Appointment of British Columbia Cabinet Member Is Expected to Be Made In Very Near Future

OTTAWA, June 16:Dr. Cyrus MacMillan, Professor of English at McGill University, has been appointed minister of fisheries. No appointment of a minister from British Columbia has yet been made but it is expected the selection of a minister from the Pacific Coast province will be announced soon. While the cabinet appointment has passed the cabinet council, it has yet to be approved by the Governor General who is at present in Quebec. It will probably be a few days before the new minister is sworn in.

Four Million Dollars Worth Treasury Bills Sold on Basis 4.25

Issue For Victoria Delivery and Payment Bought In By Important Syndicate of Financiers

VICTORIA, June 16:—Obtaining a price which it is announced has not been excelled in sale of provincial bonds for several decades, Hon. W. C. Shelly, minister of finance, has disposed of \$4,000,000 worth of nine months treasury bills on a basis of a little more than 4.25. The issue is for Victoria delivery and payment. The sale was made to a syndicate composed of A. E. Ames Co., Dominion Securities Corporation Ltd., Wood-Gundy Ltd., the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the Royal Bank of Canada.

Hands Off the C. N. R.

Tolmie, the Conservative Premier of this province, has been trying to get the Canadian National Railways to take over the P.G.E.; so far, without success. If a Conservative government is elected at Ottawa, Tolmie and the strong Tory representation from the south of this province will secure what they want and the P.G.E. will be used to divert the Peace River trade to Vancouver. Nothing then could stop it.

If Mr. Brady were elected he would be powerless against the solid influence of the south against us. He might protest; he might declaim in his best elocutionary style. It would be in vain; he would be a "voice crying in the wilderness."

Let us take no chance. Let us make no peradventure of this matter, so vital to the north. Let us elect Olof Hanson and support the hand of Mackenzie King who will see that this outrage is not perpetrated upon

We wish to co-operate with our good friends in Prince George and to assist them in their laudable desire to build up that place. But we do most emphatically object to our national railway system being saddled with the "white elephant of British Columbia" in order to divert the Peace River trade through unnatural channels to Vancouver.

If the Peace route is tied on with the C.N.R. at Prince George, the trade of this great farming area will flow naturally to Prince Rupert, but with the Tories in power it will be diverted to Vancouver over the

WHICH CANDIDATE?

Prince Rupert seems to be pretty evenly divided in its support of the two candidates for the federal house, J. C. Brady, who was the representative for Skeena in the last parliament, and Olof Hanson, who has been selected as a candidate to support the present government. Under these conditions no matter which side a newspaper takes it is going against the opinions of about half the population.

It seems likely that the Mackenzie King Government will be returned to power and in view of that fact it would seem the path of wisdom for Prince Rupert to send a government supporter, provided it does not go against the best interests of the community in other respects.

J. C. Brady was a good representative of the Conservative party at Ottawa. He brought Prince Rupert considerable publicity for he spoke on many occasions in the House of Commons and also delivered addresses in various parts of the country. The difficulty was that he was against the government and on every important occasion voted against them and very often spoke against them. That is a matter of record. If then Prince Rupert wishes to send to wind, 54. Ottawa a man who will be a faithful adherent of the Conservative party and will obey the party whip whenever it cracks, then Brady is the man to select. He will plead Prince Rupert's cause but he will do so always under the shadow of the opposition instead of as one who has the confidence of the government. We do not think Mr. Brady will take any exception to that. At any rate, the records show that seldom if ever did he record a vote other than with Hon. R. B. Bennett and against Premier Mackenzie King and his party, who at present hold the reins of power at Ottawa. In voting for Mr. Brady, then, we know exactly what to expect.
