TERRIFIC WIND STORM HITS ALBERTA

SEARCH FOR RENAHAN CONTINUES WITH RENEWED ZEAL

Sixty Mile Gale Does Damage in Edmonton And at Other Points

Roofs Torn Off Buildings By Northerly Blast and Heavy Signs Tossed For Hundreds of Feet While Pedestrians Sent Helplessly Whirling

EDMONTON, Nov. 24.—A north wind travelling up to sixty miles an hour tore roofs off buildings, tossed heavy electrical signs hundreds of feet and set pedestrians a-whirling in Edmonton and Northern Alberta towns on Saturday. There was damage of \$20,000 in Edmonton alone. Prairie fires whipped into wooded territory threatened destruction to several communities. Near Bisburn in Northern Alberta, five farmers lost their homes, stables and stock from fire.

Today the flames were still roaring in some sections.

At Drumheller a theatre audience was thrown into panic when the wind removed the roof but without injury to anyone.

MORGAN CAMP CLOSED DOWN

Logging Operations On Cumsheewa Inlet Are Suspended For Winter By Company

The John R. Morgan Logging Co., which had up to sixty men on its payroll during the season, has closed down operations at its logging camp on Cumsheewa Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, for the winter. The final crew of 18 or 20 arrived in Prince Rupert on the Prince William last night and will sail tomorrow afternoon on the Catala for Vancouver.

John R. Morgan, head of the company, expects to spend the winter between Prince Rupert, where he has sawmilling interests, and Vancouver, where Mrs. Morgan has taken up residence for the next few months. He will be here from Cumsheewa next week on the Prince William.

MAKES NO STATEMENT

Acting Premier Suggests That Banks or Pool Might Make Announcement

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—A statement in respect to reports that the Dominion government had agreed to get behind the banks in immediate steps the banks might take to assist the western wheat pools should come either from the banks or from the wheat pools, Sir George H. Perry, acting prime minister, stated today when the reports were again referred to him.

The same applied to the report that J. I. MacFarland of Calgary had been named head of the central selling agency of the pool. Sir George expressed surprise that no announcement had yet been made with respect to Mr. MacFarland.

WILL START FRESH CASE

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Fresh actions will be started by the Ontario government against I. W. C. Solloway and Harvey Mills. It is announced by Attorney General Price who expressed surprise that the Alberta government had withdrawn its appeal against the sentences imposed upon Solloway and Mills.

Canadians Took Valuable Prizes in Sweepstakes on Manchester Handicap



IS KILLED IN BLAST

Dan Vanich and George Raelch, miners, and Andrew Saltesback, a mine hand, suffered shock.

ESSENTIALS LAID DOWN

New India Constitution Must Work and Evolve, Says Premier MacDonald

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald has laid down two essentials for India's proposed new federal constitution. They are: it must work and it must evolve. There was no use producing a constitution that would not work, the Premier said, in concluding the first general debate of the round table conference on India.

"A constitution that would not work will not get you out of your difficulties and it will not get us out of ours," the Prime Minister said.

SPECULATION AS TO NEW GOVERNOR

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—Reports reaching Ottawa from England indicate that either the Earl of Athlone, retiring governor general of South Africa and brother of Queen Mary, or the Earl of Harewood, former Viscount Lascelles and husband of Princess Mary, will be the next governor general of Canada, says the Ottawa Evening Citizen in a feature story today.

Furious Gales and Torrential Rains Do Widespread Damage In Countries of Northern Europe

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Furious gales, accompanied by torrential rains, lashed the continent today, taking at least nine lives and inflicting serious injuries upon hundreds. The tempest wrought havoc in France, Belgium, Germany and Austria. Belgium appeared to be the heaviest sufferer, the low countryside being inundated when swollen rivers topped the dykes and overran the fields. France was under water from Le Havre to Paris.

Terrace High School Debate

Would Give Doctor Right to Put Incurable Patients Out of Misery

TERRACE, Nov. 24.—At a meeting of the Terrace High School Literary Society here Friday afternoon, there was a very interesting debate. The subject of the debate was "Resolved That a Doctor Should Have the Right to Put a Patient, Suffering from an Incurable Disease, Out of Misery." The debaters were: affirmative, Dud Little and Bertha Moore; negative, Jack Sparks and Doris Holden.

C. Michiel and R. B. Wallace and Miss Munro of the public school staff, acting as judges, came to the decision that the affirmative had won with a score of 73 and negative 59.

Rev. E. A. McCarthy gave a short criticism on the debate, pointing out that the negative downfall was largely due to their neglecting to keep to the resolution.

