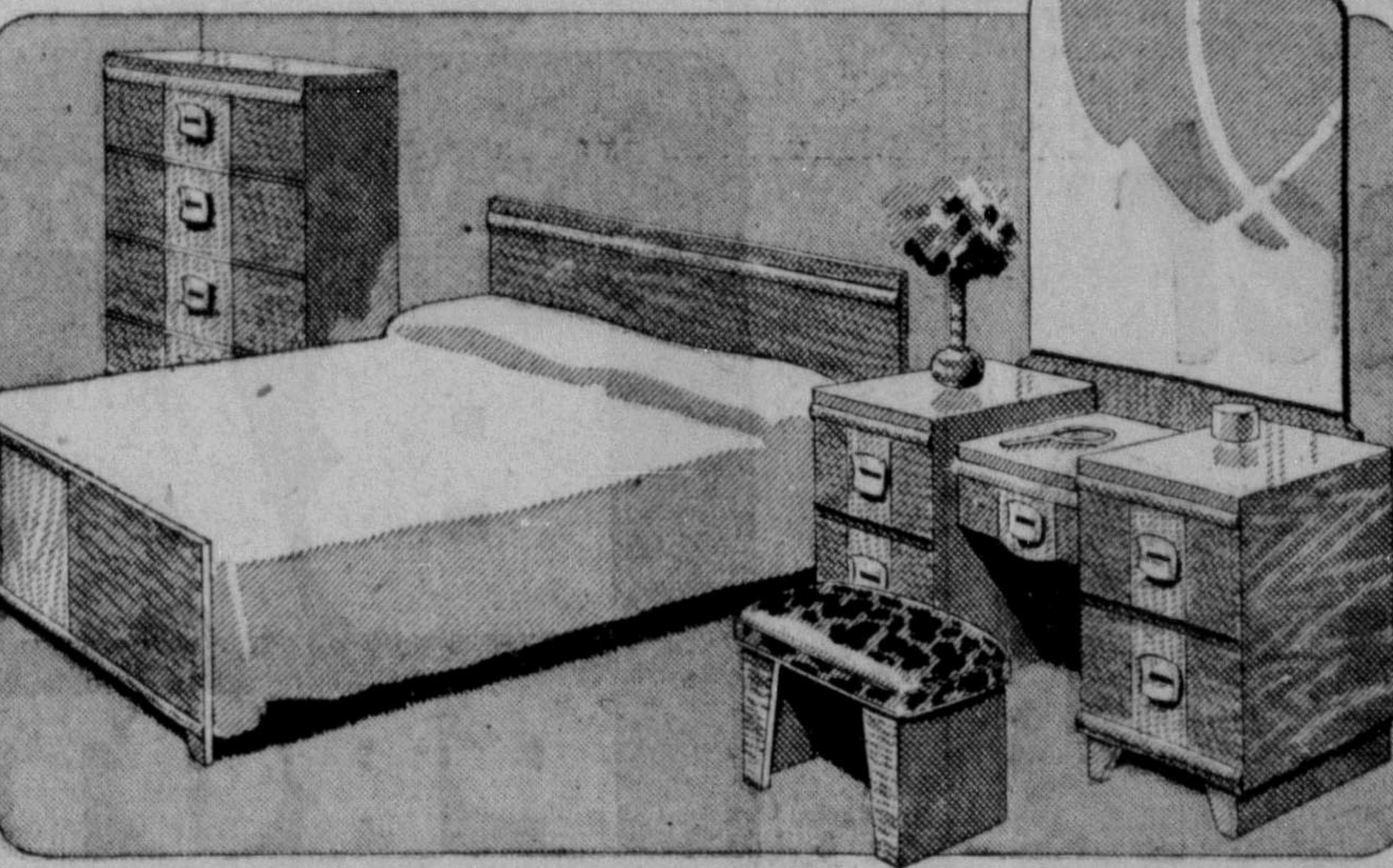

Blackwood on Bridge

Before I tell you about the beautiful play Mr. Champion made on this deal, lay the hand out and see if you can make three no trump against an opening lead of the jack of diamonds by Mr. Abel. I must tell you about one good break you would get—Mr. Abel plays low on the first lead of spades.

There was some eyebrow raising on the part of the kibitzers when Mr. Masters bid three no trump. He knew as well as anyone that he didn't quite have the cards for this bid. But he has implicit faith in Mr. Champion's ability to play a hand, and his optimism and confidence paid off.

