PLANS FOR R-101 FLIGHT THIS FALL

LONDON, Aug. 7.—Now that the voyage to Canada of the R-100 has been a success it is interesting to note something about England's efforts in airship building.

With a gross lift of approximately 156 tons, the R-100 stands in striking contrast with early British airships. The R-100 and R-101, both of which are more than 700 feet long, are the latest of the series of mammoth ships built in England since the war.

It was back in 1907, however, that the first attempts to sail a lighter-than-air machine were made in England. Then the "Nulli Secundus," carrying two occupants and a weight of 3,400 pounds, cruised 50 miles aided by favorable winds, at a maximum speed of 24 miles an hour.

More than \$10,000,000 has been spent in the construction of eight huge airships in England since the war. Others have been designed, but never built. One of the earliest, the R-31, flew two hours, broke a fin and never was flown again. Recently the old R-33, whose tests in experimental flights were utilized to improve the R-100, was broken up.

Two years after the R-34 crossed the Atlantic in 1919 in what was record time, that ship was wrecked. Several other expensive ships have been scrapped or wrecked, or scrapped before completion.

It was six years ago that the decision to build the R-100 and R-101 was announced in the House of Commons. A trip to India is planned for the R-101 this fall.

Badly Burned Aboard Troller

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 7.—With his face and arms badly burned from a gasoline explosion Peter Johnson, troller, was rushed to the Ketchikan Hospital last night from Port Alexander on the plane Sitka, Pilot E. A. Meyring.

Upon arising about 6 o'clock Johnson started to build a fire in the gas stove on his trolling boat with what he thought was kerosene but which proved to be gasoline. In the explosion that followed Johnson's face and arms were badly burned. His clothes became a mass of flames which he extinguished by jumping into the water. Other trollers, hearing the explosion rushed to his aid, quickly extinguished the fire on the boat and gave Mr. Johnson first aid.

Liberals Gain Another Seat On a Recount

SOREL, Que., Aug. 7.—Another Quebec seat has been added to the Liberal column. A recount showed that Alme Boucher is elected in Yamaska by a majority of two votes. The Liberals therefore have elected 40 members in Quebec and the Conservatives, 24.

This gives the Liberals 88 seats in the House of Commons and the Conservatives, 137.

REAL ESTATE DEAL IS NOW COMPLETED

Two Local Japanese Residents Purchase 50 Feet and Three Stores On Third Avenue

A real estate deal of some importance was put through during the last few days when C. S. Obata and D. Jasumoto purchased two lots and three stores with rooms above from J. G. Chadwick, the price being in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

The building is the one in which the La Casse Bakery, the Eagle Barber Shop and the Great West Restaurant are located, across from the Empress Hotel.

Mr. Obata, who is one of the purchasers is a barber and has been at the same stand in the building he has now purchased for the past 12 years. He plans to live in the rooms upstairs. Mr. Jasumoto already owns property in the city.

NUDE CULTS IN FRANCE

Number There Now With Arrival of Hot Season Attract Attention

STE. MAXIME, France, Aug. 4.—With the arrival of summer nude cults began springing up like mushrooms in Southern France. Already four have been located between Toulon and the Italian border.

Several years ago the police took action against a colony that occupied the top of a mountain behind Cannes. The German doctor who headed the colony was heavily fined and his forty followers were given a fortnight to leave France. They started for Haiti where they were told the winters would be less rigorous.

The new colonies live behind walls surrounding huge estates and in two cases have private beaches. Bathing "in the raw" is a common night time diversion all along the Riviera. One group was surprised in the water one moonlight night by three men and the host had to pay a hundred francs before the intruders would leave.

Premier Mackenzie King Welcomes Rest Period After Eleven Years

OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—Mr. Mackenzie King officially handed the resignations of himself and his cabinet to the Governor-General at Government House this afternoon.

