League of Nations British Campaign

Opening shot fired at Mansion House at large and representative meeting at which letter was read from King George.

London, October 14.—A nation-wide campaign in favor of League of Nations opened here under the presidency of Sir George B. Marshall, Lord Mayor of London, at the Mansion House. There was a large attendance of public men, and in addition all foreign ambassadors, diplomats, and men prominent in various fields of civil life, churchmen, laborites, industrialists, scientists and lawyers were present. King George sent the following letter: "We have won the war. That is a great achievement, but not enough. We fought for lasting peace and it is our supreme duty to take every measure to secure it. For that nothing is more essential than a strong and enduring league of nations."

VIET ORDERS CALL TO TRAIN FOR SERVICE

Paris Must Devote Spare Time to Military Duties—Germany Considers Russian Boycott.

Berlin, Oct. 14.—Suggestions that Germany join in the blockade of Soviet Russia have not been officially considered by the German cabinet but have inspired widespread indignation, indicating that the government's answer will be an unconditional refusal for participation. It is said that the Germans will insist on the installation of an international commission to deliberate on the question. Primarily the government takes the position that it cannot participate in a blockade that is tantamount to a hunger blockade such as was imposed upon Germany five years ago.

Helsingfors, October 14.—The Russian Government of Russia has ordered the entire population to be immediately prepared for military service, according to reports coming here from Russian sources. All peasants must devote all the time not occupied with agricultural work to drilling.

STEERING GEAR BROKE DOWN

Camosun Will Undergo Repairs on Return to Vancouver.

The steamer Camosun limped to Prince Rupert this morning with a broken steering gear. When nearing Lowe Inlet her gear jammed and her engineering staff immediately got busy making repairs and brought her into Prince Rupert about twenty-four hours late. She has been maintaining a regular schedule very regularly this season but she will soon be due for the annual overhaul, so it is likely she will go on the ways at North Vancouver. The Camosun will be unable to continue her trip to Anyox and the Arm, but a temporary steering apparatus has been installed and she will proceed to Vancouver under her own steam.

PERMITS FOR TWO NEW HOUSES HERE

Two building permits were issued on Saturday at the city engineer's office. J. Wozney is to build a one-storey frame dwelling on 8th Ave. East at a cost of \$1,600. The other permit was issued to J. M. Walker for a two-storey house on 9th Avenue East, valued at \$1,000.

STEEL WORKERS ARE RETURNING

Arbitration Code Being Prepared For Submission to Industrial Conference.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, Oct. 14.—A comprehensive industrial code to cover the arbitration of all disputes between employers and employees is being prepared today for submission to the national industrial conference.

With the steel strike threatened, this code was considered one of the most vital measures for bringing about industrial peace. Youngstown, Ohio, Oct. 14.—After a day of disorder and the people in fear of serious trouble, last night saw the Mahoning valley quiet and the steel mills working on a far larger scale than at any time since the strike began. Three thousand men returned to work in Youngstown, practically doubling the number who have deserted the ranks of the strikers.

300 CONTEST ONTARIO SEATS

All Shades of Opinion Represented By Candidates at Provincial Election.

FOUR CONSERVATIVES WITHOUT OPPOSITION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, October 14.—Candidates nominated for the provincial election contest in Ontario number nearly 300 for the 114 seats. The Government candidates number 100, Liberals 70, United Farmers 64, and Independent Labor 14.

The fight promises to be both exciting and uncertain. Never before were there so many candidates and never such a variety. Six parties figure: Conservatives, Liberals, United Farmers, Independent, Labor and Socialists, not to mention prohibitionists and anti-prohibitionists. The political aspect is as mixed as it can possibly be.

Four were elected by acclamation, all Conservatives. They were Dr. J. H. Cody, of Northeast Toronto, Minister of Education; Brig. Gen. Ross, of Kingston, Minister without portfolio; W. D. Black, M. L. A. of Addington, and J. R. Coke, M. L. A. of North Hastings.

Ottawa, October 14.—President Tom Moore of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress in a political speech in the Ontario elections pleads for the return of Labor and United Farmers' Candidates.

Beatty may Change Britain's Policy

Submersible battle cruiser is to take place of dreadnought, is belief of friends of new First Sea Lord.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 14.—The Evening News says there will be a great change in Britain's naval policy with the advent of Vice-Admiral Sir David Beatty as First Sea Lord. Vice-Admiral Sir David Beatty's friends declare that he believes the future of the warship will be oil driven submersible battle cruisers and that the Admiralty's plans may be shaped in accordance with this belief.

