





## HINTS FOR GARDENERS

GENERAL FALL WORK

Do not make the mistake of cleaning up all the garden foliage after the first frost and burning or carting it away. It is important that all this refuse, except in the case of diseased plants, should be dug in or placed on the compost heap where it will rot.
