Conservatives Disappear From Ontario Political Life As Effective Factor

United Farmers Take Lead in Province with Liberals Second; Twelve Labor Members Returned for Industrial Centres

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Toronto, October 21.—The final returns from the Ontario elections show that the Conservative party is left with but 26 members in the Provincial Legislature out of a total membership of 111.
 The returns received this morning are as follows:

 Liberals 28
 United Farmers Organization 42

 Doubtful 1
 Total 111
 The Liberals who have 30 members in the present legislature about held their ground, securing victory in 28 seats while the farmers boosted their membership from 2 to 42, and Labor came back with 12, some of which were notable victories.
 In Sault Ste. Marie, Premier Hearst was defeated by J. B. Birmingham. Most of the Conservative ministers went down to defeat with Sir William Hearst. Hon. W. D. McPherson, provincial secretary, in Northwest Toronto; Hon. T. W. Garry, provincial treasurer, in South Renfrew; Hon. I. B. Lucas in Centre Ontario, and Hon. H. F. McDiarmid in Elgin West, were all beaten. Dr. Cody, minister of education, was returned by acclamation in Northeast Toronto, and Hon. A. E. Ross likewise was re-elected without a contest in Kingston with Hon. George Hendy, minister of agriculture, and Hon. Howard Ferguson are sole survivors of cabinet rank.
 Liberals were elected in Windsor, North Grey, West Kent, North Lanark, Niagara, Northumberland, North Oxford, East York, Prescott, Prince Edward, Stormont, Sudbury, Renfrew, Bruce, Brockville, Durham, North Waterloo and Toronto. Farmers took the rural constituencies and Labor won in the industrial centres.
 It is expected that Premier Hearst will tender his resignation as Lieutenant-Governor just as soon as he can straighten out affairs of his department.

PUBLIC LIBRARY IS DISCUSSED

Mayor Kirkpatrick Supported
 Mayor and Alderman Perry
 In Her Suggestion.
 At last night's council meeting Kirkpatrick brought up the matter of getting a public library for the city. She had been making enquiries about this on her last trip south and had found for \$250 a year a library of 1,000 books, with a complete catalogue as often as every two weeks could be obtained. Books on special subjects could also be ordered if desired. A librarian would have to be supplied and the books paid for by the public.
 The mayor and Ald. Perry were much in favor of something of the kind. Mrs. Kirkpatrick is bringing the matter up again and she has heard from Miss Stewart, of Victoria, who is in charge of the library commission.

INQUEST TODAY ON FISHERMAN

Body of Hugh McKinnon Had Fractured Skull When Examined by Doctor.
 The inquest on Hugh McKinnon, the fisherman who died Sunday night, was commenced at 11 o'clock this morning. John Conway was coroner and the following were empanelled on the jury: Geo. A. Bryant (foreman), Geo. H. Arnold, H. E. Ross, F. M. Crosby, Wm. Goldbloom and Fred. Gilhuly.
 Dr. Cade was the only witness heard this morning. He testified that he had made a hurried examination of the body and found that the skull had been fractured and a mark was left which might have been made by a fall on a rock or with a sharp instrument. It was believed that the man had been using liquor and possibly had had a fall on the slippery streets, accounting for the wound.
 The inquest was adjourned till this afternoon at 2:30, when his two partners and the landlord of the shack, where he died, are to be heard. Interment is to take place tomorrow at 2 o'clock under the auspices of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, who are looking after arrangements and seeking to get in touch with his relatives.

ONTARIO GOES DRY BY VOTE ON REFERENDUM

Toronto Globe Estimates That There Will be Majority of 200,000.

 Toronto, Oct. 21.—The Prohibition referendum in the Ontario election shows that the country has gone dry. The Globe estimates that the majority of "noes" in the referendum will aggregate 200,000 against the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act.
 A few of the industrial centres seem to have gone wet, but the rural districts all voted strongly dry.