The dreadnaughts will not be altogether dismantled but will be considered of secondary importance.

SUNDAY CONCERT A GREAT SUCCESS

A Thousand People Attend and Several Hundreds Turned Away From Westholme Theatre.

The inaugural Sunday concert of the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra in the Westholme was attended by a thousand people and in addition there were several hundred turned away. The collection at the door amounted in all to \$237.20. The theatre seats about 800, but there were at least 200 standing at the rear and sides and seated on the steps and at other vantage points, and several hundred were turned away. There was ample evidence that this was something the people wanted and were ready to support.

The Symphony Orchestra played wonderfully well. There was a finish to their work which came as a pleasant surprise to the audience. When at the close George Woodland spoke appreciatively of the work done by Professor Harvey it was clear that the sentiments were those of the whole audience. It was a great improvement over the last concert given and compares very favorably with similar organizations even in the large cities.

It is needless to say much of Mrs. Morkill. Her power to please by means of her rich contralto voice which she controls so perfectly is wonderful. On Sunday evening the audience listened spellbound and the wish was generally expressed after the concert that Prince Rupert musical people might again have an opportunity of listening to this talented lady. It is understood that she will be in the city for a week or two and that in all probability she may be heard here again before leaving. She was accompanied by W. J. Pitman.

Western Races will Soon be Submerged

So says Sir Rider Haggard; Would stamp out sterilizing disease, subsidize motherhood and help to bring up all children.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 14.—Sir Rider Haggard, giving evidence before the National Birthrate Commission, dwelt on the dangers of artificially keeping down births, a custom which is prevalent in every western nation except Russia and Germany. He was of opinion that unless a startling change happened, western races within the next two centuries would be submerged beneath the great new influx from the teeming myriads of the East.

Sir Rider doubted the effectiveness of appealing to the consciences of people to stop race suicide but thought the state might stamp out diseases tending to sterilize the race and also subsidize motherhood and that they could directly or indirectly bring up all children, even those not born in wedlock.

RIGA IS BOMBARDED BY THE GERMANS AND THE RUSSIANS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Copenhagen, October 14.—The Letts have recrossed the Dwina River in the direction of Mitau and occupied the suburbs of Riga on the left bank of the river, according to a telegram from Wenden, Livonia, 50 miles northeast of Riga. The situation of the Lettish troops in Riga is desperate.

According to despatches from Helsingfors, German and Russian troops are expected to force a passage of the Dwina River. The old town of Riga and the port have been greatly damaged, and many of the civilians have been killed and wounded.

Allied cruisers are aiding in the defense of Riga against German attacks, which for five days have been incessant and stubborn. Riga is being bombarded by the enemy.

Under Good Management Road Should Soon Pay.

Now that the Dominion Government has agreed to take over the Grand Trunk Railway we must settle down to the idea that the G. T. P. will also be taken over and operated under the same management. Just what management that will be no one knows, but it is to be assumed that the present management of the road which is already making it a success will be continued. At any rate Prince Rupert people will hope that there will be no change. The business of the road is increasing at so great a rate that if it is continued under an efficient and enterprising management it will probably soon be paying its way and a burden will thus be lifted from the community.

Figures Talk Louder Than Words.

The figures published Saturday in regard to the fish taken in this district speak most eloquently. The fresh fish report might be better, but there have been many setbacks this year which it is hoped will not recur. September of next year should show considerably over a half million dollar catch.

Must Produce For Export.

When it was announced recently in Montreal that a heavy shipment of cheese had gone oversea, a soap-box orator declaimed on the street-corner against a policy which made it possible to export foodstuffs while famine prices were exacted for the narrow supplies left in Canada.

The argument was specious and wholly misleading. If the domestic demand were equal to the production, in cheese or in any other product of farm and dairy, then a criticism of export trade might be in order. But Canada produces an immense surplus of grain and other foodstuffs. If exportation were not permitted and encouraged, the markets would be glutted—for one season! After that, production would be curtailed. Farmers would leave the country in droves, there would be no market for manufactured goods, and the Dominion would be ruined.

Everyone who has compared staple prices in Canada with those in other parts of the world realizes that the High Cost of living is a general, a universal problem. It is the natural result of a destructive conflict, the greatest and most terrible in history. Mr. Hoover said recently in New York that the world was slowly conquering the most serious famine which had occurred since the time of the Thirty Years' War. There is a demand for the goods we do not need, which must be satisfied, not only for the advantage of Europe but for the safety of our own position as a normal exporting nation.

