CANADA GETS ARCTIC SOVEREIGNTY

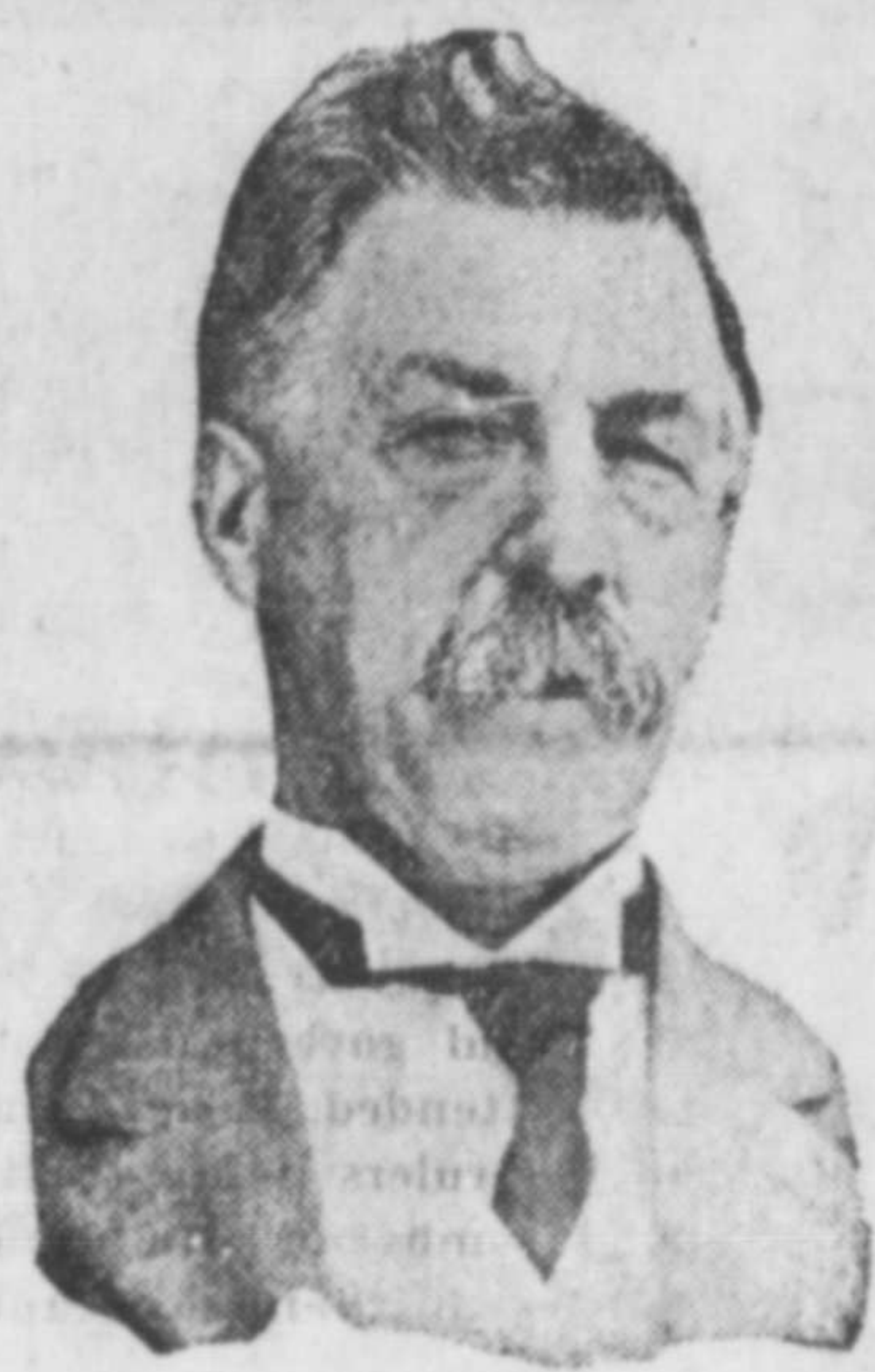
STATUS PLANS MADE BY DOMINION PREMIERS AT PARLEY