R. B. Bennett shortly afterwards proceeded to Rideau Hall where he and his cabinet were sworn in.

OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—The government is now ready to turn over the responsibilities of office to the incoming administration, declared Premier King, following the cabinet meeting of yesterday. The probabilities indicated that Premier-Elect Bennett would be ready to step into office today, and it is likely, the premier intimated, that he would see the Governor-General today and tender the resignation of the government.

Premier King recalled that it is 11 years ago today since he was appointed leader of the Liberal party, and remarked on the coincidence it would be if he surrendered reins of office on the anniversary of that event.

"We had an excellent meeting with everybody in the best of spirits," said the Prime Minister. The entire cabinet was present. He added that the relief from the burden of administration and responsibility would give him an opportunity to rest. His nine years in office had been somewhat of a strain.

BEARS CHASED GOLF BALL ON JASPER LINKS

Miss Evelyn Hay of Toronto Sees Interesting Game Between Bruins and Her Ball

JASPER PARK, Aug. 7.—When Miss Evelyn Hay of Toronto drove 150 yards from the first tee of the Jasper Park Lodge golf course, three black bears, until then engaged in an intimate but haphazard wrestling match on the edge of the fairway, removed their attentions from one another and took after the bounding ball.

They reached it almost together. The smallest of the trio, however, a two-year-old cub, got his teeth on it first. He was bowled over by a clout from one of his more bulky companions and the ball jolted from his mouth. He seized it again and had carried it about 15 yards nearer the green for which Miss Hay had aimed it in the first place before he was once more laid low by a combined assault on the part of his two confreres. The ball was left in the middle of the fairway while the two larger bears chased their younger and more successful golfing partner back into the bush.

Miss Hay continued with a new ball from where the bears left off and according to Leo Borgault, her partner, defense man of the New York Rangers who spends his summers managing the transportation desk at Jasper Park Lodge, made the hole in six. Mr. Borgault retained as a souvenir the teeth pitted ball dropped by the bears in the fairway.

OWNERS OF G. T. P. MAY ENTER SUIT

TORONTO, Aug. 7.—British holders of first and second perpetual preference stocks of the Grand Trunk Railway are considering entering action in United States courts to have the title to Canadian National lines in the United States vested in them on the ground that they were illegally acquired by the Canadian government. R. C. Hawkin of London of the perpetual stockholders' committee said here today.

Bob Cummings Won Single Sculls Beat Eddie Snead

VANCOUVER, Aug. 7.—Bob Cummings, formerly of Kelowna, B.C., but now of San Francisco, won the tacketweight singles sculling title of the Pacific Coast on Wednesday evening by defeating Eddie Snead of Vancouver in a special match race, over a distance of one mile, 500 yards. Cummings won by 20 lengths in eight minutes, 40 seconds.

Snead collapsed 200 yards from the finishing line, unable to finish.

CONGRATULATIONS TO BENNETT

The Daily News offers its congratulations to Premier Bennett on his succession to the most important office in the Dominion of Canada. During the recent election we opposed him and his party but now that the people have chosen, it is for the whole country to get behind their premier and support him in everything he does for the benefit of the country.

We do not believe in a nagging policy. We do not think it pays anyone. Premier Bennett will be in office for four or five years. He will head a strong party and will doubtless surround himself with good men. He will have the best possible opportunity to carry out his policy and by the end of that time we shall be able to tell whether it has been for the good of the country or not. We hope it will be, for we do not want the country to suffer. It is much more important that the country shall prosper than that the Liberals be returned to power. We do not wish to be able to say "We told you so." It would be much better for all concerned to be able to say "we are glad you have succeeded."

It may be well for us all to remember that the country is much greater than any party. Also we might remember that the great mass of the people are not particularly concerned about parties but much more about good government.

Some strong party men affect to believe that all the brains, all the honesty and all the progress are on their side. They also affect to believe the converse, which is that all the idiots, all the rogues and all the reactionaries are on the other side. Let us get rid of that idea. There are just as good men on one side as the other and perhaps better. Time will tell. At any rate this is Mr. Bennett's day. Let him have our good will and our support. He needs it.

