HOUSE TO PROROGUE BY END OF MAY

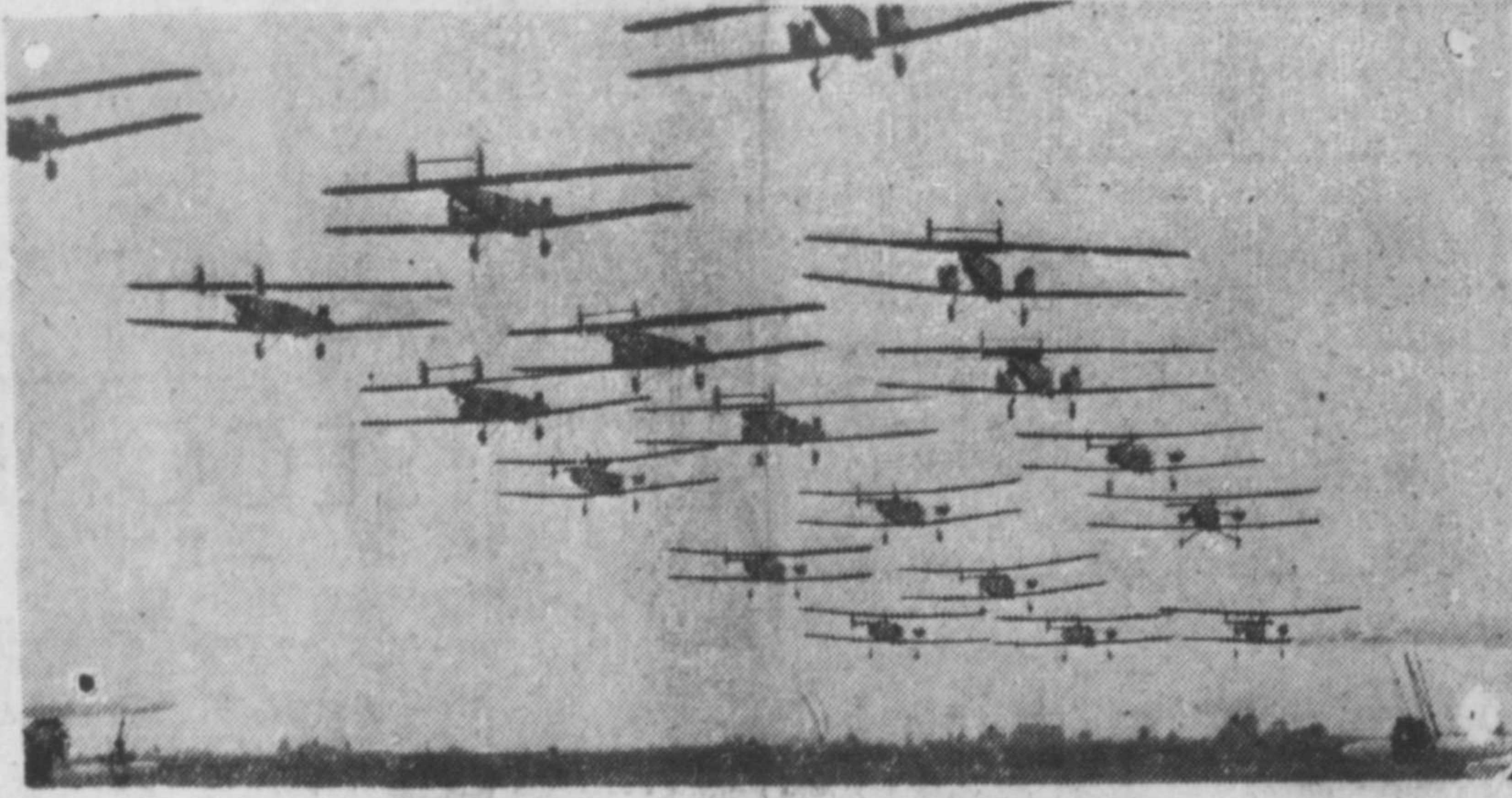
Another Conference Is Held Tuesday Between Premier and Bennett

King and Conservative Leader Agree on Desirability of Bringing Session to Close As Soon As Possible

OTTAWA, May 14.—While no definite date is yet fixed for the prorogation of Parliament, the general expectation now is that the end of the month will see the members on their way home for the election campaign. Last night Premier King and Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, had another conference with a view to facilitating the business of the House of Commons. It is understood that both leaders agreed on the desirability of putting through the budget, estimates and remaining legislation with reasonable dispatch and that they are co-operating to this end. The budget vote is expected late tonight or tomorrow.