KING ELECTED TO PARLIAMENT

Will Undertake Leadership of the Liberal Party in House Before End of Week.
 SIR HENRY DRAYTON IS ALSO RETURNED
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Ottawa, Oct. 21.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King has been elected by acclamation in Prince Edward Island and Sir Henry Drayton was unopposed in Kingston. Both of these members will at once take their seats in the House of Commons; the one as opposition leader and the other as Minister of Finance in the Borden Government.
 Opposition sympathizers have been awaiting the return of Mr. King with a great deal of interest. He should assume the actual leadership of the party before the end of the week, replacing Mr. McKenzie, who has been undertaking the duties since the death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

SCHOOL BYLAW IS DEFECTIVE

Must be Again Submitted to the Electors, as Advertising Was Defective.
 MUNICIPAL INSPECTOR TURNS DOWN BOND ISSUE
 The chairman of the School Board has received word from the Municipal Inspector that he refuses to pass the bond issue for the high school owing to defective advertising and that the by-law will have to be resubmitted to the electors.
 For some time past the Municipal Inspector has had the matter under consideration and has expressed himself as opposed to a bond issue owing to the failure of the municipality to advertise the schedule of payments in connection with the bylaw. He has now finally refused to pass the issue and the bylaw will have to be voted on again in its corrected form. The bylaw as advertised has not been passed by the city solicitor.
 Parents of children in the city consider it is most unfortunate that this delay should have occurred as the new building is badly needed. There are already two temporary rooms in use as school rooms, one in a store building on Second Avenue and the other in the basement of the Methodist Church. Other rooms will have to be opened long before the new building can be ready.

MUST MEET ALL LABOR DEMANDS

So Says President of Mine Workers on eve of Conference.
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Washington, Oct. 21.—On the eve of a conference called by the secretary of labor in the hope of averting a strike of bituminous coal miners set for November 1, John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, announced that the strike would not be rescinded unless the operators met all the demands, including the five day week.

HARD WINTER FACES NOME

Food and Fuel Famine Likely if Steamer Fails to Land Supplies.
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Seattle, Oct. 21.—Nome, Alaska, is facing a winter, food and fuel famine. Howard B. Ames, a member of the Nome Mercantile firm, states, He reported that if the liner Victoria which leaves on the last trip, this week should be unable to land supplies, the little town would suffer.

CITY DECIDES TO PURCHASE TRACTOR

The mayor announced at last night's council meeting that he had taken up the matter of securing a tractor for the city which would almost entirely eliminate the use of horses for city work. He had received a very good offer from a firm that had just got out a new machine. They offered to send a tractor on approval free of charge and guaranteed that once the city got it here they would want to keep it. The machine is 8 feet long, can turn in its own length and weighing only two tons is easier on the streets than horses and wagon. The weight is distributed evenly over five planks. The cost is \$2,500.
 After a little discussion which further brought out its advantages, it was moved by Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Barrie, that the machine be sent for on trial and purchased if satisfactory.
 W. J. Pitman announces a specially selected carload of pianos and player pianos, which will arrive direct from the factory early in November. Wait for it.

LIGHTING OF STREETS IS CONSIDERED

City Council at Meeting Last Night Receives Report of Utilities Commissioner

The matter of improved lighting for Third and Second Avenues came up again at last night's council meeting. The report of the superintendent of utilities to the utilities committee was read to the meeting. It was moved by Ald. Perry and seconded by Ald. Kirkpatrick that the Retail Merchants' Association be communicated with, giving them the figures on a new system for their consideration and co-operation and also that the mayor appoint a man to canvass the down-town property owners and get their feeling on the matter. This resolution was carried unanimously.

Two Plans.

In the report of the utilities superintendent two plans for better lighting were set forth, both based on permanent and ornamental schemes. The new lighting schemes provided for better lighting on Second Ave. from McBride to Eighth Street and on Third from McBride to Ninth. The first scheme would provide for fifty lamps distributed three to a block and would cost \$10,000 which would mean a tax of \$3.23 per lot per year for ten years. The second scheme, a bigger and better one, would provide for 100 lamps, 6 to the block, would cost \$18,000, the tax levy being \$4.41 per lot for 15 years. Mr. Duncan, the superintendent, thought the time was ripe for permanent lighting, but as extra lights would probably cost \$50 apiece this extra overhead expense should be carried as a local improvement.