Group of Islands Is Formally Recognized As Dominion's By Action of Norway Government

Canada Liquidates An Old Obligation By Paying Over to Commander Otto Sverdrup Sum of \$67,000 For His Work of Exploration

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.—The government of Norway has formally recognized Canadian title to the Arctic Ocean islands commonly known as the Sverdrup group comprising Axel Heiberg, Ellef Ringnes, Amund Ringnes and King Christian Islands, it is announced by Sir George Perley, acting Premier. The islands were discovered and explored in the years 1898 and 1899 by Commander Otto Sverdrup, leader of the Norwegian polar expedition in the Fram. The action of Norway removes one possible ground of dispute as to Canadian sovereignty in the whole Arctic north of the Canadian mainland. Canada, incidentally, liquidated an old obligation when it paid over to Commander Otto Sverdrup the sum of \$67,000 in return for his services in the Arctic islands. By this sum the Dominion also purchased Sverdrup's original maps, notes, diaries and other documents relative to his explorations.

HONOR FOR WAR DEAD

Hundreds of Prince Rupert Citizens Braved Rain Last Night To Attend at Cenotaph

Long Parade

Proceedings in Charge of Rev. C. E. Motte Who Conducted Service

On the twelfth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice which ended the Great War hundreds of Prince Rupert citizens gathered around the cenotaph in the Court House grounds last night to again pay solemn tribute to those who laid down their lives in the Great War in the cause of British freedom and democracy. Just before the parade started from the Canadian Legion quarters on Third Avenue a heavy rain started after a promising afternoon and the shower continued almost undiminished throughout the service. Despite this, however, hundreds stood with heads bared throughout the ceremony.

The service was conducted by Rev. Charles E. Motte, himself a chaplain overseas during the War. The order of service was as follows:

- "O, Canada."
- Prayer by Rev. C. E. Motte.
- The Last Post.
- Hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past."
- Reveille.
- God Save the King.
- Bandmaster Thomas Wilson played cornet accompaniments for the singing, The Last Post and Reveille were sounded by Bugler Rance.

The Address
"Comrades," said Mr. Motte, in giving the address, "we are met tonight to do homage to the memory of those who fell in the Great War. As we gather before this Stone of Remembrance the springs of our memory roll up the curtain of time. Again the scenes of war come before our vision. Again we seem to see our fallen comrades and hear their voices and, as each Armistice Day comes around, we feel it our humble privilege to remember them before the Throne of God.

"As we reverently remember them, let us try to answer the question of their sacrifice. Did they die in vain? In answer let me take you back to August 1914. A nation of seventy million people, who had been taught that war was a biological necessity, and who had been trained and organized for war over a period of 50 years, suddenly mobilized an army of ten million men and was at the throat of her victims before they could defend themselves. She struck a felon's blow at Belgium and the north of France. The story of how Great Britain's little army of Contemptibles dug themselves in on the banks of the Marne will ever stand out as one of the brilliant pages of history.

"The war came upon Canada, as well as the other members of the Empire, as a bolt from the blue. How she felt about it was seen in that within two months of the outbreak of the war her First Division was on its way overseas. That army was raised from our cities, the vast wheat fields of the west, the farms

Great Round Table Conference With India Formally Opened By King George; Bennett Has Place

LONDON, Nov. 12.—India turned a new and fateful page in her momentous history today. In the Royal gallery, looking down on many gilded chairs, the King in a speech of ten minutes opened the Indian round table conference.

It was such a scene as not even Westminster had witnessed before. East and west met on common ground. The clashing races, castes and creeds that make up vast and mysterious India, met in common purpose. The sombre formality of the occidental morning coat predominated but across it splashed many colored turbans and flashing jewels of the East. It was a scene that symbolized the vastness and variety of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Just behind the ruling princes sat Premier Bennett of Canada and the premiers of the other Dominions.

"More than once," King George said, "the sovereign has summoned historic assemblies to the soil of England, but never before have British and Indian statesmen and rulers of Indian states met as you now meet in one place and around table to discuss the future system of the government of India and to seek agreement for the guidance of my Parliament."

