## PREDICTS RUPERT TO ORIENT TRADE

### PREMIER BENNETT GIVES ANOTHER IMPERIALISTIC SPEECH

#### "All For One and One For All" Manner For Empire Going Onward

Canadian Prime Minister Addresses United Kingdom Branch of Empire Parliament Association Last Night

LONDON, Nov. 1.—"All for each and each for all." In the famous old phrase of Alexander Dumas' "Three Musketeers," Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada last night described his conception of an Empire drawn closer together by expanding bonds of trade. He was speaking at a dinner tendered to visiting Premiers by the United Kingdom branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association. Referring to the matter of status, Premier Bennett said: "Because we have secure recognition of equality does not mean that we are given the licence to terminate ties that bind us but rather that, by co-operation and co-ordination, we may be true to the great trust reposed in us."

#### MATERIAL FOR SPAN

Princess Louise Brinks Eighty Tons of Steel and Timber to Be Used in Galloway Rapids Bridge

C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, arriving in port at 7 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, will not sail before 3 o'clock this afternoon for Skagway and other Alaska ports as the vessel is unloading 80 tons of material including lumber and steel for use of the provincial public works department in the Galloway Rapids bridge construction. Some of the material is to be taken out to the job on scows and some of it by truck. It is the final voyage of the season for the Princess Louise on the Skagway route. She is to be replaced for the winter by the Princess Norah.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Obata attended the couple. The bride had a charming appearance in a full white wedding costume.

After the wedding, a reception was held for the older people in Nippon Hall on Fulton Street. There was another reception for younger people last evening. The bride is well known and popular here, having lived in the city since early girlhood, attending the schools here. Mr. and Mrs. Kadonaga will reside at Selwyn Inlet where the groom is in the employ of the Kelly Logging Co.