STRAWS SOMETIMES INDICATE

Straws sometimes indicate which way the wind blows. The journalist who filed an article with the Canadian Press yesterday told of some of our great men attending a luncheon. They gave them in the following order: Mr. Bennett, Mr. King, Viscount Willingdon. That seems to have been his idea of the order of precedence and he was not far wrong. At a social function Viscount Willingdon would have been almost the whole show but the other men are the choice of the people, the men who really govern. One is a figure head, the others are the real leaders.

PROPOSED AIR SERVICE

Without having much knowledge as to the expense and the possible loss in operating, it is probable that the Canadian people would like to see an air service between London and Montreal. Not only would it be an advantage in time of peace but in case of war it would be a great thing to have a tried and tested operating service. It would be a great strength to the Empire.

Many people would possibly object to mention of the war possibilities, but unfortunately we have not yet arrived at a period when we can feel anything like secure. Objectionable as it is, this phase has to be considered.

CANADA WILL BENEFIT

Canada is already benefiting from the drought and heat in the United States. The price of wheat is moving up because of it.

While we do not like the idea of benefiting at our neighbor's expense, we must remember that they sometimes benefit at ours. We regret very much that the people of the United States have to suffer from something over which they have no control. However, this is one of the "acts of God" as the law calls it. Possibly before the year is over they will be glad to purchase wheat from this country. It will injure local trade because it will do away with the demand for lumber, which is now admitted free of duty into the United States, according to the latest ruling.

NORTHERN B. C. BENEFITS

Northern B. C. will benefit very greatly from the big salmon run this season. The quantity of fish is so great that it is taxing the capacity of the canneries to handle it. It indicates that the scientists knew what they were talking about when they predicted a good fishing season. It also means that the fishermen will have money to spend when the season is over.

The Letter Box

NINA GURVICH'S RECENT CHALLENGE

The Editor, Daily News:

In connection with the proposed boxing match between the two local boys, Nina Gurvich and Billy Bagshaw, I would like, in the interests of the game and for the satisfaction of local boxing fans who want to see these boys meet, to explain what has transpired regarding the arranging of a match between them.

In the first place, Nina challenged Billy for a six-round fight, and as Bagshaw's manager I accepted the challenge provided the fight would be for ten rounds, and immediately entered into negotiations with him. After several interviews, all details were agreed upon—amount of purse, weight, judges, etc., and also the number of rounds, namely ten. An agreement was then drawn up accordingly and at the eleventh hour Nina refused to go through with it, stating that he would only fight six rounds and denying that he had agreed to fight ten. It might further be mentioned that the agreement, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, provides among other things, for Nina weighing in on the day of the match at 141 pounds, this giving him a four-pound weight advantage over Billy.

With regard to Nina's recent statement of August 5th that he will fight Bagshaw "any time, any place in a six-round contest at catchweights," I would like to state that on the occasion of Nina's recent fight at Ketchikan, he advised me that he weighed 140 pounds and was not in the best of condition. This being the case, my thirty-five years of experience in conditioning fighters tells me that Nina in good condition would make 138 pounds at the most. It would therefore appear ridiculous inconsistency on his part that he now wants to fight at "catchweights."

Unfortunately, the match is now off, at least until such time as Nina will go through with the original agreement, when I will be willing to offer a \$200.00 purse for the match to be divided any way he wishes, winner take all or otherwise. Failing this and inasmuch as Nina wants to meet Bagshaw in a six-round match, I am quite agreeable and will send Bagshaw against him "any time, any place," provided there is no promoting, that is, the fight to be held in private and Nina can weigh a ton if he likes, this for a side bet of \$200 cash.

Ottawa reports that the strike of the Grand Trunk trainmen has been settled on a compromise basis between the original demands of the men for immediate standardization of wages and the offer of President Hays to standardize rates in 1913.

