Liberals Decide to Oppose Grand Trunk Railway Deal

Not fair to Parliament or Country for such important legislation late in session; Financial condition of Country makes deal unwise.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, October 15.—A full caucus of Liberals decided to oppose legislation confirming the Grand Trunk deal proposed by the Government on the ground that it was unjust to Parliament and the country to bring down legislation of such importance in view of the declaration of the Acting Prime Minister on October 10 that the business of Parliament was nearly completed and adjournment was at hand.
Another reason for their opposition is because financial conditions make it unwise that the country assume further heavy bills.

PEACE TREATY AGAIN BEFORE PARLIAMENT

Amendments Making Measure to Include Pact with Austria Adopted by Commons After Protest.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Oct. 15.—A short sharp session on the German treaty took place in the House of Commons yesterday when that measure was approved. The question was over the Senate amendments to the bill to carry the Peace Treaty into effect. It was explained by Hon. C. J. Doherty that the effect of these amendments was to extend the provisions of the bill so that they would apply to the treaty with Austria and also to other treaties with Canada.
The minister asked the House to amend the amendments in order that the Austrian Treaty was carried but not with regard to other treaties.
Mr. Doherty explained that in the House of Commons the amendments followed the Government's motion then carried.

ACTION ON STEEL STRIKE

Heated Discussion on the Labor Proposal to Arbitrate, Industrial Commission Adjourns.

Washington, Oct. 15.—After a full day discussion of the labor proposals to arbitrate the steel strike, during which attempts at postponement and the substitution of another resolution by the public group met with defeat, the National Industrial Conference adjourned without having taken definite action.

Appointed Deputy Minister of Finance at Victoria—Deasy Issuer of Marriage Licenses.

Two appointments of interest in the current number of the British Columbia Gazette. Ernest D. Johnson, inspector of revenue, is acting deputy minister of finance in place of Deputy Minister Geopel. Mr. Johnson was until recently city treasurer here.
Thomas Deasy of Masset, Indian agent, is appointed as issuer of marriage licenses in place of C. Harrison who recently left for overseas.

HOSPITAL FINANCES ARE DISCUSSED AT COUNCIL MEETING

Before adjourning the Council meeting last night Ald. Barrie brought up the matter of the payment of the city grant to the hospital. He had heard that the hospital was in bad financial shape and wondered why the city could not pay its grant without delay. Acting Mayor Rochester and Ald. McRae explained that this grant was paid according to the rate taxes were paid, this being arranged when the matter of the hospital grant was brought up at the first of the year. The arrangement was that on 65 per cent of the taxes being paid that 65 per cent of the hospital grant would be paid.
Ald. McRae felt that some more satisfactory way of paying this grant should be made, especially taking into consideration the difficulties under which the hospital board labored.

The general policy in the matter of hospital affairs then came in for discussion. Ald. Casey felt that hospitals should be directly under the government supervision, that they should be supported by general taxation and that they should be free for the sick. He suggested that Ald. McRae might make a name for himself in evolving some hospital reform along those lines.
Ald. Kirkpatrick expressed herself as being in favor of such a scheme and explained that D. G. Stewart, president of the hospital board had just such an object in view when he attended the recent hospital convention. It was, however, pointed out that doctors were not in favor of it and it was understood that the convention had not taken it up.

FREDDIE WELSH IS OUT ON BAIL

Accused of Biting off Part of Manager's Right Ear, but Says Not Guilty.

Berlin, Oct. 15.—Freddie Welsh, once world's champion lightweight boxer, was arraigned in court here charged with biting half his manager's right ear off during an altercation.
Manager Harry Pollock was confined to a hospital ward, his counsel announced.
Welsh told the court he did not bite the former manager's ear but simply knocked him down and a broken bottle on the floor was responsible for Pollock's ear gashes.
Welsh was held on bail of \$1,000 to come up for trial on Tuesday next.

OFFER TO SETTLE ACCEPTED BY CITY

Long-Standing Dispute With the Canadian General Electric Co. Brought to a Close.

The matter of the city's claim against the Canadian General Electric was finally disposed of last night. A letter was read from the company in which they expressed their desire to keep the matter out of courts. They offered to settle with the city on a fifty-fifty basis. The settlement would provide for the payment of \$2,297.50 to the city in full of all claims on either side.
The city fathers, after considerable discussion and careful looking into the matter, decided unanimously in favor of settling on this basis and the long standing dispute was finally brought to a close.

MR. MEIGHEN TABLES GRAND TRUNK PAPERS

Documents Will be Printed Before Discussion is commenced Regarding Transfer.

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—Hon. Arthur Meighen tabled some additional correspondence and memoranda relating to the legislation to acquire the Grand Trunk Railway. These documents will be printed before the discussion of the Grand Trunk resolution is commenced in the House of Commons.

