Million Dollar Claims Expected To Arise Out Of Maquilla Shipwreck

Owners and Agents of Vessel to Be Sued By Cargo Owners on Grounds That Ship Was Unseaworthy; **First Writ Issued**

VANCOUVER, March 8:-Arising out of the foundering on December 2, 1928, off the Aleutian Islands of the steamer Chief Maquilla is an action commenced in Supreme Court here by the Insurance Company of North America which claims \$247,000 from the Canadian-American Navigation Co. Ltd., owners, and the Canadian-American Shipping Co. Ltd., agents for the ship. The writ, issued by Roy W. Ginn, is the first of several contemplated by the cargo owners in which aggregate claims of approximately \$1,000,000 will be made against the Chief Maquilla's owners on the ground of the ship's alleged unseaworthiness.