The first parade of the Earl Grey Rifles was held last night in Little's building. Nineteen men turned out with Captain Stork in charge and Lieutenants A. W. Agnew and McMordie. George Leek, Brown and Godson were appointed sergeants.

President William Law of the telephone company got a shock yesterday when the office bell rang as an indication that the wires had been tested and found all right. There are over 200 phones in section one and service is promised within the next few days.

Passengers of the wrecked steamer Princess May were brought to Juneau in small boats, all well, notwithstanding their thrilling experiences.

SKATING VETERAN

Willi Boeckl of Austria, for 25 years a participant in international figure skating contests, has held the world championship three times.

SPORT CHAT

In the recent British Amateur Association championships the victory of the Finn Virtanen in the four miles was noteworthy. He is said to be the finest distance runner ever seen at Stamford Bridge. He is just out of his teens. He is to run in a match with the more famous Nurmi this month at Stockholm and there is great interest being taken in this struggle. The distance will be four to six miles and the newcomer is considered likely to win. He is rather more strongly built than Nurmi and is taller.

Great progress in high jumping has been made in recent years and over 6 feet is cleared at quite a number of sports. In the recent triangle competition between teams from England, Ireland and Scotland Dr. P. O'Callaghan of Ireland and E. Braddock of England both tied at 6 feet, 2 inches, while G. Turner of England cleared 6 feet 1 inch. The long jump was won by P. Anglim of Ireland with a leap of 23 feet, 1 inch.

Scotland's only victory was in the four miles where Sutherland in a tremendous fighting finish just got ahead of Winfield the English runner by a yard and a half. Time was 20 minutes 2 3-5 seconds.

In the Oxford and Cambridge versus Princeton and Cornell Universities the win of Gordon for the British team in the high jump was only accomplished when he cleared 6 feet 3 3/4 inches.

The Chinese football team that is making a round the world tour in 1930-31 will have 20 players from the leading teams of Tientsin, Hong Kong, Shanghai, and Singapore. Their itinerary provides for five international and six club games on the European continent and they hope to spend six weeks in Great Britain.

Alain Gerbault, one of France's most promising tennis players a couple of years ago, is fonder of boating than of tennis. He completed a round-the-world trip in a sailing boat alone and recently returned to France where he saw the Davis Cup and in England the Wimbledon competitions. He is planning another long sea trip but gave his impressions of England's chances in the Davis Cup in the near future. He thinks that there are many promising young men players and mentions specially Lee, who put up such a good showing against Borotra, and Perry.

The double victory of Lord Burghley in the 120-yards and 440-yards hurdle races in the same afternoon at the British Amateur Athletic Association's championships was a remarkable performance. He has been in the finals of the A. A. A. championships at 440 yards on five occasions and has won them four times.

Arrangements for the Marlbore cricket team of London to visit South Africa this coming winter have been completed and five test matches have been provided for at Johannesburg on December 24, 26, 27 and 29; at Capetown on January 1, 2, 3 and 5; at Durban on January 16, 17, 19 and 20; at Johannesburg on February 13, 14, 16 and 17, and the final match at Durban on February 21, 23, 24 and 25.

The old-timers and supporters of football in the city are very anxious that the game should not be dropped and held a meeting last evening to perfect arrangements for the old-timers' game which will be played in the near future.

The sympathy of all local sportsmen and particularly of followers of football will be extended to Geo. Laidler, who has been keeping goal so splendidly for the Regiment and for the representative game against the Despatch, in the death of his mother. Mrs. Laidler had come north on a visit to her son and his wife and was taken ill here, the illness terminating fatally. George has made himself a universal favorite with the followers of football by his skillful and plucky goalkeeping and gentlemanly conduct on and off the field.

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Preparing For Edmonton Grads Visit to Rupert

Ralph Smith had the girls busy last evening in practice for the forthcoming basketball games with the Edmonton "Grads," world's champions. The girls are very keen about the game with these champions and are going at their practices with great enthusiasm.