Pretty Big Scheme.

Mayor McClymont said that, personally, he would be in favor of the new permanent system as a taxpayer but the scheme was a pretty big one and he thought that the council should not act without first being sure of the feeling of the people who would "have to pay the piper."

Ald. Rochester saw the necessity of better lighting, but thought the expense was big. He felt rather inclined to increase the number of arcs under the present system and suggested that the profits from one department go towards making up the deficit in other departments.

Sewers Needed.

Ald. Perry said that there was a far more important and immediate question which the city should be thinking of spending money on—that was the sewerage system. He expressed fears that under present conditions there was always the danger of a very serious epidemic breaking out.

The mayor, in speaking again, said that street improvements and ornamental lighting were two points that had made some of the southern cities almost bankrupt. They had been enthused by prosperity and had plunged too deeply. He stated that during his trip to Victoria he had found that there were only six municipalities in the province that had been financing legally. The others had been using their sinking funds to liquidate indebtedness brought about by such extraordinary expenditure.
 Both Ald. Kirkpatrick and Ald. Casey expressed themselves as favoring better lighting, but ways and means were the vexed question. Nobody felt like going ahead with it unless the people expressed themselves in favor of it.

Avalanche Struck

Ontario Conservatives.

An avalanche struck the Conservative Government of Ontario yesterday when the combined efforts of the Liberals, the United Farmers and the Labor men sent them into political oblivion. It was the final sweep of the country against Toryism, so far as provincial governments are concerned. The only remaining Conservative Government is that at Ottawa.

What everyone is asking today is, what effect will this Ontario upset have on the Dominion Government? Will it make the members harden their hearts and cling on to the reins of power? Will the Liberal Unionists who are supporting them stand for a continuance in office indefinitely? If they go to the country, will they have as many members left as Ontario has? These are simply the natural questions which follow the results of yesterday. People with political views are answering them in their own way. Some Conservatives are trying to console themselves with the fact that the Liberals are a minority as well as the Conservatives. What they have to remember is that the Farmers are an opposition party as well as the Liberals and Laborites.

First returns from Ontario seemed to indicate that Labor was running strong. That was in the industrial centres, however. The ten labor men were reported elected early in the evening and then there was no more news in regard to labor. It is for them the substantial gain of nine seats.

Who Will Form Government Now?

Who will be entrusted with the task of forming a government in Ontario now? Will it be the leader of the Liberals or a leader to be chosen from the Farmers? The Liberal party is the only one organized and with a definite leader. The Farmers on the other hand have the largest number of representatives in the House. Neither party can do anything alone. It is possible that the farmers may hold a convention at once and choose a leader and that the Lieut.-Governor will then call upon him; the Liberal leader may be called upon and given an opportunity of trying to unite the factions of the opposition into a governing body; or the third alternative seems to be that there will be a caucus of all the opposing forces, Farmer, Labor and Liberal, and that they will choose a leader from among themselves, whom the Governor will ask to form a government. The situation is a curious one. A similar condition may arise in the Dominion after the next general election, so that the action of the Lieut.-Governor on this occasion may set a precedent.

Interest Here in Ontario Election.

Much interest was taken locally in the Ontario elections. Men and women of all parties were inquiring throughout the evening for results and the News bulletin service kept many informed of the progress which was being made. The Dominion Government Telegraphs provided an excellent bulletin service.

FOUR CARS BUTTER FOR BELGIANS GO FROM EDMONTON

Edmonton, Oct. 20.—As a part of an order from the Belgian government, P. Burns & Co. last week shipped four cars of butter from Edmonton and were also shipping from Calgary and Saskatoon. The Edmonton shipment included 200,000 fifty-six pound boxes, and about a couple of weeks ago they shipped about 400,000 boxes on the same order.

It is understood that the order will take up all the available surplus that the Burns produce department can command. The Belgian government has also bought heavily in eastern Canada.

With the heavy outside demand the price of butter to the trade has gone to 59c. There is a big demand from the coast, both in the American and the Canadian cities and big shipments are being made there weekly.