#### Customs Collections Show Big Decrease

#### WEATHER IMPROVED

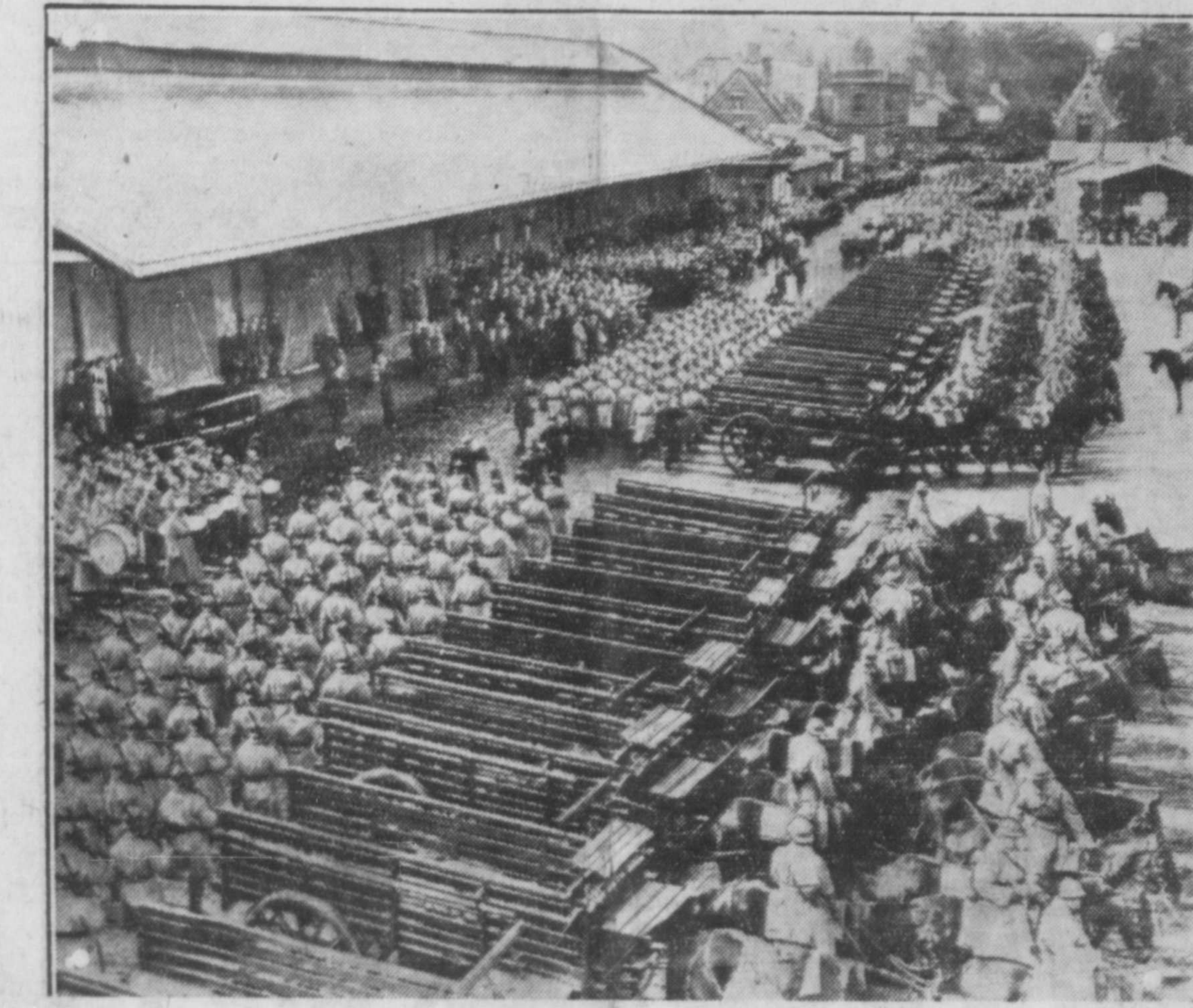

### This Port Is Destined to Play Important Part In Orient Trade, Vancouver Man Informs Japanese

Mayne D. Hamilton Tells Tokyo Business Men of This Port's Advantages and Predicts That Business Must Eventually Come This Way

TOKYO, Nov. 1.—The growth of Canada's trade with the Orient and its future potentialities, especially through the ports of British Columbia, were dealt with before a gathering of Japanese business men here by Mayne D. Hamilton, supervisor of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in British Columbia, vice-president of the Vancouver Board of Trade, and representative of the British Columbia government on the trade delegation of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. Speaking of Canada's chief export to the Orient—wheat, Mr. Hamilton said that Vancouver now has elevators with storage capacity of approximately 15,000,000 bushels while Victoria, New Westminster and Prince Rupert have an additional 3,000,000 bushels capacity.

#### NO TRACE OF FLYERS

Renahan Still Missing Between Here and Vancouver and Burke Out of Atlin

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—The whereabouts of Pilot Renahan and his two companions, who left here on Tuesday for Atlin, remained undetermined today. The general opinion, however, is that Renahan is weatherbound at Swanson Bay. Frank Dorbrandt made an unsuccessful search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke from Atlin yesterday, going as far south as Nakina Summit. He encountered stormy weather with visibility practically nil.

#### Four Fires During October Did Damage Estimated At \$500

During the month of October this year the fire department responded to four alarms. In only one case was damage done, this being when the basement of D. E. Murphy's home on Fifth Avenue West caught fire early in the month. The loss is believed to have been about \$500 fully covered by insurance. Last year in October there were four alarms with \$300 damage.

#### Shake-Up In Harbor Board Staff In Vancouver; Thirty-Eight Of Employees Are Given Their Time

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—The Board of Harbor Commissioners has sent notices of dismissal to thirty-eight members of the inside, outside and sub-executive branches of the staff. This step, it is unofficially stated, is taken in the interests of economical administration and for other reasons. Included in the list of dismissals is W. G. Stickney, assistant secretary; Maurice Quain, electrical superintendent; F. J. Russell, superintendent of piers; Charles Reid, purchasing agent; several policemen and a number of clerks and stenographers.

#### FEW ARE REGISTERED

Householders and Licenseholders to Number of 272 Qualify As Municipal Voters

As licenseholders and householders, 272 persons registered this year for the civic voters' list, it was announced this morning at the office of the city clerk following the closing of registrations last evening. Last year 296 persons registered in these categories and the year before, 335. There was little activity this year in getting names on the list.

