PRAIRIE CROPS DAMAGED BY STORM

CONSERVATIVES HAVE GOOD MEETING

Hon H.H. Stevens With Able Address Talks of Dominion Issues Today

Was Largest Gathering So Far in Present Election Campaign—Enthusiasm Displayed and Speakers Given an Excellent Hearing

The largest meeting so far of the federal election campaign in Prince Rupert was that held in the Moose Hall last night when Hon. H. H. Stevens of Vancouver was the principal speaker on behalf of James C. Brady, Conservative candidate for re-election in Skeena riding. The hall was almost if not entirely filled and, at times, considerable enthusiasm was displayed. Both Mr. Stevens and Mr. Brady, who spoke briefly, received a good and responsive hearing. Mayor Cyril H. Orme presided and Miss M. A. Way presided at the piano for the accompaniment of "O Canada" at the opening and the "National Anthem" at the close.

Mr. Stevens, who spoke for about an hour and a half, confined himself largely to national issues, criticizing the Mackenzie King government freely on a number of its policies and outlining the Conservative platform for the remedying of affairs. Despite the fact that it was reported that he had suffered a slight indisposition as a result of his trip up the coast, Mr. Stevens spoke very ably in a clear, reasoning manner.

Opening humorously with an anecdote of an experience at Port Simpson in the early days some 31 years ago, Mr. Stevens paid a personal tribute to Mr. Brady whom he was confident would be re-elected to the House of Commons. He had learned, Mr. Stevens declared,

to love, respect and admire Mr. Brady whose friendship he greatly valued. Mr. Brady, he said, had great capacity and power for national usefulness and he predicted that he would play even a greater part in national affairs after the coming election than he had done in the past four years. Such cities as Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton held Mr. Brady in high regard and Prince Rupert had good reason to be proud of him.

It was not offensive, Mr. Stevens said, to say that any government at election time might be considered to be on trial. If that government could not stand up to scrutiny, it should be removed. It was the duty of the opposition to criticize the government usefully.

Premier King, Mr. Stevens charged, in his speeches throughout the country was leaving a false impression with regard to certain matters. For one thing, he stated that, during the war, the Conservative government had paid none of its war expenses out of revenue but had borrowed it all and that was why there was such a burden today. The fact of the matter was, as stated by Sir Thomas White, then minister of finance, that \$500,000,000 had actually been raised out of taxation for war purposes. There was a surplus on consolidated revenue account from 1911 to 1921 of \$572,000,000 as compared with \$493,000,000 from 1921 to 1930.

Reduction in Debt
True, Mr. Stevens admitted, there had been a reduction in public debt since the Liberals came into power of \$227,000,000 but it should be remembered that, prior to 1922, the Conservative government had paid all deficits and advances to the national railways and included them in the public debt whereas this government had separated these and not included them in the public debt.

Former Premier of New Zealand Died Yesterday at Age of Seventy-Four

WELLINGTON, N.Z., July 8.—Sir Joseph Ward, former Premier of New Zealand, died yesterday at the age of 74 years. He had enjoyed a long and brilliant career in the public life of this Commonwealth and his demise is a matter of regret for the whole Empire.

Catala Crew Is Exonerated

Supreme Court Judge Finds Steamship Was Not Negligent in Connection With Collision

Officers and crew of the steamer Catala were exonerated in Supreme Court in Vancouver last week by Mr. Justice Fisher of blame in connection with the upsetting last October in Johnstone Strait of a Pacific Mills scow laden with 750 bales of craft pulp. The plaintiff claimed \$7500 but the judge ruled that the defendant had not been negligent.

Vanderhoof Man Found Poisoned

Albert Heymann Found Dead in Vancouver With Bottle of Potassium Cyanide By His Side

Albert Heymann, aged 70, for many years a resident of Vancouver, was found dead in his office at Vancouver last Saturday with a bottle of potassium cyanide lying beside his body. A doctor, who examined the body, declared that the man had been dead for 10 hours before he was discovered.

The late Mr. Heymann, who was a German by birth, settled in Vancouver before the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. A few years ago he discovered a medicinal clay and went to Vancouver with the idea of forming a company for handling it in an extensive way. He had met with many disappointments.

Released From Ice

Nanuk and Stravropol Free at North Cape After Being Frozen in For Months

MOTORSHIP NANUK, North Cape, Siberia, July 8.—Freed at last from the icy grasp of the Arctic, the fur trading ship Nanuk and the Soviet steamer Stravropol were riding at anchor in open water off North Cape today after having been frozen in for many months.

The Nanuk will proceed to Seattle and the Stravropol to Vladivostok.

FINANCING STEEL PLANT ON PACIFIC COAST

TORONTO, July 8.—Special financing of a \$25,000,000 steel plant to be erected in the vicinity of Vancouver by the Coast Range Steel Co., which owns extensive iron ore property on Texada Island is now being arranged in New York, according to an announcement in the Financial Post.

