COAL BOUNTY BILL IS INTRODUCED

Steel and Iron Plants Receiving Benefits to Follow Working Rules

Must Operate Industry In Compliance With Hours and Wages Consistent With Versailles Treaty

OTTAWA, May 28:—A bill was brought into the House of Commons yesterday providing for a bounty of forty-nine and a half cents per ton on Canadian bituminous coal used in the iron and steel smelting industry in Canada.

Restrictions with respect to hours of labor and working conditions can only apply, however, in cases where the provinces have passed labor legislation along such lines.

CONFERENCE DISCUSSED

Dominion Legislation and Merchant Shipping Subject For House of Commons Debate

OTTAWA, May 28:—The House of Commons late Monday discussed the report of the conference on the operation of Dominion legislation and merchant shipping legislation which took place in London last October.

Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, who was Canada's ministerial representative at the conference, moved a resolution declaring that the House approved the recommendations. Subsequently, he made a statement explaining the purposes of the conference and the conclusions arrived at there.

VANCOUVER WOMAN DIES

Victim of Shooting on Pender Street East Last Sunday Expires

VANCOUVER, May 28:—Mrs. Allan Groat, also known as "Bobbie" Kelly, victim of a shooting affray in a house on Pender Street East on Sunday, died in hospital here yesterday, refusing to reveal who fired the shot and insisting that the shooting was an accident.

Gordon Riddell, landlord of the house, was yesterday remanded until June 2 on a charge of attempted murder in connection with the shooting of Mrs. Groat. Police were not ready to state today whether the charge would be amended to one of murder.

RHEIMS, France, May 28:—Cardinal Lucon, Archbishop of Rheims, died here this morning.

EMPIRE FREE TRADE ADOPTED AS PLANK AUSTRALIAN PARTY

SYDNEY, Australia, May 28:—Encouragement of Empire free trade through reciprocal tariff arrangements was adopted yesterday as one of the planks of the Country Party led by Earl C. Page. The conference urged more efficient publicity for Empire goods.

FURTHER SUPPLEMENTARIES ARE TABLED

AVIATION IS LINKING UP EMPIRE

Is Serious Topic of Discussion For Commerce Congress—Aviation In Canada

LONDON, May 28:—Empire business men attending the congress of the Empire Chambers of Commerce yesterday sought ways and means to promote the more effective linking up of the Empire by air.

J. H. Woods of Calgary, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, during a discussion in which he showed that carriage of mail by air in Canada had grown from 15,000 pounds in 1927 to 500,000 pounds in 1929, said: "The carriage of mail, freight and passengers by the air has become an ordinary business factor in our lives within the past two years."

FARM DEBTS ARE REDUCED

Parliament Takes Steps to Relieve Soldiers Who Are Still On Land

OTTAWA, May 28:—Reduction by 30% of outstanding indebtedness of all soldier settlers still in active occupancy of their farms is provided for in an amendment to the Soldier Settlement Act which was given its first reading in the House of Commons yesterday.

CLERK OFFERS TO MAKE GOOD

Clifton H. Maxwell of Vancouver Relief Department Would Reimburse City For Thefts

VANCOUVER, May 28:—Clifton H. Maxwell, former city relief department employee, charged with theft of \$2300 worth of meal tickets by redeeming these at the Wonder Cafe, has offered to make restitution to the city, Mayor Malkin announced yesterday.

On pleading guilty today to the charge of stealing \$2,300 worth of city chattels, Maxwell was remanded until Thursday for sentence.

Counsel for Maxwell requested that the charge be amended from that of theft of \$2,300 to theft of "\$2,300 worth of chattels," the chattels being the meal tickets used by the department.

Queen Mary Now 63 Years of Age

Celebrated Anniversary of Birth Monday in Robust Health and Fine Spirits

LONDON, May 28:—Queen Mary celebrated her sixty-third birthday Monday with most of the members of her family around her. The Queen was in robust health and fine spirits despite the advancing years.

LONDON, May 28:—An official Buckingham Palace statement today said that King George's rheumatism shows definite improvement.

Serious Riots at Bradford, England, Number of Persons Were Injured

BRADFORD, England, May 28:—A serious riot broke out here last night when a crowd of 3,000 people rushed the town hall in an attempt to rescue seven persons who were injured in earlier rioting. Eight of the rioters and one constable were injured. The city was quiet today following the trouble.

