## British Railway Strike being Dealt with very Effectively

**Trains are Running Everywhere and Motor Services between Cities have Been Organized; Preference Given to Food Trains in Ireland; Government well Equipped; Stones Thrown.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 30.—The railway strike is still confined to the railways and even there it seems to be losing ground. Indications point to a greatly increased railway service tomorrow in which volunteers, who have been constantly offering their services, will play a prominent part.

Although the strike is not operative in Ireland, the Irish railway executive has ordered that from Wednesday only perishable goods and animals for immediate slaughter be accepted for transit. The passenger service will be reduced in order to make way for the food supplies.

Schedules prepared by the various companies show a quite respectable number of trains which are to be operating tomorrow, especially in London and the suburbs, while regular motor services are being organized between some of the big towns like Birmingham and Manchester.

### Attempt to Derail Trains.

For the first time there were some attempts today to derail trains and also some stoning of them. The most determined attack occurred between Kirkcaldy and Thornton where missiles were thrown at the driver of a train from Aberdeen and detonators were placed on the lines. A fireman was injured from being struck by a stone.

An aspect of this strike making it different from all other strikes is that the Government is in possession of all the machinery of war in working order and available for counter measures. This includes thousands of lorries for road transport with efficient air service and other facilities virtually non-existent in pre-war days. These, together with guns and the system of rationing, controlling the distribution and consumption of food and regulation of other things essential to public life, make the task of the Government much easier than it would otherwise be.

### Government Action.

The food controller has issued a number of regulations fixing prices and restricting consumption of staple foods. The Government has invited citizens to enroll as special constables for any possible emergency and also has placed constables at various points in readiness to afford protection in the event of disorders.

## GOOD PRICES AT TAX SALE

Only Two Lots Bought in by the City During Morning.

The city tax sale which commenced this morning so far has been very satisfactory both to the city officials and those interested in the city generally. A good sign was that of over four hundred lots originally listed for tax sale only one actually been auctioned, the rest having been redeemed by the delinquent tax payers. The prices actually brought at the sale this morning were, generally speaking, very good.

In Section One the most of the lots went at the upset price, that is, they were sold for the amount of the taxes. Lots in the vicinity of Market Place went at from \$250 to \$500 while two lots on Second Avenue sold for \$1,000. The highest price paid for any one lot was \$950.22 for one on Fraser Street.

In Section Two the lots were sold at prices ranging from \$20 to \$320 which was considered very good by the city officials.

The total received up to noon was \$12,383.72, and only two lots were bought in by the city. A. E. Woods, city clerk, was the official auctioneer, W. D. Vance, collector and Harry Birch cashier for the sale. The sale will continue this afternoon and it is expected that it will be finished by 5 o'clock at the latest. This afternoon a few lots in Sections 5 and 6 will be sold and a larger number from Sections 7 and 8.

## REDUCE PRICE HOG PRODUCTS

Bacon Must be Sold at Same Price as Before March 10 last Says Board of Commerce.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, Sept. 30.—Definite action to reduce the price of bacon and other products of the hog were taken today by the Board of Commerce at a sitting here. An order was issued that from and after October 15 next pork and hog products sold for consumption in Canada by the Canadian packing houses and other producers shall be sold at practically the same as those which prevailed on March 10 of this year.

The Board further orders that prices shall be still further reduced if conditions warrant it. An intimation was given that the Board would keep the industry under close surveillance and would make further orders along the same line of found necessary.

## BIG BASEBALL GAME TOMORROW

Cincinnati Reds Will Play Their Opening Match Before 33,000 Spectators.

Cincinnati, Sept. 30.—With every available seat and all available standing room in Redlands field, supposed to accommodate 33,000 baseball enthusiasts, assigned or sold, everything appears in readiness for the opening game of the world's series baseball championship match tomorrow between the Cincinnati Reds and the Chicago White Sox.

The desks of the hostesses here are packed three deep as the visitors try to obtain sleeping accommodation, and the number of visitors is being added to as every incoming train arrives. One of the first special trains from New York brought 75 newspaper correspondents.

