## United Nations On All-Out Offensive

### Will Not be Stopped by Thirty-Eighth Parallel

TOKYO (CP) — Allied troops drove four miles into North Korea today in what the United Nations commander called "an all-out offensive."  
The Thirty-Eighth Parallel means nothing to Lt. General James A. Van Fleet, commander of the United States Eighth Army.

Van Fleet said his Army's tactics in pursuing the Reds into territory was a gamble in paying off.  
"Considerable progress" has been made.  
"The Chinese toward and the Thirty-Eighth Parallel some fronts while they stubbornly on others."  
"The Eighth Army, I believe, will not be limited by such barriers as the parallel in chasing them."



TEHRAN (CP) — Prime Minister Mohammed Mossadegh tearfully asserted today that Iran will "fight to the end" to achieve oil nationalization.

### Geoff Walsh Brigade Head

OTTAWA — Brigadier Geoffrey Walsh, C.B.E., D.S.O., 41-year-old engineer of Brantford and St. Catharines, Ont., whose Army career has taken him from Spitzbergen to China, was named today to command Canada's new 27th Brigade group and direct its preparations to serve in Europe or elsewhere.

The aged government head, interrupting guarded seclusion with which he has met threats on his life, told a press conference that only nationalization of his country's chief resource could save Iran's people.

The West, Mossadegh said, would have to write off the Middle East if the government's taking over of British-developed oil fields was stalled. Yesterday Britain was given a week to give up control.

Great Britain announced today she is sending her tough 18th parachute brigade of four thousand men to the Mediterranean island of Cyprus, within easy striking distance of Iran.

(In Berlin Gregory Pushkin, Soviet ambassador to the East German government, was reported to have told East Germans that Russia will "resist" injection of foreign troops into the Iranian crisis.)

## Powerful H-Bomb Tested

### FLASH

### Eniwetok Island Experiments "Successful"

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP) — The United States announced today that it had "successfully" carried out atomic tests at Eniwetok including some experiments that may lead to hydrogen bombs.

The announcement said that "in furtherance of the President's announcement of January 31, 1950, the test program included experiment contributing to thermonuclear weapons research."

The term "thermonuclear" refers to reactions involving the release of atomic energy through fusion of hydrogen atoms.

President Truman gave the go-ahead for the development of super H-bombs so the United States may defend itself "against any possible aggressor."

It was hinted by the United States that it had made the first tests of some kind of a hydrogen bomb, perhaps of the "Bad Bomb" variety, and said they were successful.

Language of the announcement was guarded but it seemed to indicate that the United States is at least well on the way to perfecting the most powerful weapon the world has ever known.

### Fulham Wins From Toronto

TORONTO — The touring Fulham soccer team yesterday defeated an Ontario all-star team three to nothing in an exhibition soccer match before a crowd of 8,000 persons. All goals were scored in the first half.

Superior passing provided the First Division English League team with its edge.

### Fanny Brice Has Brain Hemorrhage

LOS ANGELES — Condition of Comedienne Fanny Brice, aged 59, following a cerebral hemorrhage at her home, remains critical today. She is best known for her characterization of "Baby Snooks" on the radio.

## Truman Asks Eight and Half Billion to Meet Red Threat

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP) — President Truman yesterday asked for \$8,500,000,000 to help friendly countries to throw up a 'defensive shield against Russia.'

President Truman said that "the Soviet threat is worldwide." He was giving a message to Congress outlining a broad new foreign aid program.

He said that the Communist attack may come through "armies marching across frontiers or by internal subversion, political infiltration or sabotage."

Mr. Truman said the money will go to speed shipment of American arms and economic aid to nearly fifty friendly countries. These include Formosa, Iran and other "powder-keg" centres but the heavy accent was on Europe.

**Synopsis**  
Temperatures in the cold Pacific air which yesterday invaded the province, last night fell to freezing or close to freezing in many sections of the interior. Gradual warming will take place during the day and temperatures tonight should be several degrees warmer than those of last night. There was snow at 2500 altitude at Prince Rupert and Queen Charlotte Island area.

Skies in most sections of the province were clearing this morning but during the afternoon showers are expected to develop along most of the higher ridges.

The storm centre in the Gulf of Alaska appears to be weakening this morning and two or three days of sunny weather are expected in most sections of the province.

**Forecast**  
North coast region—Cloudy and cool with a few showers today, clearing overnight. Sunny with a few cloudy intervals Saturday. Winds—southwest (15) today, decreasing to light overnight, increasing to northwest (15) Saturday. Lows tonight and highs Saturday—at Port Hardy, 43 and 60; Sandspit and Prince Rupert, 40 and 56.

## Brief on Insurance

Special committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce will present a brief to a committee of the Legislature which will tour the province to investigate the operation of hospital insurance and conduct hearings in connection therewith. Chairman of the Chamber's committee, named at a meeting of the executive council this week, is J. T. Harvey with J. W. Scott, E. R. Gordon and Dr. R. G. Large the other members. The Chamber of Commerce is on record as protesting the increase in hospital insurance premiums and the co-insurance imposition.

Another special committee of the Chamber consisting of A. D. Vance, Dr. L. M. Greene and A. S. Nickerson will look into the possibilities of having the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Central British Columbia held in Prince Rupert now that Burns Lake has intimated that it will be unable to entertain the gathering. Suggestion has been made that one of the vessels of Union Steamship Co. might be chartered if the convention is held here. The ship would provide accommodation and also make a special cruise to Kitimat and Kemano Bay where Aluminum Co. of Canada has commenced operations in connection with its vast alumina smelter and power development project.