Trade With Mother Country is Vital to Canadian Prosperity Premier Tells Victoria Crowd

Problem of Workless Hinged Largely on Wheat Question, He Declares, and Liberal Policy For Marketing Products Is Best

King Expresses His Favor For Unemployment Insurance

Promises That He Will Take Up With Cabinet Question of Extending Western Province Boundaries to Arctic Ocean

VICTORIA, July 8.—Addressing a great audience here last night, Premier King stressed the paramount importance to Canada of trade with the Mother Country. He brought to the attention of his audience the absolute necessity of securing the British market for Canadian grain products. The problem of unemployment, he asserted, hinged very largely on the wheat situation. The short crop on the prairies, the failure to market that crop and also the smashed stock market were, he said, the causes of unemployment in the west. The government, in its budget, was holding out a hand of goodwill to Great Britain, the Premier declared. He said that Canada's fiscal gesture had already met with a ready response in the Mother Country. The method of goodwill was an effective method for developing and securing of markets and not the process of "blasting your way" which the Premier said had been advocated by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Opposition leader.

The Premier answered three questions put to him by the Trades & Labor Council of Victoria. He declared himself personally favorable to unemployment insurance and said that his government would cooperate with the provincial government in regard to this form of insurance but that the legislation was a matter of provincial jurisdiction. He asserted that he favored protection (Continued on page four.)

PREMIER AT CHILLIWACK

Prime Minister of Canada Given Picturesque Reception in Visit to Fraser Valley Town

CHILLIWACK, July 8.—From an open air platform erected on the main street of this town, Premier King addressed one of the greatest gatherings of his entire campaign tour. A new feature of the Premier's speech was a brief reference to freight rates and the attitude of his government thereon. He said that he would have few words to say on this subject for the reason, he explained, that a reference on the mountain differential and equalization of rates was now before the cabinet for consideration and no decision had yet been given. He declared, however, that the government intended to keep on working for freight rate equalization until it became an accomplished fact.

Definite issue with the Conservatives was taken by the Premier on a number of subjects. He asked the audience if it favored sending to the Imperial Conference men who ridiculed the idea that Canada was a nation, men who had obstructed the efforts of the government to attain national status. He referred to the position taken by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, on trade negotiations with the Mother country as "bargaining with a stick of dynamite in your hands." He said that the real reason for calling an election a year and a half before the government required to do (Continued on Page 4.)

Lightning, Hail and Wind Lay Wide Area of Crops in Waste

Disrupted Telephone and Telegraph Services Delay Reports of Loss—Thousands of Acres of Wheat Lands Ruined

WINNIPEG, July 8.—Hail and winds of cyclonic force, following on the heels of an electrical storm last night and early this morning, caused heavy damage to grain fields in a wide stretch of the west, disrupted telephone and telegraph services, delaying full reports of the damage. Hail stones, some as large as pigeon eggs, cut standing grain down over an area stretching from Amisk, Alta., to Brandon, Man. Thousands of acres of wheat lands were laid in ruin.

Philadelphia Scientific Party Is Out to Get Specimens of All Living Things on Q. C. Islands

WINNIPEG, July 8.—To collect a specimen of every living thing possible on the Queen Charlotte Islands for the museum of the Academy of Natural Science at Philadelphia, is the mission of an expedition headed by Wharton A. Huder, assistant curator of birds and mammals of the academy, who is now at Jasper Park Lodge, Jasper, Alta., making final arrangements for the party.

Harry S. Drinker jr., prominent barrister and clubman of Philadelphia and his son, Harry S. Drinker, 3rd, a student of St. George's school, Rhode Island, both members of the expedition, passed through Winnipeg this week over Canadian National Railways for Jasper where they will await the arrival of Edward Woolman, Vice-President, American Forestry Association and prominent alumnus of the University of Pennsylvania, and Frank W. Wood, taxidermist of the academy of natural science at Philadelphia.

From Jasper the whole party will proceed to Prince Rupert, sailing on the C. N. steamer "Prince Charles" for the Queen Charlotte Islands on July 14.

What is going to happen to Prince Rupert if the Mackenzie King Government is returned to power and Mr. Brady is elected to represent Skeena?

The Peace River Outlet is to be determined within the next year; Premier King has made this public pledge.

CAMERON LAKE PARK

The Tolmie Government is to be complimented on its decision to take over and preserve the wonderful big timber at Cameron Lake for the public use forever. The timber in that park is marketable. It is probably the largest merchantable timber in the province and the cut to the acre would be enormous. Governments in the past have felt that the cost of holding it off the market would be too great, but those who look on it from a scenic tourist point of view feel that the money would be well spent. It is something that probably will never again be duplicated anywhere. We are in full agreement with the idea of holding this timber as a national asset.

CONAN DOYLE

Sir Aruthr Conan Doyle came into public notice first as the writer of Sherlock Holmes stories. Then he became internationally known as an exponent of spiritualism. After

the war in his sixtieth year, the great author laid aside his pen altogether and devoted himself to the study of the other world and its manifestations here. He wrote books about it, he crossed oceans to lecture about it, and he gave the world a superb assurance of his sincere faith in it by announcing that he and Lady Doyle were fully convinced that they had communicated with their dead son.

