London, October 10.—The demands of the British miners, endorsed by the General British Trades Union Congress, for the nationalization of the coal mines were laid before the Prime Minister by representatives of the Parliamentary Committee of the Trades Union Congress of the Miners Federation.

The Premier spoke for one hour and made it clear the Government was not prepared to accept the recommendations of the coal commission headed by Sir John Sankey to acquire and run e mines as state property.

Thorough endorsation of the Victory Loan, 1919, is expressed by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, eader of the Liberal party in the Dominion, in a letter addressed to the Minister of Finance, Sir Henry Drayton. This is his letter:

"My dear Sir Henry,-I am pleased to join with you in commending the Victory Loan to the people of Canada.

"It is imperative that Canada's redits should be maintained.

"As the Government finds that borrowing is a necessity to meet! existing obligations, it is in every way desirable that the amount required should, if possible, be raised within Canada itself. hope, therefore, that this loan may be over-subscribed by citizens of the Dominion.

"You appreciate, of course, that in expressing a desire to see the loan a success, such obligation as may have in the matter of criticizing unnecessary and extravagant expenditures, is increased rather than lessened, and this endorsation is given upon your assurance that the organization of the campaign and everything about it is absolutely and entirely non-political.




While enjoying the pleasure your paper affords last night, I came to the letter of a person who styles himself "Christian."

The Expenditure of \$610,000,000

How the last Victory Loan was spent

DEFORE buying Victory Bonds again you may want to know how Canada used the money you loaned her last year.

Canada borrowed the money to carry on the war and to provide credits for Great Britain and our Allies.

ONSIDERABLY more than one-half of the Victory Loan 1918 was spent on our soldiers. This included \$312,900,000, for paying them, feeding them, bringing them home, separation allowances to their dependents, maintenance of medical services and vocational training schools.

\$259,000,000 of the Victory Loan 1918 was paid on account of authorized Soldiers' gratuities.

@9,000,000 was spent at Halifax for relief and reconstruction after the disaster.

Other disbursements were not, strictly speaking, expenditures, but National Re-investments.

To Great Britain for example:

\$173,500,000 was loaned for the purchase of our wheat and cereals.

\$30,000,000 for other Foodstuffs \$2,900,000 for Canadian built ships. \$5,500,000 to pay other British obligations in Canada.

\$9,000,000 for our fish.

Making in all, \$220,900,000 advanced to Great Britain.

To our Allies, we loaned \$8,200,000 for the purchase of Canadian foodstuffs, raw material and manufactured products.

The Re-investments will be paid back to Canada in due time, with interest.

These credits were absolutely necessary to secure the orders for Canada because cash purchases were impossible.

IN VANCOUVER

Vendors of Soft Drinks Bound Themselves Together for Mutual Protection.

Vancouver, October 10,-A two per cent trust is being formed here for protecting the interests of retailers who vend two per cent beer and other soft drinks. Temporary officers have already been chosen and steps taken to oppose a proposed measure of the City Council to confine the selling of two per cent to bars of hotels.

Quiet pressure has been brought to bear on the Council by the hotels of the city to have the trade which once was theirs brought back. As there are hundreds of vendors of soft drinks in the city outside the bars, the proposed action would injure a great many of the small retailers. It is to protect themselves against this and other inroads on their business that the new association is being formed.

The Vancouver City Council is very favorable to any of the big interests of the city. It is the same council that put the jitneys out of business in order to foster the interests of the B. C. Electric Railway Co., but they have been asked to stay their hand in regard to two per cent legislation until such time as the other vendors can make themselves heard.