GREATEST SILVER COUNTRY IN WORLD

That is What Alice Arm Mining Men are Saying in Vancouver.

That the Alice Arm district, particularly that area extending south from the Kitsault River, is destined to be developed into the richest silver camp in the world is the opinion of prominent mining men who have recently returned from the north, says the Vancouver World.

Already there is every indication of a busy winter of development and many of the large groups are in the hands of companies and individuals intent upon "bringing in" this district on a scale never seen before. W. V. Somerville and J. D. Meenach are among the enthusiasts who are owners of promising properties at Alice Arm.

Meenach, who with Charles Z. Frey and other Seattle capitalists, own the Musketeer group, located about three and a half miles northwest of the Dolly Varden mine, passed through this city recently and expressed himself in no uncertain terms regarding the district.

"It is the greatest silver country in the world, without a doubt," said Meenach, "and you will see the greatest silver camp in history there when the developments under way are carried out. A mile north of me is the Wolf, and further north again on the east side of the glacier is the Homestead group where men are now working and a great showing has been made. All the properties are striking richer pre the further they go down. There will be some great work done this winter. The Wolf has 419,000 tons of ore blocked out and will be working with the diamond drill this winter. The Climax is working on a vein 20 feet wide and showing 113 ounces to the ton. The North Star has wonderful ore, the quartz being held together by great deposits of native silver. They are packing out ore now in sacks up to 1,000 ounces to the ton."

There were two basketball games last evening. The first game was a fast exhibition played between the Colts No. 2 and the King Edward School, which resulted in a win for the former, score 2-0.

The second game was played between the High School and the Senior Colts. The Colts had a 3-0 lead in the first half, but the High School boys came to their senses in the second half, took six baskets themselves and held the Colts scoreless. It was a lively game, full of life and excitement. Final score, 6-3. There was a number of enthusiastic spectators who took a lively interest in the games.