Sir Arthur insisted that he had not only spoken to his son, but that the son had replied, and that the father's ears had heard the voice.

Many who relished the reading of his detective stories deprecated Sir Arthur's abandonment of Sherlock and his wholehearted whole-time labors for spiritualism. He was said to have told some such people that he had created Sherlock Holmes not so much for financial gain as to make a reputation for himself that would enable him to attract attention when he turned seriously to spiritualism as his subject. He got both the money and the attention, and, being a hearty affable soul—a typical British "uncle" in appearance—he won not only wealth and admiration, but the love of many in both hemispheres.

LADIES HEAR H. H. STEVENS

Declares It Would Be Great Advantage to Have Member as Government Supporter

A meeting of ladies was held yesterday afternoon in Moose Hall to hear an address by Hon. H. H. Stevens. There were something like 80 present. Mrs. J. C. Brady presided and, in a neat little speech, introduced the speaker of the afternoon. Mr. Stevens spoke most enthusiastically of the prospects of winning the election. He said that he had travelled through Southern British Columbia and found the greatest enthusiasm everywhere among Conservatives. He spoke of the exodus of young people from Canada. The best of them had gone. The speaker took it as a foregone conclusion that Mr. Brady would be sent to Ottawa again and said that, on this occasion he would be sitting

on the right hand side of the speaker instead of the left, which would be a great advantage. He complained that Premier Mackenzie King had no vision for the future. He had no idea of what Canada should do or be but he had great ability on the platform.

hibiting immigration to Canada until such time as all the people in the Dominion who were willing were able to get work. He reiterated his former statement that the Dominion government stood ready to assist the provinces which found unemployment too great for them to cope with.

After referring to the restoring of the natural resources to the western provinces and the railway belt lands and Peace River Block to British Columbia, the Premier said that another thing remained to be done in connection with the western provinces. He proposed to suggest to his colleagues in the cabinet that the government take up immediately the question of including great stretches of northern country within the provincial boundaries. "My own opinion," declared Mr. King, "is that these western provinces should stretch right up to the Arctic Ocean. Thus we would be rolling back the map of Canada to the region of the northern lights."

An overflow meeting was necessary, so great were the numbers of people who desired to hear the Premier.

FUR BUYERS WERE FINED

Herbert Porter and D. R. Stein Each Pay \$50 For Buying Skins Out of Season

On charges of having purchased fur in a closed season, Herbert Porter and D. R. Stein, Vancouver fur buyers, were each fined \$50 last night in provincial police court by W. E. Collison, justice of the peace, after a two-day hearing. Application will be made tomorrow for confiscation of approximately \$2,000 worth of fur involved in the case.

Porter and Stein were arrested here several weeks ago. They claimed that furs came from Union Bay and, therefore, were not out of season. The court, however, ruled otherwise. Staff Sergeant Alex McNeill prosecuted the case and Milton Gonzales was defence counsel.

Mr. Drinker, "even mosquitos, have a special commission to collect as many different types of mosquitos as possible, giving such details as their stings and their after effects. The islands contain 11 different kinds of birds and there may be more," he said, "and many of these cannot be found in any other part of the world. For instance, a very interesting specimen is the Queen Charlotte jay, found only on the islands, and a common song sparrow which has long wing feathers, one of nature's provisions to the bird, living as it does in a very moist climate. In addition to getting specimens of birds," continued Mr. Drinker, "we are taking 18,000 feet of motion picture film and we will spend a whole week taking pictures of them in their natural background. Then there is a small black bear found on the islands which we hope to get a specimen of," said Mr. Drinker. "It is like an ordinary black bear, but is very small even when full grown."