From the proceeds of last year's Victory Loan over \$200,000,000 was advanced to Great Britain for the purchase of the goods Canada could not consume. It was a measure of self-protection, since Canadian producers got cash for their grain and were enabled to continue their work for the benefit of themselves and the Dominion.

The extension of credits oversea must continue for this year, and a portion of the proceeds of the 1919 Victory Loan will be set aside for that purpose. It is a measure of insurance for the continuation of prosperity in Canada.

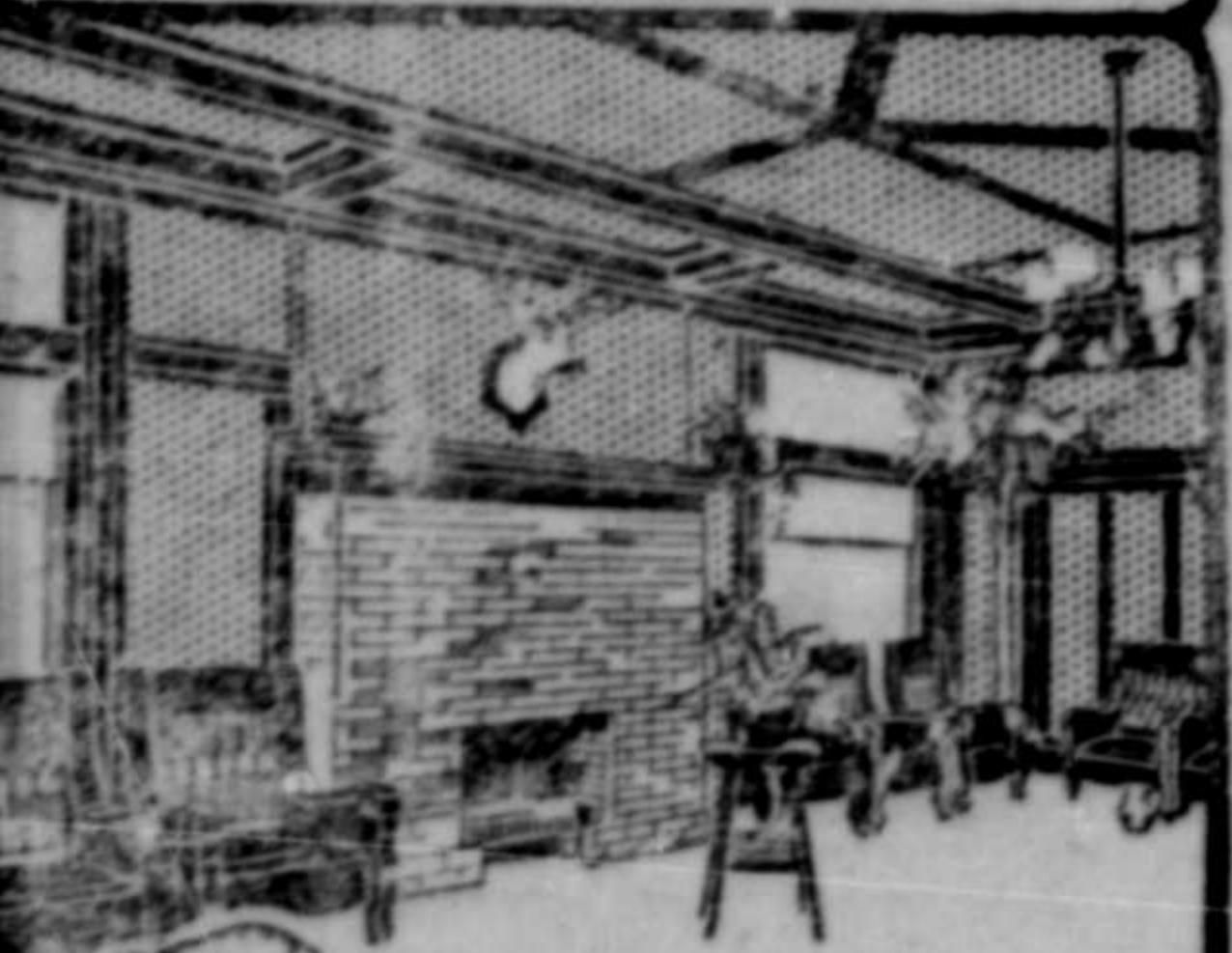

There is but one other home of the kind and that is in Virginia.

