Maynard the Flying Parson Wins Cross Continent Flight

flies from Mineola to San Francisco and Return coming in First; There were Sixty-three Starters of whom 27 Withdrew and 9 were Killed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Mineola, October 18. (2 p. m.) Lieut. B. W. Maynard arrived in San Francisco at 1:50 p. m., the first of the transcontinental fliers to complete the round trip to San Francisco and return.

Sixty-three aviators started and twenty-seven have been forced to withdraw. Nine contestants have been killed.

Great shouts greeted the "Flying Parson" when he arrived. His wife and two little daughters were waiting for him on the landing field.

New York, October 18. (11 a. m.) Lieut. Maynard, the "sky pilot," is expected to arrive at Roosevelt Field early this afternoon, completing the first flight from ocean to ocean and return. Maynard won the first leg when he flew from Mineola to San Francisco, a distance of 2,701 miles. He spent last night at Cleveland.

More Ship Contracts; Daily Train Service

These are two things G. S. Hanes, M.L.A. Advises Prince Rupert People to Get after; Is Interested in Mining.

Lieut. Geo. S. Hanes, M. L. A. for North Vancouver, arrived in the city on the train last Thursday evening. Mr. Hanes came by way of the Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific and left again this morning. He will return by way of Prince Rupert and the P. G. E., making a stop at Telkwa.

Mr. Hanes expressed himself as being very pleased and surprised at Prince Rupert's prosperous appearance on his first visit to the city. He considers that an undulating townsite is very desirable for a city and in this respect it resembles his home, Vancouver. Mr. Hanes had a large amount of the grading of the city in North Vancouver and was later mayor of that city for several years.

Prince Rupert, again like North Vancouver, is a shipbuilding city. Mr. Hanes urged the advisability of keeping the Dominion Government interested in letting other ship contracts for the city yards. Now that this industry is started here in the long run it will not have been much to the city if it ceases with the completion of the first two ships. He also advises that the Grand Trunk Railway has been taken over by the Government and that local organizations, such as the Board of Trade, take the matter of a daily train service with the member and get him in asking for daily trains. The inauguration of such a service would not be a very expensive and would, doubtless, pay for itself in the increased business that would go over the line. He thinks that it is just as important on the Grand Trunk as on the C. N. R.

Mr. Hanes, who is interested in mining matters, states his confidence in the mines of northern British Columbia and things that they should be a lot of business through the port of Vancouver. Summing up his prospects up he considers that the industrial future is in Prince Rupert, but urges that the people get busy and see that no opportunities are passed.

400 CANADIANS ARE STILL IN ENGLAND

NO PROGRESS WITH GRAND TRUNK DEBATE

Ontario Elections Interest Members More Than Proceedings of Parliament.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—The House of Commons was not in a hurry to get along with the debate on the second reading of the Grand Trunk bill yesterday. After listening to three speeches the members decided to adjourn the House until Monday and then it is expected that they will be more interested in the Ontario election than in proceedings in the House. It is certain that the taking of a division on the second reading will be deferred until members who have been participating in the contest are back in the capital.

J. H. Sinclair is inclined to favor private ownership under public control; H. H. Stevens, of Vancouver, devoted attention to the circumstances of Hon. W. S. Fielding, whom he accused of being the cause of the failure of government ownership in Canada.

REFUSES TO ARBITRATE STEEL STRIKE



E. H. GARY TESTIFYING BEFORE SENATE COMMITTEE

Eliot H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation, in his statement to the Senate committee says that he will not meet any workmen's representatives and advocates federal regulation of concentrated capital and combined labor. He declares that unions are a menace to the country and refuses to arbitrate the steel strike. Continuing he said: "We put ourselves squarely upon the issue that this is a question of the open or closed shop. Now, as to what will bring about the closed shop we must decide from time to time, depending upon the facts presented. At the present time the union leaders have brought about this strike, which is no more or less than an attempt of a minority to secure control of the interests of the large majority, including not only the employers but the employees."

SIX SHOT IN CLASH GUARDS AND STRIKERS

Cincinnati, Oct. 17.—In a clash between guards and strikers at the St. Andrew's Steel Co. six men were shot.

BRITISH COLUMBIA FLAGPOLE ERECTED

London, Oct. 18.—The great flagpole presented by British Columbia and brought to London from Vancouver has been completely erected at Kew Gardens. Its erection was delayed for several years on account of the war.