Two British Transports Land Reinforcements on the Asiatic Coast.

VON DER GOLTZ HAS RESIGNED

German Commander Drops Out As Result of Entente Protest; Bolsheviks Badly Beaten.

STAGGERING BLOW AGAINST THE SOVIET

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Berlin, Oct. 15.—General von der Goltz has resigned from the German army as a result of the latest Entente note, says the Tages Zeitung.
London, Oct. 15.—Six German merchant ships have been captured during the past two days by the British torpedo boat destroyers, which took them to Reval, says the Daily News Reval correspondent.
London, Oct. 15.—The success of General Yudenitch against the Bolsheviks is so complete as to be almost staggering, says the Daily Mail's correspondent at Reval. The advance guard took Kotoshova, 50 miles from Petrograd, on Sunday and recovered the advanced point of the Jugo offensive. A thousand prisoners, thirteen guns and many machine guns and an armored train were captured.
London, Oct. 15.—(Noon). The bombardment of Riga by German and Russian forces has set parts of the city in flames.

YUKON STEAMERS STILL HELD BY THE RIVER ICE

Nasutlin Reaches Mayo Safely and Frozen in for Winter; Women and Children on Other Vessels.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Dawson, Y. T., Oct. 15.—Overland arrivals from Mayo report that the steamer Nasutlin reached that point safely and is frozen in for the winter.
The Yukon River is partly cleared of ice from Dawson southwards. The steamer Dawson was expected to arrive here with all the delayed upper river business. The Stead between Forty-Mile and Circle is still delayed by heavy ice. The temperature is higher, but it is a question if these boats will be able to make their destination.
Forty Mile, Y. T., October 15.—Many women and children are included in the 300 passengers on the four Yukon steamers marooned in river ice. The passengers are helping to cut wood to keep steam in the boilers. The steamers are the Alaska and Seattle frozen in about sixty miles below Dawson and the Yukon below Circle.

FRANCE'S LOSSES WERE 27 VESSELS

Paris, October 14.—The naval losses of France during the war period included 27 vessels, of which three were battleships.

PRINCE RUPERT PIONEER DIES AT VANCOUVER

Word has reached town of the death of J. T. Moore, one of the pioneers of this city and a large property owner. Mr. Moore died in Vancouver on September 18 after an operation, having left Prince Rupert only a few weeks before. He was well known over the coast from the boundary to the Yukon and his many friends will regret to learn of his decease.

No Gratuities for Returned Soldiers

Help will be extended to men of various classes for special purposes.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, October 15.—The special House of Commons committee appointed to consider soldiers re-establishment are completing their report behind closed doors. It is authoritatively predicted that there will be no further system of gratuity along the lines suggested by the Gratuities Association or the Great War Veterans contained in the recommendation of the committee.
It is understood that the committee will recommend:
1. That Canadians who served with the Imperials should get the difference between Imperial and Canadian gratuity.
2. That grants be given matriculant subjects who left for the war and were unable to complete their university courses.
3. That loans be advanced to medical men who graduated just before the war and who are now in need of post graduate courses.
4. That vocational training be extended in case of certain trades.
5. That an actuarial form of insurance be provided for disabled men at present unable to secure insurance from regular companies.

MURDERERS TO HANG FRIDAY

Dr. Gervais and His Associates Were Guilty of Killing Sheriff's Officers.

Regina, Oct. 14.—Dr. J. Gervais, V. Carmel and J. B. St. Germain, found guilty of murdering sheriff's officers Charles Horsley and Lajoie at Steep Creek, now under reprieve, are to hang Friday.

SITE SUGGESTED FOR AMERICAN CAN CO.

A letter was read from the Board of Trade at last night's council meeting in the matter of a site to be offered to the American Can Co. as an inducement to bring their northern branch to this city. The letter explained that this company would probably employ in the neighborhood of three hundred persons and would be a great industrial asset to the city. Acting Mayor Rochester further explained its importance to the city and told that a site near the shipyards would be suitable.
Some of the aldermen were of the impression that it was hardly a matter for the council to deal with especially as no definite proposal had been made. The letter was turned over to the Utilities Committee.

COAL MINERS MUST KEEP THEIR CONTRACT

People Hungry For Good Music.

The way in which people flocked to hear the music at the theatre on Sunday night was a revelation. For two hundred people to stand for two hours in order that they might enjoy classic music, some of it of a purely sacred nature, is a hint to church managers. Many church people were disappointed to find that they were unable to get in on their arrival and some of them suggested that it was hardly fair to those who went to church to be debarred for that reason. A thousand people enjoyed themselves at a time when many, especially those away from home, usually find the time hang heavily.

