Navy League Worthy Institution.
 We take great pleasure in commending to the people of Prince Rupert the Navy League and its work. Not only during the war but in peace times this institution looks after the interests of the first line of defence the Empire has.

It needs money to keep up the work and on Tuesday the people of this city are to be asked to contribute. They will doubtless do so liberally for we are a seaport town and the claims of the sea folk appeal to us.

Curious Attitude of Union Steamship Co.
 About a week ago the S. S. Camosun met with a misfortune when she broke the shaft of her rudder. As a result she is today laid up. She was bound north at the time and a few hours' steaming would have brought her to Prince Rupert. She returned to Swanson Bay, made temporary repairs and came on here with passengers and cargo. Up to that point everything was correct and from all accounts received the manipulation of the ship without a rudder showed expert seamanship on the part of the officers.

When the Camosun arrived here the natural thing would seem to have been to have drydocked her and had the repairs made. Instead of that, however, some temporary work was done by the engineers of the ship and she was taken back to Vancouver for her overhaul.

The Union Steamship Co. looks to Prince Rupert for a good deal of support. Her vessels ply here regularly and many of the merchants and others patronize them as occasion requires. It is to be assumed that this patronage is of value to the company and that the intention is to continue the service to this port. It is of benefit to the people here as well as to the company.

When there was an opportunity, however, to turn a little business our way, and when all the ethics of the sea would have seemed to make it desirable to make the ship perfectly safe, the company orders its steamer to return to Vancouver and even permits her to carry passengers in her disabled condition.

We know nothing of the relative cost of repair work here or at Vancouver or of the relative cost of overhaul here compared with the other cities, but we do think that an effort should have been made to come to terms with the local drydock concern with a view to having the work done here. The people of this city should insist that in matters of this kind the local concerns be given at least an equal opportunity with Vancouver.

The management of the Union Steamship Co. may argue that they are running their own business in their own way, but so may local shippers when asked for business by the company. The Union Company cannot afford to ignore this port, the business of which is steadily becoming more valuable, especially as the agent of the company is also the agent for the Dominion Express Company, which does a large business with Prince Rupert.

MUCH BUILDING IN BULKLEY VALLEY

Shortage of Lumber Causing Delay in Erection of New Dwellings.

Building in the Bulkley Valley is going ahead as fast as lumber can be supplied. At the present time new settlers are thinking of getting more substantial buildings to withstand the rigors of the interior winter. This summer has seen a greater influx of real farmers to the district than ever before, but the greatest trouble just now is the scarcity of lumber. This is causing considerable delay and inconvenience to intending builders and if the winter is severe may cause discomfort during the cold spells.

There are already a number of new sawmills between Telkwa and the coast and the demand is much greater than the output. The coming of spring should see renewed development of the timber industry in order to supply local demands as well as those of points in the east and abroad.

COLONEL PECK, V.C. IS OUT FOR TOLMIE

The Victoria Daily Times of recent date has the following:

Lieut.-Col. Peck, V. C., M. P., is to enter the Federal by-election campaign next week for the Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture, it was announced today. He will likely speak at the first big public gathering of the campaign which is to be held in the Royal Victoria Theatre next Wednesday night. Other prominent speakers are being arranged for. Dr. Tolmie and others will also hold a general meeting in the Princess Theatre on the Friday night following.

Major Dick Burde, M. P. P., and Capt. Hanes, M. P. P., are supporting the labor candidate.

HYDER HAS SHORTAGE OF BUILDING MATERIAL

Hyder, Alaska, Oct. 18.—Hyder is suffering from the present lumber shortage. There is considerable building activity at the Salmon River camp. The United States government is putting in a new wharf there and all the available lumber is being quickly picked up.

There is not much building going on at Stewart, as the buildings erected in 1919 will be adequate for all the needs that will arise this winter.

Many old timers of Grand Trunk construction days are in business in the new towns. J. McDonnell, who formerly conducted the Northern Hotel of New Hazelton, has moved all his furniture to Hyder and is running a house there, and Roy Moseley is conducting the King Edward Hotel at Stewart. Art Noble is customs officer at the border.

Sport Briefs

Benny Allen, former billiard champion of the world, set a world's record at Kansas City on October 15 when he pocketed 78 consecutive balls. He will compete for the world's championship at Philadelphia on December 1.

Eminent sporting men say that the war has stimulated athletics very much in the old country, especially boxing. Army life has discouraged the spectacular side, however, and has tended more to individual effort.

The French army has adopted basketball as the official sport and the soldiers of France are making rapid progress in mastering the finer points of the game. International games are already on their program and the Frenchmen are very keen on getting more experience at the sport. A series of international games will be played in Coblenz during the coming season which opens early in November.