Proposal of Viscount Lymington to Accord Dominion Preference

Reciprocation For Favorable Tariff Discussed in British House—Might Not Be Practicable Scheme

LONDON, May 14.—The British government should extend subsidies to the development of civil aviation in Canada it was declared in the House of Commons yesterday by Viscount Lymington, Conservative member. "Canada has increased enormously its preference to us under its new tariff," he said, "and, while we are debarred from according the Dominion a similar degree of preference, there is nothing to prevent our subsidizing civil air services throughout Canada."

Under-secretary for Air Montague remarked that Canada had its own aircraft developments and it would not be easy to impose British methods or even subsidies upon the Dominion.

BABE'S HAND WAS FOUND

Member of Infant Discovered in Stomach of Fish Caught in False Creek, Vancouver

VANCOUVER, May 14.—The city police are investigating the finding of a child's hand, apparently about six months old, in the stomach of a bull fish caught in False Creek here yesterday afternoon. The fish was about ten inches long.

The hand had been severed at the wrist and had not been in the water long as it was well preserved. Police are of the opinion that it had been amputated before it was thrown in the water. They are dragging False Creek today in an effort to secure other portions of the body.

Husband Rang Bell Wife Asks Alimony

Palm Beach Woman Makes Odd Claim For Divorce

PALM BEACH, FLA., May 10.—Her husband's practice of setting off alarm clocks and ringing a cow-bell in their home while she was ill caused her to be placed in a hospital for treatment, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Brooks of Palm Beach and New York, declared in a suit filed against her husband, Reginald Brooks for alimony without divorce. Mrs. Brooks claimed that last January while she was suffering from a nervous breakdown, her husband obtained several alarm clocks, wound them, set them so they would ring at one hour intervals and hid them in dresser drawers, closets and under furniture.

Brooks, her bill continued, also went about the house ringing a cow-bell at night. Finally her physician ordered her taken to a hospital so she might have quiet, the papers in the case state. Brooks, it is declared, has an annual income in excess of \$150,000 and owns property in excess of \$1,000,000.

GOV'T. IS DEFEATED

Labor Administration Suffers Another Reverse in the House of Lords

LONDON, May 14.—The House of Lords last night again brought forth defeat for the Labor government, this time over the coal mines bill which passed the House of Commons only after long and bitter struggles.

The House of Lords carried an amendment to provide that the quota of coal allotted by the centres of production in each district should not be less than the home consumption within that district. The amendment was carried by a vote of 134 to 38.

France and Italy Are Still Negotiating Towards End of Settling Naval Differences

GENEVA, May 14.—France and Italy, resuming negotiations left pending since the close of the London Naval Conference, have decided to utilize the fifty-ninth session of the League of Nations council, which opened here this week, to seek settlement of their conflicting naval policies and the fleet parity dispute. This became known when Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, announced that he had offered his good offices to the French and Italian foreign ministers, both receiving favorably Henderson's offer.

PRAISES TARIFF

London Times Gratiated at Good Reception Canadian Budget Is Receiving

LONDON, May 14.—"There seems little doubt that, on the whole, the new tariff, whatever may be said of other features of the budget, has had a good reception," said the London Times yesterday in commenting upon the Canadian political situation.

"One gratifying feature of the discussion on the budget is that, only in isolated instances, has there been any objection to the great extension of the British preference."

MISS AMY JOHNSON TO RESUME HER FLIGHT TO AUSTRALIA; IS STILL WELL AHEAD OF HINKLER

RANGOON, India, May 14.—Amy Johnson was making ready again today to resume her flight to Australia despite her forced landing at Insein yesterday when damage was done to her single-seater Moth plane. After losing her way she was forced to land and made a perfect ground contact but the machine taxied too far, striking a small ditch as a result of which some damage was done to wings, wheels and propeller. Miss Johnson, who is still two days ahead of Bert Hinkler's record, is anxious to expedite repairs so that she may be on her way again. The weather was foggy when she left Calcutta yesterday, she said. The journey was uneventful, however until strong winds and heavy rains were encountered near Akyab. She crossed the Yoma Mountains at an elevation of 12,000 feet but was forced to descend rapidly owing to poor visibility.

Miss Johnson mistook a playing field at Insein for the race course at Rangoon, 15 miles distant. She smiled cheerfully, however, when it was definitely determined that her engine was undamaged.