TWO TUGS CALLED AT PRINCE RUPERT

The Clayburn, belonging to the Vancouver Tug and Barge Co., was at the Grand Trunk dock this morning and left for Vancouver with a barge load of lumber. She brought up two scows of coal.

The Francis Cutting, of Swanson Bay, was also in. She is towing for the Whalen Co. It will be remembered that this boat used to be an American fishboat but was caught off Cape Scott fishing inside the three-mile limit and was confiscated.

TAX IS NOT FOR AVERAGE INVESTOR

Victory Bond issues of other years had a tax exempt clause which aroused considerable interest but for the great majority of investors could have no material effect. The forthcoming loan has not this tax exemption feature. But it must be firmly impressed that it is only the interest yield that is taxable.

Married people and people with dependents are not taxed on an income of less than \$2000. So it can be seen that the great majority of investors in these bonds will never know personally that the income from their bonds bears a tax.

The tax on bond income is only for rich men to think about.

Canadian Delegates To Labor Conference

Two Federal Ministers, the Provincial Deputy Minister and Two Officials of Labor Bodies included in Party.

Ottawa, October 18.—The names of the members of the Canadian delegation to the international Labor Conference to convene at Washington on October 20 have been made public. Dominion Government delegates: Hon. G. D. Robertson and Hon. N. W. Rowell.

The recommendation as for work people received from the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada is H. M. Draper, secretary-treasurer of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

SHOULD SHIP TO \$250,000

Road Superintendent Says Dolly Varden Mine Ought to Double Last Month's Output.

George Young, road superintendent of Atlin District, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon and left again for Stewart this morning. He has been making an inspection of conditions at Alice Arm and says that, judging from present indications, the Dolly Varden mine ought to double its last month's output of \$125,000 this month.

The government is at present putting in a pack-road to the Climax mine which has been recently bonded. Mr. Young states that the present activity in the Alice Arm district is all that could be desired and great confidence is being placed in the camp by outside interests.

PETROGRAD IS NOT TAKEN YET

Daily Mail Claims to Have Authentic Information to That Effect.

SAYS RUMORS DUE TO SPECULATORS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Oct. 18.—A Helsingfors correspondent of the Daily Mail sent a despatch at 2 o'clock Friday morning claiming to have authentic information that neither Petrograd, Gratchina nor Phkov have been taken.

The correspondent gives details to show that anti-Bolshevik troops had not yet crossed the railroad running between Gratchina and Phkov and intimates that the various rumors now current are due to the manipulations of financial speculators.

STEEL WORKERS AT CHICAGO MAY RETURN MONDAY

Officials Say Mills are Gradually Resuming Full Capacity.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Chicago, October 18.—Rumors today were that the steel strike in Chicago district would end on Monday. This was denied by the laborites.

The company officials said there was no set time for the ending of the trouble, but the mills were gradually resuming operations at full capacity.

A court ruling issued yesterday prevented picketing today at some of the smaller mills.

KRONSTADT IS SURRENDERED

Official Notification by Finnish General Staff at Helsingfors.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Helsingfors, Oct. 18. (Noon). The surrender of Kronstadt, the Bolsheviki naval base defending Petrograd, is announced officially by the Finnish General Staff. The white flag was hoisted over the fortress yesterday.

London, October 18.—General Yudenitch has captured Krasnoe-Selo and Gatchina, south of Petrograd where he met workmen from the city who asked that the army refrain from shelling Petrograd and pledging if this promise was given to join the anti-Bolsheviki, according to a Helsingfors despatch received here.

Latest advices are that the Bolsheviki are still desperately defending the city of Petrograd.

AUSTRALIA BUILDS MORE WOODEN SHIPS

Archbishop Du Vernet On What Constitutes Wealth.

It is well known that a decided increase in the gold output of a country causes a decided increase in the price of commodities. In other words, the purchasing power of an ounce of gold lessens as the supply of gold accumulates. It is not so well known that a decided increase in the currency of a country in the form of paper money has very much the same effect. To tide over a financial crisis during the war, most governments have issued more paper money than the normal ratio to the gold reserve. Under the circumstances this may be justified, but it is of the utmost importance that the people should not be beguiled into thinking that increased currency means increased wealth, for money, be it gold or paper, is not wealth. Wealth consists in the commodities needed by the people, and these commodities can only be increased by labor expended upon the materials of nature assisted by capital in the form of machinery, etc. With fifty million men withdrawn for several years from the work of production, there is at the present moment not enough of the commodities of life in the store-houses of the world to go round. No issuing of paper money, no tinkering with the tariff, no taxing of the profiteers, no shortening of the hours of labor, no increasing of the rate of wages (however desirable many of these reforms may be) will add an extra pound of flour to the depleted store-house of the world, unless such encourages production.