"We have met to try to register by agreement a recognition of the fact that India has reached a distinctive point in constitutional evolution," Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald said.

The Maharajah of Kashmir declared the Indian princes stood solidly by the British connection. "Neither England nor India," he declared, "can afford to see this conference end in failure."

Recommendations Are To Be Given Approval From Plenary Session

No Acts Passed By Dominions May Be Repealed By England — Ship Control Switches Over and Nationality Right Is Given

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Prime Ministers attending the Imperial Conference have rounded out the subject of equality of status and their constitutional recommendations are complete for approval by a plenary session of the conference. The decisions confirm in all particulars with recommendations of the 1929 conference on the operation of Dominion laws. The Colonial Laws Validity Act of 1855 will be repealed and thus no acts passed by any Dominion Parliament may be vetoed on the ground that it is repugnant to law of England.

ALL KEPT ARMISTICE

King George Took Part In Ceremonies In London. Yesterday

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Practically every country except Germany paid homage yesterday to the men who fought during the war. King George took part in the official armistice day service and government officials also attended. Most of the European rulers laid wreaths on the tombs of the Unknown Soldier in their own capitals.

The Prince of Wales addressing a large meeting at the Albert Hall made a striking appeal for peace. "We don't want another war," he declared.

CREW LEFT TODAY

H. W. D. Johnson, chief officer, and twenty-nine members of the crew of the Canadian National freighter Canadian Ranger, which has been tied up here for the winter, left on today's train for their homes in Montreal.

When the recommendations are made fully effective, the net result will be:

Each Dominion will have full legislative power over all ships in its territorial waters or engaged in its coasting trade and over its own ships both inter-territorially and extra-territorially.

Any alteration in law touching succession to the Throne will be made only by consent of all seven Parliaments of the British Commonwealth.

The right of each Dominion to define its own nationality is recognized.

Prince Takes Control Plane

CALSHOT, England, Nov. 12.—The Prince of Wales took complete control of the giant German seaplane DO-X for ten minutes during a half hour flight he made in her today.

"He is a very fine pilot," Flight Lieut. Meitz, the plane's chief pilot, said.

Gym Committee to Proceed With Campaign But Not Under Y.M.C.A. Auspices As Was First Planned

Inasmuch as the campaign for raising the funds necessary for the erection, equipment and operation of a gymnasium and swimming pool is now to be very actively undertaken, the general committee appointed for this purpose feel that the time is quite opportune to advise the citizens as a whole regarding the object, aims and aspirations of such an organization. The object is to provide a suitable and certainly much needed facility principally for the younger generation of both sexes of the city of Prince Rupert. It is, however, also the desire of the general committee that provision be made for the accommodation of those of more mature years, in order that they may derive the benefit of clean, healthful and beneficial pleasure and recreation. The sum of \$50,000 is considered absolutely essential to provide a structure to house a gymnasium, swimming pool, shower baths, lockers, recreation, reading and rest rooms, and to equip them in such a manner that the needs of the citizens will be filled adequately, and the structure can be looked upon and pointed to with pride. To have a fully qualified instructor who will be in attendance and provide supervision, and proper instruction to those who make use of the gymnasium and pool. To have an attendant secretary who will have jurisdiction over the recreation, reading and rest rooms and regular secre-

tarial duties such as supplies, equipment and finance. The executive duties to be in the hands of a board of management composed of representative citizens of Prince Rupert, such board to have control over all policies and matters of an executive nature. These are the aims of the general committee. Its aspirations are, in short, (Continued on Page 2)

All Day Search Covering Wide Territory Yields No Trace Of Renahan; Canadians Join Hunt

An all-day search on Tuesday by the rescue plane Wrangell, piloted by Ansel Eckmann, was unsuccessful in finding any trace of Pilot Robin Renahan, who has now been missing for over two weeks after supposedly making a forced landing near here on the night of October 28, while bound for Atlin. Leaving here at 9:45 a.m., the Wrangell was flown as far north as 10 miles above Ketchikan and after going over Digby Island Portland Canal and Observatory Inlet were explored almost to Alice Arm. The Wrangell returned to Prince Rupert about 5 p.m. The plane refueled during the day at Ketchikan and, in all, about six hours was spent in the air. Visibility was quite good. A thorough examination was made all around the Dundas Islands where it was thought Renahan might have been forced down but these islands yielded no trace either of missing plane or party.