INTEREST IN WEST

Lieutenant Governor Says Old Country Is Attracted By British Columbia

VICTORIA, May 28:—There is sincere interest in the Old Country in Western Canada and in British Columbia particularly, Lieutenant Governor R. Randolph Bruce said on his arrival yesterday from a visit in Great Britain.

Accompanying the governor was Miss Margaret Bruce Mackenzie, his niece, who succeeds her sister, who was married recently in the Old Country, as chateauine at Government House.

ESTIMATES ARE DOWN

Supplementary List Tabled at Ottawa Includes Sums For Fisheries and Public Works on This Coast

OTTAWA, May 28:—Supplementary estimates for the fiscal year 1930-31 totalling more than \$11,500,000 were tabled in the House of Commons Monday.

A vote of \$74,000 for the Department of Fisheries included \$25,000 for investigations and activities by the Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission under the Fraser River sockeye salmon treaty and \$25,000 to assist in the conservation and development of deep sea fisheries.

For harbors and rivers in British Columbia a sum of \$134,000 was provided.

WOMEN ARE MASSACRED

Heathenism Breaks Out in Connection With Coolie Fighting in Rangoon

LONDON, May 28:—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Rangoon, Burma, reported that 15 Indian coolie women were massacred by fighting coolie mobs during rioting which has taken such a heavy toll of life. Some of the women are said to have been tortured before being killed.

New Brunswick to Have Polling Soon

June 19 Designated as Election Day, Official Announcement States

FREDERICTON, May 28:—The New Brunswick general elections will be held on June 19, it was officially announced yesterday.

CLERK IS POISONED

Fred M. Bentley Unable to Explain Discrepancies in Vancouver Scavenging Department Books

VANCOUVER, May 28:—Fred M. Bentley, chief clerk in the city scavenging department for the past five years, was found poisoned in his home Monday night following the discovery of alleged discrepancies in the books of his department which he could not explain. Mayor W. H. Malkin announced yesterday.

Bentley is in a critical condition from mercurial poisoning but may recover. Bentley admitted in hospital today, in the presence of the city solicitor and two police officials, that he had diverted to his own use an average of \$200 monthly for the past four years, the mayor announced today. According to Bentley's statement, he had taken the city's cash by writing off accounts as bad debts.

AMY JOHNSON LOST HER WAY

Landed at Quilberry and Refuelled and Then Arrived at Charleville

SYDNEY, Australia, May 28:—Amy Johnson reached Charleville, Queensland, tonight. Motorists grouped their cars to light the flying field with their headlights.

Miss Johnson lost her way flying from Long Beach to Charleville and landed finally at Quilberry. She proceeded to refuel and is spending the night at Charleville.

Senate Favors London Treaty

Naval Disarmament Pact Approved With Unanimity By Canadian Red Chamber

OTTAWA, May 28:—The Senate last night approved the London treaty on limitation and reduction of naval forces. There was perfect unanimity.

FOUR MEN ARE KILLED

Fatality in Quebec When Ground Around Well Collapses and Buries Victims

THREE RIVERS, Que., May 28:—Four men were killed at St. Zephyr in de Courval yesterday when ground around a well, from which they were removing cans of milk, collapsed and buried them. The dead are: Ernest Maroote, his two sons, and Philippe Jutras.

Eight Million Dollars Required to Liquidate Further War Pensions

Sum of \$5,000 Is Appropriated to Investigate Removal of Ripple Rock—Compensation For Capt. McCoskrie Remitted

OTTAWA, May 28:—Supplementary estimates tabled in the House of Commons included an item of \$5,000 for investigation as to the advisability of removing Ripple Rock, a menace to navigation between Vancouver and Prince Rupert. In addition to the items of \$7,000 to complete the fishermen's floats at Prince Rupert and \$11,000 for Stewart wharf improvements, there was an appropriation of \$25,000 to provide for investigations by the Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission under the Fraser River sockeye treaty.

There is also a vote of \$2600 to recoup the British Columbia Workmen's Compensation Board for payments made to the late Capt. E. McCoskrie, port warden at Prince Rupert.

Further supplementary estimates of \$9,479,000 were tabled in the House yesterday afternoon by Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance. Eight million of this is appropriated as a further amount required for European war pensions.

GRAPE JUICE IS GIVEN PROTECTION

OTTAWA, May 28:—Following conferences with grape producers, Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of finance, introduced an amendment to budget resolutions in the House of Commons yesterday to provide protection against importation of concentrated grape juice. The item passed.

