## PROHIBITION AGAIN BEFORE PARLIAMENT

Speculation as to What Action the Senate Will Take on This Occasion.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—(p.m.) Hon. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, this afternoon introduced a re-prohibition bill for the purpose of dealing with inter-provincial trade in liquor after the new Treaty is formally declared complete.

At the last session a bill was introduced by the House of Commons during the closing days before prorogation, continuing the present regulations until further legislation should be passed. This was thrown out by the Senate.

It is not known what action will be taken by the Senate on this occasion, but it is expected that they will deal drastically with it. Many prohibitionists, however, are of opinion that the bill will be accepted by the Senate as they say it would be a victory for the Government to introduce legislation if they were to be thrown out by the Senate.

Such action, they point out, would be simply camouflage for the express purpose of fooling the "dry" section of the electorate. For that reason they say they feel confident the Senate will be more lenient on this occasion.

## MARTIAL LAW IN CHICAGO

Chicago, October 7.—Martial law has been declared within a radius of five miles from East Chicago, Indiana, by Adjutant General Smith.

Major General Wood, in command of Federal troops, has issued an order placing the town under martial law.

## ANY PASSENGERS ON PRINCE GEORGE

Bound Through to Anyox and Stewart, and Others For Up the Line.

The Prince George arrived in this morning promptly at 10. Fine weather was reported locally, although a southwest wind was encountered in Charlotte Sound.

The George had a good passenger list. As well as some local passengers there were quite a number of passengers for the north and others were on their way to Stewart and Anyox. She had her usual calls at Swanson and Ocean Falls where she discharged considerable freight and a few passengers.

## INQUIRY REGARDING DEATH OF INDIAN

An inquiry is to be held on the body of the Metlakatla Indian who was drowned at Seal Cove at the end of the week. On the day of the Indian search party the body here yesterday the body was taken away to Metlakatla because they had a chance to get it to the wharf. The case was turned over to the provincial police and Constable Logan went yesterday afternoon to investigate. Although the body cannot have been in the water for more than two or three days it is ready in an advanced stage of decomposition.

## SEVERE STORM IN MOUNTAINS

Weather Has Been Severe Both in Kitwanga Neighborhood and Also East of Prince George.

There have been some severe storms in the mountains in the neighborhood of Kitwanga and also farther east on the railway. Between Prince George and Edmonton the severity of the weather has been interfering a good deal with telegraphic communication. Trees have been thrown across the wires and long stretches have been "injured" by the effect of the storms.

## FINED FOR GAMBLING AT NEW WESTMINSTER PROVINCIAL FAIR

Vancouver, October 8.—Following a complaint of a clergyman's daughter of gambling at the recent New Westminster Provincial fair, James Angell was in the police court yesterday fined \$50. The charge was that he conducted a game at the fair.

## TAKE MANY YEARS TO RESTORE MINES OF NORTHERN FRANCE

Paris, October 7.—The commission of German experts following a visit to the mines of northern France, declare that it will take from eight to nine years to restore them to their former condition.

## MOVE NEWSPAPER PLANT TO SEATTLE

'Ed. C. Russell, publisher of the Alaska Dispatch at Juneau, passed south this morning on the Princess Mary. He is moving the whole of the newspaper plant to Seattle where he intends to publish the paper specializing on Alaska news.

There is now only one paper in Juneau, the Daily Empire. It is a newsy eight-page sheet that seems to serve the people well.

## NINE INCHES OF SNOW AT SKAGWAY

The Princess Mary arrived from Alaska ports at 7 o'clock this morning, about thirty-six hours late. She had a heavy cargo of freight for Skagway on her last trip north and also spent considerable time at Ketchikan loading fish, but the chief cause for her delay was a terrific snow storm at Skagway. There is nine inches of snow on the ground there. The coming of winter brings the great outrush of people from the Yukon country and the Mary had a big passenger list southbound.