BALLANTYNE IS GUILTY

Former Ontario Deputy Minister of Labor Will Appeal Conviction

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—James H. H. Ballantyne, suspended deputy minister of labor, was yesterday found guilty before Judge Denton on a charge of stealing a \$15 dress from a local lingerie shop and was remanded in custody until Thursday for sentence. He will appeal the conviction.

DIVIDEND ON NICKEL

Twenty-Five Cents Per Share To Be Paid to Stockholders On December 31

NEW YORK, November 12.—Directors of the International Nickel Co. of Canada yesterday declared a regular quarterly dividend of 25c. per share on common stock payable December 31 to stock of record December 1.

HUNT IS RESUMED

Four Planes to Engage In New Search For Burke, Missing For Over Month

The provincial police here are advised that two Pacific International Airways planes left Vancouver via Prince George, Hazelton and Telegraph Creek for Atlin where they will take up the search for Pilot E. J. A. Burke and two companions who had been missing exactly one month yesterday on a return flight from Liard River Post to Atlin. One of the planes is a Speedster and the other a Fairchild.

A third machine to leave Vancouver for Atlin will be a Junkers in charge of Pilot W. A. Joers, who found Burke when he was missing last August in the same sector.

All four planes engaging in the Burke search will be ski-equipped.

The two Pacific International Airways planes arrived at Hazelton today, according to word received by the Government Telegraphs.

DISTURBED AT LUNCH

Lord and Lady Willingdon and Sir George Perley Fled From Golf Club Flames

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.—The Royal Ottawa Golf Club was burned to the ground on Monday afternoon with a loss of more than \$200,000. The Governor General and Lady Willingdon and Sir George Perley, acting Prime Minister, were among those at a luncheon who were forced to flee from the flames.

Victoria Man Dies In Crash

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—John Heisterman, youngest son of B. S. Heisterman, real estate broker, was almost instantly killed last evening when a motorcycle on which he was riding collided with an automobile driven by Frank Shapland at the corner of Fort and Quadra Streets.

SENATOR IS DEAD

Hon. J. G. Turriff Passes Away After Long Career In Public Life

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.—Senator J. G. Turriff, aged 75, of Assiniboine, Sask., died on Monday after a lengthy illness. He was called to the Senate as a Liberal in 1918.

Hon. John Gillanders Turriff was born at Little Metis, Que., on December 14, 1855, of Scottish parentage. He was educated at Little Metis and Montreal. Mr. Turriff became a Hudson Bay factor and first entered public life in 1884 when he was elected for Moose Mountain District in the local legislature. He represented the district for three terms. In 1891 he was unsuccessful candidate for West Assiniboia for the House of Commons against Hon. E. Dewdney, minister of the interior. Holding the position of commissioner of lands at Ottawa from 1898 to 1904, he was elected to the House of Commons in the general election of 1894 and re-elected in 1908, 1911 and 1917. He was summoned to the Senate on September 23, 1918.

The late Senator was married three times. By his second marriage, he had three daughters and a son. The son was killed on service overseas in the Great War.

The late Senator Turriff was a Presbyterian. He made his home at Carlyle, Sask., and at Ottawa.

BENNETT SCHEME IS REJECTED BY BRITISH GOVT.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The British Government definitely rejected the Canadian offer of a reciprocal Empire tariff preference put forward by Premier Bennett at the opening of the Imperial Conference.

The Empire Premiers sat until 7 o'clock this evening and found themselves unable to reach any agreement on alternative decisions. They will resume the discussions tomorrow.

