Cause of Five Post-Operative Deaths In Edmonton Hospital Ascertained

EDMONTON, Dec. 9:--Haemolytical streptoccoci germs, which recently caused five post-operative deaths at the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Edmonton, were carried into the operating room by inefficient sterilized linen due to improper adjustment of steam control valve operating in the sterilization chamber, it was reported by a committee of bacteriologists last night. The chief engineer of the hospital, whose name was not given, has been discharged.

BUILDING CARS

The C. P. R. is building cars for use on their Vancouver Island road. They are being turned out at the Victoria shops and are said to be very satisfactory. Yesterday we publshed pctures of the work.

There is a splendid yard owned by the Canadian National Railways at Prince Rupert. Not only is there a wood working plant but all the facilities for the iron work.

At various times it has been suggested that the local shipyard should be utilized for car building but nothing in that line has been done here. Instead the work is done at the shops in the east or on the prairies where weather conditions are not as well suited to winter work of that kind. Now that the C. P. R. has led the way in getting work done in British Columbia, possibly the C. N. R. may follow.

RADIO INTERFERENCE

Every autumn there is radio interference and it is found necessary to trace down the trouble and try to have it eliminated. This fall has been no exception to the rule. Naturally the new power coming from Falls River is being blamed because it is the one important event that most people think is likely to cause the trouble. Possibly it is the offender but, there are other offenders. This is the season of the year when furnaces go into operation and other electrical appliances are used. Shop window decorations often cause trouble. New vacuum cleaners and sewing machines and all the hundred and one new electrical appliances are sources of danger to the best reception.

We cannot interfere with the power coming from Falls River or with the extension of the use of electrical appliances but usually if the trouble is located it can either be removed or ameliorated. Finding the source of trouble is the chief difficulty. This takes time and skill. Patience is required. Usually late in the evening reception is better than early in the evening, due to some cause not known. As the number of radio owners increases the pressure for the removal of interference is bound to become stronger.