#### SCALING IS DECREASED

The timber market being at a standstill, log scaling in Prince Rupert district for the month of October this year totalled 8,133,972 board feet showed a sharp decrease from 13,823,304 board feet in the same month last year. The scalings of practically all varieties showed decreases. Following are scaling figures for October this year with those of the same month in 1929 for comparison:

Pole production for October this year totalled only 423,787 lineal feet as against 2,721,282 lineal feet in the same month last year. The production was barely ten per cent of the same month last year. There were 593 cords of cordwood cut this October as against 216 last.

#### BROTHER TO SEARCH BROTHER WHO IS MISSING ON COAST

According to word received by radio last night, a brother of Robin Renahan, who is missing on a flight from Vancouver to Atlin to join in the search for Pilot E. J. A. Burke, was to hop off from Seattle this morning to scout the coast for trace of the missing rescue flyer. The last heard of Renahan was when he passed Alert Bay on Wednesday afternoon heading out over Queen Charlotte Sound.

#### NEW ORANGE BRANCH HERE

A Grand Black Preceptory, the first of this higher branch of the Loyal Orange Lodge to be formed in Northern British Columbia, has been organized in Prince Rupert. The formal opening will be conducted next Wednesday by O. W. Wakelin, grand registrar of the Grand Black Chapter of the Orange Association for British Columbia. A large number of prospective local and district candidates will assist in the inaugural.

#### LOGGERS TO WORK

Plans Being Made to Re-Open Camps and Give Employment to Many

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—Plans to send 5,000 to 6,000 unemployed coast loggers back to the camps in the woods during the present depression are under consideration by the British Columbia Logging Association, it is announced by R. V. Stuart, manager of the organization.

Financial assistance will be sought from the provincial government and a delegation will go to Victoria, probably early next week, for that purpose.

TRYING TO SELL P. G. E.

For years various governments have been trying to sell the P. G. E. but so far without success. With persistence some government is pretty sure to succeed. British Columbia does not want the railway. The province wishes to be relieved of the burden of overhead taxes which it entails. The difficulty is that no one wants it unless a bonus is given along with it sufficient to make it practically a free gift to the purchaser.

Prince Rupert's position in regard to it is that the needs of the Peace River country should not be sacrificed to that of the P. G. E. The country is too large and rich to have its interests made subservient to any railway, much more to a little jerkwater affair like that leading from nowhere to nowhere which the North Vancouver people are so crazy about.

We should like to once more remind the powers that be of the fact that the route to Prince Rupert is the natural one for the outlet from the Peace River country and that to try to turn the business into unnatural channels is to handicap the farmers of the Peace who will have to pay for the transportation.