This hand is an extreme example of the general rule I gave you yesterday concerning the use of the hold-up at no trump contracts. Unless you hold one more stopper in the suit led than the number of enemy high cards which must be knocked out—then the hold-up is indicated.

When Mr. Abel led the jack of diamonds, Mr. Champion saw that he was going to have to knock out a spade, a heart and a club, three cards in all—and was going to have to be lucky besides. Holding just three stop-

pers in the suit led, he let Mr. Abel's jack of diamonds hold the trick!

He won the diamond continuation and led the four of spades, finessing dummy's nine. Mrs. Keen won with the queen and had no diamond to return. She led back the deuce of hearts (any other lead would have brought the same final result) which Mr. Champion ducked and Mr. Abel's king won.

Another diamond lead was won in the closed hand and a successful spade finesse taken. A second heart finesse followed and when this held things began to look up.

Mr. Champion was now able to knock out Mr. Abel's ace of clubs

while still holding one stopper in spades. Thus he made three spades, two hearts, three diamonds and a club to bring home his contract—and make Mr. Masters' bidding look good.

Note that if Mr. Champion had won the first diamond trick (is that what you did?), then Mrs. Keen would have had a diamond to lead when she was in with the queen of spades. In that case there would have been no way in the world to make the contract.

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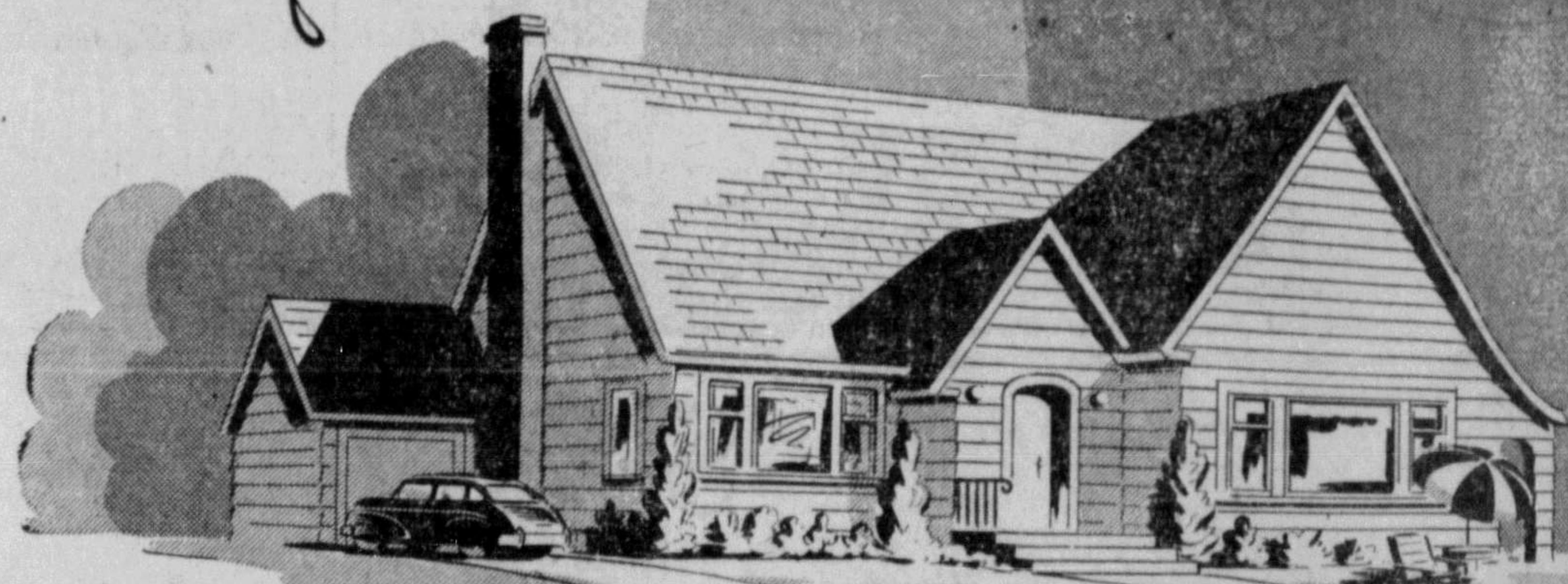
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