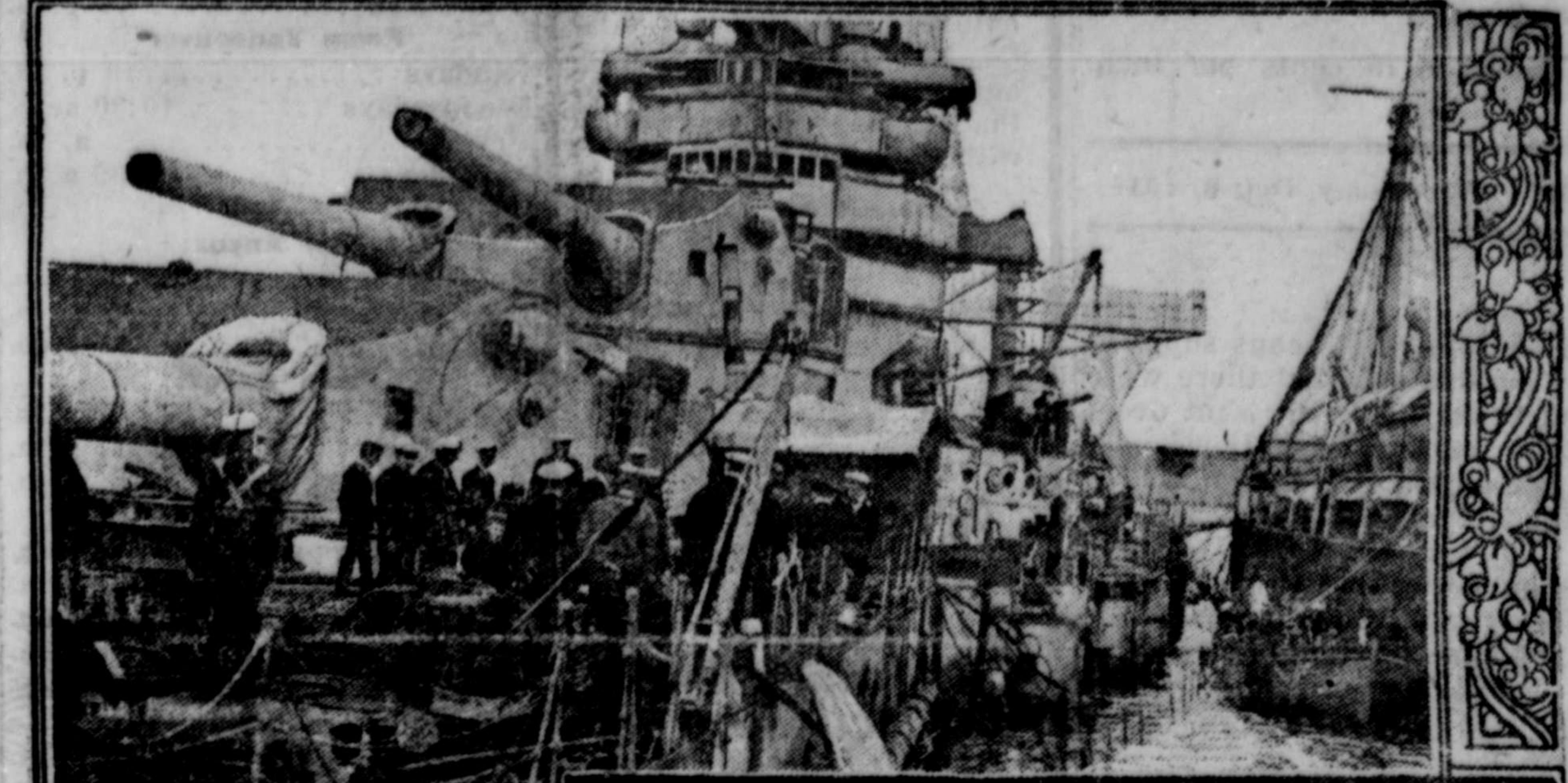

## CHICAGO GETS FIFTH GAME

After an Intensely Exciting Match Yesterday the White Sox Won.

Cincinnati, October 7.—With a final score of 5 to 4, the White Sox this afternoon turned the tables once more on the leaders in the world championship series. The winners made ten hits and three errors, while the losers made eleven hits but no errors.

When the ninth inning was completed and still the two teams were tied, the excitement among the thirty thousand spectators was intense. Everyone was strung to the highest pitch and when the final run that cinched the game was made, the fans from the Windy City yelled themselves hoarse.

## NEW WHARF AT MASSET NEARLY IS COMPLETED

W. T. Meuse, Who Has the Contract, Will Return to Prince Rupert Soon—Other Work on Inlet.

Masset, Q. C. I., Oct. 8.—Good progress is being made by W. T. Meuse on the new wharf which is being built by the Dominion Government at New Masset. The work is almost completed and in about two weeks the contractor will be returning to Prince Rupert. The old wharf gave way last winter when a steamer was discharging cargo and some of the goods on it at the time were lost. The new wharf is a very good one and is of a permanent character.