In connection with entertainment of delegates to the official opening of the Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. plant on June 12 a transportation committee will be headed by Hugo Kraupner. Cars will be arranged to take the delegates on a tour of the city following their arrival from Vancouver the day preceding the opening on a specially chartered voyage of the steamer Prince George. The Junior Chamber of Commerce has already undertaken to provide ten cars. Some 200 visitors are expected.

The Chamber executive also took up the matter of congestion and delay in freight handling between Vancouver and Prince Rupert and R. S. Collinson was delegated to investigate and report back.

PORHCRAWL, Wales — Charles Coe of Oklahoma City entered the final round of the British amateur golf championship today by defeating Albert Evans, a Welsh farmer, 4 and 2, in the 18-hole semi-final match today.

### Trade With China


EMOTIONAL factors, perhaps inevitably, seem to enter into any discussion of the question of a possible embargo on trade with China. The ordinary man is apt to feel that the Chinese are "the enemy" and that it is "wrong" to trade with the enemy. Then there are others whose judgment is determined by their hope that a peaceful settlement is just around the corner and can be had if only the United Nations refrain from doing anything that might irritate the Chinese.

But emotions are dangerous guides in such matters. This is a complex problem which calls for cool thinking and a cool assessment of the advantages and disadvantages of any line of action. And, first of all, it seems necessary to get it clear what we are thinking about, because words like "embargo" and "blockade" are being loosely and indiscriminately used to describe three quite distinct things. These are: first, the so-called "selective embargo," the decision not to export to China any of the goods which are now called "strategic materials" and used to be called "contraband of war"; secondly, the complete embargo, the cessation of exports to China of every sort and kind; thirdly, the blockade, the use of naval forces to prevent the sending by sea to China of goods from any source whatever.

The selective embargo is the proposal which is now under consideration at Lake Success. The member states of the United Nations are being invited to stop the shipment to China of arms, ammunition, implements of war, petroleum and items useful in the production of weapons of war.

The view now generally being accepted is that both a general embargo and a naval blockade are policies to be avoided, since they would do far more harm than good; but that the policy of the restricted embargo—the denial so far as possible to China of all overseas supplies of war materials for her troops in Korea—is the one which should be adopted.

#### LAY 1800 A DAY

HANOVER, GERMANY.—We were amazed when we visited Germany two years ago to find that, even while the cities lay in ruins, Germany was offering for sale manufactured goods with which no other European country could beat, or easily equal.

There were at that time trade fairs on in Britain and here in Hanover. Our observation was that the German range and quality was quite as good as the British—and the prices were definitely lower.

Now the contrasts are even more striking. Today we visited the great continental fair grounds—and on the eve of the 1951 exhibition they claim here that this fair has already grown greater than the famed Leipzig affair, which, they say here, has gone swiftly downhill since the Russian occupation of Eastern Germany.

We have no way of knowing whether such is quite true. But even my layman's eye can plainly see why the reviving Germany is getting more and more of the world's business.

THEY ARE ON THE job here. They have technical plants as good as any in the world. And they have a very high technical know-how.

But also, they know how to buckle in and work—right down at the level where it counts. From my hotel window I look out on the main square in this town. A block away is a big luxury hotel, with a famous name. Just a year ago there was only a heap of rubble where that famed hotel again stands—now

several stories high. They desperately needed the space to accommodate the foreign trade buyers coming to the trade fair. Two weeks before last year's opening they started to build. They were actually doing business—two weeks later—on the first two hotel floors.

I AM ASSURED HERE that it is not unusual for a bricklayer to lay 1800 (eighteen hundred) bricks per day—which is about double what trade union restriction would permit in many Western countries.

(In New York a couple of years back, I was investigating this same matter, and the average there was around five hundred per day.)

Maybe what is going up here in Germany is what we call jerry-built, maybe it is pretty shoddy stuff. If so, you can't tell it from looking at it.

THEY TELL ME THAT poverty is still harsh and widespread here. Unemployment stands at about 16 percent of the total working force in some cities in the western zones. As it happened, we had to spend three very-early-morning hours in the railroad station here, waiting to clear our baggage through customs. There were hundreds of people in the crowded waiting room who had obviously spent most of the night there.

I first thought they were rotters who liked to sit up all night drinking beer. But on talking to some of them, I found that some were refugees from the Russian zones—some were travellers who could not afford a room or hotel.

ONE NOTABLE DIFFERENCE IN Germany between the 1949 and 1951, scenes is that far fewer Allied occupation troops are in evidence.

It is no military secret that there are more, not fewer, Allied soldiers here than there were in 1949. Hence I can only conclude that they are on more of an "alert" footing. That is, more of them must be out on the military front lines, for they just aren't around the towns in such numbers. The British troops you do see look very young, and a little lonely.

TWO YEARS AGO, THE GERMAN people seemed to me to be in a most confused and bewil-

dered state of mind. They don't impress me that way now. Two years ago, women glared at my window—shopping wife. Few smile at foreigners now—but none glare.

I have a hunch that the more politically highly educated Germans are laughing up their sleeves at the predicament of the Western Allies. They are letting us stew in our own juice. Are the Germans the prisoners of the Allies? Or are the Allies the prisoners of the Germans? The Germans know perfectly

well that the Western Allies must not only keep Western Germany strong and safe in the Western camp. But they also know that the Allies have to keep on coming across with the funds to keep them strong and prosperous here. They are playing a (so far) polite game of mild blackmail.

Later in this series, I shall discuss the political situation here—for we are here on the very eve of the Lower Saxony election, which will show whether a Second Nazi rise is or is not a possibility.