OLD LAKELSE HOTEL BURNS

Premises Containing Baths Destroyed By Fire Last Week

TERRACE, Nov. 24.—The old hotel at Lakelse Hot Springs, containing the baths, was destroyed by fire of unknown origin last week.

PLANES ARE UNREPORTED

No Word From Two Smithers-Telegraph-Creek Machines Owing to Wire Trouble

VANCOUVER, Nov. 24.—Because of wire trouble over the week-end, no word has been received from the two Pacific International Airways planes which left Smithers on Saturday for Atlin to take up the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke and two companions or of Pilot E. L. Wasson of the Treadwell-Yukon Exploration Co. who left Whitehorse on Saturday to fly to Liard Post via the Frances Lake district in search for Burke.

Two Navy Planes Reach Ketchikan; Will Scour Panhandle's South End

Now Believed Best Chance Lies There For Finding Missing Flyers Alive—Hope of Discovering Them Near Here Almost Exhausted

The most important development of the week-end in connection with search operations for Pilot Robin Renahan and two companions, Frank Hatcher, mechanic, and Sam Clerf, guide, who became missing four weeks ago tomorrow evening while flying from Butedale to Ketchikan in an Alaska-Washington Airways seaplane en route to Atlin to join the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke and two companions, was the arrival yesterday afternoon at Ketchikan of two United States Navy Loening amphibian planes. The two American planes had jumped from Seattle to Alert Bay on Saturday, completing the flight to Ketchikan yesterday. Although they came up the inside passage, they did not call or pass over here. This was probably because the port was obscured by a thick misty rain that prevailed all day and which prevented Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap from continuing the search from here in two Royal Canadian Air Force seaplanes.

While there was still considerable low cloud here during the earlier part of this morning, a general improvement in weather conditions seemed in prospect and it was hoped that the planes both here and at Ketchikan would be on the hunt today. There is much ground to be still covered around the many islands and lakes on the southern tip of the Alaska panhandle. Interest in the search will now centre around that territory for it is there, if anywhere, that searchers believe there is now the best chance of finding Renahan and his two companions alive. Pilot Ansel Eckmann, colleague of Renahan's in the Alaska-Washington Airways service, who has already been engaged in searching for over two weeks, expresses strong hopes of Renahan and his party being found safe somewhere in that inaccessible area. "There are many islands and lots of wild country up there, and Renahan may have made a forced landing in an inaccessible place which will be hard to find," Eckmann declares. "It's just a matter of going over every bit of that country and if the plane didn't go into the water, we're pretty sure of finding it."

Eckmann, who went south last week to get a brand-new plane in which to continue the search, should be back in Ketchikan at once. He was expected to come north with the Navy flyers yesterday. The three planes will concentrate without delay on the southern end of the panhandle and, if there is anything to be found there, it should be soon located.

A refueling ship, the naval tug Swallow, which came north from Seattle at the week-end, will assist the American planes and should greatly facilitate the search operations by the service she will be able to give.

Little Chance Locally
With the search from Ketchikan now starting in real earnest, the ten thousand or so miles of search flying that has been done during the past three weeks out of Prince Rupert has pretty surely established that there is no plane disabled though safe in this area. The Air Force flyers are now making efforts by close flying to locate wreckage either on the shore lines or in the timber. The nature of the search which is now being carried on needs fine weather and, during the past week, this has been much lacking.

Arthur Dawe to Give His Garage Away and Go Travelling

VANCOUVER, Nov. 24.—Arthur P. Dawe, who won more than \$400,000 on the Dublin Sweepstakes, is a native son of Vancouver. He is 35 years of age and married. He operates a garage and service station in the Kitsilano district.

Although he had had little time to get used to the possession of wealth, Mr. Dawe said today that his first step would be to clear the garage of debt and then deed it to the two boys who are now assisting him. Then he and his wife will probably take a trip.

Dawe holds a master mariner's ticket and was first officer in Canadian National freighters and captain of some of the Pacific Coyle Navigation Co.'s tugs. He opened the gas station about four months ago.

Mr. Dawe was educated in the public schools of Vancouver and the University of British Columbia.

NOT TO BE CANDIDATE

Ex-Mayor Newton Apparently Has Little Intention of Contesting Mayoralty This Time

Asked on Saturday afternoon about rumors that he might again be a candidate for the chief magistracy, Ex-Mayor S. M. Newton did not give a definite answer. He stated that, while he had been requested by friends to again enter the ring, he had given the matter little thought. It was to be gathered that the former mayor, meantime at least, had no intention of being a candidate.

Funeral Rites Held Yesterday

Remains of Late William Stewart Scott Forwarded Today to Saskatoon For Burial

Funeral service for the late William Stewart Scott, whose death occurred Saturday morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital, was held yesterday afternoon at the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers prior to forwarding of the remains by train today to Saskatoon where interment will take place.