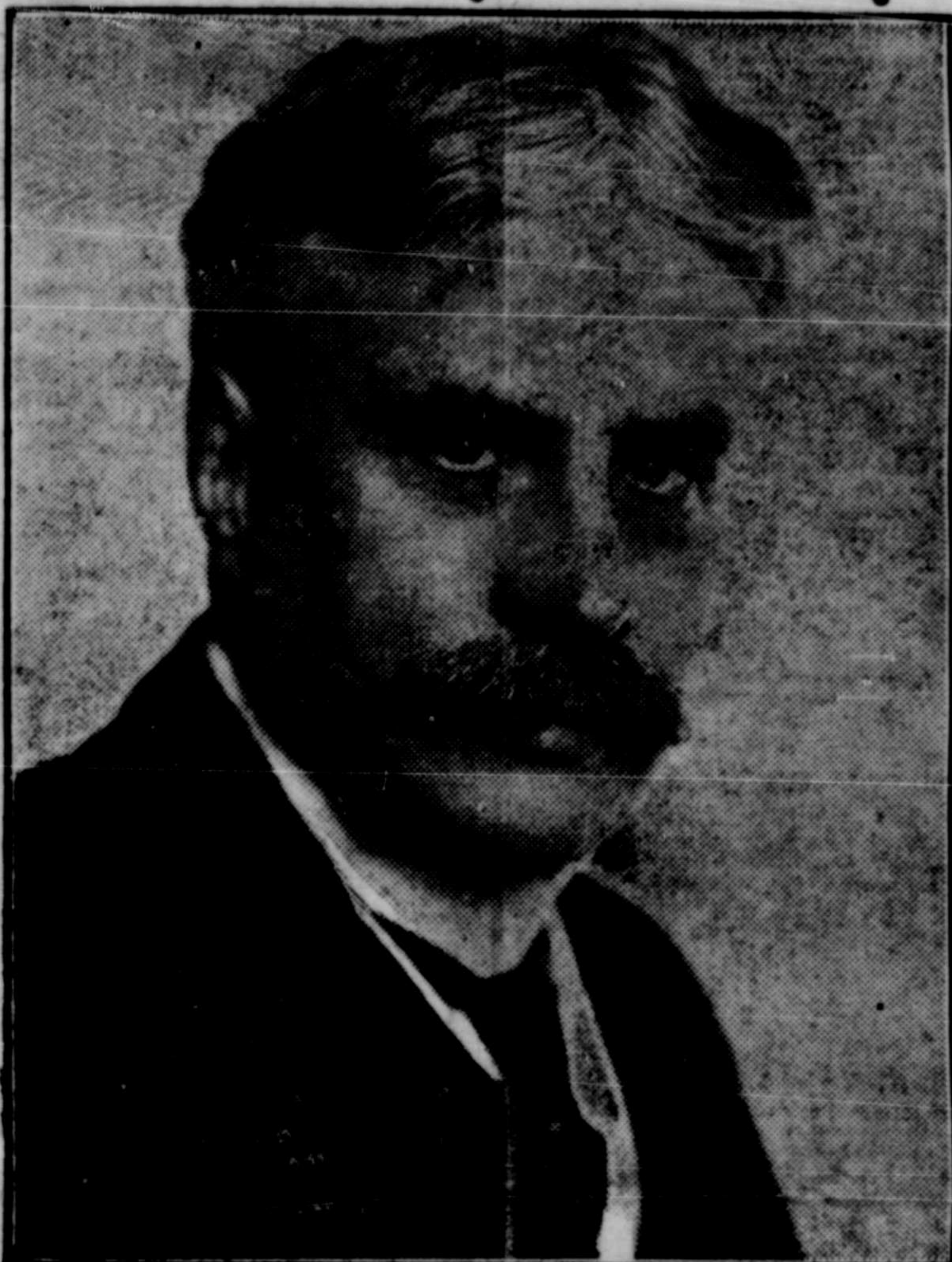

## W. J. BOWSER CHOSEN CONSERVATIVE LEADER

**AT BIG CONVENTION IN VANCOUVER A BRAND NEW PLATFORM IS ADOPTED, INCLUDING THE SOLVING OF THE HIGH COST OF LIVING**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, Sept. 30.—The first Conservative convention since 1914 held here yesterday chose unanimously Hon. W. J. Bowser party leader for British Columbia.

There were a large number of delegates present from all over the province and these included a large number of women. A brand new platform was adopted which included a proposal to establish government pre-cooling and refrigeration plants, the encouragement of British farmers to settle in the province, the promotion of an aggressive program of immigration, efforts to establish better relations between capital and labor and the securing of better terms between the provincial and the Dominion Governments.

William J. Bowser, L.L.B., LL.D., K.C., of the law firm of Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge, was born in New Brunswick fifty-two years ago. He became Attorney-General in the McBride Government in 1907 and, following a quarrel with Sir Richard, he became premier when that statesman went to London as Agent-General. He made a journey to London in 1909 when he was presented at Court with Mrs. Bowser and again in 1911 after the accession of King George and Queen Mary. He now lives in Victoria where he has a beautiful home on Terrace Ave. His Government was defeated by the Liberals led by the late Mr. Brewster in December, 1916, and since that time has been leader of the opposition in the provincial House.