In Russia the Soviet Government has been issuing paper money at a marvellous rate. Workmen have been paid big wages with Soviet money. The delusion that with plenty of such money there was no need to work has widely spread, and many factories have become disorganized and have been closed. Meanwhile, the commodities of life have been dwindling fast. Peasants are refusing to cultivate their fields only to be robbed by the idle poor, or to have offered in exchange worthless money. Not only in Russia, but in many other lands, the world shortage means that millions must perish.

Viewed in this light, profiteering on the one side, and sympathetic strikes on the other side, at this critical moment, seem a crime against humanity. Both the idle rich and the idle poor, by increasing consumption and decreasing production, are adding to the misery of the world.

Arrivals from farther south tell of the way in which people are paving even the small towns, while we put up with conditions that are a standing disgrace. No one expects that very much will be done at once, but if we do a little all the time we shall find that we soon have a city that has a respectable appearance and along the streets of which it is possible to drive without getting mired.

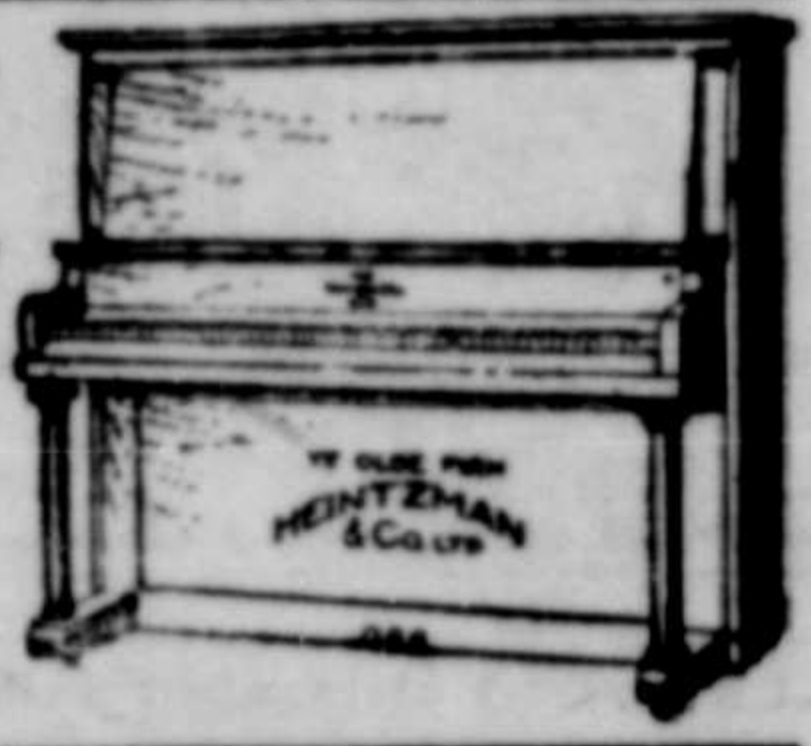

TRAWLING NEAR PUGET SOUND EXPERIMENT

Curious Kinds of Fish Brought Up in Nets and Sometimes Sea Eggs.

Owing to the unsettled condition of the market for groundfish, the trawling experiment which was conducted in Puget Sound waters during the spring by Fred Nelson and associates with the steamer Dauntless, was discontinued during the summer, says the Pacific Fisherman. Mr. Nelson states, however, that the work will be resumed during the fall, when the company expects to have completed negotiations with Middle Western dealers to handle the entire catch of edible fish in carload shipments. The commercial success of fishing by this method will be assured, says Mr. Nelson, when a suitable market can be established on the Pacific Coast or elsewhere. As yet the groundfish has not met with any demand among Seattle dealers, in fact the last two catches brought in by the Dauntless, consisting chiefly of deep sea sole, could not be disposed of to fresh fish dealers and consequently had to be sold to the reduction plant.

Much Prospecting.

Considerable trouble was experienced on the first trip, which was devoted to prospecting around Whidbey Island, on account of rocky bottoms which necessitated frequent repairs to the trawl; and several hauls were brought up which were too heavy to be brought aboard by the tackle, and caused further damage to the net. Places where the government chart shows sand bottoms, says Mr. Nelson, were found to be covered with pinnacle rocks so that it was necessary for him to abandon the government chart and work out a map of his own as he prospected the various districts on the Sound. During the first part of the experiment the fish taken aboard were mostly togfish, rattfish and other species which could not be disposed of for the market, and were sold for fertilizer at \$10 per ton, while sole taken by a Seattle dealer at \$6 per lb. As operations progressed, however, the crew became more familiar with this method of fishing and more edible fish were caught. Heavier gear and a new net to replace the first one, which was made of pieces of old nets, was at length secured, and large quantities of edible and inedible fish were successfully brought over the side of the Dauntless.