The local service was attended by a large number of friends of the deceased who was well known and widely esteemed. Rev. Dr. F. W. Dawe of First Baptist Church officiated and W. Vaughan Davies presided at the organ.

HALIBUT FISHERIES

The closing of the halibut season draws attention once more to the fact that the banks are being over-fished and that the result of the present activity in the industry will mean a steady lessening of the amount of fish caught and the consequent gradual falling off in the number of boats fishing.

John Dybbavn, manager of the Royal Fish Company is responsible for the following figures based on hauling weights:

In 1928, 1977 vessels landed at Prince Rupert 28,298,000 pounds.

In 1929, 2,067 vessels landed 28,114,600 pounds.

In 1930, 1,918 vessels landed 23,692,700 pounds.

The average set in 1928 was 14,300 pounds; the average for 1929 was 13,600 pounds and the average for 1930 was 12,300 pounds, indicating clearly that the supply is falling off.

Even under present conditions the supply of halibut will undoubtedly last for a number of years but the catch is likely to diminish each year.

"His Majesty's Choir Children" to Sing



Canada is honored—and delighted—by the visit to the Dominion of the children of His Majesty's Savor Chapel Choir, composed of twelve boy sopranos, the pick of England's best youthful singers, all of them under sixteen years of age. It is the first occasion in the 700-year history of the Chapel that a King of England has given permission to the children of the choir to leave Great Britain. They will take part in the Christmas Festival to be held this year at Lucerne-in-Quebec, and they will also give a recital at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, December 23. Those who associate the choir with strictly church music will get a surprise, for programmes to be rendered by the boys include not only this type of music but also some of the best known of secular songs, glee and part songs presented in solo, trio or choral form. When they sing church music they are garbed in scarlet and gold costumes surmounted by the quaint Tudor ruff, exactly as they appear upon festival occasions in London. They come to Canada as representatives of an institution which typifies the best traditions of choral singing in a country where choral singing is unexcelled in any part of the world.

Navy Planes At Ketchikan; Will Scour Panhandle

Another full day's flying, it is expected, will either find wreckage or almost definitely establish that there is none to be found hereabouts.

On Saturday, after visibility had cleared up somewhat, the Canadian flyers got in three good hours of searching, leaving at 12 noon and returning about 3 p.m. The sea being moderate, they went out to Stephens Island and both planes flew twice around it at various altitudes. Stephens Island had been minutely searched before but rumors have continuously led in that direction so it was considered wise to take one more look.

From Stephens Island, Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap went down the west coast of Porcher Island but, when they neared the south end of the island, fog rolled in so they crossed the island and came up the main channel, skirting Kennedy Island. They flew around the north end of Smith Island and around a mountain back of the Skeena Slough in the direction of which Renahan was seen to be going that night by cannerymen. There were some patches of cloud but the airmen got a fairly good look at this mountain and discovered nothing of interest.

After making a landing at North Pacific cannery where the report as to a plane having been seen flying around the north end of Smith Island toward the mountain at 6:15 p.m., on October 28, was confirmed by a number of men, Phinney and Dunlap came on in for the night. They learned at North Pacific cannery that men had gone out hunting and had also kept an eye out on

Co-operation—the Keynote to Progress

As head of your family, you always place the interests of your sons and daughters ahead of the interests of outsiders, don't you? You may be on the friendliest terms with outsiders, yet you concede without question that members of your own family have first claim on you for help of any kind. Collectively you form the oldest co-operative unit known to man—the home. And the best way to promote the welfare of that or any other co-operative unit is to do everything possible to promote the welfare of the individuals who comprise it.

Sentiment and self-interest combine to cause you to place the interests of your family first. You assist them to establish themselves in life, not simply because they are your sons and daughters, but because their success will add to yours.

Similarly, sentiment and self-interest combine to regulate your dealings within your own community. You help your neighbour, not simply because he is your neighbour, but because you believe he will be willing to help you in return. You and he have many interests in common. As a matter of good business you prefer to trade with those who trade with you.

Once beyond the borders of your community, when you get into the wider reaches of your province or of the Dominion itself, the call of sentiment tends to grow weaker, and the element of self-interest becomes less apparent. But seeing that our nation is simply our families and our communities in the mass, will not its welfare be best promoted by the same means we adopt to promote the welfare of our homes and our local trading circles?

Let us suppose you are a farmer living, say, in Saskatchewan. A large part of your income is expended for the purchase of implements, fencing, lumber, cement, twine, house furnishings, and the thousand and one other articles required to equip or service your farm and your home. The money you pay for these articles eventually finds its way back to the pockets of the workers who make them. Isn't it better for you if the workers you thus benefit are workers in Canadian factories, rather than workers in foreign factories?