To Open Mining and Assay Office at Stewart Camp

Cecil M. Bryant A. R. S., M. E., a resident of this province for 34 years, who for the past 17 years has conducted an office in Vancouver, is in the city en route to Stewart where he will open a consulting mining engineering and assay office. Mr. Bryant arrived here on Sunday last and will sail this afternoon on the Prince George for Stewart. He is well known in mining circles throughout the province.

RANGOON TROUBLE

Sixty Are Dead So Far in Disorders; Have Nothing to Do With Civil Disobedience

RANGOON, India, May 28:—Serious disorders growing out of the dock strike here Tuesday had rolled up casualties of 60 dead and 740 injured. Many more are believed to have been killed as disturbances between the Burmese and Hindus continued.

Apparently the disorders here have no connection with the civil disobedience campaign.

PRICE OF WHEAT VANCOUVER, May 28:—Wheat showed a slight gain on the local exchange today, the price quoted being \$1.10 1/4.

STEAMER IS ASHORE

Seattle Freighter Oduna Drifts Sideways Onto Beach in Prince William Sound Port

SEATTLE, May 28:—Coastguard headquarters here were advised yesterday that the freighter Oduna of the Alaska Steamship Co. drifted sideways onto the beach near Granite Mine, Port Wells, Prince William Sound, Alaska, while making a turn. The steamer is now listing badly.

The freighter Latouche and the coastguard steamer Discoverer are proceeding from Cordova to the scene.

Capt. J. Johanson with a crew of 31 officers and men were on the Oduna which was en route from Seattle to Alaska.

**SEVERE HANDICAP**

Not having road connection with the outside is a severe handicap to Prince Rupert. It is almost impossible to persuade automobile parties to come through to the city from Hazelton owing to the heavy freight charge. To expect tourists to pay forty dollars each way in order to visit Prince Rupert is just a little too much even for an optimist. Until the road is through we might as well give up the idea and devote our efforts in other directions.

There is a proposal coming before the Board of Trade at its next meeting to devote a considerable sum of its publicity money to advertising the city in a booklet distributed chiefly among tourists who visit British Columbia in their own cars. This would seem like wasted effort. If the road were through, it would be quite a different matter.

The city contributes to this publicity fund of the board and just now it is considering the possibility of having to cut off even some of the donations which were placed in the estimates earlier in the year. Under these conditions it seems hardly consistent to bonus a southern publication such as the one under consideration. It is to be hoped that at the board meeting next week the members will reconsider the suggestion and those who have not yet heard of it will oppose it and vote it down.

Tourists coming to Prince Rupert will be brought by the railway companies and shipping companies and will be very little influenced by an advertisement inserted by the city in a little booklet. The city is getting free publicity from the railway booklets, which are the ones most in demand by travellers and are distributed by the million. It also gets free publicity from a number of southern newspapers, the best kind of publicity.

We have no quarrel with the publishers of the little booklet in question but in a time of stress like the present do not like to see public money frittered away just because a high power salesman is busy on the job.

**CANADIANS FOR GOVERNORS**

While it does not make much difference to the country who is the governor general or to the provinces who are the lieutenant governors, we are rather inclined to favor the idea of Canadians being appointed. We know that there is considerable difference of opinion in regard to this. It is a matter of sentiment. A great many people who live in Canada are not yet really Canadians. Their sympathies are elsewhere. We do not see how it can be otherwise. The next generation will feel differently about these matters. They will be Canadians if they are given a Canadian education.

The tendency of the day is against any but Canadians participating in any degree in the government of the country. This means Canadians either born or naturalized.

Some people are so optimistic they never bother about such a trivial and commonplace matter as working.