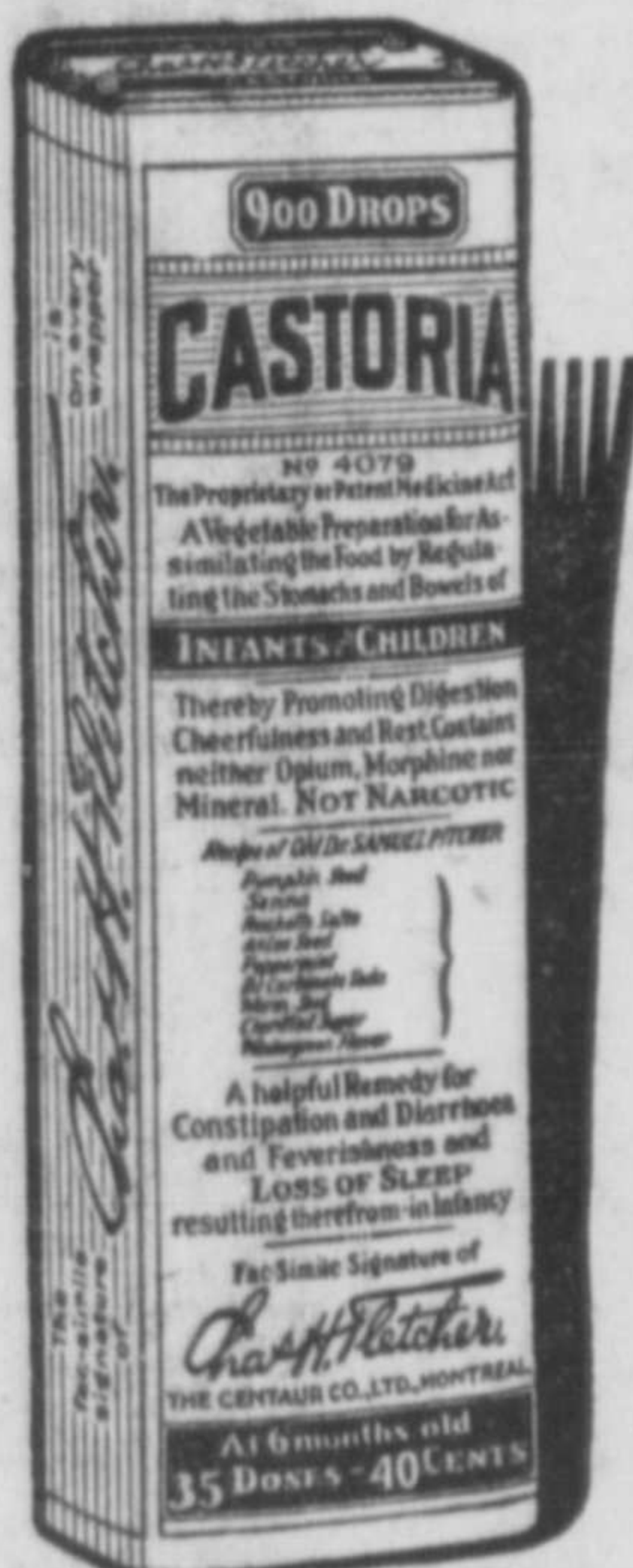
VICTORY FOR EMPIRE TRADE

The first contest in Britain since Premier Bennett proposed to the Imperial Conference that a system of Empire trade should be established on the basis of an all-round tax against other countries, has resulted in a victory for the candidate favoring the Canadian proposal. This may or may not mean anything but from this distance it seems as if it were an indication of the British trend of thought today. It follows out the suggestion made in these columns recently that the party favoring free trade within the Empire has a good chance of winning the next election.

Possibly the small Liberal group, seeing the tendency of the day, will throw in its lot with Labor to hold off the general election for a year or two. No one can be sure just what will happen there.

