

MASSET NEARLY IS COMPLETED

W. T. Meuse, Who Has the Contract, Will Return to Prince Rupert Soon -- Other Work on Inlet.

Masset, Q. C. I., Oct. 8 .- Good progress is being made by W.T. Meuse on the new wharf which is heing built by the Dominion Government at New Masset. The work is almost completed and in about two weeks the contractor will be returning to Prince Rupert. The old wharf gave way last winter when a steamer was discharging cargo and some of the goods on it at the time were lost. The new wharf is a very good one and is of a permanent character.

At Old Masset repairs are being made to the wharf, the piles being replaced with creosoted material that will withstand the ravages of the teredo.