At Old Masset repairs are being made to the wharf, the piles being replaced with creosoted material that will withstand the ravages of the teredo.

At Port Clements the wharf is being put in shape, the piles that are beginning to weaken being replaced by some that have been treated with creosote. This will put all the wharves on the northern part of Graham Island in good condition. The work is being done by day labor.

## 'PAULINE' IS RELATIVE OF LOCAL LADY

Maid of Late Edith Cavell Cousin of Mrs. Will Edmunds of This City.

"Pauline," the maid of the famous Edith Cavell, who was so atrociously murdered by the Germans, is a second cousin of Mrs. Will Edmunds of this city. Mrs. Edmunds, on looking through a recent issue of the "Daily Sketch" was much surprised to see her cousin's picture occupying the front cover of the magazine.

"Pauline," whose real name is Miss Randall, was with Edith Cavell in Brussels at the time of her murder and it is expected that she will be in a position to give very valuable evidence in the trial of Quieu who is alleged to have betrayed the martyred nurse.

Miss Randall, before the war, was a circus rider, but answered the call and volunteered her services to the army and thus became so intimately connected with Nurse Cavell. She is at present a nursemaid to a doctor's family in St. Albans.

## LEXINGTON RAMMED BY A SUBMARINE

Closing of Watertight Bulkheads Saved Her from Sinking and Possible Loss of Life.

New York, Oct. 7.—Quick action on the part of the crew in closing the watertight collision bulkhead of the steamer Lexington, prevented possible loss of life when she was rammed by United States submarine O-7 in the treacherous waters of Hell Gate Channel in upper East River.

**Should Probe and Punish Offenders.**

If it is true, as D. D. McKenzie charges, that beans supplied to the soldiers by a Canadian firm were bad and that there were quantities of stones in the pork and beans that were sent overseas, there should be some law that would punish those who were guilty of the offense. At any rate an inquiry should be held and the offending firm given all the odium that comes from publicity.

The fact that the goods were supplied to the British Government and not to the Canadian Government should make the authorities all the more keen on upholding the honor of the country.

**Cultivate the Prince Rupert Spirit.**

At the time of the big Seattle fair some years ago the merchants there sold a little non-collapsible doll to visitors which they called "The Seattle Spirit" because it would not down. In Prince Rupert we are beginning to cultivate a Prince Rupert Spirit. It is showing itself in various ways, and the more it spreads the better it will be for the town. The spirit of civic pride, the desire to build on a sure and sane foundation, the desire to co-operate even with those whom personally we do not like; these are manifestations of the Prince Rupert spirit which will weld the community into a united whole and bring success.

**Summer is Past And Autumn Here.**

Summer is past and there is that tang in the air which makes for better work, for achievement. It is the fall of the year, but it is the rising time in the matter of doings. People walk with brisker step. They greet each other with a tone that indicates something doing.

These are the days when people get an opportunity for study. There are long evenings, steadily lengthening for more than two months yet, and the young man who is wise will employ himself in some course of improvement. It is not enough to read popular magazines. A regular course of study for a set purpose is the way to improve.

Churches will now be arranging for the winter work of their societies. They will try to amuse and instruct. People today are hungry for information on matters pertaining to life. They read books on religion, on science, and on technical work, as well as articles on philosophy. It is a pity that in Prince Rupert we have not been able to provide to any extent for those who wish to do this.

We need a public library. It is one of the outstanding needs of the city. In the big cities today it is the experience of librarians that people are wanting to know. The city authorities are the ones who should provide for the satisfying of that want.

**Welding People into A United Whole.**

Some figures published yesterday showed that there were an immense number of people of other than British origin living in this country. In that respect we resemble the United States. We are a mixed people and the work of the present generation will be to unite them.

By giving us a say in the Peace Conference we have been recognized as a nation. Now the work comes of uniting that nation and making it a good working unit. It will come chiefly by education. Children who are educated in the public schools grow up Canadians almost invariably. They have a national spirit. The teachers are largely responsible for that. The extent to which they realize their responsibility in this matter will gauge the success they will have and the benefit the nation will reap.