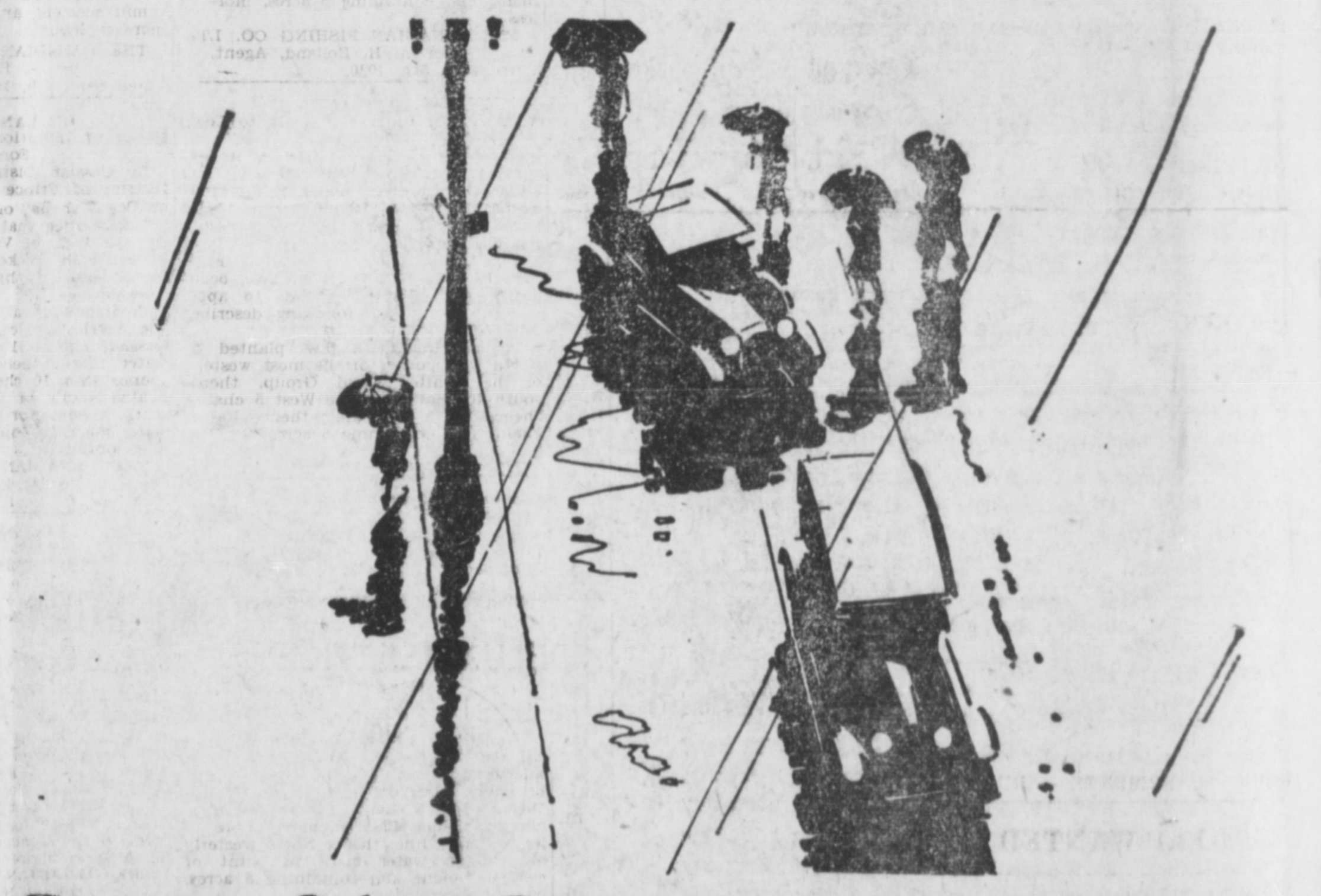

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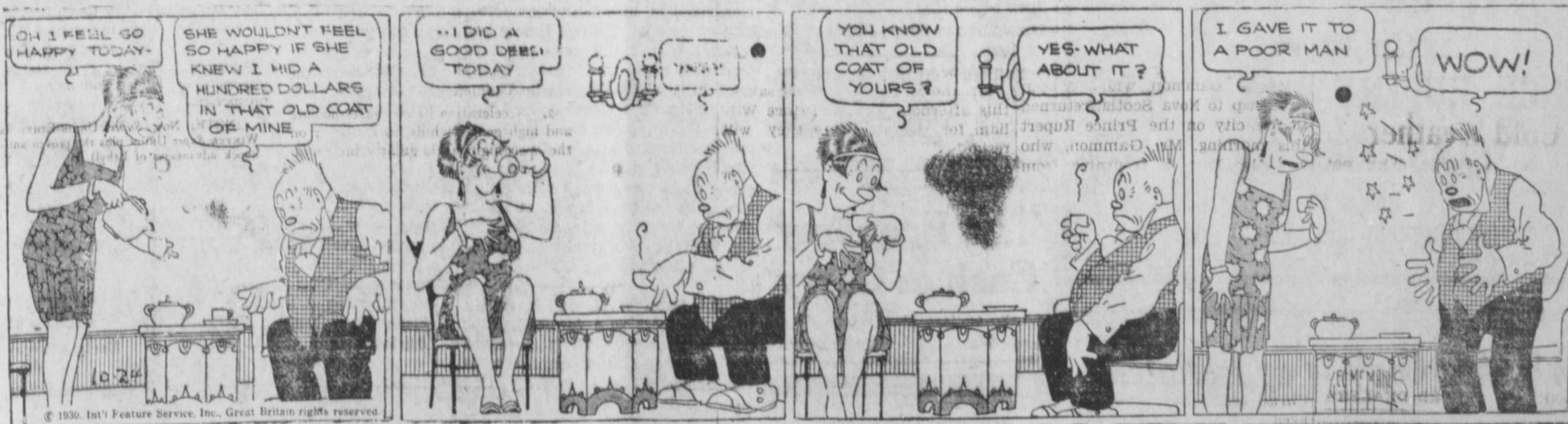