The "Grads" were organized in 1914, and were so called because the members of the teams are graduates of the Commercial High School. They have won the provincial championship 15 out of 16 times. In 1923 the team met the London "Shamrocks" and though losing the first game won the round and the Canadian championship. They repeated this victory in seven successive years.

Last year the playdowns were cancelled but the "Grads" defeated both the Vancouver "Meralomas" and the Toronto "Parkside" in exhibition games.

The game here will be played on August 20.

F. P. BURDEN IN EUROPE

Travels by Air and Sits in Royal
Seats at Hendon

LONDON, Aug. 7.—British Colum-
bia's Minister of Lands, was a busy
man during his visit in England,
from which he is now returning.
As one of Canada's 15 delegates to
the second World Power Confer-
ence he made the journey from
London to Berlin in an Imperial
Airways liner, a mode of travel
which, he declared, was the es-
sence of comfort and convenience,
and along a route which was
full of scenic variety. He partici-
pated in the proceedings of the
conference, and delivered addresses
in the course of discussions. When
seen on his return from Berlin Mr.
Burden was full of praise for the
excellent way the conference had
been managed, even to the small-
est details. Speakers were remind-
ed that the time-value of the con-
ference worked out at \$250 a min-
ute, and by means of a series of
small colored lights indications
were given to them at what pace to
speak and at what length. There
were 4,200 delegates gathered from
40 countries, and in front of each
delegate were ear-phones and
switches giving him a choice of
listening-in to a speaker in Eng-
lish, French, or German no matter
in what language he might be ad-
dressing the conference.

Mr. Burden received wide notice
in the British press, the Morning
Post and the Manchester Guardian
in particular devoting considerable
space to the Minister and his
views on the Peace River district.

Through the courtesy of Lord
Thomson, the Air Minister, he was
accommodated with a seat in the
Royal Enclosure at the annual
Royal Air Force display at Hen-
don. During his stay in London Mr.
Burden made British Columbia
House his headquarters, and was
much struck by the large number
of callers seeking information
about the province from the point
of view of trade and settlement. "I
had no idea," he said, "there was
such a stream of enquiry, nor did
I realise how valuable it is to the
Government to have a London of-
fice where these people can count
upon securing official and authen-
tic information. B. C. House is do-
ing good work for the Province."

President of B. C. Conference of United Church Given Reception

IS VERY OPTIMISTIC

There was a splendid attendance last evening at the United Church to welcome Rev. O. B. Sanford, president of the B. C. Conference of the United Church of Canada. In the absence of the pastor, Rev. A. Wilson, who is on his way to England at present, Rev. C. E. Motte presided, and Mrs. A. Wilson was pianist.

Mr. Sanford expressed his great pleasure at the warmth of his reception and the large audience. The only chilly experience he had endured during his visit so far was at the Cold Storage plant.

He spoke of the experiences he had enjoyed so far on his trip which had taken him to many points on the coast. The revelation of the heroic and magnificent work of the ministers of the church was almost overwhelming. At Bella Bella, at Bella Coola, and in the Kitimaat district the fabric of the community life was being practically reconstructed as a result of the Christian influences of the church workers.

There was a very large attendance at Bella Bella where he had conducted the induction service for Rev. P. Kelly. In spite of the fact that the fishing season was at its height there was a practically full attendance of the Bella Bella Indians led by their chief.

The hospitals at Bella Bella and at Bella Coola were also visited and here the work of the medical missionaries was splendid beyond description. A particularly impressive experience was that of seeing the magnificent lasting memorial to the late Dr. Spencer who had died in that district. Mr. Sanford had known Dr. Spencer's wife who had been a school mate of his and as he stood before the tombstone erected by the Indians in appreciation of his work he felt that here indeed was one who had followed in his Master's steps.

Mr. Sanford made a plea for a greater spirit of brotherhood among all workers. The happiness and sal-