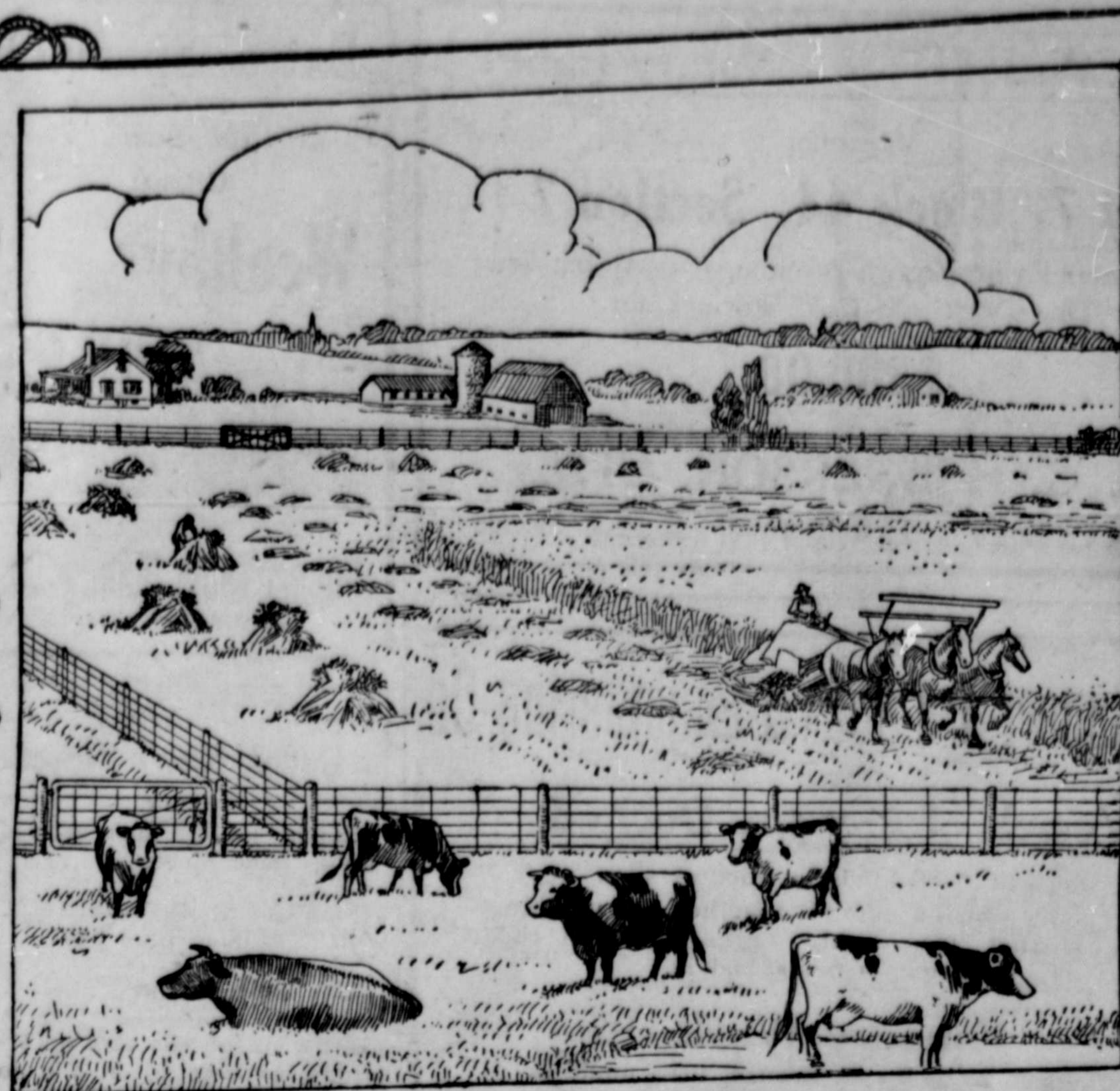
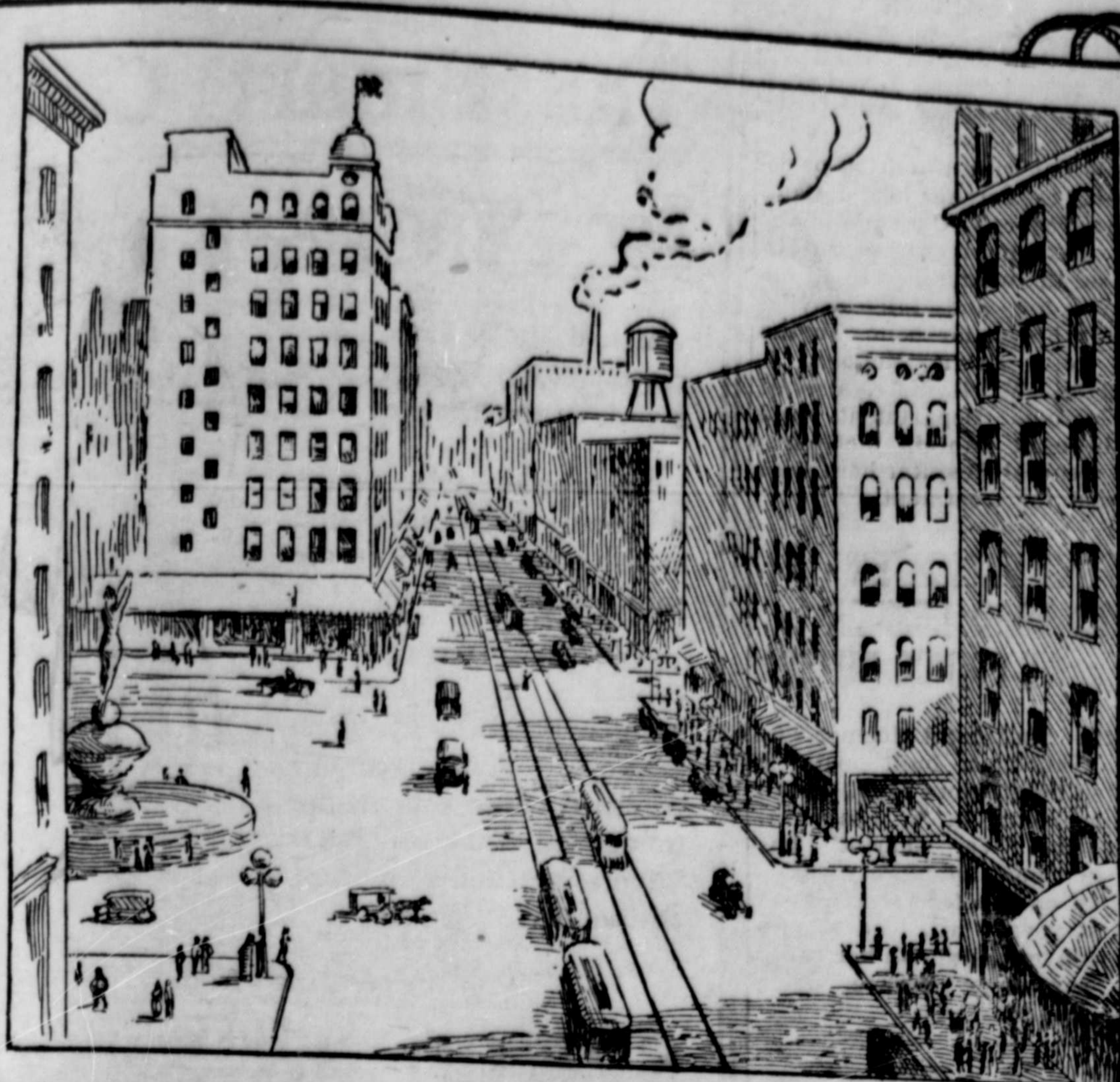

