

British Liberals Have Made No Bargain With Labor Gov't But Do Not Want Baldwin In

LONDON, Dec. 5:-The wild horses of Wall Street have dragged Great Britain over a rock road of finance, Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George today told a council of his party. The mischief of Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin's United States debt settlement continues to spread, he said. "We are only beginning to realize what that terrible debt settlement means. That gold standard settlement was premature and ill thought out. The Liberal party has made no deal to keep the Labor party in office but it has no desire to see Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin become prime minister," Lloyd George said.





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
