## Nationalization of Mines is Refused

### Premier Lloyd George met Representatives of Labor and in long Speech Told Why

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 10.—The demands of the British miners, endorsed by the General British Trades Union Congress, for the nationalization of the coal mines were laid before the Prime Minister by representatives of the Parliamentary Committee of the Trades Union Congress of the Miners Federation.

The Premier spoke for one hour and made it clear the Government was not prepared to accept the recommendations of the coal commission headed by Sir John Sankey to acquire and run the mines as state property.

## DRYDOCK BUSY OVERHAULING FISHING BOATS

### Work Proceeding on Hull of Ship the Keel of Which Was Recently Laid.

Two fishing boats, the Sumner and the Sitka, belonging to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. are at present in the drydock undergoing general overhauling, preparatory to setting out on their long winter fishing voyages. The drydock officials expect to handle a number of these larger fishing boats this winter, as there will be many of them plying in and out of Prince Rupert.

Work is busy going on at the shipbuilding plant. There are over two hundred men at present employed there and more are being taken on. Work is being done on the hull of the ship, the keel of which was laid by the Governor General during his recent visit here, and the staff report that another keel will be laid within the next thirty days.

The working of the shipyard this winter will mean a lot to the city generally and the public in general feel more contented and satisfied now that their fond hopes of ships being turned out here is to be realized. It will be certainly another red letter day in the history of Prince Rupert when the first hull is launched, as was when the first keel-plate was laid.

## FIRST CLASS FISH LOWER

### Second Class Halibut Fetches a Higher Price, However, at Exchange Today.

The price of first class fish has gone down a point or two, but the second class was considerably higher at this morning's Fish Exchange, so the average for the catches sold was as high as ever. The following are the catches and prices at the sale:

Vancouver, 27,000 pounds, sold to the Royal Fisheries at 17.8c and 18c.

Liberty, 24,000 pounds, sold to the Royal Fisheries at 17.9c and 18c.

Rainier, 3,000 pounds; Niagara, 4,000, and Maghnel, 8,000 pounds, at 18c and 19c., sold to the Atlin Fisheries.

Venus, 11,000; C. & C., 3,000; Cuba, 5,000 lbs., sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. for 17c. and 18c.

The Andrew Kelly arrived last night with 70,000 pounds of trawl fish for her owners, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company.

Secretary Nickerson of the Prince Rupert Housing, Ltd., has obligated itself to loan \$15,000 although all of that amount has not yet been paid out. There will be something like \$7,000 available over and above that amount.

## PROFITEERS IN ENGLISH FISH

### Alleged That Immense Percentage Was Made By Retailers at Grimsby.

London, October 10.—England has been looking into the problem of fish profiteering. The special correspondent of the Manchester Guardian at Grimsby says that inquiries among the fish traders regarding profiteering among retail fish mongers of restriction of sales and the consequent loss of much valuable food, meet with an indorsement of these charges that is often embarrassingly emphatic.

"It is admitted," he says, "that under the control of the last two years trawl owners, wholesalers and retailers have had no cause to cavil at the profits they have made, but retailers have aroused resentment in the trade by attempting to apply to a period of plenty practices calculated to maintain the prices of a period of scarcity.

"So it is said, and indeed there would seem to be little doubt that the trouble of continued high prices to the consumer begins and ends with the refusal of the retailers to be induced by greater supplies and lower prices at the ports to increase their own supplies and lower their own charges accordingly. Whether haddock cost two shillings or ten shillings a stone (last week they dropped as low as sixpence per stone), the price per pound to the consumer remains very much the same, the retailer taking the extra profit of 300 to 700 per cent as his due.

### More Fish Than Ever.

"The most remarkable fact that emerges is that more fish is now available for consumption in this country than was available before the war. The results from the rapid return of the fishing industry to normal and the temporary closing down of the large continental trade. Thousands of tons of cured fish were sent to Spain, Portugal, Italy and South America before the war, and large quantities of fresh fish were sent to Antwerp and Hamburg. It would seem that the community is the victim of a partial return to the competitive system, which lay dormant during the war, but which was the public's best protection against high prices in the days of peace. Normal conditions have revived the proverbial "cut-throat competition" in the wholesale market, where every man is out to undercut his neighbor. Thus we have the spectacle of wholesalers fighting for the custom of retailers who may buy the cheapest fish, but sell it (having no serious competition at their own doors) at something like the old famine prices."

## NO SHORTAGE OF LIQUOR IN THE FUTURE

### Government Agent to Supply the Drug Stores of Prince Rupert at Wholesale.

Victoria, Oct. 10.—The provincial government has shipped a supply of liquor to Prince Rupert to the government agent there in order that he may keep the drug stores supplied. He will not be permitted to supply liquor direct to purchasers, but only through the drug stores.