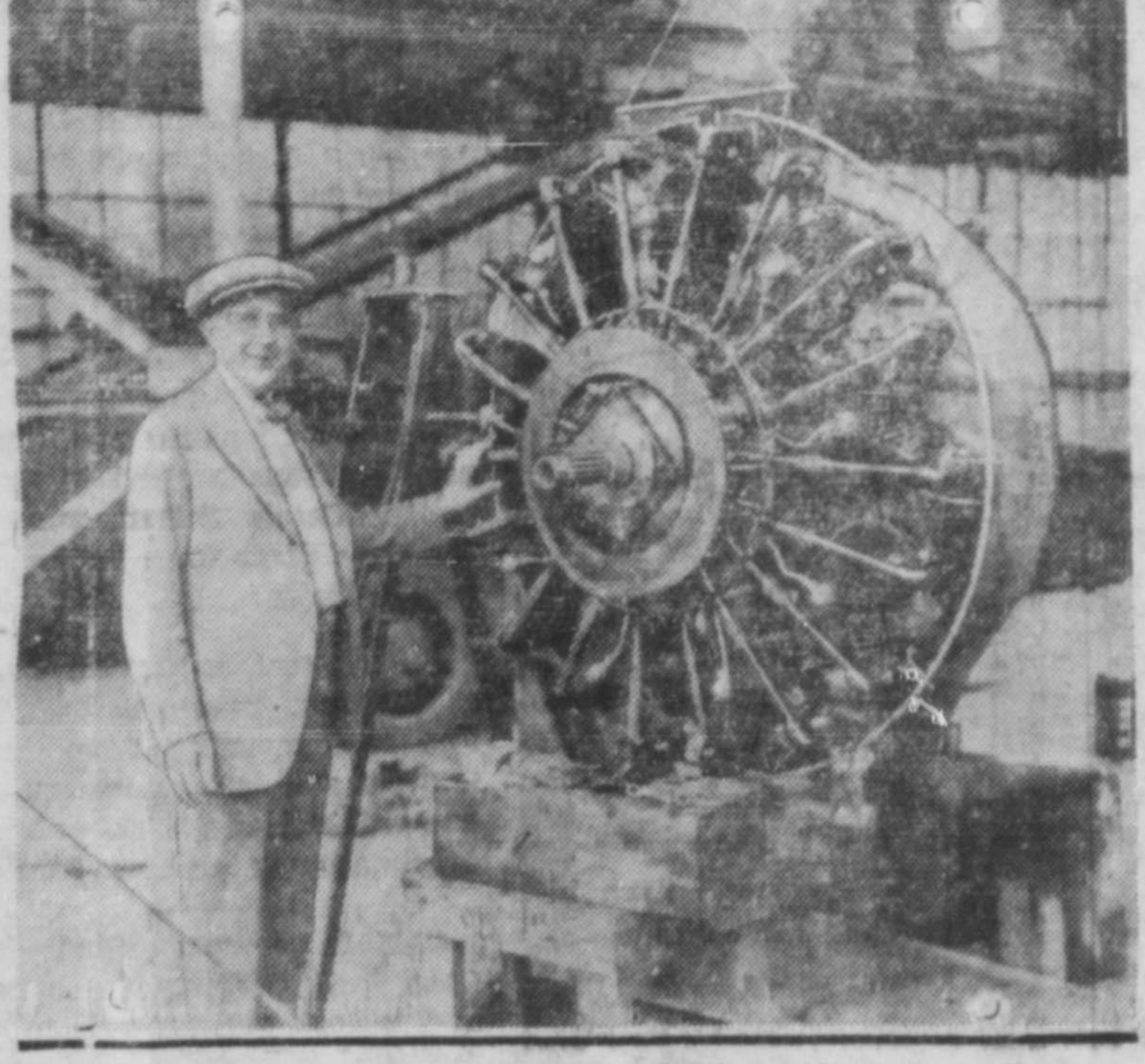
The party will remain on the Islands until August 22, according to Mr. Drinker. From there four members of the expedition will proceed to Summit Lake near Prince George on the northern line of the C.N.R. and from there start on a 550 mile canoe trip up the Peace River in an attempt to get a specimen of the mountain sheep found only in that region.

Edward Woolman and Frank W. Wood, the other two members of the expedition will arrive in Winnipeg on July 9, arriving at Jasper on July 11.