## Premier Borden Ill will Probably Retire

**Suffering from Complete Physical and Nervous Breakdown; Likely to be Succeeded by Sir Thomas White; Liberal Unionists Caucus.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—Sir Robert Borden is suffering from physical and nervous breakdown and is unable to attend the Unionist caucus called for this week. His physician orders complete rest.

The Liberal Unionists are today holding a caucus, the first separate caucus of its kind held since the formation of the present Government. Faced with the proposal to consolidate and establish the Unionist party and to determine their own part in it, the gathering should prove very interesting. There are 44 Liberal Unionists, one of which is the member for this district, Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V.C.

Should the counsels of the physicians prevail against those of his own colleagues and against his personal promptings, the situation which would follow the retirement of the Premier would be difficult to predict. For the first time since the Premier was taken home, the members of Parliament are frankly discussing in the corridors the prospect of his early retirement, and in the event of his retirement, the choice of leadership undoubtedly will fall upon Sir Thomas White, at present himself in semi-retirement. His is really the only name mentioned and it is believed he would accept.

## INQUEST ON DEATH OF ALFRED M'KAY

**Open Verdict Given by Local Jury Regarding Decease of Indian.**

The inquest on the death of the Indian, Alfred McKay, who died at Port Simpson last month was held in the Provincial Court Room yesterday afternoon. Dr. Cade testified that there was absolutely no evidence to show any pathological cause of death, this being difficult to ascertain as the body was not examined until some three days after death. Gertrude McKay, the fifteen year old wife of deceased, Martha Clausen, his cousin; Joshua McKay, brother; Dennie, his partner; as well as Dominion Constable Watkinson, all gave evidence.

The jury which consisted of J. E. McGuire (foreman), T. A. Roy, H. Elkins, F. Rutley, O. B. Smith and McLean brought in the following verdict: "That deceased had died on or about the 26th of August, cause of death being unknown."

## GERMANS ORDERED TO EVACUATE LITHUANIA

**Drastic Penalties Threatened by Supreme Council if Demand Refused—Serbia Ready for Peace with Austria.**

Paris, Sept. 29.—The Supreme Council has sent the German Government a note through Marshal Foch demanding the immediate and complete evacuation of Lithuania by German troops. Drastic penalties are threatened by the Supreme Council in case of non-compliance with this order.

Serbia, according to the "Petit Parisien," has now signified her readiness to sign the treaty of peace with Austria. This change of attitude is said to be due to explanations made by former Premier Passich and former minister Trumbitch, and also to a great extent by the Fiume developments.

## STEEL RAILS TWISTED BY FOREST FIRE

Vancouver, Sept. 30.—The forest fires along the line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway above Squamish are so intense that the steel rails have been twisted and melted by the heat. Great trees have fallen everywhere.

Vancouver, Sept. 30.—Forest fires are declared by Fire Warden VanDusen to be worse than ever experienced. Both along the Fraser valley and up the coast the situation is made more serious by the dry weather and winds. Telephone and telegraph wires are down in many places and the city and vicinity is under a heavy pall of smoke.

## RELIEF FOR RETURNED MEN

The City Council last night decided to grant special terms of payment to those men who went overseas and who were unable to pay their taxes on property during the time they were away. The payments will be spread over the same number of years that the property is in arrears. A soldier owing four years' taxes will have four years to make the payments without interest with the same deductions that would have been given had he paid on time.

Those paying all their taxes before the end of the year will get a 25 per cent rebate.

Mike Costello, Ed. Anderson and J. McLeod were each fined ten dollars in the police court this morning for using obscene language on the public streets. The arrest was made by Constable McGlinchy on Third Avenue.

At the council meeting last night Alderman Rochester drew attention to the condition of the road across Cow Bay. This it was explained did not belong to the city, which had no jurisdiction in the matter.

### Prince Rupert is Well Represented.

Prince Rupert is well represented in the inner councils of the Liberal party. Yesterday a despatch was received from Vancouver which stated that F. G. Dawson of this city had been appointed a member of the National Council. That is an important position, as he represents the whole of the northern and central portion of the province. From time to time it will be his duty to proceed to Ottawa and confer with W. L. Mackenzie King and the other members of the Council on matters of policy and procedure.