Shell Fish.

Prospecting for suitable fishing grounds was carried on in the traits around Whidbey Island and in Discovery Bay. An interesting feature of this portion of the work, as related by Mr. Nelson, was the great variation in the kinds of catches made. At one place a whole net full of fish eggs was hauled up which, of course, were of no value to the trawler and had to be thrown back into the Sound. At another place starfish and many varieties of shellfish were brought up which also were of no commercial value. Several schools of deep sea sole were located, from which large quantities of the finest quality of fish were available. The grounds located this spring by the company will serve as a basis for operations next fall which will be conducted on a larger scale with possibly two or three small boats working the Sound and one large trawler working off the coast.

Valuable Experience.

In speaking of the expenses of the experiment Mr. Nelson considers the experience he gained and the knowledge he has acquired of suitable trawling grounds as well worth the expenditure, and believes that such a knowledge is absolutely necessary before profitable trawling can be accomplished in Puget Sound waters.

In addition to trawling this fall the company plans to engage in the wholesale and retail fish business in Seattle.

According to reports received in town, Lieut. C. R. Murray, R. A. F., is again in military hospital in England. Mr. Murray was formerly principal of the Borden St. School.

A sleigh road is being cut from Burns Lake to Babine Lake in order to take a concentrator in as soon as the snow comes.

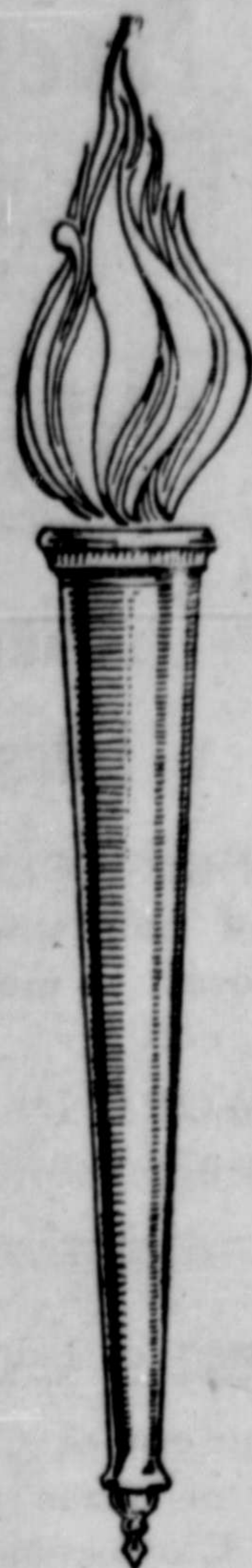

PROPOSE PLAN OF GOVERNMENT

Real and Quebec People Ob-
ject to Taking Over of Rail-
road by the Country.

The following special des-
criptions are featured in the Ed-
monton Bulletin just to hand:
Quebec—George Elie Amyot,
member of the legislative council
and president of the Dominion
Trust Company, of Quebec City,
has announced that although
he has already subscribed to close
on a million dollars to the vari-
ous Victory Loans in Canada, he

will not contribute to the coming
one if the Government purchase
the Grand Trunk at a time when
the finances of the country are as
at present. In a letter, com-
municated to the press he says
that he has subscribed \$50,000 to
the first Victory Loan, \$250,000
to the second, and \$500,000 to the
latest, but now he says: 'I'm
through.'

"Montreal—Opposition has de-
veloped in the Montreal Board of
Trade to the proposed plan of the
Government to take over the
Grand Trunk Railway, as an-
nounced in recent despatches
from Ottawa. The president, Mr.
John Baillie, has recently re-
ceived many letters and tele-
grams asking that official action

be taken by the Board of Trade to
emphasize its opposition to the
plan. Following these requests,
President Baillie on Monday sent
out notices to all members of the
Board of Trade calling a special
general meeting for Thursday
next. It was stated yesterday that
Montreal Board of Trade had been
consistently against the national-
ization of railways and was op-
posed to the plan for the acqui-
sition of the Grand Trunk by the
Government, although the council
was on record as desirous that
the Government should treat the
Grand Trunk with every possible
consideration."
