GANDHISTS VERY BUSY

Number of Demonstrations Reported In and Around Bombay

BOMBAY, India, April 9:-Demonstrations fostered by the Gandhists are considerably increasing the country. At one point where it was reported Gandhi was to be arrested, 10,000 people gathered but so far the leader of the movement FIVE POWER is free.

In Bombay numerous demonstrations have been made, especially by students who are among the leaders in the anti-British cause.

The total included appropriations for the offices at London, Washington, Paris and Tokyo and the League of Nations at Geneva. Premier King was in charge of the estimates which were approved before the committee rose.