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

### Fur Seal Treaty May Be Revised—Halibut Boats Tying Up Now—Landings For Week

Preparations are being made by the Japanese government for resumption of negotiations looking to the revision of the four-nation fur seal treaty under which certain islands in the northern areas belonging to Canada, United States, Japan and Russia are permanently closed to sealing fleets. The Japanese have complained for several years that they are the heaviest losers under the pact because one of the assumptions under which it was made, namely, that the same seals return to the same islands each year, has been disproved. It is contended that seals from the Japanese island in the Pribilof group, to which the treaty applies, have recently been found in the Hokkaido group. Fishermen in northern waters have been notified to report whenever they find foreign seals in the vicinity of the Japanese island. It has also been contended that the seals have increased to such an extent under protection of the treaty that they are destroying fish which Japanese fishermen catch in these waters. The four nations treaty was entered into because it was feared that the slaughter of the seals in that maritime area was so great as to threaten the species with extinction. The Pribilof Islands, belonging to the United States, certain islands belonging to Japan and the Comandorski Islands, belonging to Russia, all of which are breeding places for seals, were declared permanently closed to sealing. All nations are declared to be in favor of reopening the treaty but negotiations have been complicated by the refusal of the United States to recognize the Soviet Government of Russia. The treaty was made with the Czarist government but has been accepted and observed by the Soviet.

### Returning Down Coast

Harry Scott, who has been spending the past few weeks in town while his gasboat Lila was undergoing an extensive renovation, plans to leave about next Monday on his return down the coast to resume his hadlogging operations in Grenville Channel about seven miles this side of Lowe Inlet. He will clean up the logs on his limit about next June, he expects. Of late Harry has been doing some prospecting along the coast with interesting results and more may be heard of this anon.

Owing to the very dry summer and lack of water in the streams, very few fish were able to get into

the spawning streams on Portland Canal during the past season, it is stated. Large schools of fish hung around the mouths of the streams trying to get in and many of them were in a spawning condition even then—eggs being seen floating everywhere. Rains last month may have allowed some of the fish to get up, however.

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All the halibut boats are either on their final trips of the season now or have already tied up for the winter. On November 15, an even fortnight from today, the season will close and fishing cease. A week after that should easily see the last boats in with their catches. The last boats out will be principally the larger ones. The present stormy weather and the prospect of more of the same kind during the next two weeks has made it advisable for the most of the smaller boats to already tie up.

An interesting marine visitor during the past week was the floating cannery Princess Beatrice which came up from Rivers Inlet on Sunday afternoon for docking, returning down the coast on Tuesday. The Princess Beatrice, in her day two decades ago or so one of the most palatial and popular liners travelling in the coast trade, is considerable of a contrast to that at present. Bereft of her smoke-stack and her interior filled with machinery where once was comfortable passenger accommodation, she presented a strange sight without and within. It even made old friends feel just a little bit sorrowful to see her that way. It was a contrast, indeed, to see the new liner Princess Louise, also of the C. P. R. fleet to which the Beatrice once belonged, follow the older vessel into the harbor Sunday afternoon. It was 21 years ago last August that the writer remembers making his first trip to Prince Rupert aboard the old Princess Beatrice. On the same trip Sir Charles and Lady Rivers-Wilson and Sir Charles M. Hays and daughter, with their entourage, were passengers coming north on the good old ship. Lady Rivers-Wilson kindly scribe nut chocolate just before the Beatrice entered Queen Charlotte Sound and he has never liked that kind of chocolate since. Probably to many other old timers of Prince Rupert, the Princess Beatrice recalled interesting memories of pioneer days. There are only two other boats of the good old days that still come to Prince Rupert once in a while. One is the Union Steamship Co.'s Camosun and the other the C. P. R. Princess Royal which have had an equally colorful career, were equally popular in the early days and are still going strong in the coast trade. A little younger than the Princess Beatrice, the Camosun is a steel vessel whereas the other two are wooden.