FIRST HANGING TAKES PLACE IN MAYO CAMP

Mute Record of Battle With the Scotch Left by Roadside in Yukon.

The following story of a Yukon tragedy appears in a recent number of the Dawson News under a Mayo headline and dated September 20:

The first hanging in the Mayo camp took place several days ago at 'Skinners' Rest,' the beautiful roadside resort beside the crystal springs seven miles out from Mayo.

"Twelve victims were suspended from trees beside the spring. The hanging took place some time at night. Exactly who performed the deed is not known. The victims are still suspended from the trees, and in full sight of the road. They are big, dark fellows, who hang silently by the neck as a grim reminder of the past. The victims formerly were filled with rye, Scotch, bourbon, and other brands of the tribe of John Barleycorn. The decree having been passed September 1 banning them from their usual rendezvous in road-houses and hotels, some of the boys took the victims out and quietly and in the most approved manner provided the usual number of nightcaps, and then proceeded to render life of the spirited outlaws completely extinct.

"The only thing now remaining in the vicinity of the beautiful pool with which the weary wayfarer can slake his thirst is the kickless and rapid liquid gurgling from the earth. No one has yet dared drink too heavily of this rare libation, and some cynical passer-by has posted on the tree beside the twelve hanging victims the satirical inscription, 'Skinners' Rest.'

"The perpetrators of the lynching are entirely shrouded in mystery, but recent arrivals at Mayo report footprints in the vicinity similar to those of Jack Pickering, Jimmy Greenfield, Isaac Lusk, and a lot of other ardent dry who are known to have done all possible in their time to retire firewater which drove the snakes out of Ireland."