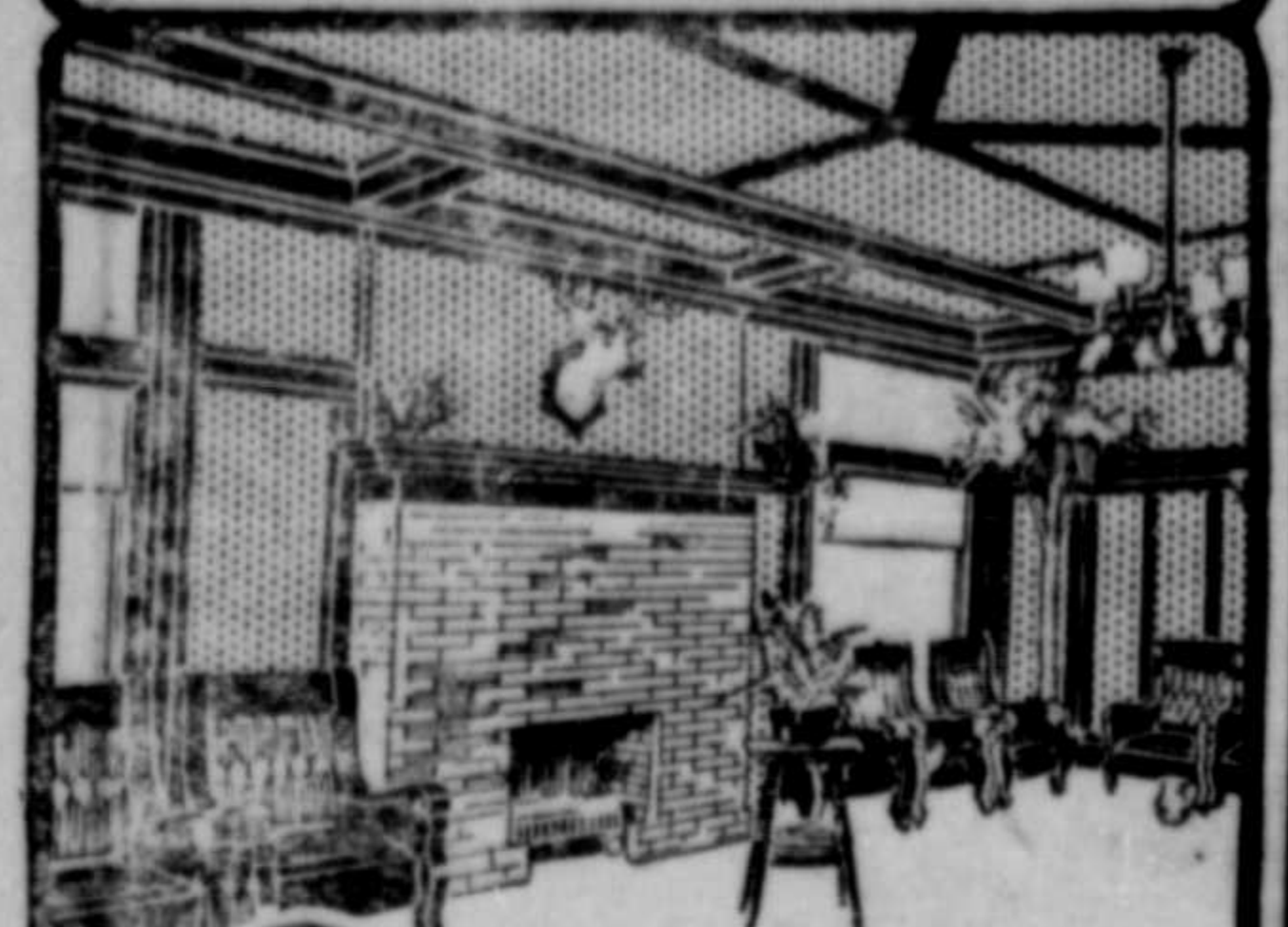

## THE TURMOIL AT OTTAWA

J. K. Munro Writes Interestingly  
of Canadian Politics in Mc-  
Lean's Magazine.

Under the heading of "The  
Turmoil at Ottawa," J. K. Munro  
writes most interestingly in Mc-  
Lean's Magazine of political af-  
fairs as he sees them. He may  
be right or wrong but he is al-  
ways interesting. He says:  
"Canadian politics are in the  
melting pot. New parties are be-  
ing born, old ones are remodeling  
their creeds to meet new and  
changed conditions. It is moving  
day all round and the common or  
peanut variety of politician is  
holding his breath till he dis-  
covers whether the coming order  
of things has a place for him and,  
if so, at how much.