One hundred and fifty returned men and citizens sat down last night in the Moose Hall at the annual banquet held by the Canadian Legion to commemorate the twelfth anniversary of the armistice which brought the Great War to a close. There were several fine speeches and an excellent musical program. Merriment prevailed but eyes became wet on some occasions when experiences were recalled between 1914 and 1918 during which time so many loved comrades answered the call from which there is no mortal returning. James Smith, president of the local branch of the Canadian Legion, presided as toastmaster. Decorations of the hall were outstanding. Many complimentary remarks were paid to the work of Jack Preece in this connection. Probably the outstanding address of the evening was that of Bishop G. A. Rix in speaking on "The Day

we Commemorate." It was a very impressive talk. Mayor C. H. Orme, in responding to the toast to "The City," and Olof Hanson M.P., responding to the toast of "Our Country," were both heard with interest. Other speakers were Lieut. Walter Hume, who responded to the toast to "The Navy," and Col. J. W. Nicholls, who replied to the toast to "The Army." G. P. Tinker responded to the toast to "The Ladies." At the opening of the dinner, two minutes silence was observed for fallen comrades. "O Canada" was sung and Grace was pronounced by Rev. Charles E. Motte. The musical program included vocal solos by J. S. Wilson, Joe Seguin, J. A. Teng, Tom Barton, Algie Hunter, R. E. James and Fred Armature; vocal duets by J. A. Teng and A. Clapperton; violin solos by J. Campbell; violincello solos by William Beaumont; cornet solos by Thomas Wilson; comic turn by Mr. Scott; step dance by Mr. eLigh, and community singing with S. C. Thomson accompanying. "Allouette" with G. P. Tinker leading, was sung with much gusto. Accompanists included S. C. Thomson, J. Webster and Mrs. J. S. Black. A poppy collection was taken up and \$27.3 was thus collected.

and orchards of the east, from the forests and the lumber camps and the mining valleys of British Columbia. From the banks of the Yukon, across the mountains and plains of the Dominion to the far reaches of the St. Lawrence, that army was raised. It was no spirit of militarism or selfish idealism that inspired and led these men to forsake their homes and loved ones to face the tragedy of war and death. They came forward of their own free will with the sole purpose of destroying the hydra-headed monster militarism.

"The part Canada took in helping the Empire to place about ten million into the ranks of her army and navy is something to be justly proud of. Her achievement on the field of battle she will never be ashamed of.

"The triumph of the war was not the triumph of militarism. It was the triumph of peace, the foundation of which was laid in the blood of our fallen comrades. On that foundation a structure has been built with the result that the nations of the world have renounced war as a means of settling their international difficulties. In this we have witnessed one of the great miracles of history. War is outlawed. It is doomed. The moral renunciation of war will ultimately result in a reduction of armaments, and it is hoped, their abolition. As the nations organized and trained for war so must they organize and train for peace. We still suffer from our military mentality. We have yet to reach the achievement of the idealism of peace. We have arrived between the two mentalities, and the question of armaments is a problem which will find its solution in the transition of time. The idealism of one generation is the achievement of the next.

"As the cause of peace advances we begin to see more clearly that our beloved dead did not die in vain. They are the real pioneers of a new civilization. As we remember them before the Throne of God, we can, with gratitude recall the words of Him who said: 'Blessed are the peace makers for theirs is the Kingdom of God.' Therefore it is with gratitude and thanks to Almighty God we remember our fallen comrades.

Hundreds of persons marched in the procession which was in charge of Major G. P. Tinker, D.C. M., with other officers of the First North B. C. Regiment assisting. The order of march was as follows: Boys' Band, Bandmaster Wilson. R.C.N.V.R., Lieut. Haworth. Boys' Naval Brigade, Lieut. Blance. Daughters of the Empire, Mrs. J. Manson. Girl Guides, Capt. Rogers. Boy Scouts, Scout Master B. Ferguson. Detachment Loyal Order of Moose. Detachment, Loyal Orange Lodge. Detachment, Toc H. Detachment, First N.B.C. Regiment. Canadian Legion, J. Smith.