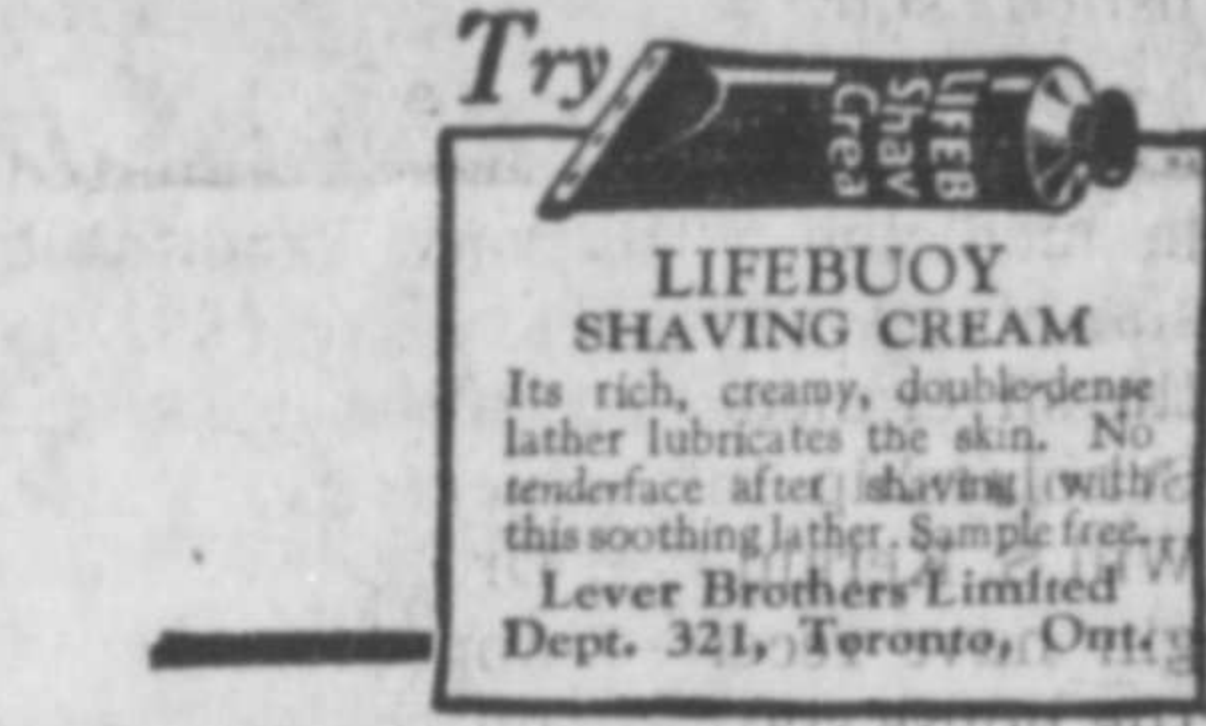

# SPORT CHAT

A fleet of four United States yachts have answered the challenge of Sir Thomas Lipton for the America's Cup with the launchings of the Weetamoe at Bristol, R.O., and the Yankee at a Boston yard. The launchings came as the doctory Irish sportsman was observing his 80th birthday anniversary. The other two United States boats, the Enterprise and the Whirlwind, were launched at Bristol April 14, and Boston, May 7, respectively. The four must now fight it out in a series of trials or eliminating races for the honor of meeting Sir Thomas' challenger, Shamrock V. off Newport next September. Upon one of the four will rest the responsibility of defending the famous trophy, emblematic of Columbia's rule of the wave over Britannic yachtsmen since 1851. In that year the schooner America led Britain's fastest yachts around the Isle of Wight and brought home the cup. Racing for the recovery of the cup, which is bottomless, began on this side of the Atlantic sixty years ago. If the vast amount of money, expended in competition for it and in its defense is considered, the trophy's lack of a bottom becomes almost symbolic. This year's racing alone, it is estimated, will represent an outlay of at least \$4,000,000 before Sir Thomas leaves these shores, with or without a trophy which originally cost 100 guineas. It will be his fifth effort to recover it for Britain and the Royal Ulster Yacht Club and many claim his chances are brighter than ever before. Although figures show the dimensions of the five yachts vary considerably, they are for practical purposes much alike and differences represent the designers' theories. To gain an advantage in one direction they were forced to make concessions in another to conform to the 76 foot rating under the universal rule.

# TAX LIFTED FROM CHARITY

Person May Deduct Up to Ten Per Cent For Donations to Institutions

OTTAWA, May 28.—By an amendment to the Income War Tax Act adopted in the House of Commons today contributions to any charitable organization not exceeding ten per cent of the income of taxpayers are exempt from income tax.

The term "charitable organization" in its legal sense includes churches, schools, universities and institutions for the relief of poverty. In the original form the amendment applied only to churches, hospitals and educational institutions but was broadened to include all charitable organizations.

Banks, consulting engineer for the Selukwe Gold Mining & Finance Co., says that, while the rich ore which the Premier found in its early history has not been found on the B. C. Silver, nevertheless seven ore shoots to date have been found and, no doubt, others would be located as time went on. Four of these shoots had been exposed in No. 6 level by tunnelling during the past year. The best ore body to date was one which showed 120 feet