It has been suggested that possibly in these days of Church Union ideals, the churches might unite on a Sunday night musical service at the theatre, possibly securing the services of the musical society for the singing and with several of the best local soloists aiding.

People are hungry for good music but they are not hungry to listen to long prayers nor to hear long sermons. It is useless to argue that people ought to like those things. Perhaps they should, but they do not. They show clearly that they do not because they stay away from church. They show that they like good music because they turn out to hear it and patronize the collection plate when they get it.

How many people have stood for two hours because they could not gain admission to a church service in this city. Possibly they have done so but it has not become a habit that could be noticed.

We are strongly in favor of music, all that it is possible to get. Churches where the music is good are usually the churches where the crowds go.

New Athletic Association Here.

Some committees are at work gathering data and making other arrangements for the organization of an athletic association in this city that will take over the Agricultural Building and use it as a gymnasium. Very soon one of these committees, as soon as it knows just what it wants, will ask the people of the city for support. The general idea is to make the association helpful to the town. The chief difficulty will be in getting a good physical director who will organize the games and classes and keep things running smoothly. There is no doubt that such an organization is badly needed here and that it will receive the support of everyone when it is launched.

Editor's Home At Vanderhoof.

The field secretary of the National Editorial Association must have made an extremely favorable report on the Vanderhoof district for the executive to have decided to make it their permanent home. At any rate it means a good deal to the Nechaco valley and also to the whole of central and northern British Columbia. The big hotel which was commenced at that point some years ago will be completed at once and editors from all over the country, especially the big free lance special writers, are expected to visit the district often and they are bound to tell of the place in some of their articles. The little town of Vanderhoof is to be congratulated on its luck. Doubtless there is a good future for it, for if it has good hotel accommodation it will soon prove to be the Mecca of all commercial men and other travellers through the country.

PREPARATION FOR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Committee Meeting Last night in Board of Trade Rooms With View to Organizing

Last night there was a meeting of the general committee having in hand the preliminaries for the organization of an athletic association in this city. The gathering took place in the Board of Trade rooms with M. P. McCaffery in the chair.

The committee reported some progress since the last meeting and it was decided to appoint several committees to secure further data and to meet again next Tuesday evening in the Board of Trade rooms.

H. S. Wallace, W. J. Nicholl and H. F. Pullen were appointed a committee to secure an estimate of the cost of making dressing rooms and shower baths in the basement or some other suitable part of the Agricultural Building.

The subscription committee, headed by W. E. Williseroft, will provide an estimate of the cost of equipment. They consist of, in addition to the chairman, Messrs. Johnston, Westaway, Brady, Self, Clementson, Fisher, Darton and Carmichael.

A committee on organization which will recommend officers for the permanent organization is composed of J. D. McAuley, H. P. Wearmouth and Mr. Clementson.

It is expected that each committee will get busy at once and that by next Tuesday it may be possible to get right to work so that no time may be lost in making use of the building.

SOLDIERS NEED NOT PAY ROAD TAX BUT THEY WILL NOT VOTE

The report of the Finance Committee in regard to the payment of road taxes by returned soldiers was adopted. The report provided that returned soldiers would not be asked to pay their two dollars for road tax, but that they would not be able to vote unless they had paid this tax or had paid other municipal taxes.

City Clerk Woods explained in the matter of voting that the soldiers would have to prove that they had paid municipal taxes before their names went on the voters' list. The tax would be refunded to the wives or some representative of the claimant without them having to appear personally at the city hall.

Sport Briefs

The annual visit of Australian cricket teams to England will not take place this year but an English team will visit the Commonwealth and the Australians will be invited to England in 1921.

Eddie Cicotte, the star Chicago pitcher, who was driven out of the box in the first game of the world's series and who lost his second game on account of lack of support, came into his own in the seventh game when he showed his regular control, speed and judgment. He was backed up by the usual dash and "pep" of his team mates, but, alas, they started too late. Four games won in a row would establish a world's series record and the records weren't going Chi's way.

Already there is some action in the winter basketball series. The St. Andrew's Society and Sons of Canada have arranged teams, while several other associations are getting ready to enter. These games will in all probability be played in the Exhibition Hall and will form a part of the winter's athletic program. It looks as if there will be more doing in the sport line this winter than ever before at any rate, the present enthusiasm in that direction was never shown before and prominent business men and others are promising their active support. Clean winter sport is something that has always been felt to be a necessity in this city, as there never was too much of it. It is to be hoped that present plans will materialize as it will mean an invaluable gain in occupying the long winter evenings that hang so heavily on the hands of most young men.

There were three shut-out victories in the recent world's series. This is rather a record as there have been only six shut-out games in the last nine years' big games, those of Jimmie Ring, Ed Eller and Dick Kerr.