"Yes it is a much muddled  
mess that meets your eye no mat-  
ter which way you look. Let it  
rest for a moment on the Union  
Government and what do you  
find? Of course Sir Robert Bor-  
den is still there and still working  
industriously at his old job of  
doing nothing. Time was, not so  
many months ago either, when  
there were hopes that Sir Robert  
might follow his favorite occupa-  
tion in another if not higher  
sphere. You'll remember when  
Sir Thomas White was cultivat-  
ing popularity with the common  
herd of statesmen, when with a  
handshake like unto that of the  
Prince of Wales he was worming  
his way into the heart of Parlia-  
ment, and the while the members  
went to bed softly humming 'His  
Bright Smile Haunts Me Still'?

Well in those sunny spring days  
Sir Robert really could see his  
household furniture being moved  
from the Washington of the North  
to that other city that spends  
much time trying to make amends  
for the lies the man it was named  
after could not tell. Yes, Sir  
Robert dreamed he was going to  
be British Ambassador to Wash-  
ington. And others believed that  
dream. Even as astute a states-  
man as Lord Beaverbrook whis-  
pered to friends that Sir Robert  
was on his way and that another  
would soon hold the reins at Ot-  
tawa. But alas and likewise  
alack, something slipped. Whether  
it was that training as a consti-  
tutional lawyer does not fit a  
man for a diplomatic career, or  
that too many Englishmen whose  
incomes had been eaten up by  
war taxes had to be supplied with  
jobs; or that somebody in England  
had dined with Sir Robert and  
discovered that solemnity and  
stolidity, even when surmounted  
with the nicest hair in all the  
political world, does not every-  
where pass for international in-  
telligence, matters not. It is  
enough to know that Sir Robert  
did not go to Washington, that  
he did come back to us and that  
there is no immediate prospect of  
a change."

Mr. Munro touches up all the  
politicians who have appeared to  
the fore of late and concludes in  
part as follows:  
"But not content with letting  
the future look after itself politi-  
cal seers are also trying to figure  
what the next Parliament will  
look like. So we may as well  
stand off to one side and take a  
look at that too, providing Sir  
Robert Borden still lives and his  
Unionist baby is able to sit up  
and take a little nap when the  
nest comes. You'll admit that he  
won't make any inroads in Quebec  
You will also hazard a prediction  
that the Maritimes won't lean any  
stronger towards Unionism. Con-  
sequently Hon. Mackenzie King  
should come up to the Ottawa  
River with 75 to 80 seats. But  
west of that he'll dwindle away  
to dribs and drabs and will prob-  
ably appear at the barrier with  
about ninety odd followers all  
told. And at that he'll probably  
have the largest and most com-  
pact following in the New House.  
Hon. J. A. Crerar and his farmers  
should sweep the West from the  
Lakes to the Mountains with the  
exception of a few ridings in  
Southern Manitoba. They will  
also cut some figure in Ontario  
where, according to unbiased  
students, they will carry about  
twenty-five seats. There are 235  
seats in the House. Giving the  
Liberals 90 seats and the Farmers  
30 seats there would be left 85  
seats to be divided among the  
Unionists, straight Conservatives,  
Labor men and returned soldiers.  
All of which would indicate that  
Sir Robert Borden is justified in  
hanging on to his job till he can  
at least find places of honor and

## HUMPS BY THOUSAND IN EASTERN RIVERS

Pacific Salmon are increasing in Atlantic Waters, According to Latest Report.

Washington, D. C., October 8.—Secretary of Commerce Redfield received the following report from the Commissioner of Fisheries respecting the attempts of the Bureau of Fisheries to establish Pacific humpback salmon runs in Maine waters:

There is now in progress a run of humpbacks in the section between the Penobscot River and Passamaquoddy Bay. Quite a number of fish have been caught or observed at the dam in the Penobscot River at Bangor, but the principal run is in Passamaquoddy Bay and streams tributary thereto, especially in Dennys River and Pembroke River.

The herring weirs in Passamaquoddy Bay are taking considerable numbers of humpbacks, and it was reported some days ago that an Eastport herring fisherman had a boatload of humpbacks which were sold at 16 cents a pound, and more recent reports that these fish are bringing fishermen 20 cents a pound are being retailed at 40 to 50 cents a pound. One of the bureau's superintendents who has been investigating on the spot says that people who have eaten humpbacks claim them to be as good as Atlantic salmon. This is probably true of the fish just coming in from the sea, but rapid deterioration of the flesh ensues when the humpbacks enter fresh water.