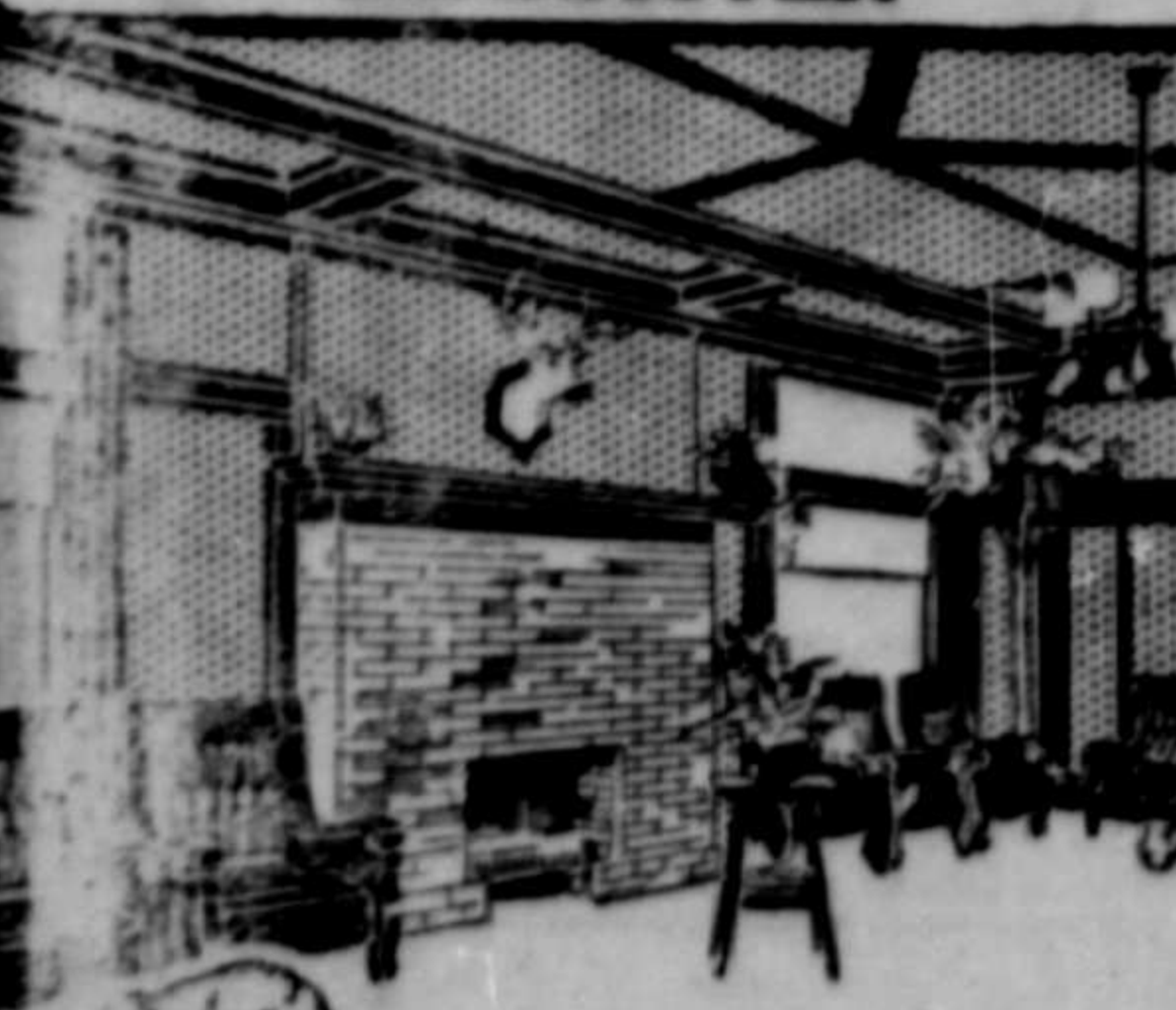

NELSON DAY NAVY LEAGUE

Big Drive Commands Interest and Support of Every Canadian.

Ships and men to man them are the big need of the Empire today. Canada is called upon to do her share in meeting the necessity. Shipyards are busy and new boats are being turned out as quickly as possible to fill the great gaps made in the merchant marine service through the dastardly work of the Hun submarines during the bitter years of the war.

Ships and more ships mean much to Canada, for this nation must have a great export trade for its surplus products if prosperity is to become permanent. Qualified sailors in great number will be required to man these ships. Canada must provide as many of these men as possible, and must have them ready as the ships are ready. To this end the Navy League of Canada is doing wonderful work through the medium of its naval brigades. For the continuance and extension of this valuable mission and for the establishment and maintenance of sailors' homes in Canadian ports the League is now calling upon the citizens of the Dominion to subscribe half a million dollars. That is the object of the Nelson Day campaign which is to be short and sharp. The actual drive will last for three days, October 21, 22, 23, and the duty devolves upon every Canadian to make it a success.