Johnny Kilbane is running for alderman in Cleveland. Johnny has been boxing since 1907 and he now intends to retire. He will name several leading featherweights and bantamweights to enter in a tournament, the winner of which will receive the world's featherweight title which is now held by Kilbane.

It is understood in eastern sporting circles that next year's world series will be the best four out of seven games as formerly. This year's experiment with a nine-game series does not seem to have been satisfactory and the general desire is to get back to the seven games.

The site for the Olympic games which will be held in Antwerp next year is a large tract of land formerly an old field which the Huns improved for their drilling during their four years' stay in Belgium. The stadium is now well under construction, being half built. The building is being supervised by the man who built the London and Stockholm stadiums. It will cost three million francs and persons. 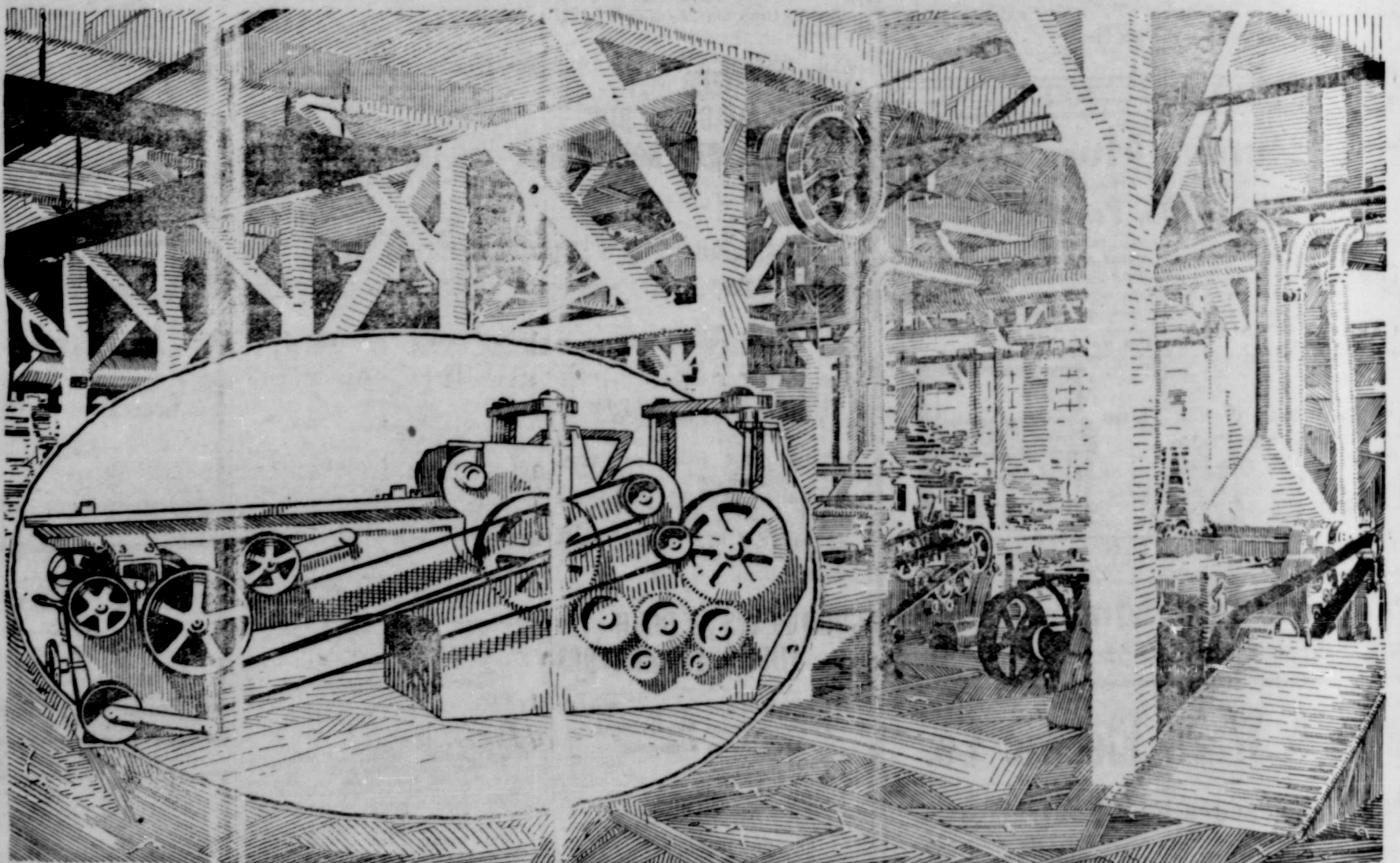