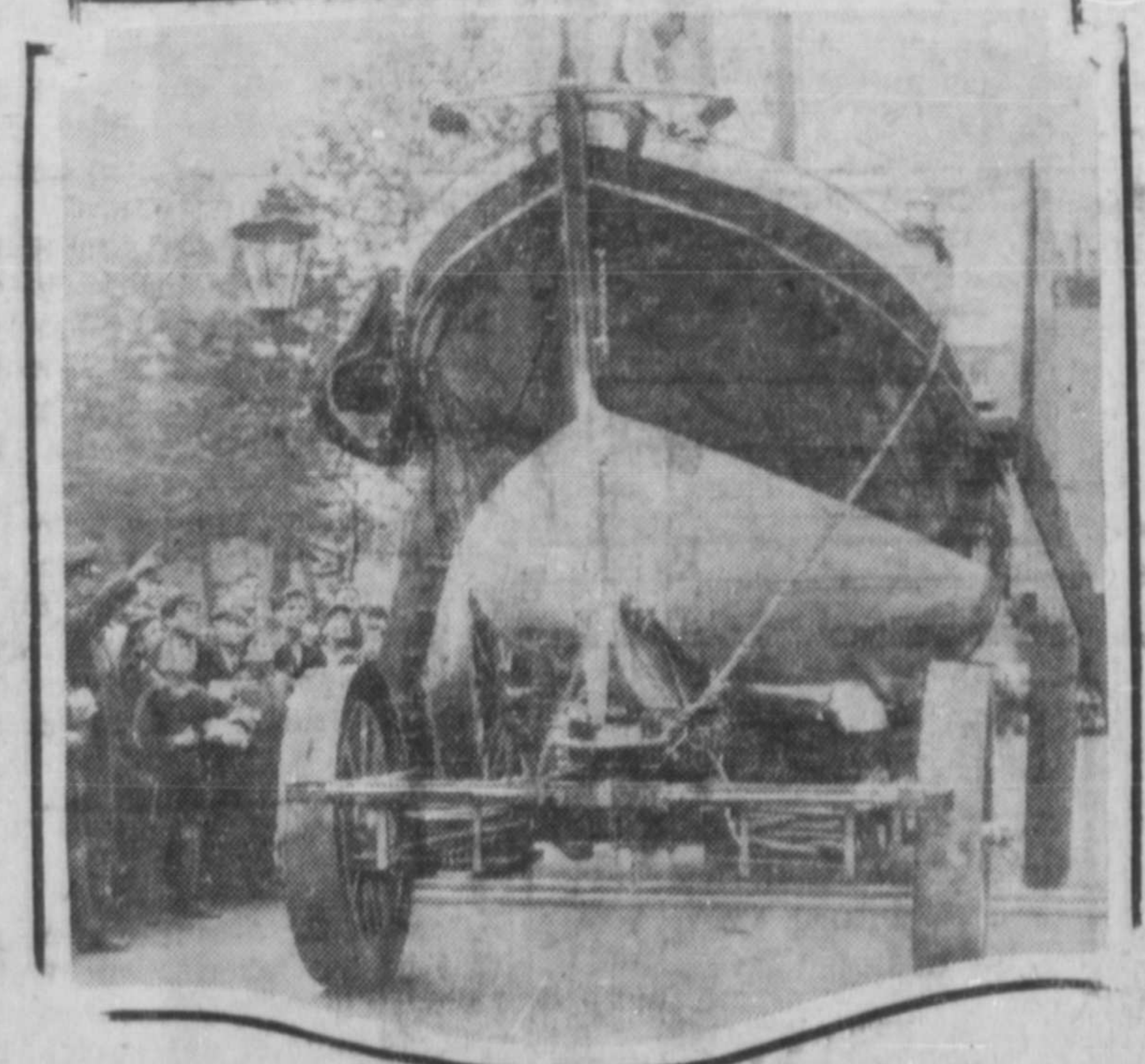

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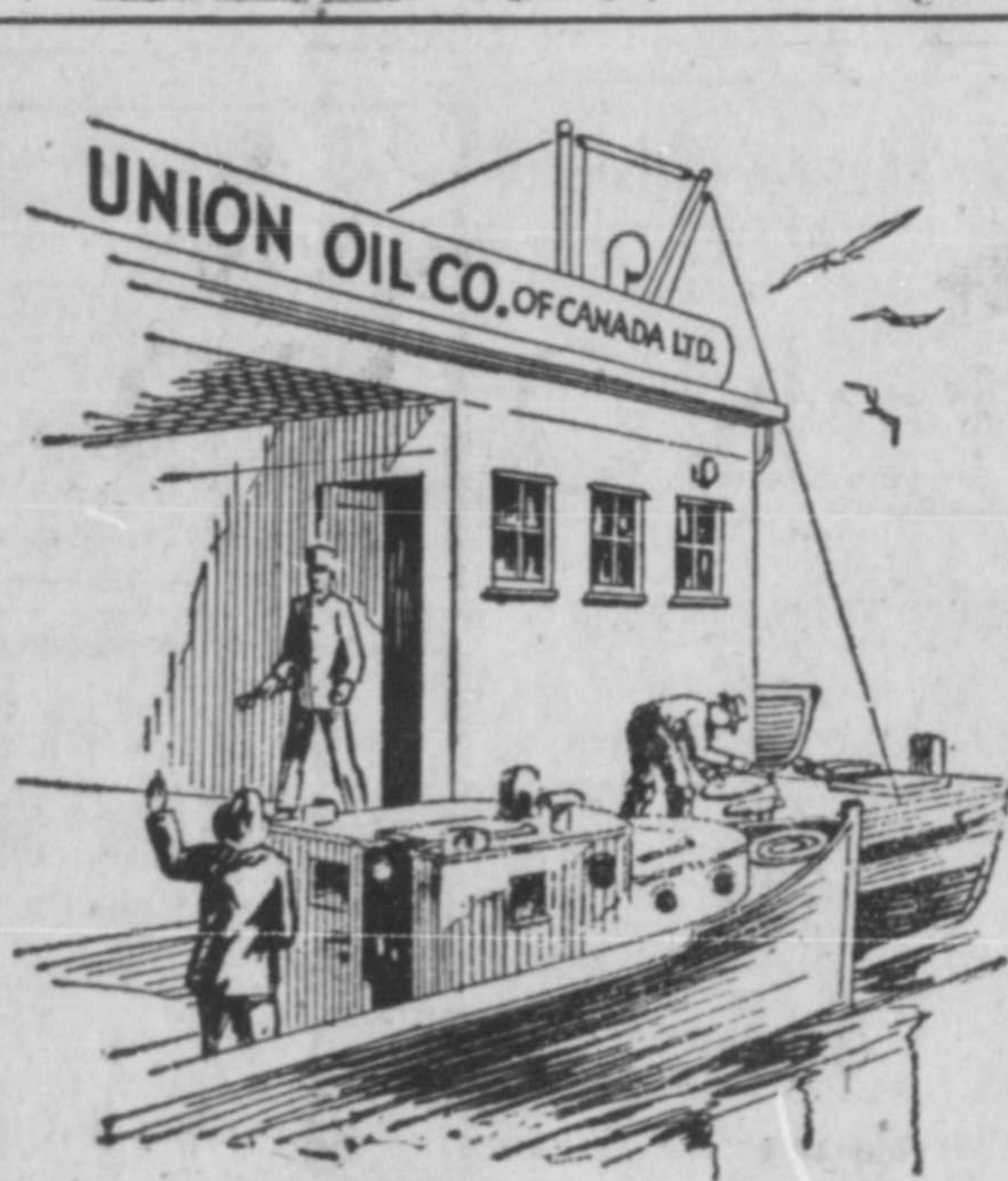
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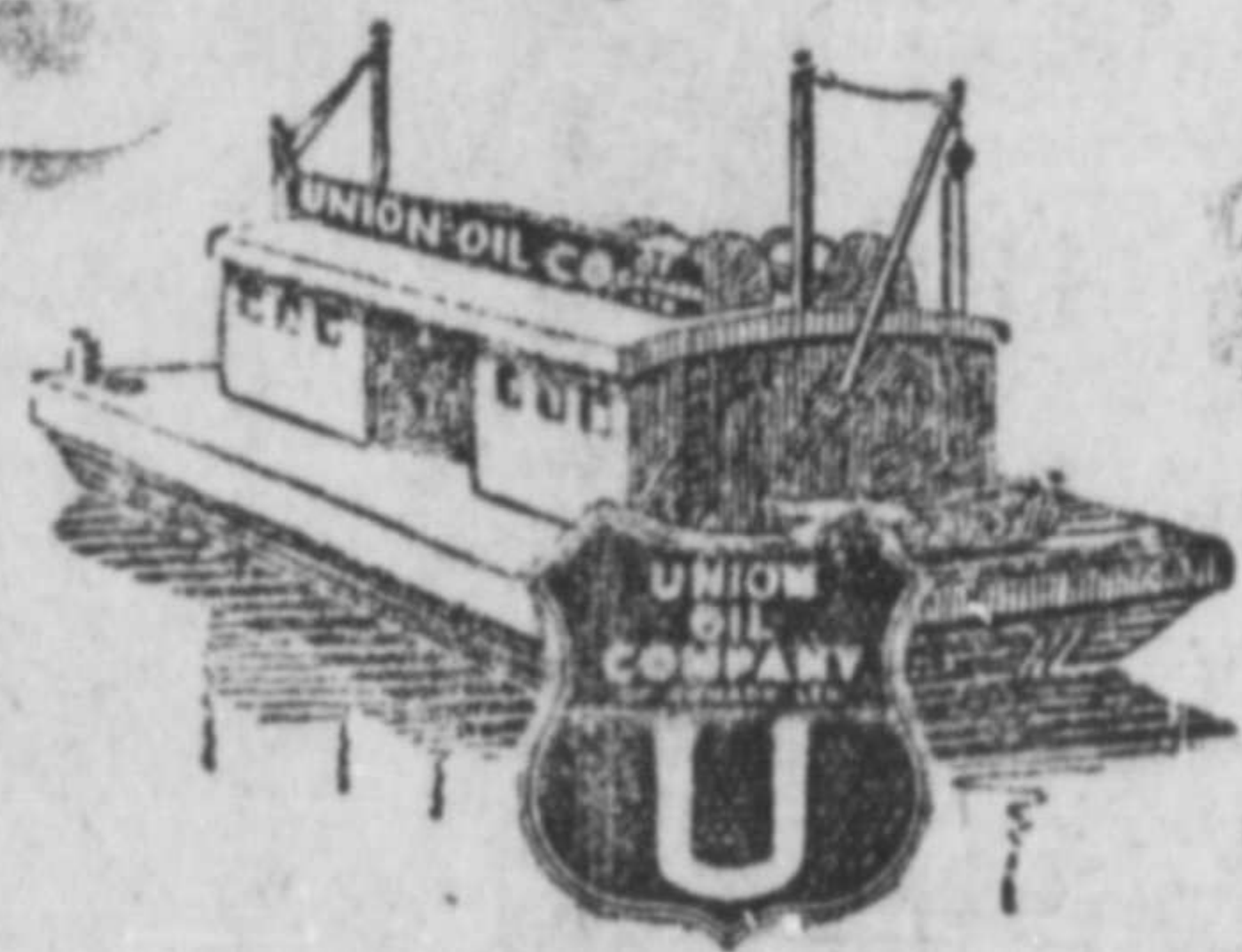
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Hon. H. H. Stevens in Able Address

the debt. In eight years that government had guaranteed railway bonds to the extent of \$487,000,000 but had not included that sum in the public debt as the Conservatives would have done.