If your money goes to workers in Canadian factories, don't you put them in a better position to buy your wheat, your butter, your eggs, and all your other farm products? Not only that, but because you have bought their products, haven't you established a first claim to their consideration when they come into the market to buy products such as you have for sale? It's simply the community trading principle on a little broader scale!

But send your dollars to factory workers in other countries, and what assurance have you that such workers will ever buy as much as a cent's worth of your products in return? Your dollars have gone far beyond the community circle, beyond even the national family circle. They have gone where there is no mutuality of interest, to countries where it is impossible for you to influence their spending in the slightest degree.

Or, to use quite a different and in some respects perhaps a little better illustration to demonstrate this community of interest, let us suppose you are a Quebec farmer, and that you contributed your portion to the \$8,903,885 that Canada spent last year for imported corn to feed cows, hens, and hogs.

What would have happened if this money, instead of being sent to corn growers outside of Canada, had been spent with grain growers in Western Canada for the feed wheat and feed barley they had for sale—feeds that would have been equally as good for the production of milk and eggs, and considerably better for the production of bacon? Wouldn't the Western grain grower have had more money with which to buy the products of Quebec factories? And if Quebec factory workers had had more money to spend, wouldn't that have meant a better market for your milk, eggs, and pork?

Some of the money you spent for imported corn would almost certainly have come back to you if you had spent it for Canadian feeds instead. As it was, how much do you think ever came back from the foreign corn grower to whom it was actually sent?

So getting back to where we started from, don't you agree that it always pays in the long run to develop trading operations as much as possible within the family circle?





QUIET IN AIRPLANES

British Designers Patiently Cut
Down Noise In Modern Passenger Carrying Craft

LONDON, Nov. 24:—Noise in aircraft, from the view of the occupant and of the earth-bound person over whom he flies, has occupied years of research and experiment. The problem is a difficult one, involving many aspects of aircraft and aero engine design; the finding of a satisfactory solution is among the most urgent needs of flying today.

Patient research by the Aeronautical Research Committee, the measurement with delicate apparatus of sound intensities, a study of the sound-absorbing powers of certain materials suited for use in the walls of aircraft cabins, the testing of various types of airscrew, the search for an efficient engine silencer—these have marched side by side in British laboratories and workshops with certain developments in design. The result is that some new-type commercial aircraft built in Great Britain are notably quieter in flight than their predecessors. The passenger in these flying machines no longer finds it necessary to shout in conversation with his neighbor, and the fatigue of long journeys is much reduced.

Many points have emerged from the research work. Much of the noise is caused by the engine. A great deal comes from the airscrew. The flapping of the sides in a fabric-covered aeroplane may be a serious source of noise and vibration of the entire craft, set up in a variety of ways, adds to the turmoil. Increase of speed introduces fresh difficulties; it has been found that a speed rise of 100 feet per second (about 70 miles an hour) multiplies airscrew noise 10 times.

Four Blades Quieter

An airscrew with four blades is quieter than a two-bladed screw; thin blades make less noise than thick ones. Here is an indication of a partial cure for the important airscrew noise. In the design of engines, in spite of the difficulty of producing an efficient exhaust silencer, much can be done by enclosing valve gear and other moving parts. Vibration is lessened in modern British practice by the employment of rubber shock-absorbers in the engine bearers.

The British aircraft and engine builder is thus endeavoring to quieten his production in many ingenious ways. In the later big commercial craft—land machines and flying boats—the size of the structure enables the designer to place the power plant at a considerable distance from the passenger quarters. This is noticeable at once in the lay-out of the large four-engined air liners which Imperial Airways are planning to place in commission next year on the European and Imperial routes. The motors are carried in nacelles stream-

MISTY RAIN STOPS HUNT

Government Flyers Unable to Get Into Air For Renahan Search

Thick misty rain again held Royal Canadian Air Force pilots today from continuing the search from here for Pilot Robin Renahan and his companions. It was expected that the United States Navy planes at Ketchikan would be similarly held down.

These steps lined into the structure at points distant from the saloons; unlike most three-engined craft, these new flying machines have no central engine in the nose to transmit incessant vibratory shocks through the passenger-carrying fuselage.

Recent progress in aerodynamical knowledge, resulting in the building of "cleaner" aeroplanes has markedly reduced noise. The modern air liner is not braced with a multitude of wires which hum and thrum as the craft moves through the air; exterior wire bracing is reduced to a minimum nowadays and there is a considerable gain in quietness from this advance alone.