Some time ago a petition was received from residents of Prince Rupert asking for the establishment of a government dispensary at that place. Owing to the comparatively small amount of business there the government could not see its way clear to comply with that request, but authorized the drug stores to sell liquor to those securing a prescription from a doctor. Then the drug stores ran short and word was received from Prince Rupert that the people there were dry and that even for medicine there was no liquor to be secured.

Representations were made to the Government and as a result they have decided to allow the government agent to keep a stock of liquor with which to supply the drug stores of that city.

## FLYING PARSON MET CAPTAIN

### Competitors in Reliability Race Pass Each Other in Air.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—Eastbound and westbound fliers met in the air at North Platte, Nebraska, today in the transcontinental reliability race and tonight Lieut. B. W. Maynard, the "flying parson," was at Cheyenne, Wyoming, hundreds of miles ahead of the other westbound aviators, while Capt. L. Smith, well in the lead of the contingent from the west was at Omaha for the night.

## PROHIBITION WILL CARRY

### So Says C. H. Orme in Regard to Vote Being Taken in Ontario; Election Uncertain.

Prohibition will carry by a large majority in Ontario, but politics are more uncertain, and it is hard to tell whether or not the Ontario Government will be returned. This is the opinion of C. H. Orme, the local druggist who went east to attend the funeral of his mother at London, Ontario. Mr. Orme was away for five weeks.

Mr. Orme says everything is "tip top" in Ontario, everyone being prosperous, but even at that things do not look as good as they do here. Mr. Orme sees more opportunity here than at any point he visited while away.

Speaking of the coming elections in Ontario, Mr. Orme says that there are so many cross currents such as the farmers' votes, the soldiers' votes and the various other factions that make the election a very uncertain one. Of one thing he feels sure, however, and that is that prohibition will carry.

Mrs. Orme arrived home with Mr. Orme last night.

## CALIFORNIA SHIPMENTS ACCEPTED

### Dried Fruits and Other Products From Western States May Now Come North.

G. W. Nickerson Co., the local brokers, have received word that the Pacific Steamship Co. is preparing to accept shipments from San Francisco to Victoria or Vancouver. This will allow shipments of dried fruit and other goods on order to get through.

Owing to the action of the United States Government Shipping Board refusing to advance the wages, there has been a shipping strike on the U. S. Pacific coast, and it was impossible to secure shipments from California by boat, and rail shipments are too expensive. This notification of the shipping company is taken to indicate that the strike is no longer effective.

## CHINAMEN THROUGH RUPERT FROM THE PORTS OF ALASKA

Thirty-three Chinamen, belonging to the United States, arrived here last night on the Tilamook, en route to Seattle. These Chinamen have spent the summer at Barnes' Cannery at Ketchikan. From the Tilamook they were transferred to the Prince George, on which vessel they continued their voyage.

It is not very often American Chinamen come out from Alaska via Canadian ports, as they generally travel on American vessels. Last year there was only one batch of them came through here and it is expected that there will be no more here this year.

Special track has to be kept of them by the immigration authorities, as they are each subject to a five hundred dollar head tax on entering this country, so the steamer officials have to keep their eyes open that none of them debark here.

Some of them will go as far as San Francisco, for they are free to travel as they wish when they again reach American territory. Some of them were booked first class, but the most of them travel steerage.

## RUPERT BEING DISCUSSED BY RAILWAYMEN

### Meeting of Officials at Edmonton to Consider Increased Business Problems.

There was a general get-together meeting of officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway at Edmonton commencing on Monday last for the purpose of discussing the methods of handling the greatly increased traffic over the line and planning for the future developments. There were about fifty at the meeting. According to A. E. Rosevear, general freight agent for the company with headquarters at Winnipeg, Pacific coast questions were to be thoroughly gone into and recommendations made relative to the coastwise steamer service, additional steamers and facilities to take care of the increased business, realizing that the port of Prince Rupert, of which Edmonton is the inland connecting link, is going ahead by leaps and bounds.

### Increased Lumber Traffic.

The question of handling increased traffic will also be discussed and in this connection, a large number of new saw mills have been constructed along the line of the G. T. P.

In addition to this, a conference is to be held with representatives of the passenger, operating and other departments, with the object of discussing questions of co-operation. The question also of assisting the Canadian wheat board of the Dominion government and the seed grain commission in obtaining seed wheat, will be dealt with. This is considered a vital necessity, especially in the drought area. Farmers must be distributed with seed wheat in the spring.

The question of industrial development will also be discussed fully to so devise ways of obtaining good farmers to settle on lands adjacent to the Grand Trunk Pacific railway. In this regard it is announced there has been a very large movement of new settlers into British Columbia.

This church is the first built in the valley and the opening service was attended by over fifty of the pioneer settlers. Rev. J. H. Kerr, the clergyman in charge, assisted the Bishop and also presented two candidates for confirmation.

In the evening there was a harvest thanksgiving service. The crops of wheat and oats this season were the largest in the history of the Pouce Coupe district.