It was unpopular. Mr. Stevens realized to say that the country was not progressing and that business was not good. This, however, was the time for an accounting and it was not well to shut one's eyes to facts. Since 1922, the speaker declared, taking into account gains by immigration and natural increase as well as death losses, Canada had had a shrinkage in population of 1,355,000 persons. Whereas there should be 11,152,000 people, there actually were only 9,796,000. Such staggering and appalling figures should rightly challenge the attention of the people of the Dominion. Such was the position despite the great natural resources and opportunities of the country. He criticized the government for hoodwinking this matter. The object and vision of the Conservative party and its leader, Mr. Bennett, was not only to stop this shrinkage but make of Canada a country a place where even more people might come and be profitably occupied.

Heading this outward procession from Canada to the United States was the cream of the brain power of Canada, college graduates who had been trained at the expense of the taxpayers of the Dominion. The reason that Canada had been unable to supply occupation for these people was because there was lack of a leading directing policy. The only thing to do was to condemn the government and its policy. In 1923 the government had tinkered with the woolen schedule with the result that Canadian woolen factories had closed and 22,000 operators had been put out of business and the most of these were now to be found in the United States. Similarly in 1929 the iron and steel schedule had been lowered and 200 factories were adversely affected and tens of thousands of men thrown out of work. They too, as a result of a specific act of the government, had joined the outward procession. When no one in Canada benefitted an atom from these changes which had tended only to increase imports from the United States was that not improvidence and lack of economic wisdom? Mr. Stevens recalled that he had warned the government that it would be delivering Canada bound and shackled into the hands of the United States. Had not Canada already progressed toward that unhappy fate? Canada's purchases from the United States had increased from \$500,000,000 to \$900,000,000 and much of the goods involved in that increase could well be made in Canada. Each year Canada added in this manner to the mortgage held on the Dominion by the United States. That mortgage could be added to just so long as there continued to be a margin of safety. The country could not continue to go behind in this manner year after year indefinitely. It was a condition, the speaker declared, that could be remedied. Meantime, United States continued to study how they could stop buying from Canada.

Foreign Trade

Mr. Stevens challenged Premier King's statement that Canada's foreign trade was steadily increasing. He criticized many of the trade treaties which the Liberal government had entered into as being injurious to Canada. Under the

treaty with France, canned salmon from Canada now entered that country under an intermediate tariff instead of on a minimum tariff. The result was that importations of Japanese pink salmon to France increased while the Canadian importations decreased relatively. The French tariff on Canadian wheat had been placed on a sliding scale and last year France had imposed a tariff of 95c a bushel against Canadian wheat which effectively kept it out of that country. Italy and Germany, having similar agreements with Canada, had likewise kept out the wheat from this country. Such were examples of the trade treaties which had been entered into by this government.

Mr. Bennett had not said that he would abrogate all the trade treaties but he had said, and the speaker heartily endorsed the statement, that he would abrogate all treaties that were harmful to Canada and under which Canadian industries were not adequately protected. Premier King had asked: who would Mr. Bennett, if he became Premier, take with him to the Imperial economic conference. "I have no idea who he would take," Mr. Stevens declared, "but, if he went alone, he would be worth more than the whole bunch of them." (laughter).

Under the agreement with France, Mr. Stevens continued, French wines were allowed to enter Canada on a fixed low duty. Under the Australian treaty, there was no preference for Australian wines. In view of the production of pilsner beer in Canada against which a tariff had been imposed by the United States, Mr. Stevens thought it was the duty of the Canadian government to put up a decent duty against American cottonseed oil so as to keep the market for pilsner oil which had been proven to be equally as good.

"Prince Rupert ought to be," declared Mr. Stevens, "a metropolis and an industrial centre. This district occupies about the same position geographically as such cities as Oslo in Norway and Sweden. The climate is better and the district is larger. There are more minerals here, more coal, greater resources, better farming lands and greater possibilities for industrial development. Those two countries have a population of twelve million people. There is no reason that there should not be as many here except that there is lack of a policy of leadership."

Something must be done to correct the situation, Mr. Stevens declared. It was vital to this coast that the purchasing power of the Orient should be restored. The future of this coast was wrapped up with trade with the Orient. There were a billion people there who were living below a decent standard of subsistence because Europe had destroyed the value of their silver money by going on a gold basis.

Oriental Problem

"The biggest problem facing the world today is the restoration of the purchasing power of the Orient. It is a matter that should be taken up at the Imperial Conference," continued the speaker. "It was the action of London and German financiers in 1870 that brought about the demoralization of silver values. A terrible weight of responsibility rests on the British Empire in the restoring of silver values and it is something that means more to the development of the Empire than anything else. It is but natural that the ratio of silver and gold should be maintained. The Orient cannot buy and cannot pay because they have not the gold while their silver has been put down to 38c per ounce. Western civilization must face this problem or it is going to face a revolution in the Orient for the people cannot go on starving and dying this way. No more profitable thing could be done for British Columbia than to restore the purchasing power of the Orient."