It is a good thing for this city to have a live man in a position of that kind. Mr. Dawson has been here as long as there has been a semblance of a city, and he knows the whole district well. He is fully acquainted with our needs and aspirations. Members of the Liberal party will feel that their affairs are safe in his hands, and those whose sympathies have not in the past been with that party and possibly still are not, will be glad to know that the general interests of Prince Rupert and the northern and central districts are being well looked after.

Mr. Dawson was formerly the owner of the Daily News, but is now free from journalistic entanglements.

### Prince Rupert is Free From Fires.

Prince Rupert is very free from fires. Last month there was not one, as was shown by the report of the fire chief to the City Council. In spite of its freedom from conflagrations the city has to pay high rates of insurance. This it seems is because of the character of the buildings. There are too few fire-breaks in the business section.

If the city could be given an assurance that a substantial reduction would be made in the rates it would pay to build a few fire walls here and there in the city. At any rate the owners of property should be encouraged to erect substantial buildings that would act as fire breaks and at the same time be a credit to the city. The Royal Bank building and the Killas building are models of what should be done and their presence has already had a considerable effect in lowering the insurance rates in their immediate neighborhood.

### Great Lack of School Facilities.

A rearrangement of classes has taken place and also a change of seats at the Methodist Church, resulting in better conditions for the pupils attending. There are now 23 pupils at the Methodist Church basement and 38 in the room in the Hays Block. These rooms are the best available but there will be another room needed by Christmas and more before the next summer holidays. While the owners have done the city a service in allowing their rooms to be used, yet the rooms were not built for public school rooms and it is not pretended that they are suited for the purpose.

What it is necessary to remember is that more provision will yet have to be made for the pupils of the schools before the new school can possibly be ready, and all the time the pupils and teachers are suffering from lack of facilities.

The Duke raised his hat and his escort looked relieved. It was a hunting party of Scotsmen on their way to Porcher Island on the good ship Eleanor Mac.

### WOULD RESTORE KING NICHOLAS TO MONTENEGRO

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Rome, Sept. 29.—It is reported here that many other Italian leaders are emulating the feat of Gabriele D'Annunzio in seizing Fiume and are marching upon Spalato and other coast towns at present without the jurisdiction of the Italian Government. These districts have been handed over to the new Jugo-Slav State by the Peace Conference although they formerly belonged to Italy before the war with Austria and have a large population of Italian people.

It is also rumored that these independent Italian forces have plans to restore King Nicholas to the throne of Montenegro, and it is alleged that the Peace Conference at Paris is plainly perturbed at the Italian situation.

Yesterday saw some rather quick action on the part of the city police officials. At 11:15 a. m. He reported that he had been relieved of \$1,000 in cash and two checks for \$100 and \$10.17.

A Japanese by the name of Z. Inone was suspected, so Chief Vickers accompanied by Muchida proceeded to the train going out and found Inone aboard ready to go east. He was arrested and searched and the money was found on his person. He was promptly taken to the city police station.

Grant Mayhood, the Stewart mining man, while out hunting across the harbor Sunday encountered two wolves near Lost Lake. He shot one of the pair, but the other got away from him. Wolves are rather unusual animals around here and it is not often a hunter encounters one.

## FRUIT STORES MAY NOW SELL FIVE POUNDS

Quantities Above That Amount Are Barred After 6:30 According to Bylaw Just Passed by Council.

When is a fruit store a fruit store and if it is not a fruit store what is it? This was one of the questions that seemed to be puzzling some of the aldermen at the meeting of the City Council at their meeting last night.

Last week it was decided that a fruit store, so far as the City Council was concerned, should be a place where fruit in larger quantities than ten pounds at a time was sold. When the bylaw came up for final reconsideration last night Alderman McRae asked to have the ten pound clause eliminated and classify the fruit store as any place where fruit was sold.

A long and discursive discussion followed in which a delegation of retail merchants, L. M. Fuller and George Munro, took part. They backed up Alderman McRae's suggestion, but the City Council refused to comply with the request, only Aldermen McRae and McMeekin voting for it. The Council then changed the ten pound limit to five pounds.

### The Delegation.

Mr. Munro, addressing the Council, said that most of the fruit sales were less than ten pounds. He was not concerned with the matter of quantity, he wanted a straight classification. If this went through a good many stores would have no classification whatever. The whole discussion was whether fruit should be sold in the evening or not. He thought they should make a proper classification and then if necessary change the closing law to conform with it. This tampering with classification would lead to trouble. The retail merchants took the stand that there should be no discrimination. If this passed it would be worse than before.