LOAF OF EMPIRE

Canadian Born London Lawyer Makes Suggestion For Empire Free Trade Supporters

LONDON, May 14.—All who are interested in Empire free trade should make it their duty to demand an "Empire loaf" made of wheat flour produced in the British Empire says Sir James Dunn.

Sir James, who is a native of Bathurst, N.B., and a prominent lawyer, says that, apart from any Imperial sentiment, the Empire loaf, consisting of 85% Manitoba wheat, is the best bread in the world.

SATISFIED NO LEAKAGE

British Attorney General Makes Statement in House Regarding Gandhi's Arrest

LONDON, May 14.—Sir William Jowitt, attorney general, in the House of Commons declared that he was satisfied that there had been no leakage from official sources in connection with premature reports that Mahatma Gandhi, Indian Nationalist leader, was to be arrested.

PROSPECTORS WERE STAKED

Relief Money in Vancouver Alleged to Be Wrongfully Used By Officers

VANCOUVER, May 14.—Allegations that two "prospectors" had been staked and sent to Day's Lake on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway where Relief Officer George Ireland and Clerk Investigator Clifton Maxwell allegedly own property, was contained in answers given by Accountant Hutchins, of the relief office at the probe yesterday.

The records also showed, Hutchins claimed, that between September and April groceries valued at \$169 were sent to Ole Olsen at Crescent Beach. Accounts for the groceries supplied these men were kept separate in orders from Ireland, Hutchins stated.

It was also brought out that there was a discrepancy of 13,700 street car tickets in the account of Maxwell, who handled the relief for single men.

CELEBRATED EXPLORER

Dr. Nansen died yesterday and the world lost a great man. The voyage which Dr. Nansen made to Greenland when he was a student indicated to him the vast field for exploration and scientific study in that land and in 1887 he began preparations for an expedition to cross the great ice fields that covered the interior of that country. The possibility of his success was discountenanced by many Arctic authorities of that time, resulting in the Norwegian government refusing him a small grant which he had requested. He, however, paid the greater part of the expenses from his own pocket.

The expedition started in May, 1888, joining a sealing ship bound for the east coast of Greenland. Nansen and his five companions left the ship on July 17 to force a way through the ice belt to land about 10 miles distant. It took the party 12 days to reach their objective, in the meantime having been carried some distance south with the ice drift. They struck the west coast of Ameralik Fjord in September and upon reaching the settlement of Godthaab were obliged to spend the winter there. The party returned home in May, 1889.

In 1890 Dr. Nansen conceived the idea of a polar expedition to cross the polar regions by getting his vessel fixed in the ice north of Eastern Siberia and drift with it. His theory was that a drift-current set across the regions from Bering Strait and the neighborhood of the New Siberia Islands toward the coast of Greenland. His plan, although adversely criticized, succeeded. The expedition sailed on the "Fram" June 24, 1893. In September the "Fram" was made fast to a floe in 78 degrees, 50 minutes, north latitude. Shortly afterwards she was frozen in and the long drift began. By March, 1895, the ship had reached 84 degrees, north, and Dr. Nansen decided to make an expedition northward on foot. Accompanied by Frederick-Hjalmer Johansen, a lieutenant of the Norwegian army who had shipped as fireman on the "Fram," Dr. Nansen on April 8 reached 86 degrees, 14 minutes, north, the highest latitude reached by man to that time.

From that point they turned back and eventually reached Frederick Jackson Island in Franz Joseph Land, where they were compelled to spend the winter, remaining from August, 1895, to May, 1896. They lived in a little stone hut and their only food was raw polar bear meat. After resuming their journey in May the two explorers fell in with the Jackson-Harmsworth expedition in June, 1896 and returned to Norway with it, reaching home August 13. The "Fram" followed into port safely a week later.

INTERIOR FARMING

Sheep Being Imported—Surplus of Feed Grain

The farmers are still importing sheep, several carloads having been brought in this winter, says an official report of S. S. Phillips, district agriculturalist, Smithers. In the Houston district twenty-four registered Hampshires have been imported from Alberta. The lambing reports show an increase over previous years. It is necessary that the lambing period be delayed as heaviest losses occur when lambing starts earlier in the season.

There has been some winter killing of alfalfa, although many of the well-established lots have come through well. There is still a shortage of moisture in the ground to insure a normal crop of hay.