**Easy Way of Financing House.**

A good many Prince Rupert people who are mechanically inclined have been building their own houses. They spend their spare time nailing boards instead of playing ball. They have found it to be a good kind of recreation, and as a result they have acquired a house without having to pay for it.

By borrowing the money and paying it back in instalments they have paid the same as rent all the time and eventually they will own their own houses.

This method of house building is one that might commend itself to a good many more people. A good many are not aware that they can build in that way. Given a cheap lot and the rest is easy.

**Conservative View of Coalition.**

Away back in July J. S. Willison, until recently editor of the Conservative Toronto News, writing in the Canadian Magazine spoke against a coalition government as a general policy. He said:

"Disraeli said that England did not love coalitions. There is not much in the practice of free, constitutional government that Great Britain has not tested. If the judgment of the British people is against coalitions it is because the fruits are faction, irresponsibility, instability, sectionalism and parochialism. They know, because they have learned by experience, in Canada experience is teaching the same lesson. It was perhaps wise and necessary that in the desperate emergency of war all partisan considerations and interests should be set aside in the Mother Country and in Canada. This was not done in the United States, where as great unity of sentiment in support of all military and patriotic objects was developed and maintained as in other countries. But the constitution of the United States, designed to assure popular sovereignty and guard against military despotism, lends itself to autocracy and concentration of effort in war. In war George the Third was not so great an autocrat as was Woodrow the First. Nor do the experiences of the United States in the Civil War and in the Great War necessarily condemn the American constitution.

"If coalitions are valuable in emergencies they do not ensure orderly and responsible government. At Ottawa we begin to have legislation by rhetoric or, as has been said, government by explosion. A score of extremists to the right of the Speaker, uniting with the Opposition, may impose any revolutionary measure or any empirical project upon the country. The Cabinet must submit, resign or order a dissolution of Parliament. The situation would be even less satisfactory if Mr. McKenzie, who leads the Opposition, did not display a considerable degree of common sense and steadiness. Under the two-party system there is some assurance that the common sentiment of the country will be expressed in legislation. Under a coalition, sectionalism thrives and the national interest is subordinated to personal considerations and passing political exigencies. Ministers lie upon a bed of torment and a sense of insecurity pervades the country."

## HOSPITAL DRIVE IN NEAR FUTURE

Special General Meeting Decides to Raise Funds Locally—Rates of Rooms Lowered.

At the special general meeting of the Hospital Board held in the council chamber last night it was decided on the suggestion of Dr. Kergin to recommend to the board of directors that the rates of private rooms be set at \$25 a week and \$30 a week. At a previous meeting the rooms had been advanced from \$20 and \$25 respectively to \$25 and \$35.

It was also decided to increase the membership in the Hospital Association from one dollar a year to five dollars a year and to institute a campaign for funds in the near future, the president to appoint a committee to have charge of the campaign.

In discussing the matter of hospital rates for private rooms, Dr. Kergin explained that raising the rates for the rooms would work a hardship on many who had absolutely no conveniences at home for maternity cases yet who could not afford to pay the increased rate. There were only two of the lower priced rooms, but eight at the higher price. He thought the revenue should be raised from the city or the province.

#### More Than Right.

W. E. Williams agreed that they were charging more than was right, but they had approached the City Council on the matter of an extra grant and while it was agreed that the city should pay up their indebtedness to the institution the estimates had already been made up and no extra grant could be expected this year. He thought it was a shame to charge the rates they did. The hospital should be financed by the city and the Government. The latter had done its share but the city had not. He thought that next year if the city would pay a per capita of 65c. they could break even.

The resolution recommending the lower rates was moved by Dr. Kergin and seconded by L. W. Patmore and carried unanimously.

A rather long discussion followed in regard to raising funds in the city and it was finally decided, on the motion of Judge Young, seconded by D. G. Stuart, that the membership fee be raised to \$5 and a special hospital drive take place in the near future.

The Taylor Company has the mining property well in hand now, under the supervision of some returned soldier experts, and is taking out large quantities of ore.

TWO PER CENT TRUST FORMED IN VANCOUVER

Vendors of Soft Drinks Bound Themselves Together for Mutual Protection.

Vancouver, October 10.—A two per cent trust is being formed here for protecting the interests of retailers who vend two per cent beer and other soft drinks. Temporary officers have already been chosen and steps taken to oppose a proposed measure of the City Council to confine the selling of two per cent to bars of hotels.

Quiet pressure has been brought to bear on the Council by the hotels of the city to have the trade which once was theirs brought back. As there are hundreds of vendors of soft drinks in the city outside the bars, the proposed action would injure a great many of the small retailers. It is to protect themselves against this and other inroads on their business that the new association is being formed.

The Vancouver City Council is very favorable to any of the big interests of the city. It is the same council that put the jitneys out of business in order to foster the interests of the B. C. Electric Railway Co., but they have been asked to stay their hand in regard to two per cent legislation until such time as the other vendors can make themselves heard.