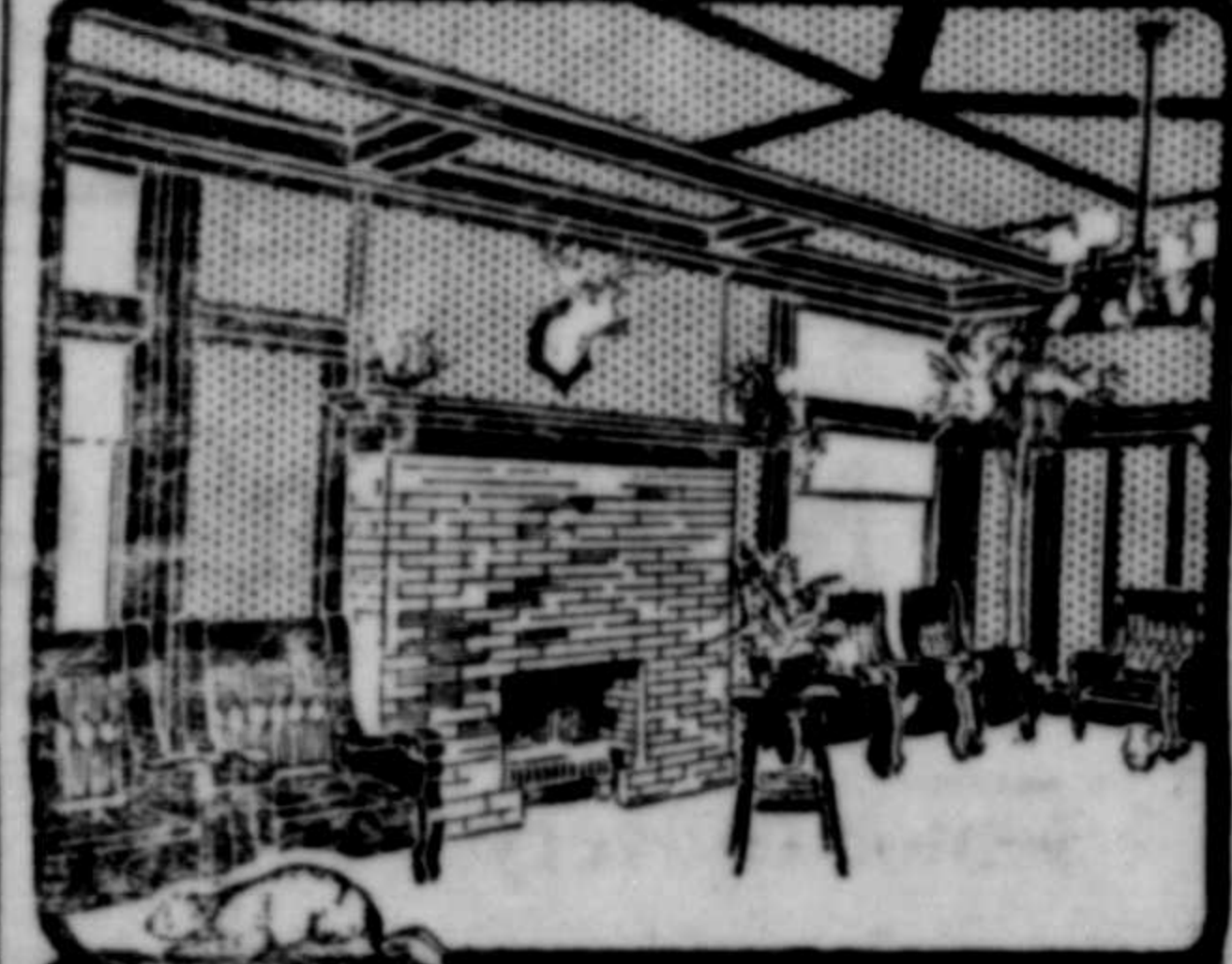





MAYOR REPORTS ON TELEPHONE

Advices Installation of Automatic System When Time Comes To Put in New One.

The report of the mayor regarding a new telephone system which he had been looking into while in the south was received by the city council last evening. The mayor gave a verbal explanation of his report as it was not as full as he would have liked owing to the short time he had to prepare it. He stated that he had not got as far as he had wished with the matter and was not very well versed on such matters from a mechanical standpoint.

However, he had taken up the matter with various authorities and had ascertained that practically all of them were highly in favor of the automatic system instead of the manual system. From the standpoint of economy, the use of this system would save at least \$8,000 per year in wages which would more than pay the interest on the capital required to float the new system.

The mayor did not, however, express himself as being in favor of installing a new system. He was of the opinion that the city could get on for some time yet by installing a new panel which would cost about six thousand dollars. The present tendency of the people was to defeat money by-laws anyway, and it would be necessary to raise bonds for a new system. He had called upon the Northern Electric Co. at Vancouver. Owing to the rush of business in the west one of their head engineers is coming to Vancouver and the company had offered to send him to Prince Rupert to report on the local situation free of expense to the city, as he would return to Montreal this way.

The report was laid on the table.

NO SALARY RAISE FOR POLICE MAGISTRATE

Consideration of Application by Col. McMordie Laid Over for Six Months.

At last night's council meeting, the request of Magistrate McMordie for a raise of salary from \$1,200 to \$2,000 was laid over for six months on the recommendation of the Finance Committee.

Ald. Perry inquired the reasons for this report and Ald. Rochester explained that this course was taken because Magistrate McMordie had been in that position only a short time, his duties did not take up much of his time and therefore did not interfere very much with his private business, and, furthermore, the matter of an increase to the police magistrate had been brought up before and had been turned down by the city council. The Finance Committee could not see that the circumstances had changed since then but they felt that when the proper time came that the police magistrate's salary would be increased.

GOVERNMENT SHOULD ADMINISTER JUSTICE

That Was Opinion of Municipal Convention According to Report of Mayor.

At the Council meeting last night, the mayor reported on the opinion of the Municipal Convention as to the Administration of Justice and Education in the municipalities. The convention was in favor of the government taking over the entire control of these branches. The appointment of magistrates and crown counsel was made by the government and they also set their salaries, but the cities had to pay them, which was not fair to the cities.

In the matter of schools some extra source of revenue would have to be forthcoming before city municipalities would be able to administer them without going behind.

Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 20 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional on construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchase, involving full title, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Comptroller. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