figured prominently in a recent rescue feat. In command of the company's cannery tender "Waterland," Capt. Wold was nearing Seattle on his way from Kodiak Island when, in the tide rips off Point No Point, he spied the cruiser Wandere on fire and its occupants two prominent Seattle yachtsmen, bucking the waves in a 10-foot dinghy. Picking the men up, Capt. Wold hooked a line on to the remains of the yacht which he beached at Edmonds, taking the owner and his guest back to Seattle. Capt. Wold had previously won distinction when in the winter of 1923, with his small halibut schooner Attu, he towed the large tug Roosevelt away from the reefs of Middleton Island and towed her through a howling gale to safety in Prince William Sound.

### Canada Fish Week

Canada Fish Week will be observed this year from November 17 to 22, the date having been set by the Canadian Fisheries Association at its recent convention in Montreal. The idea is to observe the week all over Canada from coast to coast. It is not known as yet whether there will be any special observance of the week in Prince Rupert. It will mark the closing of the halibut season on the Pacific Coast.

Towards the latter part of September and during October, a large number of American halibut fishing boats put into Victoria to load herring bait. On one day the Aleutian, Unimak, President and Chancellor visited the Spouse wharf in the inner harbor of the Capitol port to load bait supplied by the Sooke Harbor Fishing & Packing Co. The boats took enough bait at Victoria for a 15-day cruise to see them back to Seattle.

The large lighthouse tender Estevan, Capt. Harry Bilton, is still in waters contiguous to this port carrying out heavy work in connection with aids to navigation in north coast waters. The vessel was at the Philpott-Evitt wharf coaling the most of Thursday. The smaller local tender Newington is still at the local dry dock undergoing overhaul. The Newington seems to spend a great many of her days in dock now. Possibly, it is time they thought of getting a new lighthouse tender as well as a new snagboat for our waters.

Robert R. Payne, well known locally and in the district as production manager of the Canadian Fishing Co., has recently been named as a new member of the board of directors of the company.

James S. L. McMillan of the Imperial Oil Co. staff at Sarnia, Ont., has come to Vancouver as research chemist for the B. C. Packers. He is associated with Don Finn, former director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, who is in charge of the research department for the B. C. Packers.

Deer and bird hunting is being pursued here this season with the usual interest, every week-end seeing parties hie forth. The hunters seem to be meeting with moderate success. Rupert Benson seems to be leading the bird hunters, getting his goose every week-end as regular as the clock. The rainy weather does not seem to dampen the spirits of the sons of Nimrod a whit.

Harold Lokken, manager of the Fishing Vessel Owners' Association of Seattle and well known to most of the halibut fishermen on this coast, returned to Seattle recently after a fortnight's vacation along the coast as far south as Monterey, Cal. He visited such minor halibut ports as Astoria, Newport and Marshfield, Cal., and Eureka, Ore.

The American halibut boat Spray, well known here, was withdrawn from halibutting recently by her owner and master, Capt. William Selset, and has turned temporarily at least to herring operations. Capt. Selset became associated with Albert Coel at Kodiak and has been using the Spray to carry herring from the fishing areas to Kodiak for curing.

week of Saturday to Friday inclusive totalled 546,000 pounds of which 64,200 pounds was from Canadian boats and 481,800 pounds from American. The landings for the season up to yesterday totalled 22,991,100 pounds made up of 6,227,000 pounds Canadian fish and 16,764,100 pounds American.

Prices during the week were steady, generally speaking. The top bid for Canadian fish was 14.2c and 7c which the Tramp was paid for 2,500 pounds while the low bid of the week was 8c and 4c which the Covenant received for 13,500 pounds.

The high bid of the week for American fish was 15.9c and 6c which the Alki and Onah were paid for catches of 2,300 pounds and 3,500 pounds respectively. American prices sank as low as 7.6c and 4c which the Eldorado received for 16,000 pounds.
