Nearly 20 Cents a Pound for Halibut

All records beaten at Sales on Prince Rupert Fish Exchange yesterday and possibility of still higher prices

At yesterday's Fish Exchange all high price records for halibut sales were exceeded. First class fish sold for 19.9c and second for 16c. The previous record for car lots was 19.2 for Hirsts and 14.2c for seconds in January, 1919. Last year's price for October 19 was 15.2c and 12.3c.

The scarcity of halibut just now is the reason of the very high prices and there are several causes for the present shortage of fish. The fishing industry has really never recovered from the effect of the strike last summer, when it was given a serious





MUCH BUILDING IN BULKLEY VALLEY

Shortage of Lumber Causing Delay in Erection of New Dwellings.

Building in the Bulkley Valley is going ahead as fast as lumber can be supplied. At the present time new settlers are thinking of getting more substantial buildings to withstand the rigors of the interior winter. This summer has seen a greater influx of real farmers to the district than ever before, but the greatest trouble just now is the scarcity of lumber. This is causing considerable delay and inconvenience to intending builders and if the winter is severe may cause discomfort during the cold spells.

There are already a number of new sawmills between Telkwa and the coast and the demand is much greater than the output. The coming of spring should see renewed development of the timber industry in order to supply local demands as well as those of points in the east and abroad.






