

Man The Unknown

EARL RIVER is a quiet little place, about 20 miles west of New York. A young fellow was valking along there the other day shooting at crows. One of his bullets went astray: instead of hitting the crow it was aimed at, it hit a fireworks lactory. The whole place went up with a blast and a cloud of smoke that led people all around to think an atomic bomb had been dropped.

What did they do? A listener to lectures, a peruser of pamphlets, might suppose that they all ran away from the explosion. The fact-of the matter-as any real student of human nature, especially North American human nature, might have guessed -is that they did just the opposite. They ran, drove and propelled their wheelchairs toward it. Every highway leading to the plant was jammed.

Civil defense officials might well study this incident. They are making their plans on the assumption that when Megalopolis gets bombs, thousands will flock out, looking for safety. They should also consider the possibility that when Megalopolis gets bombed, thousands will flock in, looking for excitement. The traffic jams may well be caused by people entering, not leaving, the doomed city.

Man is made of flesh and blood, sure enough. But in with the flesh and blood is mixed a good bit of rubber. Knock him down, and he bounces right up again: abolish him, and he comes shambling back. Threaten him with nameless horrors, and he expresses a lively interest, and asks how much it will cost to get it, and is it all right to bring the family. The kind of people now facing atomic demolition are, after all, the kind who pay out good money for automobiles which they drive at 75 miles per hour on roads fit for half that speed:

Let us not too readily assume that when the thing happens, an invisible hand will be seen writing, "Mene, mene, tekel upharsin." What is as likely is that an all too visible hand will be seen collecting admission fees, and an all too audible voice heard crying, "Popcorn, peanuts, soft drinks . . ."-Toronto Globe and Mail.

The Better Buy

AS APRIL and income tax month comes up, it may be interesting to reflect on the inner feelings of the taxpayers whose patience is becoming tried with many annoyances such as the constantly rising cost of living, the hospital insurance premiums, failure to get things done and a general sense of frustration to say nothing of the other and even larger anxieties which fill the air these uncertain days.


Even if there may be jolting increases in the income taxes, such as we all expect, there is still freedom, prosperity, justice and opportunity for the most of people. Looking around the world, the most of folk would still probably jump at the chance to pay the taxes which are or will be exacted in Canada in order to get the privileges which Canadians still enjoy. And, after all, much of our taxes are going for defence to protect ourselves from outlaws at home or conquerors from abroad who would take away from us the priceless privileges which we as people of a democratic nation possess.

A lot of our taxes this year will go towards the general effort of organizing a common defence against the threat of totalitarian aggression. It is no guarantee of peace but, if it succeeds, millions of people will be saved both from the creeping inundation of tyranny and from the sudden scourge of war. It may only buy us a truce and a chance to prove by peaceful means the superiority of free speech and free enterprise. Meantime, if we don't have the defences, for which we all must pay, how can we ourselves enjoy higher standards and carry those standards to more backward peoples?

Looking at things this way, Canadians may be a little less impatient with the increased taxes, providing always that they are fair and equitable and that the money realized is efficiently and effectively used, realizing that they may be instrumental some day in bringing better things if not for ourselves for those who come after us.

Food is the main problem in India now, as it has been for centuries past. Directly connected with that is farmland owner-

The Communists say: "Shoot the landlords, burn their property, drive them out, kill them if you can."

The government says: "We intend to put through a land reform program. The farmer who works the lands will have no landlord over him. He will pay a fair percentage of his crop to the government, and he can retain his farm for his whole lifetime, so long as he works it well.

But the government's program is, to date, so hedged in and held back by difficulties and complications that it just has not done the job. It just has not convinced the tenant-peasant that he is going to get the land at a fair small population.

For the present rate of compensation-20 times the annual rent on the farm in question, plus a bonus to the landlord of 15 percent—is just too much.

However, many of the provincial treasuries cannot readily raise the amount of money needed to complete the transfer

He is re-distributing the land by taking away from those with vast holdings and giving it on most liberal terms to those with too little or none at all.

If I had to sum up my impression of Hyderabad's crisis in one sentence, it would be: The only way to beat the Communists, for good and all, is to "beat them to it." Democracy in Asia and India seems to me to have only one real choice:

Either give the land to the tillers now, or wait for the Communists to come along and organize them to take it by force.

Land reform is much more truly a democratic than a Marxian device. For as the peasants long since found to their cost in Russia — the Communists only "give" them the land in the first place in order to take it away again later in the enforced col-

Yippee! DOUGHNUT TWISTS



DOUGHNUT TWISTS

Scald 1/2 c. milk, 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 11/2 tsps. salt and 1/2 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meanwhile, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water, I tsp. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Royal Fast Rising Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well.

Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 2 well-beaten eggs and 1 tsp. vanilla. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted bread flour; beat until smooth. Work in 21/4 c. (about) once-sifted until the sugar dissolves, I c. granubread flour. Knead on lightlyfloured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in a warm place, free from draught. syrup becomes too sugary, stir in Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into a rectangle, 1/3" thick; loosen doughnuts. dough; roll again to 1/3" thickness. Cut into strips 7" long and 1/2" wide. Fold strips in half, twist, then pinch ends together. Arrange,

well apart, on lightly-floured cookie sheets; grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Carefully lift, a few at a time, into shortening that has been heated to 365° — hot enough to brown a cube of day-old bread in 60 seconds. When under-sides are browned, turn and cook second sides. Carefully lift from fat and drain on absorbent paper. Coat with a mixture of fruit sugar and cinnamon or brush hot doughnuts with the following syrup: Heat, stirring lated sugar, 1/4 c. butter or margarine and 1/4 c. water; simmer 5 mins., then stir in 1 tsp. vanilla; keep hot over boiling water - if a little boiling water and heat to boiling point. Yield - 3 dozen

Note: Dough may be cut with an orthodox doughnut cutter; fry the doughnuts and the "holes".

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


