Unprecedented Frigid Wave From Pacific to Atlantic Coasts and Heavy Toll of Life Is Reported

SEATTLE, Jan. 18-Throughout the United States from the Pacific seaboard to the Atlantic, the unprecedented cold wave is continuing.

In the middle states there was a serious blizzard yesterday. Twenty-five lives are reported lost in the vicinity of Chicago owing to the cold.

In Montana thirty-five degrees below zero weather is being recorded. In New York it is sixteen above.

For the first time in years zero weather has been recorded in northern Texas.

In many cities throughout the states, it has been necessary to close the schools until there is an abatement in the weather.

In the larger cities, hoboes and tramps, unable to exist out of doors, are reported to be crowding into the jails.

VERY COLD VANCOUVER

Thermometer Descended To Eight Above Zero Yesterday; Fraser River Mills Closed

VANCOUVER, Jan. 18 .- The celd snap of the past fortnight, which reached its lowest point here yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, when the thermometer descended to eight degrees above zero, has resulted in about 800 sawmill employees being out of work on the Fraser River, the booming grounds being frozen over. 