After the ceremony, the parade marched back to the Canadian Legion quarters where it was dismissed.

provide—"the greatest good for the greatest number." In order to do this, a facility must be obtained that will prove adequate in all its functions and yet be reasonable in cost, operation and maintenance. It is vitally necessary that it be made available to the community as a whole without restriction except as to necessary regulations covering certain fees, rules of conduct, etc.

From information at hand with the general committee, it seemed that an affiliation with the Y. M. C. A. would be desirable as that body possessed an organization based on practical principles with years of experience in problems of organization such as it was presumed were essential in our case. Accordingly preliminary steps were taken to effect such a connection. As matters progressed and developed, however, it became apparent that there were certain restrictions and regulations as to membership imposed that did not appear to be desirable or conducive to the wholehearted support of the community and to make it "the greatest good for the greatest number." 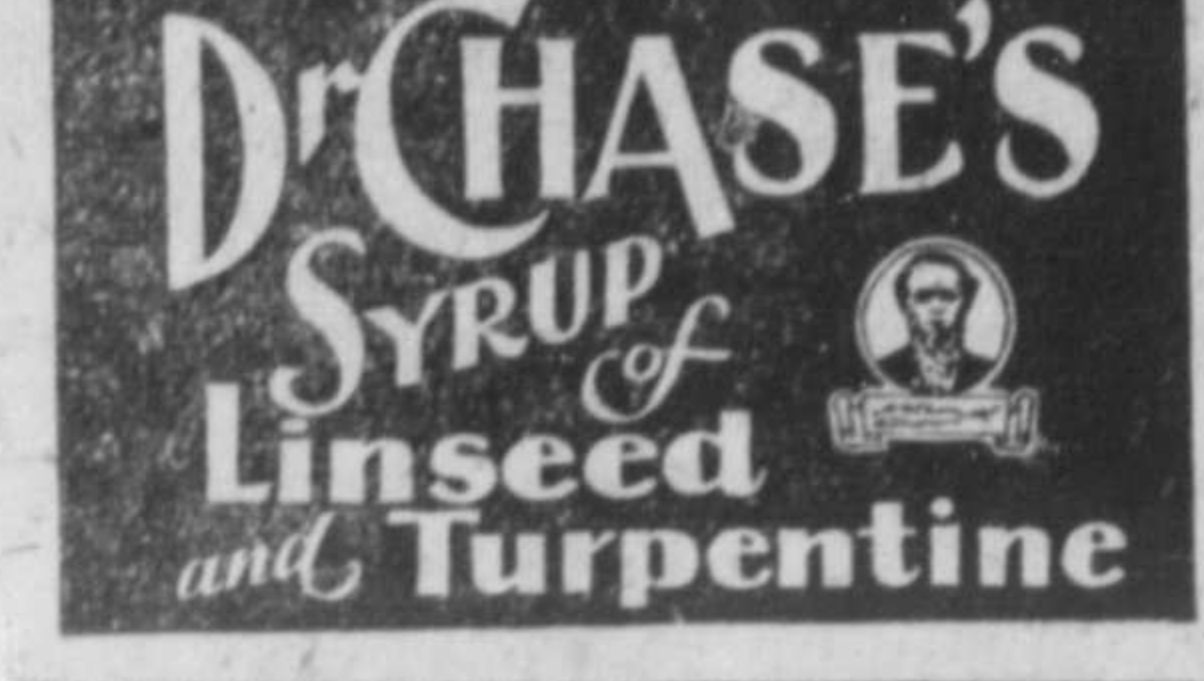

SURVIVAL OF FITTEST

"Too many people, engaged in the actual making of things to sell, fail to sense the all important fact that the better they do their own part in the program the longer their job will last. If everyone who works for wages really appreciated this, inspectors and the overhead they represent could be to some extent wiped out.

WORKS ARE DISCUSSED

Terrace Board of Trade Makes Suggestions to Provincial Government

TERRACE, Nov. 12:—Terrace Board of Trade met in monthly meeting with E. T. Kenney presiding and an excellent attendance of members.

A petition from residents of Terrace and Usk was ordered to be forwarded to the Dominion Telegraphs asking for a commercial service between Terrace and Usk.

The secretary reported having had correspondence with Dr. Wrinch M.L.A., with regard to unemployment in the district, and that a list of about sixty names had been forwarded to Dr. Wrinch.

The total income from the Hallowsen dance was reported to be \$119.75 and the expenses, \$84.70, leaving a balance for the funds of the board of \$35.05.

Discussion took place as to suggestions for relief work and the following proposals were put forward:

Rock work at north end of Terrace bridge; clearing trail on east of Kalum Lake; slashing proposed cut-off on Lakelse road; erection of bridge over Kalum River near Kalum Lake, and brushing out, ploughing and grading Lakelse Avenue within the limits of Terrace municipality. It was decided to forward these proposals to the minister of public works.

The shocking condition of the highway between Terrace and Usk was also considered and a communication ordered to be sent to the ministry regarding same.

It was decided to ask for an increased appropriation for road work in the district consistent with the increasing demands of modern traffic. It was pointed out that the allowance had not increased for 10 years whilst in that period road traffic had multiplied several times.

Suggestions were put forward as recommendations to the minister of public works for the 1931 program, these including the following:

That an outlet be provided for the residents of Vanarsdol by a roadway either east or west; that the Remo road be put into shape to stand up to the traffic over it; that Lakelse Lake road and Kalum Lake road be widened and improved where necessary; and that the government be urged to start work at the Terrace end of the main highway between Terrace and Prince Rupert and that the work proceed westward as well as eastward.

sources at his command for use in the search if desired.

Dividing Up Ground

It was arranged last night that Pilot Eckmann should continue the search from the north, moving his base to Ketchikan. He will cover the southern tip of the Alaska panhandle, Cape Chacon and islands adjacent to the westward.

Flight Lieutenant L. H. Phinney and Flying Officer C. R. Dunlap, who will fly together, will make their base here and have been assigned to cover the Dundas and other islands in Chatham Sound, Portland Canal, Observatory Inlet, Pierce Island, etc.

It has been decided safer and more effectual to divide up the search in this manner so as to eliminate the necessity of planes having to cross oftener than necessary over Dixon's Entrance which is considered by Pilot Eckmann a rather dangerous place.

Eckmann took off this morning for Ketchikan while Phinney and Dunlap went out to make their first search.

Flying with Flight Lieutenant Phinney is Sergeant A. H. Warner, mechanic. Flying Officer Dunlap's companion is Corp. W. C. Atwood, mechanic. Corp. M. Squires, rigger, is coming north by boat to complete the Canadian personnel here.

Pilot Eckmann, incidentally a commissioner of the United States naval reserve, sent the following telegram last evening to the commanding officer of the United States Navy at Seattle: "Earnestly request you to endeavor to send naval planes help search for Renahan, Hatcher and Clerf, missing in Chatham Sound or Dixon's Entrance since October 28. Suggest basing at Ketchikan." A telegram was also sent to the head office of the Alaska-Washington Airways in Seattle urging the company to impress on naval officers the necessity of more planes being obtained to engage in the search.

"If we can get enough planes," Eckmann said last night, "we may be able to get through with the search within a month. As it is, with only a few planes, we may go on all winter without success. More important, if Renahan, Hatcher and Clerf are still alive, it is necessary to rescue them without delay. Speed is the first requirement now in the search."

Eckmann yesterday requested the United States coastguard cutter Cygan to continue to assist in the search for Renahan, working westward toward Cape Fox in conjunction with Eckmann himself. The Cygan, after engaging in the search for several hours yesterday, went to Ketchikan for stores.

Yesterday Eckmann investigated the report of smoke being seen at a lonely point on the Dundas Islands. He went down and found an Indian and white man there, evidently trapped. They had been there only since last Friday so, of course, did not hear of Renahan's plane. There are a number of trappers at various points on the Dundas Islands while at the north end a number of trappers are operating.

Deceived Again

On Duke Island, just across Dixon's Entrance in Alaska, the Eckmann party thought for a while yesterday that they had found the
