

Managing-Director of Daily News Seeks Seat on City Council This Year

-H. F. Pullen, managing-director of The Daily News, announces that he will be a candidate for the office of alderman at the forthcoming general election. In connection with his candidacy Mr. Pullen says: "I have no particular criticism to make of the work of the city council of last year, but I feel that at a time when there is hope of expansion and great need for it, there should be an active campaign to try to bring this about and that without spending much money. It should be one of the duties of an alderman. in addition to carrying on the ordinary business, to help put up a vigorous campaign for extension of the industrial activities of the city. With this in view I have in mind active propaganda along the following lines.

1. "I would urse that the city take active steps to try to induce the WINNIPEG, Jan. 6 .- Resident of Canadian Pacific Railway to make its northern outlet at Prince Rupert.

2. "I would co-operate in every possible way with the Canadian National Railway in anything which would make for the progress of Prince Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Rupert and particularly in connection with the proposed tourist hotel. with the suggested steamship line to the Orient and with the new efforts to make this a live distributing port.

3. "I would continue activities with a view to securing the Peace River outlet at Prince Rupert. As a delegate from the Prince Rupert Board of Trade to the Peace River and to the convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, I have already been able to do something with the result that the claims of Prince Rupert are now generally recognized as just. Without spending a large amount of money this activity should

5. "I would urge the cancellation of the elevator lease if the Wheat Pool does not take more active steps to utilize the port.

# Building Roads

The new road law provides for 5000 miles of highways in Asiatic Turkey, and for the renovation of the existing 8000 miles of state roads, most of which are little more than miserable dirt trails. Within the whole land there are at present Phone Red 399 scarcely a dozen miles of asphalt or concrete.

But the best of roads are to spread over Anatolia to the tune of \$60.-000,000 within the next fifteen

years. Under the new law everybody in Turkey between the ages of 18 and 60, except embassy and consular officials, invalids, students, soldiers, and fathers of five living children, will be drafted for road service. Yearly for ten consecutive days, the Turkish equivalents of the colonel's lady and Judy O'Grady and their respective husbands must break stones and shovel dirt, or pay an exemption tax of \$4.

The new 5000 miles of highways will link Angora to Constantinople by a fast speedway; Angora to Sivas. Erberoum and Kara on the Russian frontier; Angora to the Persian frontier by a branch road from Erzeroum; Angora to the frontier by Irak by a branch road from Sivas, and Angora to the Syrian frontier via Smyrna, Konia

and Adana. The \$60,000,000 required for construction will be met by revenues from the state monopolies on alcohol, matches and tobacco, which aggregate some \$16,000,000 annually. Any surpluses from the general budget of the state also goes to the road fund.