The Exchange Agency in connection with the Government Clearing Plant at Telkwa has done a great deal in the way of marketing seed grain. Practically all the seed handled through the Agency has been sold. There is still a surplus of feed grain in the district which will probably be disposed of at a later date. Prospects of marketing all surplus hay appears certain.

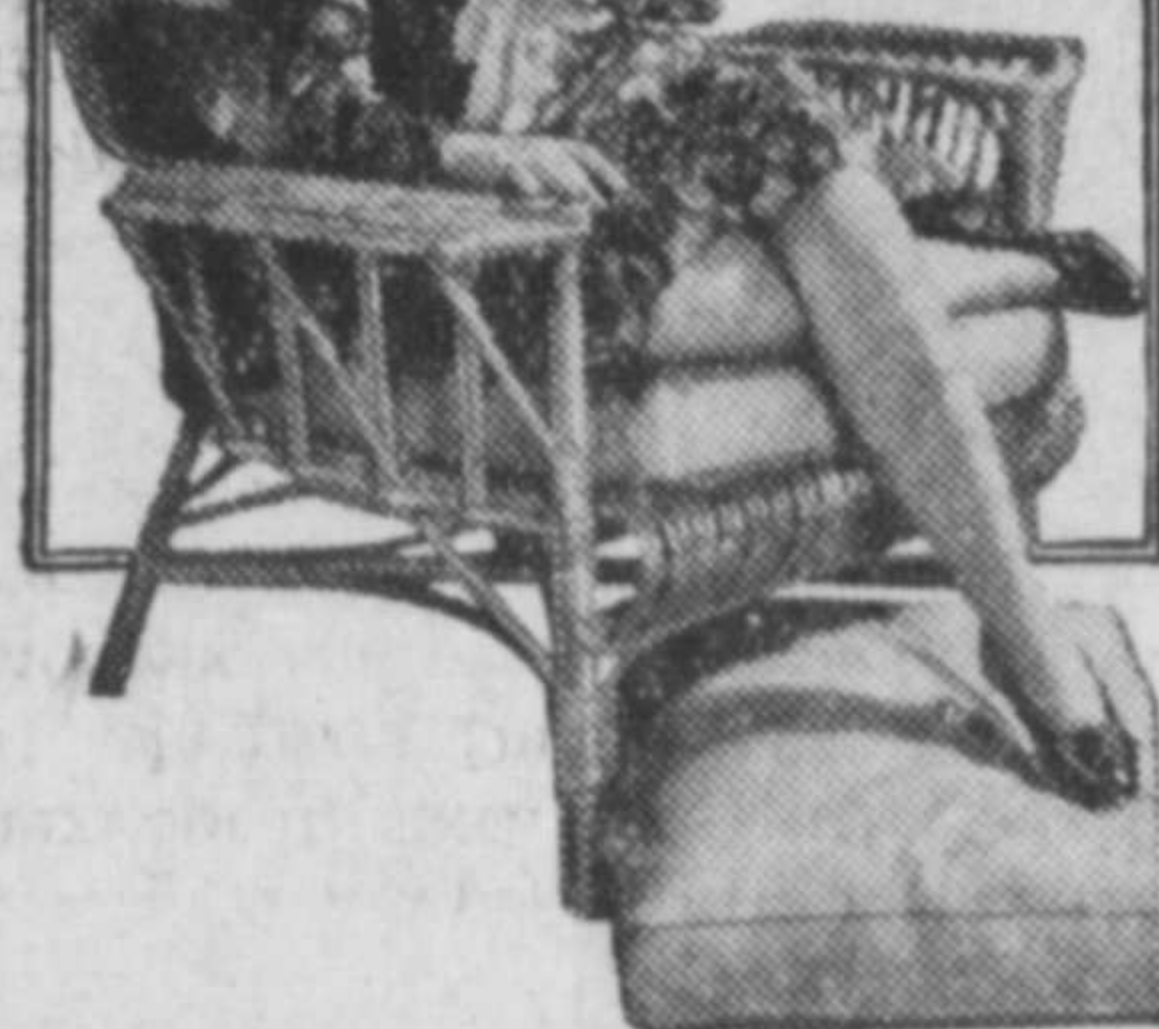

LOG SCALE IS HIGHER

Production For April This Year Showed Small Improvement Over 1929

The log scale in Prince Rupert forestry district for the month of April this year totalled 6,788,042 board feet as against 6,286,498 board feet in the same month last year and 4,767,170 board feet in the year previous. Timber production per species for April this year together with figures for the same month last year for comparison was as follows:
