

## For Dollar For Relief

Prime Minister, In Saskatoon Address, Explains Explicitly Policy of Administration With Regard to Ad For Workless

SASKATOON, July 12:-The basis upon which the Dominion Government is prepared to contribute to unemployment relief is one of dollar for dollar with the provinces and municipalities, Premier King declared in an address here last night. The particular province concerned must give the Dominion formal notice that unemployment conditions are beyond its power to cope with and ask for assistance. The Prime Minister stated that assistance would then be forthcoming. He emphatically declared that his government was ready to assisto

forthwith any province which re-ported that the situation was too great for it to deal with and requested assistance.

"I am prepared to assert," said Mr. King, "if a national emergency exists, we will assist but not until word comes from the provinces." Until such conditions arose, he was not prepared to spend money held in trust by the government. "Remember that, in dealing with public money, we are trustees," he emphasized.