The railways of Canada were capable of carrying 20 times more freight than they did today. To produce one ton of manufactured product, it was necessary to haul four tons of raw material. If Canada imported its manufactured products, the railways hauled one ton instead of five. But Canada would never build up her industries as long as she continued to purchase nine hundred million dollars worth of goods a year from United States.

Mr. Stevens criticized the tariff schedules in the Dunning budget on the ground that the countervailing duties against United States goods applied to only \$14,000,000 out of the \$900,000,000 that Canada imported yearly from the other side. As far as the British preference was concerned, duties on 125 items from Great Britain were made lower and many of the items that had been placed on the free list were absurd such as live hogs, buckwheat, oats, rye, wheat, corn-

meal, hay and straw, cut flowers, sugar beets, woodpulp, etc. It was an "absurd, inconsistent and invidious preference and an evidence of insincerity." At the same time, the Conservative policy was that Canada should not be sacrificed to Britain or any other country. "Our policy is to sit around in conference in the effort to divert imports from United States to Great Britain but, even more, to Canada."

Regarding unemployment, Mr. Stevens challenged the Liberal stand that it was not constitutional for the Dominion government to deal with it. The Conservative stand was that it was not only constitutional but the duty of the federal government to deal with it. Why should the municipalities or even the provinces be called to carry the whole burden when the situation was due to a large extent to national conditions? "We say that it is the duty of the federal government to step in and give immediate relief by giving jobs and not by giving doles. It would also be our policy to turn our attention to the cause of unemployment and endeavor to remove that cause and meantime carry out useful work. One of these works would be the construction of a national highway to which the Conservative party is pledged and which Premier King, by the power of his majority, turned down."

Technical education aid was another matter which the Conservative party stood to support. Still another matter was a large and generous national old age pension scheme as against a system of provincial pensions which worked hardship upon the provinces.

"We are asking you to support Mr. Brady," Mr. Stevens concluded, "because he stands behind Mr. Bennett and policies which we believe will lead to the restoration of prosperity an expansion of industry and development in Canada."

Mr. Brady

Mr. Brady was in rare good humor for a 25-minute speech. His talk lacked much of the rancor that he had displayed in his opening speech of the campaign and was, therefore the more pleasant. He vigorously defended himself against attacks in "The Political Corner of the Daily News" and decried what he described as "spurious" methods in the Liberal campaign.

In opening, Mr. Brady spoke in a complimentary way of the public record of Mr. Stevens. One of his most valuable works had been the reorganization of the customs department.

Mr. Brady accepted the challenge that had been issued to him in "The Political Corner" of the Daily News. He did not suppose it would have any effect however upon the "adumbrated intelligence" of the person or persons who had charge of that column. He liked to see fair play at all times and he felt confident of the answer the electors would give to such campaign methods.

The business men of Canada knew what the sales tax reduction boasted of by the Liberal government had meant. They had found that tax at 3% in 1921, had increased it as high as 6% and then gradually lowered it to 2%. The government had actually collected \$612,558,000 from sales tax as it had been handled whereas, if they had left it as they found it for those nine years, they would have collected only \$424,000,000. Yet the Liberal government boasted of reduced taxation. Mr. Brady challenged any one to refute his figures.

Again discussing Liberal boasts of reduced taxation, Mr. Brady gave the following figures of total revenue collected by the government from all sources of taxation since 1923: 1923, \$355,453,000; 1924, \$341,718,000; 1925, \$300,000,000; 1926, \$327,000,000; 1927, \$346,000,000; 1928, \$364,000,000; 1929, \$395,000,000. He predicted that taxation for this year would go close to \$400,000,000. This increase in taxation was despite the decrease in population and the fact that the agricultural industry of the Dominion had been destroyed and that woolen mills were working only three days a week. The people of Cahaa, Mr. Brady declared, were manifesting their interest in the seriousness of the situation by the attention they were paying today to public affairs.

Deeply Interested

He was deeply interested in Canadian affairs, Mr. Brady said, not only because this country had been good enough for him to raise his own six children but from the standpoint of the thousands of other children in the country.

Mr. Brady referred to a statement which had been made by William Irvine, one of the prominent Labor M. P.'s, who had said that it was up to the people to decide whether they should trust the Mackenzie King government to administer a tariff policy that they had adopted

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only by reason of political expediency or Mr. Bennett and the Conservative party which had consistently through the years advocated such a policy.

Speaking of the Peace River outlet, Mr. Brady declared that it seemed to be the Liberal platform to promise the outlet to either Vancouver or Prince Rupert depending on how those ridings voted. It was regrettable, Mr. Brady said, that so much attention was paid by this government to the question "who is your sitting member?"

"If that is their plea," Mr. Brady declared, "I know it is a spurious coin and it should be nailed down once and for all. "The Liberal party," concluded Mr. Brady, "is up the tree of protection now. On July 28 we will invite them to come down." (laughter).

At the conclusion of the meeting, three hearty cheers, proposed by Mr. Stevens, were given by the audience for Mr. Brady.

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
