# BRITISH DIRIGIBLE R-101 EXPLODES

## World's Great Airship Crashed to Ground And Forty-Seven Are Dead Vol. XXI. No. 233.

Lord Thomson, British Air Secretary, Among Those Who Perished In Disaster In Northern France

### Seven Persons Saved Lives By Being Thrown From Ship

May Be Impossible to Identify Bodies In Charred and Twisted Mass of Debris-Pilot's Story

BEAUVAIS, France, Oct. 6:- The British dirigible R-101, especially built for the eastern trip, exploded three miles south of here at 2:30 yesterday morning and was completely destroyed by fire. Forty-seven of her crew and passengers were killed. Lord Thomson, British Air Secretary, was among those who perished in the disaster. Seven persons survived. The dirigible was bound for India on her maiden flight and was less than a day's travel from her base at Cardington, England, which she left the morning preceding.

Doctors expressed the opinion that not one of the bodies of the victims would be identified. All that remains of the airship is a charred and twisted mass of debris.

The known survivors are Rigger S. Church, Engineers A. V. Bell, J. H. Bings, A. J. Cook and V. Savory, Wireless Operator A. Disley and Pilot H. J. Leach.

Those dead include, beside Lord Thomson, Sir Sefton Brancker, director of civil aviation for Great Britain; Squadron Leader Palstra of the Australian Air Foce; Wing Commander R. B. B. Colmore and Major G. H. Scott. Both the last-mentioned made the flight to Canada in the R-100.

Pilot Leach gave the following account of the tragedy: "We got into a terrific storm with high winds and the dirigible simply would not rise. I gave her more gas to get her up in the air but she did not respond. Rain was falling in such torrents that our ship was blown down to earth. She bumped twice slightly and then, with terrific impact, she buried her nose in the ground.

"Immediately, came a terrific explosion followed by two lesser ones and then flames engulfed the ship. I was shot outside my pilot window and found myself on the ground.

"At the moment of the catastrophe everybody aboard except myself and my assistant navigator were asleep. The motors were turning over to perfection. It was the Four Women Are

tempest which caused our destruction." Leach was burned about the hands and face.

LONDON, Oct. 6:-The Air Ministry officially announced yesterday that 54 persons were on board the R-101 and that 47 lost their lives in the disaster.

The R-101 was the largest lighter-than-air craft in the world. She was considerably longer than the R-100 which last August crossed the Atlantic Ocean from England to Canada.





Now do you see how true it is that were we all to practise a little intelligent discrimination in our daily buying, our unemployment problem would quickly and permanently disappear?

Every time we buy an imported article, when we might just as easily have found a Canadian article to serve our purpose equally well, we are helping to do some fellow Canadian out of a job, and making the job of some foreign workman just that much more secure! Conversely, every time we purposely give the preference to a Canadian article, we are helping to create employment for Canadian workers, and doing our bit towards making Canada as a whole more prosperous!

Think it over! Discuss it with your friends! Study it if you will not only from the standpoints of patriotism and charity, but from the standpoint of self-interest. The farther you go into it the more convinced you will become that giving Canadian products a preference over foreign products is the common sense thing to do.
