British Railway Strike being Dealt with very Effectively

Trains are Running Everywhere and Motor Services between Cities have Been Organized; Preference Given to Food Trains in Ireland; Government well Equipped; Stones Thrown.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 30.—The railway strike is still confined to the railways and even there it seems to be losing ground. Indications point to a greatly increased railway service tomorrow in which volunteers, who have been constantly offering their services, will play a prominent part.

Although the strike is not operative in Ireland, the Irish railroad executive has ordered that from Wednesday only perishable goods and animals for immediate slaughter be accepted for transit. The passenger service will be reduced in order to make way for the food supplies.

Schedules prepared by the various companies show a quite respectable number of trains which are to be operating tomorrow, especially in London and the suburbs, while regular motor services are being organized between some of the big towns like Birmingham and Manchester.

Attempt to Derail Trains.

For the first time there were some attempts today to derail trains and also some stoning of them. The most determined attack occurred between Kirkaldy and Thornton where missles were thrown at the driver of a train from Aberdeen and detonators were placed on the lines. A fireman was injured from being struck by a stone.

An aspect of this strike making it different from all other strikes is that the Government is in possession of all the machinery of war in working order and available for counter measures. This includes thousands of lorries for road transport with efficient air service and other facilities virtually non-existant in pre-war days. . These, together with guns and the system of rationing, controlling the distribution and consumption of food and regulation of other things essential to public life, make the task of the Government much easier than it would otherwise be.

Government Action.

The food controller has issued a number of regulations fixing prices and restricting consumption of staple foods. The Government has invited citizens to enroll as special constables for any possible emergency and also has placed constables at various points readiness to afford protection in the event of disorders.



Pre-emption new confined to sur-Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may

arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres,

before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 8 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent resi-dence may be issued, provided applisant makes improvements to extent of same par annum and records same each

year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as for-feiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant

may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.

WATER MAIN BEING LAID TO PACIFIC SEA PRODUCTS SHED

The Utilities Committee reported to the City Council at the meeting last night, that a water main was being laid to the wharf recently taken over by the Pacific Sea Products near Seal Cove. Before doing so, however, they were guaranteed an income from the company of at least \$20 a month in water rates, that being the amount considered necessary to pay the interest and sinking fund on the outlay. These are the conditions usually exacted from anyone wishing water mains laid for a special purpose.