NAAS SETTLERS ASK FOR HELP

Tax Payers of That District Request That Privileges be Extended to Them.

Aiyansh, Oct. 20.—At a meeting of the settlers of the Naas valley held here on September 27 the following resolution was passed:

"That this meeting requests the Dominion Government to make the Naas River Canyon navigable and to furnish wharfage facilities at the mouth of the river, preferably at Mill Bay." It was pointed out in this connection that an appropriation had already been made for this purpose and what they wanted was to get the work done.

Another resolution read: "That this meeting requests the Provincial Government to put on a fifty-ton stern wheel river boat to ply as far as Grace Harbor." This would for the present solve the transportation problem so far as the river is concerned.

The third resolution was: "That this meeting requests the establishment of a community settlement from the Tseax River to the sixteen mile post up the Grease Trail wagon road; and that an appropriation of \$25,000 for roads be asked for next year."

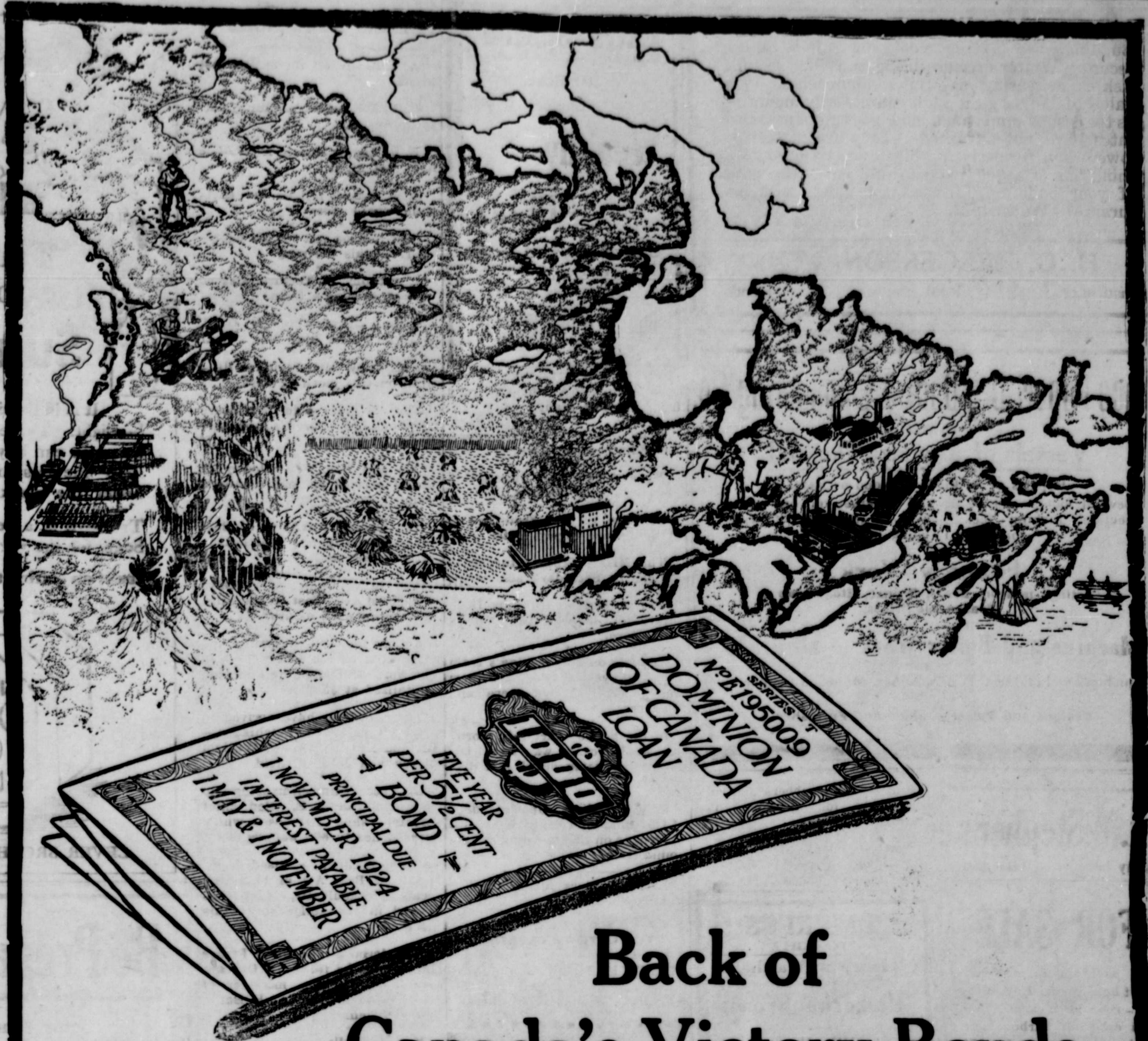
1,600 TRIBUNALS ARE PROBING PROFITEERING