Mr. Fuller said that 99 out of 100 of the sales would be for less than ten pound lots. It was easy to split a crate of fruit in half and sell it in two lots. Each of the aldermen had something to say in regard to the clause and finally the mayor moved that the committee rise without reporting, which they did. That left the bylaw as before. Then on motion of Alderman McMeekin it was decided to go into committee once more and reduce the amount that might be sold under the classification to five pounds. Alderman Barrie was chairman of committee.

### Want Privilege.

Mayor McClelland said he thought the people wanted the privilege of buying a little fruit in the evening and the effect of the classification would be to stop them doing so unless the protecting clause was left in. The question arose did the council represent the public or the retail merchants. He was opposed to closing the stores last week and he had not changed his mind since. He thought the people had just as much right to buy a little fruit in the evening as tobacco.

Alderman Rochester also championed the evening fruit sellers and Aldermen McRae and McMeekin opposed, although the latter admitted that he thought the people wanted to be able to purchase fruit in the evening. He said that the merchants had to be considered.

As the bylaw was finally passed it reads that any store selling fruit in quantities over five pounds is a fruit store.

## COLTS OPEN SEASON BY BASKETBALL WIN

The Colts Athletic Association basketball team defeated the Red Sox yesterday by a score of ten to two. This was the first game of the season and there were few spectators but at the next match a larger crowd is expected.

The Colts carried off the honors a baseball this year and they expect to win in basketball.

Next Thursday the Colts football team plays Robert Arthur's Rangers.

## CARRIER DOVE TAKES MILLION FEET LUMBER

Sailed for Australia From Masset;  
Residents of Island Bid Adieu  
to Charles Harrison.

The fishing industries at Langara Island have closed down after a successful fishing season. After four months of trolling for spring and coho salmon the run is practically over. About one hundred and fifty gasoline launches were engaged in Hecate Straits.

Rafting and milling spruce at Buckley Bay has been discontinued until the beginning of the coming year. All of the logging crews and many residents of Buckley are now away from the islands enjoying a well-earned vacation.

The four-masted schooner Carrier Dove sailed for Adelaide, Australia, on the 25th instant, carrying one million feet of spruce. The large vessel sailed direct from Masset and was towed out of the inlet by the tug Lorne. The shipment was cut and loaded by the owners of the sawmill at Sewell.

All of the residents of New Masset assembled in the school house on the evening of the 26th instant to bid farewell to the pioneer resident of the Islands, Charles Harrison, J. P., who left for England on the last steamer. After a farewell address delivered in feeling terms by James Martin, and the reading of a letter expressing the good wishes of the residents of the island by the Indian agent, the congregation joined in singing "Auld Lang Syne." Mr. Harrison replied by thanking the people for their expression of good will and promised to again visit his adopted home, where he spent almost forty years. Dancing and singing were indulged in until the small hours of the morning, when all joined in "God Save the King" and three cheers for the "Grand Old Man of the Queen Charlotte Islands."

Messrs. Harlan J. Smith and W. Patch, respectively archaeologist and naturalist of the Dominion Government, were passengers on the Prince Albert, bound for Ottawa after spending three months on the Queen Charlotte Islands collecting specimens of the ancient work of the Haida Indians and game birds. Mr. Patch obtained forty specimens of different species of birds, while Mr. Smith shipped out a large consignment of specimens collected at Masset and other parts of the islands.

### In the Letter Box

#### QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Editor News:—It is about time someone boasted the islands a few miles from Prince Rupert. With the healthiest and best summer resort in the world at your very doors, how many people realize that we have waters where trollers are making a good living from spending a few months' vacation in their gasoline launches? How many residents of Prince Rupert visited the beaches, streams, camping and bathing places that are within eight hours of the terminus of a transcontinental railway—bringing tourists from the heated cities of the east? Are your people aware that vicious wild animals, snakes and other destructive animals do not exist on the islands across Hecate Straits? Are they aware that there is no healthier place in the world for children than these islands? Yet, ten years ago, we had fortnightly communication with Prince Rupert, and we have the same space between visits of steamers today. No wonder people will not locate in places where they cannot get in communication by mail with their friends outside, or live in isolation simply because the world does not know Prince Rupert has so many places tributary where the millions of Europe could find peace and comfort for the remainder of their days.

Where the Indians build good houses; own gasoline launches and live on the produce of the sea and land, the progressive whites, looking for homes, should raise their eyes and look at the prospect before them on the ever-green islands within a few hours' sail of Prince Rupert.—T. D.

**Synopsis of  
Land Act Amendments**

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, and one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