The Bureau is making arrangements to take humpback runs on both Dennys and Pembroke Rivers, and there is reason to believe that the work will be successful. A card just received from a fisherman at Bangor says: "The humps are coming by the thousand."

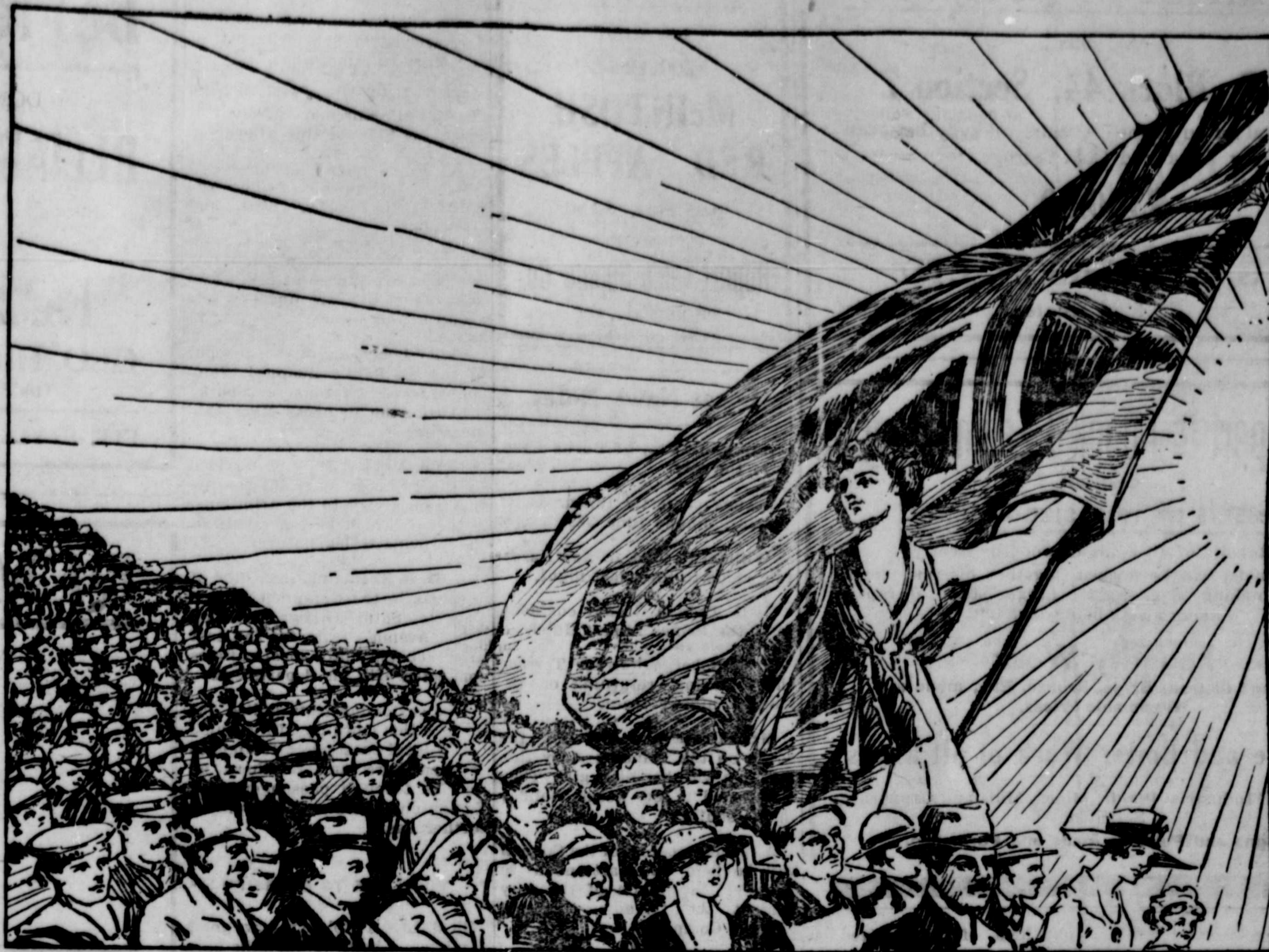
